Sewer Tax Passes As Council Sets Limit On Parking in Square

The controversial sewer usage tax was passed into law by the village council in a comparatively short session Tuesday night and two-hour parking limits were set in the business area of the village.

The sewer measure passed on third reading and is published in entirety elsewhere in this issue. A 30-day period is allowed by law during which objections may be filed, whereupon, the ordinance takes effect.

The street and sewer committee came up with a rate for the new sewer element, \$10 for the "diagnosis" period of 30 minutes, and \$15 for the first hour thereafter. Additional time will be at the rate of \$5 an hour.

Robert Bachrach appeared before the council to ask for enlightenment on a sewer drainage problem in land he owns north of Trux street, Mayor Glenn West and Councilman Elmer Markley promised to consult Huron and Richmond county authorities for assistance in correcting the situation.

H. James Root and Frederick Buzard appeared to ask what had been laid to repair the road running through the Willa-Rood addition. Mayor West told them that county help will be sought, and it funds are sufficient, the work will be done.

George W. Cheesman, member of the Board of Public Affairs, appeared before the council that drilling in the property of Henry Chapman at New Haven has produced a well with 32 feet of water-bearing sand, judged to be a well of superior quality. The lease which binds Chapman and the Board will have to be amended, Solicitor Joseph F. Dush pointed out, and the council's official authorization to commence drilling a well for production purposes is required.

A supplemental appropriation of \$997.20 to cover costs of material needed to construct a well in Mary Felt park was asked by the Park board. E. C. Gessinger has been engaged as park custodian.

Deposed Light and Power Superintendent Lincoln Sprowles signed a statement Tuesday admitting he forged the annals of George and John Kline and Richard Pittenger to checks issued by the clerk of the Board of Public Affairs.

Huron County Prosecutor Bernard Freeman has filed an affidavit in common pleas court which is based upon one of the forgeries. Sprowles admitted proceeds of between \$700 and \$800.

After sample signatures and handwriting specimens had been sent to a Cleveland expert for study and opinion, county authorities learned that comparison of Sprowles' signature and handwriting which appeared on the checks issued to George and John Kline was inconclusive and no positive evidence was found of forgery in these instances. The signature of Pittenger, however, when compared with Sprowles', and with Sprowles' other handwriting, produced a positive conclusion from the expert. He said there was a definite similarity between Sprowles' handwriting and what purported to be Pittenger's handwriting on the checks. Further, he said, he was prepared to so testify in a court of law.

Huron County Sheriff Harry Broome picked up Sprowles Tuesday and when confronted with the evidence, the readily admitted guilt. The sheriff apparently filed his own handwriting a statement to that effect, which is on file in the prosecutor's office.

Sprowles has been bound over for grand jury action.

The sewer tax has become law, and effective at once, it will be collected together with the water bill.

Short of the vote of the people to undertake the construction of an entire system, this is the only step the village council could take, and manfully it went about its tasks in full knowledge that the tax will be unpopular in some quarters. And this is an election year.

We congratulate the members of the council in getting the ordinance passed. It has some bugs in it, perhaps, but it's a start, and it can be readily amended if the need is shown.

It will do no good to point out that we are paying \$12 a year for something that hasn't materialized yet (and at that rate, it can't materialize for some time to come) whereas for about four times that much we would have something we need and are entitled to right now. Our real estate valuations would increase, and to every house owner that would be something worth having.

Nonetheless, it is a start, and a good one. We can use the sewer tax as evidence to the state health board that we are doing our best. We can use the tax to show to prospective industries that, together with an increased supply of water, good transportation, available building lots and other advantages, including a sedentary labor supply, we are a suitable place in which to install a new industry.

Despite the fact that you can't even buy a job hereabouts, we think the prospects for the future are bright. The state highway department plans to spend about five million dollars in this region over the next three years. Some of that will be spent in our town. The investment of the Ford Motor Company in a large plant at Sandusky is sure to stimulate some activity here. Some of our neighbors will work there.

Only the other morning, some of our business colleagues were bitterly lamenting the fact that business houses in Plymouth don't seem to be able to get together. They pointed out that once we had the business, now it is gone elsewhere.

There is no reason why we can't promote shopping in Plymouth. But it takes vigorous action: planning, willingness to take a chance, missionary work, and the wholehearted cooperation of everybody to meet competition. Because that's what it is: meeting competition.

And we believe in competition. If another newspaper does our job better than we do, we expect to suffer. That's why we work 65 and 70 hours a week to do better.

We have made positive steps. We have a sewer tax working, we have water soon coming, we are in touch with prospective industries. One more positive step is needed: let's let bygones be bygones, and give a scheme to promote trade in Plymouth another try. But that scheme has to be a competitive one.

Around the Square

The baseball season is on, and when the Yanks take it on the chin and the Indians win, you should hear our telephone ring! But the ragging is in jest, we hope, and all makes for a suitable topic of conversation. Better, certainly, than death, taxes and the accidental falling of a guided missile on the highway between Baltimore and Washington.

Reminds us of the fellow who had to explain a black eye. He said he'd been hit by a guided missile.

In just about two weeks, we have got to make a decision that, to us, at least, is an important one. With which party will we affiliate when we vote in the primaries? Never before have we officially joined a political party, though we've never voted in a school election for any Democrat except for local office.

Ike has said his credo is dynamic conservatism, which is explained by the pundits as a modern conservatism dedicated to the proposition of maintaining the buying power of the dollar. With this one could hardly disagree. Now, it is further interpreted by his political experts, this entails the drawing of some lines against some people, because it involves the reliance upon the inexorable demands of the price mechanism and supply and demand. This means, in principle, that controls go out the window.

The purpose of eliminating controls, down at the very bottom, is the encouragement of the private investor. And this entails a tax policy that is controversial from the start.

The shenanigans that the sharp operators have pulled off with the capital gains tax gimmick shames us, to tell the truth about it, but that's what the Republican architects refer to when they say that the line has to be drawn against somebody some of the time.

In the main, we agree with the Republican policies so far as domestic activities go, and agree partly with the foreign policies. So it seems likely that when we approach the First Evangelical Lutheran church where the party watchers sit and sign the book next month, we will declare ourselves as Republicans.

We wish this weren't necessary. We regard membership in a club, a party, or anything else, including a church, as wholehearted endorsement and support of all the club, party or church does. Otherwise, we wouldn't be a member.

Yet unless we declare ourselves one way or the other, we can't vote in May. That unfortunately is the American system.

Still, we are not entirely satisfied that the Republican party is doing right by the people. For one thing, the party itself is divided through the middle, and a Republican cannot tell from one day to the next what's what or who's who with his party. When the party sings to the McCarthy-McCormick-Jenner axis, we are Democrats who wholeheartedly and unashamedly. When it stays on the Ike-Dewey-Dulles axis, we are Republicans and proud of it.

Nor is the party doing much to encourage younger Republicans to take part in its activities and hold office either publicly or within the party. We'll bet a dime that the leadership and office holders in the GOP in both Richland and Huron counties haven't a woman or woman below 40 years of age. If the party is going to wait until a man is in middle age and injured to the conservatism that goes with it, the vibrant leadership of young America is lost to the party.

Unless a political party keeps step with the young people in the nation, and steers its policies toward a growing, modern country instead of a stand-pat idea, it will lose out to any other party that comes to grips with the needs of the hour and recognizes that a whole of a lot of citizens are wage earners, not investors.

Still, we'll probably register as Republicans, and fight like the very dickens for better leadership in the party, adoption of policies - some of which were fashioned by the Democrats - that are good and forward-looking, and not hesitate to back a Democrat if we think he's a better American, a better politician, a better citizen, and works for better policies than the Republican.

Farmer Needs Some Help-Dick

David Dick speaks from his long years as a toiler of the soil in Cass township when he says they ought to do something about the sad plight of the farmer.

"The farmer doesn't want any more than the chance to buy what he needs at a price in fair relation to what he gets for what he sells," says David Dick. "When the price of automobiles and tractors and steel goes up, the farmer has to have more for his wheat and his corn and his wool or he can't enter the market for the manufactured items."

And what would he do about it if he were in charge, "I'm not sure," says David Dick, "but it looks like holding the price of manufactured items down would be a good start."

Mr. Dick is a "general farmer" — I've got generally what you'll find on any farm. "There is a good-sized flock of sheep, mostly Corriedale and Shropshire crosses, with a goodly sprinkling of twin lambs and one all black one. Then there's one whose face is half black. "His mother must've been scared by a skunk," smiles Mr. Dick.

The veteran farmer, whose spread runs to 100 acres on the

west side of Barnes road and south of the County Line road, learned a lesson about marketing pork a short time ago.

"I took some hogs up to Cleveland and they gave me just under 15 cents for hogs that weighed well over 250 pounds, but they gave another man just over 16 cents for hogs that weighed less than 215 pounds," he explains. "When I asked them how come, they said his were a bacon-type hog and worth more than my pork-type."

Mr. Dick has some cattle, too. "I just raise some calves," he says, "and when I need some money, off they go to market."

He tries hard to give the impression he's just another farmer, but even a blind man can see he's not. Dick's Acres — that's what the lettering in the north end of the big barn that was built in 1913 says — is simply not an ordinary farm. The buildings are kept up, the grounds are neat, the plowing is done in an orderly manner, and the whole place shows that he works at it.

One of the valuable animals around the farm is a magnificent tom cat whose ears have been gnawed almost back to its skull. People cannot be judged by what others say about them, but they can be judged by what they say about others.

"He's just too mean to defend himself," laughs Mr. Dick. "He flips that big tail of his and lies on his back and lets the others trounce the dickens out of him."

The cat's name is Junior, and he's ornery as all get out, just in case anybody should ask you. And don't believe a word of what the female branch of the Dick family will tell you about giving him away. It's been tried, but without success.

There's a heap of farming going on in Barnes road in the 42-year-old farmhouse — it, too, was built back before the first war, in 1913 — and there's a heap of smart farm thinking going on under David Dick's grey hair.

One of the things he hasn't been able to figure out is how he can keep his mail from going to his namesake — no relation at all, but another David Dick — in Plymouth.

"Haven't worked that one out yet," he smiles. But you get the impression he'll work it out somehow. And soon.

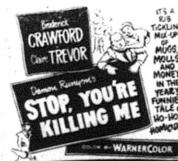

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, DECLARING THE NECESSITY TO IMPOSE AND COLLECT A SEWER SERVICE CHARGE, AND ESTABLISHING THE RATES THEREOF.

Whereas, the Village of Plymouth has sewers in place and in operation in the Village which, along with other drainage from the Village, collect and discharge raw sewage into the Huron River, and

Whereas, the Director of Health, Department of Health, State of Ohio and the Water Pollution Control Board of the State of Ohio have notified the Village of Plymouth that it must take positive steps to enlarge its sewerage system and construct a plant for the treatment of sewage, to the end that the pollution of the Huron River may be brought under control, and

Whereas, the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio finds that the making of surveys, construction of additions, extensions and enlargements of the sewerage system, including surveys and sewerage treatments plant and works are necessary to protect, promote and preserve public health and safety and are necessary in order to comply with the orders of the Director of Health, State of Ohio, and

Whereas, Council finds that rates and charges should be established and collected sufficient to amount to provide substantial funds for necessary surveys and construction of such additions and enlargements;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and declared to be necessary to the protection of the public health, safety, welfare, and convenience of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to establish and collect charges upon all lots, lands and premises served by, having connections with, or which otherwise discharge sewerage, industrial wastes, water, or other liquids, either directly or indirectly, into the Village sewers or into the Huron River.

Section 2. The funds received from the collection of the rates and charges provided in Section 3 hereof shall be deposited with the Village Treasurer, who shall keep the same in a separate fund designated "Sewer Revenue Fund". Subject to the provisions of any ordinance or indenture of mortgage authorizing and securing the issue and said mortgage revenue bonds for improvements and extensions of said sewerage system,

(16) Village Schools, Village of Plymouth, Ohio, Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars per quarter year, per building.

Section 4. Over and above the charges established by Section 3 hereof, there may be established in special instances and upon special agreement between the village and the owner of any lot, parcel of land or premises which falls under those described in Section 3 hereof, such additional charges for industrial wastes of unusual strength or composition which are accepted by the village for treatment as may be determined to be fair and equitable each such special agreement and charges established shall not become effective until ratified by ordinance duly passed by the Council of the village.

Section 5. The rates and charges established by Section 3 shall take effect on June 1, 1955, and thereafter shall be billed and become payable as provided in Section 6.

Section 6. The sewer charges provided in Section 3 shall be payable quarterly at the office of the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth. Sewer charges shall be included in and be payable with the village water bills and shall become payable at the same times as water bills become payable.

Section 9. This Ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
