A Farmer Who'll Let Bees Swarm

Raymond L. Brooks is one farmer who'll not disturb a swarm of bees even though it means putting off his plowing.

Which is just what this veteran Plymouth township farmer did this week. While working his tractor in ground in the west share of his farm south of Base Line road west of the village, he spotted a swarm of bees. He detoured and called James Cunningham, postal clerk here, who removed them from an oak tree.

That affection for animals of all kinds shows up elsewhere on the Brooks farm. Perhaps on few others will you find such a conglomeration of livestock. It's a little like Noah's Ark.

Mr. Brooks is milking a small herd of Brown Swiss, he is switching to Hampshire after experimenting with Poland China hogs, he runs a good flock of Corriedales or mostly-Corriedale sheep, and the barnyard is well populated with geese, ducks, hens, dogs, cats and other stock.

The Brooks farm - he's lived on it 38 years now - has a young woodlot, filled with oak and other useful native hardwoods that'll produce revenue in years to come.

Together with the farm of his mother, he has a wheat quota of 22 acres. It isn't enough, and he demonstrates graphically what happens when the wheat quota is down: "You can't get enough hay

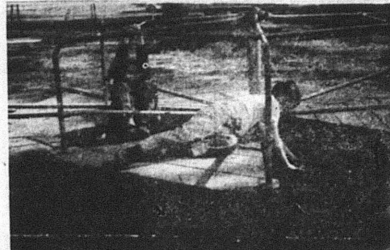
Throughout the circus, Garry Utis sold popcorn and balloons to the audience.

To recover the cost of the fire-fighting apparatus which a court held they illegally purchased, New Haven township trustees have laid suit in Huron county common pleas court against the manufacturer and its agent.

Defendants in the suit are the American Fire Apparatus Co., Battle Creek, Mich., and Harry Stupfen, Columbus, its agent. Plaintiffs are Trustees William Lins, Walter Noble and Glen Evans, which seek return of \$3,587.76, which was paid for the truck, \$600 for the temporary use of a second truck, and \$2,445.50 for equipment. Total sought is \$6,333.36.

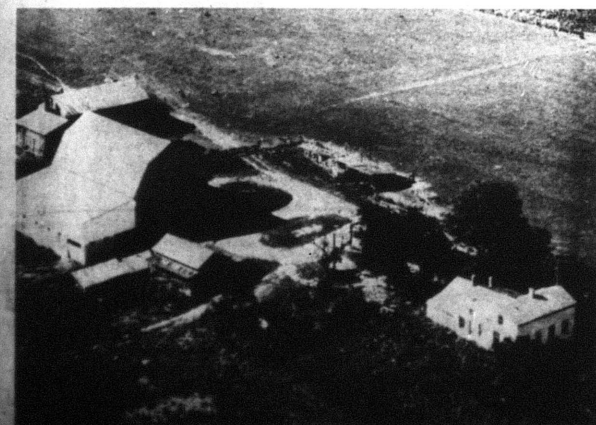
Paul Blacks Plan Reception on 50th Wedding Day

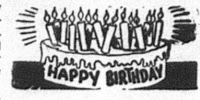

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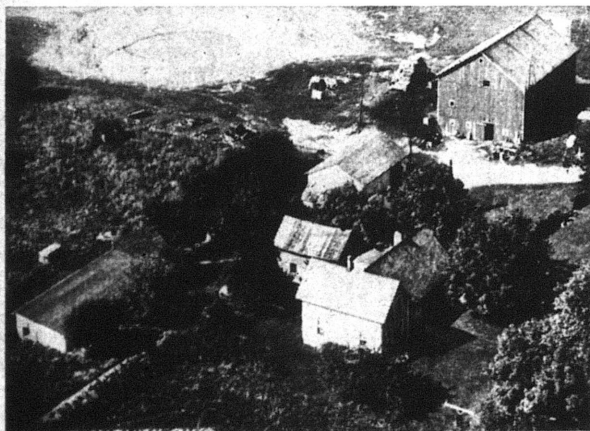

Superintendent Coon hit the nail on the head at the alumni banquet when he called attention to the absence of opportunity for our high school graduates here. And if high school graduates have no opportunity, what, O Lord, of our college graduates?

There is something more to life than paying the bills and getting the lawn cut and the ditch to draining. The sooner we realize it the better. It is the encouraging of the growth of the community, the providing of things that we are entitled to have but cannot have unless the community furnishes them — through our taxation money — for us.
