Taken to Norwalk, he was fined \$200, and costs jailed for three days, and suspended from driving privileges for a year.

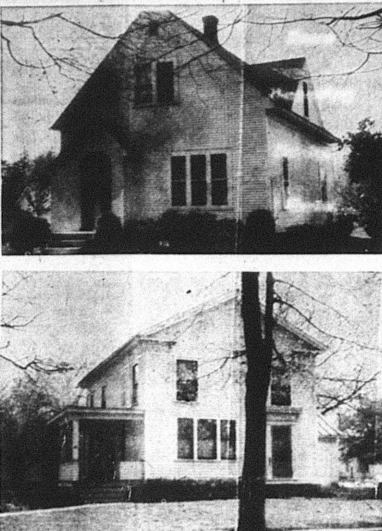
Jury to Hear Testimony

Mrs. Ream Seeks Glass, Finds Rare Certificate

Mrs. Ralph Ream, 244 West Broadway, needed a piece of picture glass, and she remembered the old stack of pictures that has lain in her attic since she and Mr. Ream bought their home from the Murphys 15 years ago.

A not particularly attractive picture seemed of the right size, and she took it apart. The part exposed to the view was a collection of steel engravings of circa 1870. The reverse is, however, an interesting bit of Ohioana that will set many who are historically minded to doing a little research.

Measuring 18 by 22 inches in size, it is a certificate awarded by the Ohio State Board of Agriculture at the State Fair in Columbus in 1855, exactly 100 years ago, to Mrs. Eliza Barker of Huron county, for a superior linen table spread. But who is Mrs. Barker?

The certificate is embellished in a floral manner with symbolical drawings of industry and agriculture in the state as it was then known. A foundry is depicted in the lower left hand corner, and a machine shop in the lower right.

In the upper left is a view of a harbor filled with square rigged sailing vessels, and the upper right hand portion bears plowing and shearing scenes.

Attire of the persons depicted is in the 1855 motif. Photographs of the certificate are being prepared for possible use by Samuel C. Cashman, Jr., director of the Ohio State fair.

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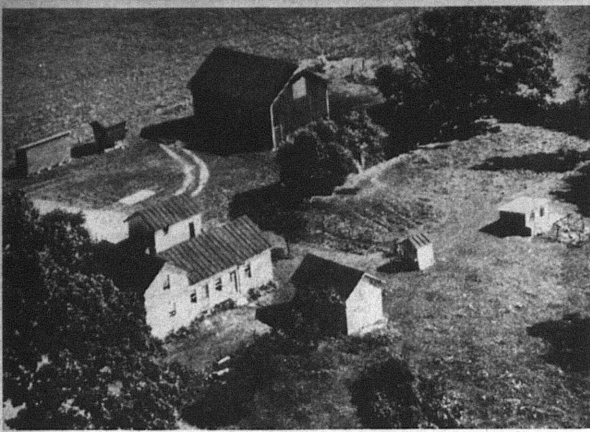

Sailor Visits Japan In USS Midway

Airman Percy W. Dean, U. S. N., was aboard the U. S. S. Midway when that 45,000 gross ton aircraft carrier visited Japan recently.

The carrier called at Yokosuka on its cruise, which covered 28,000 miles and the ports of Cape Town, South Africa; Colombo, Ceylon; Manila, the Philippines, and Subic Bay, also in the Philippines, as well as Hong Kong.

The Midway is a part of the U. S. Seventh Fleet. Airman Dean is the son of Mrs. Waneta Smith, 785 1/2 Fourth street, Mansfield, and is married to the former Janet L. Norris, 25 1/2 East Main street. He has a daughter, LaCherril Ann, two months old, whom he has never seen.

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Martins Like Jerseys and Pony

The Paul Martins live on a 160-acre farm in the east side of Town Line road, and after 18 years of farming in Huron county they are sold on Jerseys for milk and ponies for boys.

The Martins are milking a herd of seven Jerseys right now, and they are raising an 11-year-old son, Jimmy, a pupil in the fifth grade at Ripley township school.

For the Jerseys they recommend good care, patience, sound feeding and a grass and supplement program. The same recommendations — except for the grass — apply to boys. They've raised one, who's a father himself, and they find the same system works with the other.

Jimmy is the owner of a three-year-old gelded Shetland whose name is Shadow, an obstinate creature who was broken to ride by the youngster two years ago. Shadow has an affection for tobacco and will eat pipe tobacco from the hand of Mr. Martin. He also has a predilection for a nip of human flesh, and if you're not careful, he'll have a bite of your arm or leg.

Jimmy lives, eats and breathes horses, has a collection of over 60 miniature horses, and — you guessed it — wants a grown up horse all for himself.

"What do you think of a boy that wants a horse and doesn't want to give up his pony?" asks Mr. Martin. But it is a rhetorical question and requires no answer. The Martins came to Ripley township from Cleveland just 18 years ago, and for the life of them don't yet know why they did. On Sunday, a man named Ray Toobey, who worked for Mr. Martin in Cleveland for several years, came to see them for the first time since they left the Forest city. Regrettably, they were out of town, visiting in Medina county almost at the edge of Cleveland.

Mrs. Martin is the manager of a flock of 100 White Leghorn hens and an additional flock of young chickens that will be layers in the late summer.

The farm is managed on a four-year rotation scheme, with corn, wheat, oats and hay sown in the farm in that order. The grass program is what makes for good

milk. And Jerseys make for rich milk, the Martins say.

They report their last test — nearly three weeks ago — ran to 5.4 per cent butterfat, an exceptionally good figure for any herd. The average is between 5.1 and 5.4 all year, but picks up some when the cows get out on grass.

All of the Jerseys are Martin babies: they were raised from birth, or just after it, by the Martins. They know each of them intimately, more so than most farmers know their cows.

One reason is they're milking by hand, a situation which will shortly be altered when the Martins switch to machine milking. They've got the machine. They plan to remodel the barn layout and remount the milker in a more strategic position.

"A couple of years ago our herd fell to four cows and it hardly paid to milk by machine. But now we've got seven with a few more heifers ready to be added to the lot, and so we'll go to machine milking," remarks Paul Martin as he puffs on his bent-stem pipe.

All of the Jerseys are the result of artificial breeding and Mr. Martin points to two handsome young heifers "that're bred, I think". One of the cows was anemic, and the Martins' veterinarian recommended a sugar supplement. She took to it like Jimmy took to the pony for a while, but now she's on grass she's not so keen about it.

The farm has recently had an increase in population: three kittens, two coal black and one with blaze on its forehead. You'll have to talk to Jimmy about getting one. And he's a tough customer to deal with, on account of the fact that he's had to turn down innumerable requests to sell Shadow.

Inseparable companion of Shadow and Jimmy is a merry shepherd who has eaten her way into a roly-poly shape. Her name is Bullet, from guess who?

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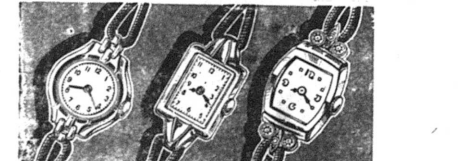

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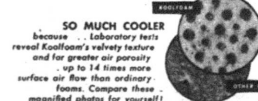

Sixth Grade Does Theme On Visit to Advertiser

By JERRY L. DARON

A printing office is an interesting place. There are some maps of the counties and towns. As we go a little farther, we come to a desk, the place where the editor chooses the news to put in the newspaper. In the same room, there are drawers containing type in letters.

Type is measured in points. Eight point type is regular-size type for a newspaper.

You look ink on with something that looks like a rolling pin. It's called a brayer.

But in the printing room is something much more interesting: the linotype machine. It has keys like a typewriter. The compositor sits at the linotype machine. The compositor punches the keys and out of a little slot drops a piece of lead with the words you want. The words are upside down and backward. They are raised letters.

When we go into the next room, we see a man standing beside what is called a printing press. There is a bunch of blank paper on a slant table. He was sliding the paper into the press. When they come out at the other end, one side of the papers were printed.

The man who runs the press has to change the type to print the other side. The ink the press uses is black and very thick. The ink is rolled on the type by rollers, but not by hand. It works with the press.

Now we go over to the folding machine. You can't just slide the papers in. You have to flip the papers up so some air gets under the paper.

As you go into the next room, you see lead melting in an iron pan. The lead is so hot so it can be poured like water. You cover a "mat" with the lead and the lead shapes where the raised papers are on the stiff paper.

Wednesday, Apr. 27, Mrs. McGinnis' sixth grade went through The Plymouth Advertiser.

The first room was a business office, where in a file, alphabetically, they keep the subscribers' names and monthly files of when

the papers are due.

The second room is the editor's office. On the desk, the editor, Mr. Paddock, writes and edits every line of the paper.

Here they keep a small reference library, with maps to show where he goes to get the news, a directory of the names and addresses of every one of the community, etc.

The third room was the advertising room. On a long table they make out the ads from mats of cut cardboard. They also have an ad book, sort of a catalogue, with samples in it. From it the merchant picks out the type and kind of ad he wants. They go by the Chinese legend that a picture tells a story better than millions of words.

The next part is called the composing room, where he writes out the orders to the printer and marks the copy with a red pencil, as to the size and measure of the type. When the news stories are written, they are hung on hooks beside the linotype machine.

The linotype is a machine that sets type and produces metal that corresponds to a line of type. It sets body type of nine point Times Roman made by the Times of London, England. There are 3,500 letters and they cost 17c each. When Mergenthaler invented it, he only got \$180 for it.

There are two linotypes, one for small letters and one for larger letters.

The file of letters is arranged in a case, by the ones they use most, and the printer memorizes its location. The capital letters are in alphabetical order because they aren't used very often.

There are two rules of printing. They are:

1. Follow the copy no matter where it goes.

2. Machinery works always except in a print shop.

Then they carry the newspaper form in the elevator to the basement to be printed. The press prints four pages on one sheet of paper.

Next is the folding machine that folds the paper.

Then there is a machine that puts the names of the subscribers on the papers.

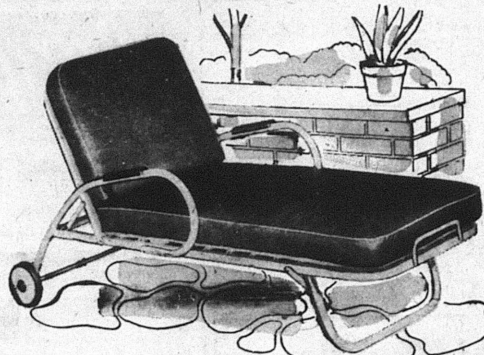

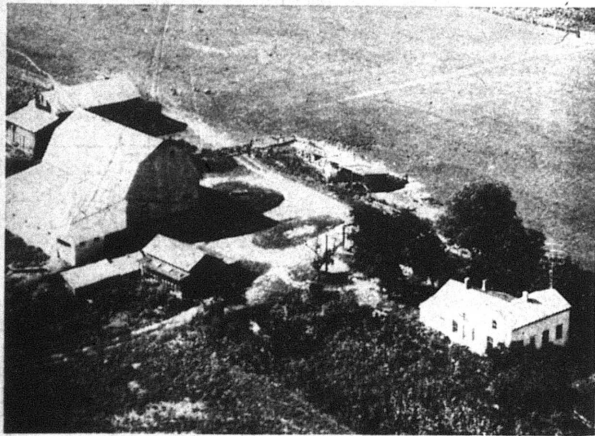

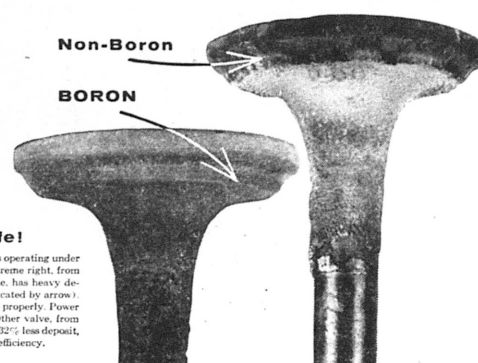
