New Lights Put Up By Shiloh Board

The traditional religious services at the beginning of Lent were observed in Plymouth churches this week as a full program of observance of the last 40 days of the life of Jesus was planned.

Plymouth Methodist church opened Lenten observance with services last night, Ash Wednesday. Shiloh Methodist church will conduct services tonight. The Rev. Thomas M. Sheesley, pastor, will be in charge.

During Lent, Plymouth Methodist services will be conducted Wednesday evenings, Shiloh services Thursdays. All services will commence at 8 p.m.

Regular Sunday worship services in Shiloh will be at 9:45 a.m. during Lent, and Plymouth services will be at 11 a.m. The Rev. Mr. Sheesley will preach at both.

On Palm Sunday, Apr. 3, baptism and reception of members will be conducted at Plymouth and Shiloh churches.

A three-hour Good Friday service on the theme, "The Seven Words of the Cross" will commence at noon in the Plymouth church Apr. 1.

Seven men will speak five minutes each on each of the seven words. All Protestant churches in the village will unite for the service.

Roman Catholics were received at St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church yesterday for distribution of ashes, in keeping with long-standing tradition, after a high mass at 6 a.m. to bless them.

During Lent, devotions will be conducted Wednesdays and Fridays at 7:45 p.m. Sunday masses will be at 6:30 and 8 a.m. (low masses) and 10 a.m. (high mass).

The pastor, the Rev. William Conces, will take confessions Friday, February 25, 1955, and Saturdays from 7:15 to 8 p.m.

Presbyterians will receive new members into the church on Palm Sunday, the Rev. Ralph M. Felix announces.

Township to Get Fire Protection

Pilgrims End Dismal Season With Tourney Loss to Bellville

A two-year fire protection contract calling for service by Plymouth telephone exchange connections at the rate of three fires for \$300 and \$100 for each additional fire will be offered to New Haven township trustees Tuesday night, it was learned yesterday.

The fire committee of the village council, Lawrence Cornell and J. Benjamin Smith, and Fire Chief Dallan F. McDougal submitted this recommendation to the village council Feb. 16 in delayed regular session and a resolution empowering the offer was unanimously approved.

The contract is substantially the same as that in force with Plymouth township, but it limits the distance over which the Plymouth fire department will go to fight fires in New Haven township.

This was desirable, the committee said, because part of New Haven township extends northwest of Willard village, a distance of some eight or nine miles from Plymouth, too far to draw the principal apparatus from the village event of a fire here.

Plymouth telephone exchange services some dwellings in the southern portion of the township, along Route 61, Plymouth East road, and as far as the Ripley township line.

Discussions with Willard fire fighters were necessary to agree upon zones of protection, the committee reported.

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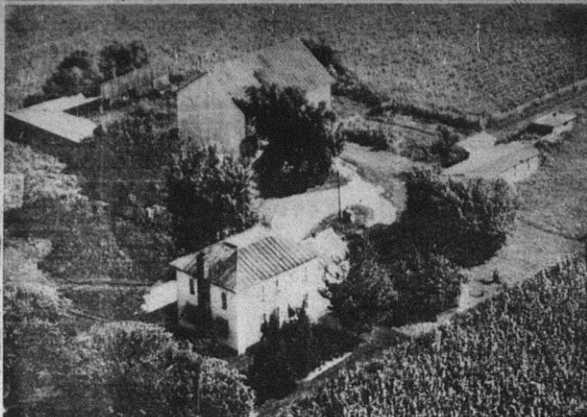

Wilcox Becomes Crop Farmer

Claude Wilcox used to worry about getting his chores done, and when he was in Florida this season, he didn't have that worry.

Why? Because he doesn't have any cows. A year ago, he sold them out, and since that time he has been a grass farmer.

The old place in Walnut road, New Haven township, used to lay down against the woods, but it was moved to the road, long before the Wilcoxes got it in 1944. Since that time, they've done a good deal of remodeling, and you could play a fair game of basketball in the living room, it's that long.

Claude Wilcox works by day at the Boughnville Elevator, and Mrs. Wilcox teaches school at Shelby, where their two children are enrolled. In between times, they farm.

The old barn, whose beams are hand hewn - you can see the adze marks on the beams even today, holds a good bit of timothy hay, and just to show you how fickle the market is, Claude Wilcox illustrates the hay farmer's problems with a tale.

"A man from Kentucky, offered me a good price for hay last fall and I said I'd wait till spring, because I thought the price would be up. I figured I'd get \$25 a ton for good hay. A few days ago, I sold that same hay to the same fellow for \$18 a ton."

He smiles, and then he says, "And I'm not going to make any more hay. I'll turn clover under for fertilizer, because without cows I have to replace the manure somehow."

The place supports right now a quota of just under 16 acres of wheat, and the balance of the land,

except for about 10 acres of woods in the northwest corner, supports corn and grasses.

As adviser, Claude Wilcox relies a great deal upon his father-in-law, Will Duffy, veteran New Haven township farmer who lives at the head of the road. The Duffy homestead was nearly burned out last spring, and the Duffys and Wilcoxes are interested observers of negotiations by New Haven township trustees for fire protection.

"Why, last spring, my daughter put in a call for fire protection to Willard, and they took the call, but they never showed up. The Greenwich firemen got here quickly after we called them and did a good job. It doesn't take long to get \$125 in a fire in the country. Mine cost me nearly \$5,000," explains Will Duffy.

Water is always a problem in New Haven township, and the Wilcoxes have a good dug well, a bit over 12 feet deep, which keeps them well supplied with good water. There's still a windmill in place over the well, and "on a cold night, it creaks like the dickens," laughs Mrs. Wilcox. "That's how I can tell it's cold."

Mr. Wilcox hasn't done anything about the windmill, because he's been too busy doing other things. "We cleaned out a hedge row there south of the house and pushed out a ditch west of that, against the road, and then we had to clean out a fence row to the east," he explains. "On top of that, these old trees need some work on them from time to time - shade on a farm is as important as water."

Along the drive there are two

majestic box elders that shade the yard, and down the lane there is a monstrous maple under which the cows used to lie, chewing their cud and building milk.

The Wilcox place would make a first-rate beef cattle farm. It has size, is well laid out, ideal for growing feed, and there's a freshet running down through the pasture that never goes dry. "My cows used to drink from it as long as it wasn't frozen over," offers Mr. Wilcox.

But for a family that's at the crossroads - for its children are in-between having to be cared for and caring for themselves - there's time for that. Meanwhile, they're enjoying the view across the meadows and sticking to their last as elevator man-farmer-school teacher.

Bond Sales Rise By 19 Per Cent During January

Ohioans started the year off with a 19 per cent increase in purchases of Series E and H savings bonds, compared to the same month a year ago, thus continuing the trend of higher investment in savings bonds, Avery C. Hand, Jr., chairman, Richland county savings bonds committee, reported today.

Sales of the two bonds in Richland county in January were \$413,309 compared to \$320,600 sold last year. Chairman Hand said 70 of Ohio's 88 counties showed increases for the month over last year.

Total state investment during January was \$34,442,651, or 9.3 per cent of the Ohio quota for 1955. A year ago aggregate purchases hit \$28,912,555. Nationally cash sales last month were the best since January, 1946, and the 573 million dollars invested in E and H Bonds represented 10.4 per cent of the national quota of five and a half billion dollars.

Series H bond investment during January topped the hundred million dollar mark for the first time since their introduction in June, 1952, and compared to a year ago, the gain was 68 per cent. Total cash value outstanding nationally in E and H Bonds reached 38 and a half billion dollars at the end of January.

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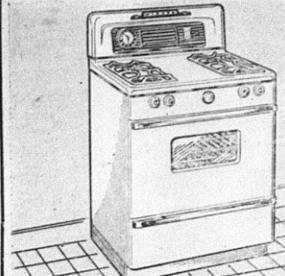

P-T-A Is a Forum

While it is good to know that the Parent Teachers association had its largest turnout in history at its meeting Thursday night, there is something to mull over.

Ask yourself the question: why was this particular meeting so well attended? Answer: because it was a musical program involving young people of the schools. Then ask this question: why don't folks respond to other meetings as well as they did to this one?

It's not so easy to answer that question. One answer to it is that folks like to be amused more than they like to think, or be forced to think. The Parent-Teacher movement is what Mr. Stevenson would call an "egghead" movement. It is designed to establish better school-community relations, and to do that, for the most part it is necessary to discuss such intricate, and unsensational, matters as lighting, acoustics, grading methods, personality trait development and control, educational psychology and such.

The Parent-Teacher association realizes that its main duty is the same as any good citizen's: how to make the general public live up to its civic obligations. The recent report of the committee to study Ohio's schools is before us, and it is a sobering, even alarming, document. Our schools are, frankly, not all they are cracked up to be, and something has to be done about it.

Plymouth schools, for example, fall within certain categories listed in the report which put them on the borderline between schools that should function and those that should be consolidated with others.

Consolidation is not a popular subject, yet it is one that we should all consider. There is no place quite like the P-T-A to discuss and thrash out these matters, because the reason the P-T-A exists is to improve things. And we shall soon need an addition to our high school.

Our school budget is something slightly over \$100,000 a year. Shiloh's is more or less the same. It would probably be cheaper to run the two together than as separate systems. And a better school, because a larger school, would result.

Or at least that is how it seems to us now. We think the P-T-A is a good place to talk these matters over, and we shall be first in line when a discussion of this sort is scheduled. Why not a debate on the subject?

Milwaukee's Better Business Bureau says that a typical order of food bought in a local supermarket costs less than the same order bought through a food freezer plan, and cites the figures: \$8.53 less. We do not doubt the Bureau, and we wish we could make Mrs. America understand that fresh stuff such as you get in the supermarket, when treated right in the kitchen, tastes better than any of this fancy-pantsy stuff the scientists dream up. You may fire when ready, Gridley.

Shiloh Teachers Get New Salary Scale As Board Revises Minima, Maxima

Minimum teacher salaries in Shiloh public schools will be \$2,550 annually, commencing with the 1955-56 school year, the Board of Education has decreed.

Teachers with only two years of formal training will receive that amount, with annual increments to \$3,300. The present scale is \$2,300 to \$3,050.

Teachers with three years' training will start at \$2,700 annually, with increments to \$3,450. Those who have been awarded baccalaureate degrees will receive \$2,900 minimum and \$3,450 maximum.

Teachers who have received five years of training will get \$3,100 minimum and \$4,200 maximum, annually.

A rule that teacher salary increases may be limited to \$400 annually even though a teacher may be eligible for more was set by the Board.

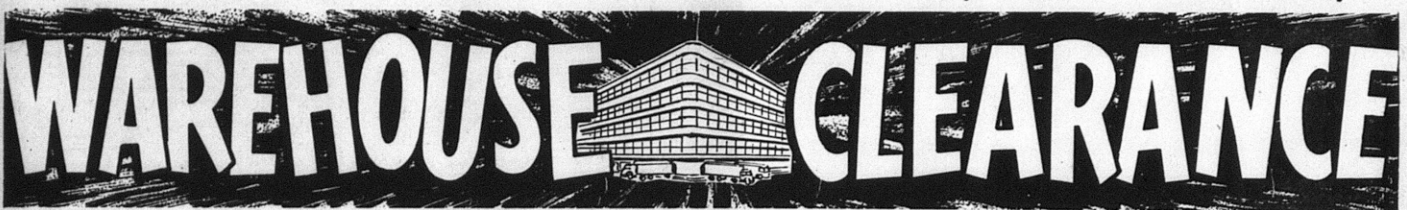
