Plymouth's retail business houses announced today new shopping hours for the Christmas season.

Harry Jump to Run For Assembly in 1956

Harry Jump, Republican who has been Huron county commissioner for the past seven years, announces his candidacy for the state general assembly.

Jump plans to file in February. He will complete his eighth year as county commissioner in 1956.

Board Decrees Cost Of Underground Wire Paid by Householder

Underground wiring between village council and private houses must be at the expense of the householder, the Board of Public Affairs decreed Monday night.

After consulting with the Ohio Board of Building and Construction, the Board laid down the following policy: "The property owner must stand all the expense of wiring and meter, to be installed outside the house."

Russell Moser, Shiloh, who has been serving as acting superintendent of light and power for six months, was hired, subject to approval of the village council, at \$4,750 annually.

The Board occupied much of its time in the settlement of a delinquent power account which has run well into three figures and necessitated the calling of several special meetings. At long last, the Board was able to report, the account has been settled and the subscriber will not be permitted to use current worth more than the size of his deposit. He is on a standing five-day notice of termination. Evidence of illicit tampering with seals on water and electric meters has been discovered. The Board was told, and new seals will be affixed in suspect cases in such manner that further tampering cannot be accomplished without detection.

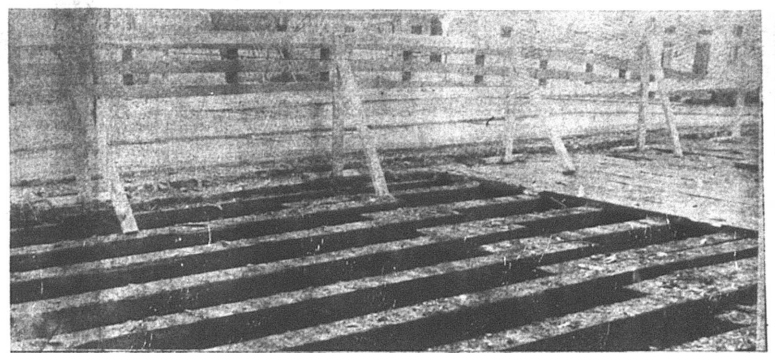

Bridge to Be Closed During Repair

Vehicle traffic over the West Broadway bridge will be closed until the bridge is repaired, the village council decided Tuesday night.

Citing danger to traffic over the open bridge, the council said pedestrian traffic might continue, especially that of school children, under appropriate supervision.

D. W. Eills notified the council he would enter into a deed to some future date to allow Albert Berberick to establish a 50-foot street in Hoffman street. The council informally agreed to accept Mr. Berberick's plan and called a special meeting for tonight to settle this and other emergency matters.

A check for \$50 payable to the fire department was received from the Richmond Equity Insurance Co. as contribution to its expense in fighting a recent fire in Plymouth Township. Since the township al-

ready has reimbursed the village, the council voted to hand the check to the township trustees.

Mayor Alfred Parkinson expressed some indignation over a letter from Huron County Prosecutor Bernard Freeman to the effect the village jail is in a deplorable condition. He said he would speak to the prosecutor about the matter, and suggested that authorities might look elsewhere for more satisfactory conditions.

The fire department was authorized to obtain a special plastic material with which to construct a windshield for riders of the fire apparatus. The department will do the work of installing the device.

Police Chief R. L. Meiser was instructed to prepare a list for consideration tonight of likely needy families who might receive Christmas baskets. At the

suggestion of Mayor Parkinson, it was agreed to distribute the orders to supply baskets evenly among all grocers.

The council agreed to see to it that Christmas lights about the square are turned on and off. The lights will remain on all night Christmas eve.

Earl R. Shaffer, representing Charles A. Hirsch & Co., Cincinnati, appeared before the council to ask if positive steps toward financing the proposed water extension could now be taken. He ran into some unexpected dissatisfaction by some members of the council, but withdrew quietly after being told it would be five or six months, in all likelihood, before the council can talk firmly about financing.

In special session tonight the council will be called upon to approve as emergency measures the

hiring of Russell J. Moser as superintendent of light and power, the appointment of Ray Bright as assistant fire chief, the appropriation of \$1,800 from one fund to another to pay for the drilling of a well in the Henry Chapman property at New Haven, and similar matters.

As is customary, the press will excuse itself during discussion of the names of persons to receive relief baskets. The question of whether families in distress because the principal wage earner is on strike should receive aid is apt to be discussed.

Fire Chief Dalton F. McDougal, sporting a Kruschke-like spatte and looking not unlike the Soviet leader — was authorized to purchase springs for a nozzle which has not been performing adequately to standing operating procedure.

Pilgrims May Break Losing Skein Friday

Still seeking their first victory over two seasons and the tail end of a third, Plymouth's Pilgrims open their 1955-56 home basketball stand in the high school tonight.

Butler's Bulldogs, reputedly weak and already swamped by Belleville, furnish the opposition. The Pilgrims, who managed to do better but not quite well enough against Union on the visitors' floor Friday, will be handicapped by the absence of young Ray Einsel, who sprained his right wrist — the same one he broke two years ago — in a practice scrimmage with the Ashland college footballers. Einsel missed the Union contest and may not get to play before the Christmas break.

Eddie Taylor, lanky center, twisted his ankle two or three times in the Union fray and although he is expected to see service, Coach Lew Petit has doubts the ankle will hold up for a full 48 minutes.

The Pilgrims managed to hold Union to a four-point lead at half time Friday, largely on the strength of a 16-point second quarter.

But, as in the case of the Margaretta contest, the Plymouth five wilted in one period and Union's third quarter total of 18 put the Indians out of reach. Final score was 56 to 42.

The Pilgrim scoring was distributed among eight athletes, with Ted Fox at the head of the list. He dumped in eight buckets and two free throws for 18 markers. Herb Caudill had eight and Frank Ousley and Bud Berberick seven each.

For Union, Jim Sprunger was

the big gun with 19 points, and Stan Young was runner-up with 11.

Tonight's contest should be a closer, if not so, other reason than that both five are weak, inexperienced, and on the way up.

Butler's resounding defeat at the hands of Belleville, its traditional rival, leads some experts to think the Pilgrims can win this one. If they do, it will be the first time in 27 games — 23 regularly scheduled contests and four in the county tourney — that the Pilgrims have won.

Fox and Bud Berberick will probably start at guards, with Ousley at center and Taylor and Caudill at forwards. Game time is 8 p.m. with the reserve game commencing an hour earlier.

Remembered by Ike, Farmer Dies at 96

A 96-year-old Butler township farmer who lived to receive a birthday greeting from the President of the United States died in Woodlawn Nursing home, Mansfield, Nov. 30.

He was Luther W. Pittenger, a native of Richmond county, where he was born Feb. 28, 1859. He was three months short of his 97th birthday.

Mr. Pittenger belonged to the Shenandoah Christian church. He lived all his life in the Pavois and Ganges area. Last year, President Eisenhower remembered his birthday with a personal greeting.

Funeral services were conducted from the Bender Funeral home, Greenwich, Friday at 2 p.m. by the Rev. Fred C. Stroebel, pastor of the United Methodist church, with interment in Ganges cemetery.

Mr. Pittenger's wife died Nov. 30, 1936, exactly 25 years to the day of his death. A daughter, Mrs. Frances Chum, Greenwich, a son, Arthur, Mansfield, and a brother, Sherman, Shelby, survive.

F-R-H Pays Xmas Bonus Of \$56,517 for 15th Year

For the 15th consecutive year, Christmas bonuses will be handed to its employees by Fate-Root-Heath Co.

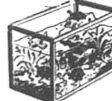

Forecast for Future Given By Mrs. Miller to Club Here

A trip to the moon by 1975, atomic powered aircraft in five years, two television sets in each home, and a four-hour work day were forecast for America by Mrs. E. B. Miller before the Twentieth Century Circle Nov. 28.

The circle met with Mrs. Earl C. Cashman in Springmill road. Mrs. Miller drew upon "Life in 1965" by Leo Cherner for her forecast.

White-collar employees will unionize, Mrs. Miller said, and as a nation America will be physically stronger but more nervous. Marriages will normally occur between 19-year-old girls and 22-year-old men, whether or not they have been delinquents. Delinquency, incidentally, is bound to increase, she said.

The home will branch out in labor-saving devices. Photo electric cells will open doors, and dishes are likely to be washed without a drop of water.

Food will be radiated. Potatoes will keep five years. They can be stored in dent-resistant plastic, which is also apt to find increasingly greater use in automobile body work.

America can count on a billion isotopes, and a uranium industry of \$300 annually. The whole nation will be united in the stamping out of disease, and homes are likely to be heated by irradiation from the sun.

Mrs. Peyton W. Thomas reviewed growth of the United Nations. Fifty-eight disputes have been dealt with, she said, one war has been fought in Korea, and three local outbreaks were mediated: the Israelis vs. the Arabs, the Indians vs. Pakistanis and the Dutch vs. the Indonesians.

Sixty nations comprise the organization for world peace, she said. Of these, 51 were charter members. There are 82 nations whose sovereignty is separate and distinct, authorizing their membership.

Annual cost of operation of UN is \$40 million, Mrs. Thomas said, and \$15,000 employees make up the payroll.

"The future of the UN is anybody's guess," she declared, "but

the trend, we hope, will be toward the original purpose, peace."

Eighteen members attended. Mrs. Stacy Brown will be hostess to the next meeting Monday night.

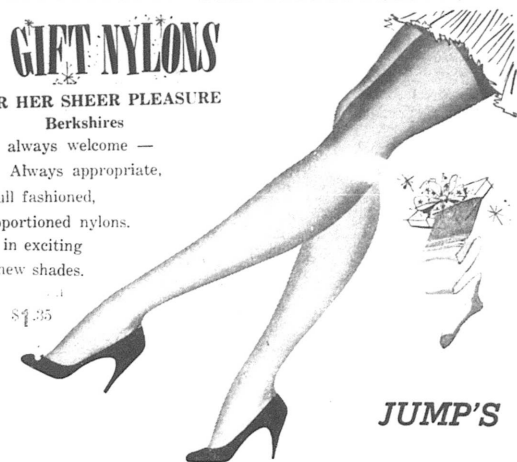

Our favorite weekend reading is the part of the financial section of the Sunday New York Times that contains those fascinating help-wanted ads addressed to folks trained in field like servo mechanisms, the experimental fabrication of cornets, the analysis of loop-response-transients, ram-jet design and development, electro-optics and analogue computation. Imagine there being enough ram-jet developers or loop-response-transient analysts around to make it worth while advertising for one!

The gifted young men at whom this recruiting literature is aimed (and we presume they'd accept a mere woman if she qualified) have almost certainly cut all ties with the past. Except in rare instances, they can't ask their fathers for advice in how to get a job. Because, of course, Pop doesn't know the first darn thing about it.

Not long ago, we ran into a man whose 22-year-old son already has a job in some branch of the physical sciences or other. "I think I'm fairly intelligent," Dad said to us. "and one day I took my boy into the woods for a walk and took a deep breath and said, 'Now, look, son, if security permits, I want you to tell me just what the hell it is that you do.' Well, he did tell me because security apparently didn't have much to do with it. And for 20 minutes after he told me, I understood it all completely. But a few minutes after that, I couldn't make head nor tail of it any more."

Maybe one reason young scientists are in short supply - and we don't doubt that they are, or the firms advertising wouldn't be paying the high rates of the Times to get - is that a lot of them are advertising copy writers for the 1956 cars. Certainly the ads for many of them make it sound like the automobiles of 1956 are about to take off into rarified space.

Oldsmobile has its Jetaway Hydromatic. Pontiac its jet-styled adornments front and back, and Chrysler its flight-swept rear fenders. And the funny thing about it all is that while they proclaim at great expense all sorts of futuristic refinements that when we were young we heard only on the Buck Rogers program, they have quietly taken a step backward.

Nearly all of the manufacturers have given up on those pesky rear-wheel fender aprons. Caddy still sports a small fender apron on all but one of its models, but it's not much of an apron. More like one of those dinguses you'd expect to see on a burlesque queen.

"Fender apron" was a misnomer anyway. An apron around our house - and we suspect around yours - is a thing to be whisked on and off. We've never seen a fender apron that would come off without costing us blood - about a cupful from one hand or the other. And as for putting the danged thing back on, we'd sooner hire a servo mechanic than try to do it alone.

Nash, which has claimed for years that you ought to buy one because the front seat flops back into a

comfortable bed, now is advertising three-tone cars as well. This was inevitable. We expect to see one decorated like a house we noticed near Detroit, the other day: all patchwork colors. Not bad if you are color-myopic, and subject to low blood pressure.

Somebody who'd been isolated from the American scene (all right, he was peeling spuds in a barracks in Germany) came back and nearly went off his trolley the first several hundred yards from the pier. "MiGod," he exclaimed. "when I saw all these two-tone pink and blue jobs, I thought I'd walked into one of those baby showers." The European cars, he hastens to explain, are normally of one color.

One friend of this column's who lost no time in purchasing a 1956 model picked it up on a rainy day. The salesman whisked him around the block on a test run, and they both noticed that a trickle of water was falling onto the dashboard through the windshield. Horrified, the salesman expressed regret and begged the customer to fetch the car back the next day, when he would get their A No. 1 mechanic to put some cement in the right place to stop the leak. It was agreed. But the customer couldn't make it the next day.

He called up the salesman and said, "I just rang you up to say I'm tied up and can't get there, so don't stand there with that can of sealer."

The salesman laughed a little (about like you laugh when somebody tells you're putting on weight) and said, "I just knew you had a heck of a good sense of humor. That's what you've got to have in 1956 - don't buy a car unless you've got a good sense of humor."

You said it, mister. In spades.

And in case you might want to buy the whole danged state, with the complete kit and kaboodle thrown in, get up \$12,642,845,291 for the real estate and \$7,011,706,276 for the public utility and tangible property, or a grand total of \$19,654,551,567. Come to think of it, that figure's incorrect, too. It was all right as of Dec. 31, 1953, but the time it takes to find out the place is worth means that it has appreciated in value.

It's common, this practice. When a company or corporation says that it was worth so much, it always does so on such and such a date, when the inventory was made. Nobody ever knows, accurately, what an outfit is worth on the day you inquire.
