Council to Convene On Sewer Tax Today

In one of its busiest sessions on record, the village council disposed of considerable business Tuesday night but agreed to put off until today a discussion of the draft sewer service ordinance.

The council heard Village Solicitor Joseph F. Dush explain the views of Henry Crawford, top legal expert of Squires, Sanders & Dempsey, Cleveland attorneys retained by the village in connection with the sewer bond issue. In short, they suggested the ordinance be watered down somewhat if the village desires to avoid any possibility of legal action by disgruntled citizens.

But, Mr. Dush pointed out, the recommendations of Mr. Crawford are only storm warnings; they do not mean that a storm will in fact ensue.

After some debate, the council seemed of one mind to go ahead with its initial plans, with the possibility that the sewer rate for Fate-Rook-Heath Co. may be revised.

In other action, the council passed unanimously a resolution to extend a two-year fire contract to New Haven township. Trustees of the township and their clerk were present to hear the motion. The contract would require payment of \$300 annually for two fire calls within 60 days of the date of signing the contract. Additional fire calls will be at the rate of \$100 a fire within 60 days of the call.

Plymouth would commit only one fire apparatus, may cancel the contract upon 90 days' notice, or when the township's contract with Willard may terminate, whichever is the sooner.

Upon request of Police Chief Robert L. Meiser, the council authorized purchase of a finger-printing outfit to cost about \$30. On recommendation of the Board of Public Affairs, which was present, the council voted to extend \$995 for an air hammer and compressor, cost to be shared with the Board and with the cemetery board.

Although it was brought out that repairs to the village truck will cost in the neighborhood of \$400 and economy dictates purchase of a new one, the council tabled further action.

The cemetery board was authorized to reinvest \$700 in U. S. savings bonds.

Bids will be received by the clerk for the purchase of salt for the water softening plant and for the right to be designated as official depository of inactive village funds. The latter will be received in special session Mar. 17.

First, Second Grades To Get Polio Shots, Wain Tells Mothers

All first and second graders of Plymouth public schools will be immunized against polio with Salk vaccine this spring, Dr. Harry Wain announced at Tuesday's meeting of the Mothers' club at the elementary school. Although the vaccine is held to be successful, the outcome of last year's test have not been made public. As soon as the announcement of the results is made, several commercial drug companies will release the vaccine to general use, so that every child may have its advantages.

Dr. Wain outlined the history of the three known types of polio to the Mothers' club. When it was first accepted as a separate disease, it affected young children in most cases, and during the last 25 years, it has struck adults. He called it a disease of civilization. In countries with meager sanitation, it exists, but the population has built up an immunity to it, and there are very few serious cases.

In the United States where a high degree of cleanliness is maintained, the average person has not built up an immunity which is why a vaccine has been developed as in the past with diphtheria, scarlet fever, and whooping cough.

Dr. Wain said the Salk vaccine covers the three types.

Frank Kieffer, Local Artist, Paints Seascapes from South Sea Memories

Frank A. Kieffer's memory works like a color camera, and he projects images he saw years ago, "when I was young and footloose," onto canvases these days in a riot of color that is a delight to behold. At least, it's a delight to him, and he's hoping some of it will rub off on the students in the art classes he plans to teach in the industrial arts shop of the high school.

Mr. Kieffer, a quiet-spoken man in his late thirties who is employed at Wilkins Air Force depot, is a

native of Sandusky. In the thirties, he went to California, enlisted in the Army, and was assigned to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, as a private in the 11th Field Artillery Regiment. It was here that his long standing penchant for sketching and drawing came into its own.

"I'd gotten started in school in Sandusky years before," he says, "with his ever-present pipe clenched in his teeth," when I won a contest for the best sketch poster. Then, when I got to Hawaii, those sunsets and that

sea, why, man, they just set me off."

A private's pay wasn't much, in those days, but a dollar bought more than it does now. He got together a kit, and joined the Association of Honolulu Artists. It wasn't long before he achieved recognition. His only exhibition, "The 1937" exhibition of the association, was a

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with entries of professional artists and experienced painters.

This and other paintings he sold, and he continues to sell some from time to time. But mainly it is a hobby. And much of it is done during his lunch hour, with a sandwich in one hand and a brush in the other.

"I like seascapes most," says Frank Kieffer. "I just love the sea,

and most of the stuff I am doing nowadays is putting down on canvas those sunsets over the water that I remember from my days in Hawaii."

Of late, he has been trying some Arizona landscapes, and here again, the memory of his experiences there flash before his eyes and go down to the end of his brush.

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"You can do ever so much more with oils and get a better color expression," he claims.

Mr. Kieffer appeared before the Community club Tuesday night to explain the various techniques and materials of the artist's craft.

"An artist grows, as he matures, as he sees things differently, as times and methods change," explains Frank Kieffer, exhibiting some of his early work to demonstrate his point. "Then, too, there

are half a dozen or more different schools of painting starting with realism, expressionism and all the other isms' up to cubism. I'm a realist, myself." His works show it. His seascapes show a striking influence of Winslow Homer, the celebrated artist whose seascapes rank among the finest in the recorded history of art. "Yes, he's a favorite of mine," says Frank Kieffer shyly. "You don't get ideas out of him. (Please turn to page 5)

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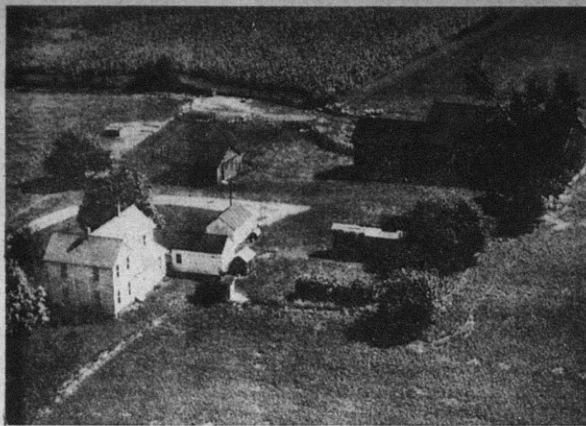
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Marion Baker Crosses Sheep

Marion Baker is pretty much sold on a Corriedale-Shropshire cross in lambs on the farm belonging to Mrs. Effie Brown of Greenwich which he farms on shares.

The place measures 100 acres, and it lies at the end of a lane extending east from Route 178 southeast of Shiloh. He's been on the place going on eight years now, and he says "I just try anything that'll make me a dollar."

One of the experiments that makes him a substantial dollar is that cross. He keeps a Corriedale ram - not registered, but he could be - and about 30 ewes. Come the second week in April, he expects to have about 28 or 29 lambs, which he'll wean as soon as he can and start on pasture grass early in May. As soon as he can get 80 pounds of good pink lamb flesh on them - he'll hustle them off to Cleveland for market.

Seems like they want lambs that'll go between 80 and 90 pounds up at Cleveland. When you get a 100-pounder they squawk," says Mr. Baker. He doesn't deal with the Greenwicks lamb pool, for which reasons he isn't quite sure, but he says he always gets "the top price at Cleveland anyway, so

it doesn't matter much." The farm runs on a three-year rotation and Mr. Baker never has much trouble with the wheat quota. Reason: he never plants any more than he needs, and his needs are less than the quota.

One sure way of making out on a share farm proposition, says this veteran Cass township agriculturalist, is to choose good seed. "I stick with DeKalb 404," asserts Mr. Baker. "It has always taken good care of me. Last year I'd say I got 200 baskets of corn to an acre with that seed."

Right now, Mr. Baker handles six cows, all but one of them Guernseys. He doesn't think Guernseys are any better or worse than any other breed, an attitude which he maintains throughout his farming activities. Breed doesn't make much difference, he claims, if good types are chosen. The same applies with hogs.

"I'd like to raise more hogs, but gosh, the price has gone down so much it hardly pays," he says. "And," chimes in Mrs. Baker, "cream prices have dropped almost 50 per cent in a year, and you can hardly pay for the feed of the cows."

The Bakers don't bother much with poultry, and they keep only a few hens to supply eggs for table use.

With a sheep flock, you've got to weed out the old ewes pretty carefully, and when you do, if you're on a stock share basis, you've got to replace them with ewe lambs that must be held out from breeding their first season to make them stronger. This is a practice that is almost a religion on the farm, and which has the endorsement of his partner.

A good part of the 100 acres is in woodlot, and in those woods stand a considerable number of sugar maples that haven't been tapped for a number of years. "They ought to be full this year," they ought to be full this year, and I can lay hands on an evaporator, maybe I'll have a try at it," says Mr. Baker.

Now if there'll only be a hard freeze and about three inches of snow, the kids east of Shiloh can have some sugar candy.

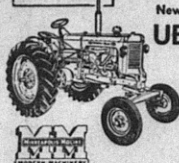
Eight badges for achievements were handed to as many Cub Scouts Friday night as Plymouth pack held its "Blue and Gold" theme night in the high school auditorium.

sews rag rugs for the Methodist church and is an eager reader of detective novels.

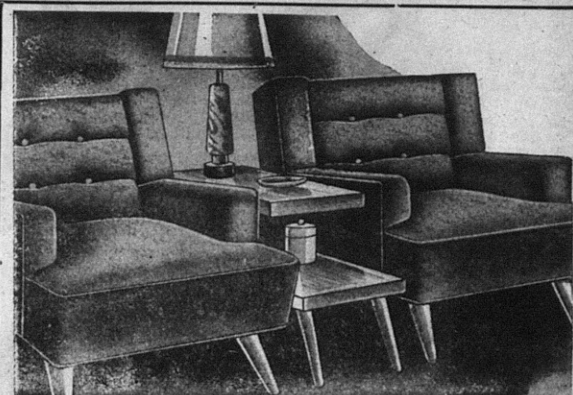
She abhors both radio and television, and says she can find ample activity for her mind in her sewing and reading.

Representative McGregor has sent us a copy of the summary of his recent survey of opinion of farmers in the 17th Congressional district. It shows that farmers are split, about evenly, on the subject of price supports for principal crops.

We do not quarrel with their right to hold any view that seems appropriate to them, and if a farmer wants price supports to be abolished, that's his privilege. But we do quarrel with the logic of their thinking and the depths of their understanding of the situation as it exists.

For anybody who has been around long enough can see that price support is as much a part of American agriculture as fertilizer and improved seed. Taken on the whole, farmers across the nation would no more sacrifice the principle of supporting prices than they would forego rural electrification.

As a consequence, it is important we think, for farmers who are our bread and butter - and make no mistake about it, Plymouth and it shopping area flourish because of the small farmer - to size up the situation and attack it where it is vulnerable.

For it is foolish to go out tilting windmills, like Sancho Panza. We can no more upset acreage control and price support than we can pry the world off its axis. But there is something we can do, and that is to take our wheat out of the bread grain program.

The underlying principle of the wheat program is the control of wheat that enters commerce as bread grains. Prices of wheat in the world, through the International Wheat Agreement and in national markets, are determined by the value of wheat for use in making bread, in every country a staple of diet.

But the wheat that is grown hereabouts is not bread wheat. It is primarily used for other purposes, chiefly in the making of cake flour and other luxury items that do not affect the broad base of anyone's living standard.

Given these facts, it seems only right to take cake wheat from the bread wheat program. The wheat which is produced hereabouts does not affect the foodstuff program in this or any other country.

Small farmers cannot stand the restriction of acreage because they are not geared, financially or topographically, to any changeover to grass or another cash crop. They need the money that derives from a cash wheat crop.

And we say, let 'em have it. Let 'em eat cake, as Marie Antoinette said. For whatever we grow of cake wheat doesn't upset the basic control of bread grain production and price.

Our neighbors and customers who are opposed - and we think rightly, because of the economic hardship - to acreage controls might do well to concentrate upon this argument, for of all we've heard or read about, this is the only one on which the system is at all vulnerable.

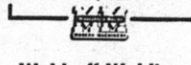

Shelby Cop, Injured Chasing Local Men, Sues for \$25,000

A Shelby police officer whose injuries resulted from a collision with another car while he was pursuing three Plymouth youths is suing in Richland County Common Pleas court for damages.
