# Assistant to Clerk Asks \$75 Raise Monthly, Gets \$40

village administrative establish-ment and standardizing salaries were taken by the village council Tuesday night as a \$40 a month raise was voted to the assistant to

the clerk.

At the request of the Board of Public Affairs, to whom the incumbent assistant had aplied for an increase of \$75 a month, the council wrestled with the problem and came up with two conclusions:

1. This amounts to \$3,780 a year.

2. By combining the posts of village treasurer and clerk, an additional \$200 revenue could be realized to the latter's job. This must be done not later than 90 days before election.

The raise was granted with some reluctance in view of the extra work envisaged by the entry into force of the new sever usage tax.

The ordinance which will be drawn up by Village Solicitor Joseph F.

Dush will stipulate that the funds to cover the raise will derive from the sever revenue fund. Since in moneys will be paid into the fund before July 1, the raise cannot be effective until spen time in July.

The salary question teetered on a delicate legal question: are the stophs of clerk of the village and clerk of the Board of Public Affairs legally split? If so, the salary of Carl V. The editorial writer at this time of ear is supposed to wax oratorical, to at out high-flown ideas and expressions hat will be guideposts to young people s they go forth from their school days.

To us, this has always seemed foolish. Ve cannot change their characters; haracter is already built by the time hey reach school, so we are 12 years ate. We cannot change their ways; only hey can do that.

Just about all we can try to do is to make them want to change those ways that seem to us, in the light of experience, to need changing.

The distinguished speaker of tomorow's commencement exercises certainly nows as much about how to prepare ne's self for the cold, cruel world as nybody in the profession, and we make o effort to steal his thunder. We proably could not do so if we were to try.

But at the risk of doing so unintenionally, we would tell the young gradates this: learn to make decisions.

Industry is today at the crossroads because men cannot make decisions fast nough. So man has devised an autonatic device that makes decisions for im. The automobile industry has adpted it quickly. One man now does the vork of several dozen two years ago; all e has to do is watch a lighted board and hange the tool or gadget that indicates vear or malfunction.

The machine does the thinking for him. Any darned fool can change the broken or worn part. And because man has failed to make decisions fast enough, other men have devised machines to do man's thinking for him.

This is not to say that machines - roots, maybe - will ultimately supplant nan. Far from it. But they will tend to lo away with the need for unskilled and emi-skilled men. This is happening every day. Mr. Reuther and his union are looking for a guaranteed annual vage, largely because they are afraid of automation, as it's called, and rightly so.

But we can't just take these unskilled and semi-skilled people - of whom there ire many millions - out and shoot them, now there isn't much need for them. They are human beings just like the rest of us. What are we going to do with them? How are we going to overcome the likelihood that advances in industry will make for a smaller demand for manpower at a time when our nation is bursting at the seams with people?

If these young graduates to whom we award diplomas tomorow haven't learned to think, where, then are they going to learn? And if they have failed to think, whose fault is it?


