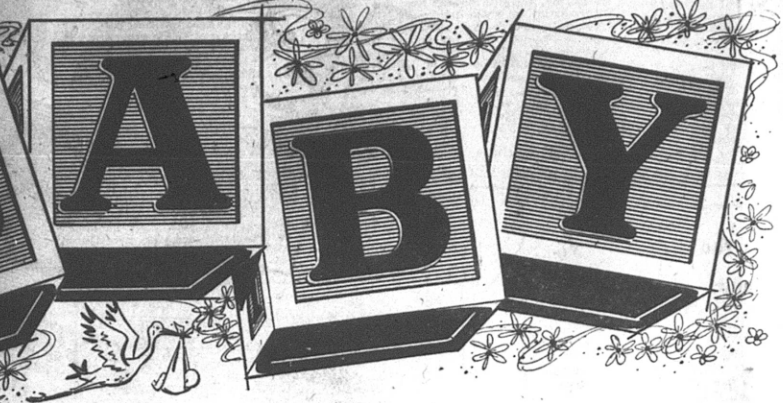

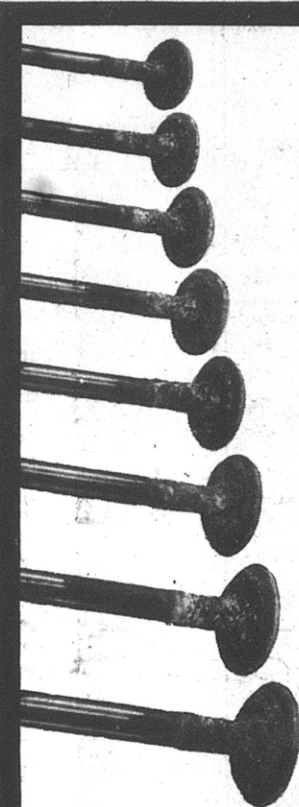

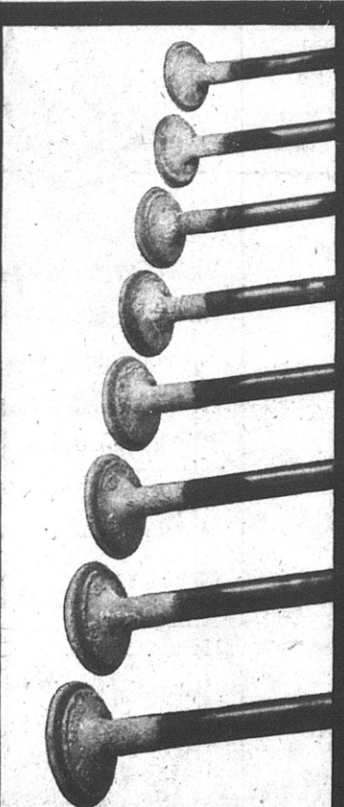

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO REGULATING CERTAIN UTILITIES MATTERS PERTAINING TO NEW BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. From and after the first day of January, 1956 all persons, firms or corporations interested in opening new allotments in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio shall furnish to the Council satisfactory evidence that they have installed or will install lateral sewers to the Village Trunk Line sewers either installed or to be installed.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and shall go into effect immediately, the reason for this emergency being that the provisions here in set forth are necessary in order to have proper sewerage services in the Village of Plymouth.
