Thieves Get \$250 At Hardware Store

By breaking a window and climbing four ladders piled against it on the inside, one or more burglars forcibly entered Millers Hardware & Appliances Monday night and stole goods roughly valued at \$250.

Fingerprints and blood specimens left on the broken window pane have been submitted to the Criminal Identification service at the London prison farm for tracing.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser reported Tuesday he has the names of three suspects whose whereabouts Monday night will be investigated.

Items taken, so far as the Millers could establish, were a Winchester rifle, an electric shaver, a table model radio, electric drills, two flashlights, and about \$9 in cash.

Although E. B. Miller told police it was the first time in over 27 years in the store that he could remember any theft, it was the second time the Millers have lost valuables by breaking and entering in three months.

Fishing gear belonging to William and Roger Miller was taken from Roger Miller's car while it was parked in Route 224 west of New Haven. The Millers were returning from the Willard conservation lake to Plymouth and a flat tire necessitated a trip in other transportation to find a spare, since Roger Miller's car was without a jack.

When they returned, the side ventilator had been broken and forced and the fishing tackle, valued at \$100, was missing.

Police have no trace of the thief. Monday's night burglar or burglars first attempted to force entry from the east side of the building by breaking a basement window along the alleys separating the hardware from Koe's grocery. Bars across the window on the inside thwarted the effort.

The entry was gained through a window in the west side of the basement along the alley leading to the rear of The Advertiser building.

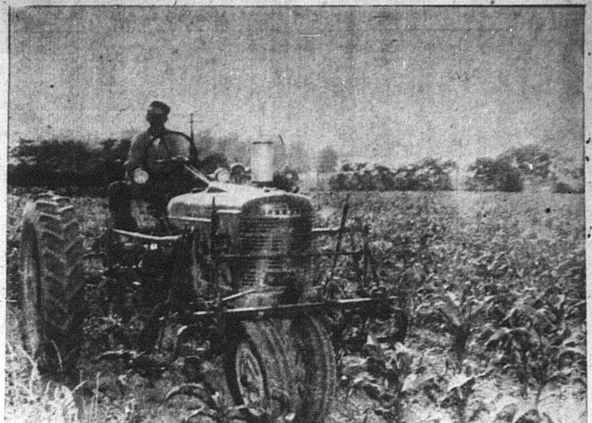

Post Office to Go Up To First Class Tomorrow

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post mailings will be limited to 72 inches in combined length and girth and 40 pounds in weight if for delivery in the local, first and second postal zones. Twenty pounds limit is affixed for delivery in the third zone or beyond.

These regulations, Mr. Sourwine points out, do not apply to baby fowl, plants, trees, shrubs, agricultural commodities, books or any parcel mailed on or addressed for delivery to a rural or star route.

The restrictions do not apply to parcels mailed to or from any second, third or fourth class post office, or to or from any military installation, or to or from any post office in a U. S. territory or possession, or any place outside the continental United States where domestic service is in operation. Matter mailed at the book rate is exempt from the restrictions.

Kermit exhibited 10 white Plymouth Rock broilers that weighed 53 pounds at age 10 1/2 weeks. His nearest competitor showed 10 broilers of the same age weighing only 51 pounds, Kermit's broilers were acquired from Page's Shiloh Hatchery.

Applicants for this examination must actually reside within the delivery of the above-mentioned post office and must have so resided for one year next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications. Age limits, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 50.

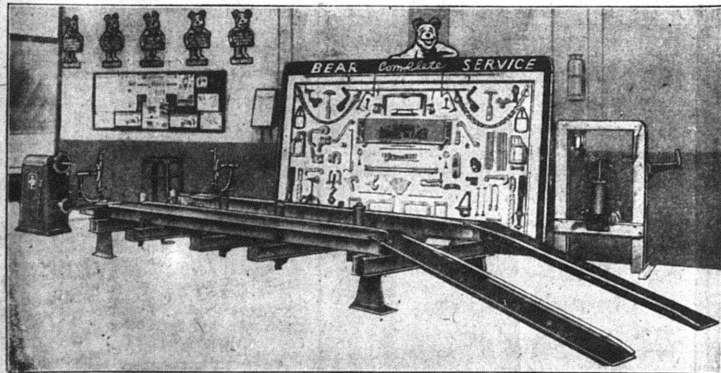

More than a Mere Suggestion —

Isn't It About Time We Stop The False Accusations?

In trying to do its duty to its readers, a newspaper sometimes treads on the toes of those who think — and we think wrongly — that it is better not to speak about evil than it is to publish the facts, with the result of unfavorable publicity.

Perhaps it is true that if you don't look at, speak of, or hear evil, it will go away. But that has not been our experience, and we are guided by the theory that it is always better to tell the whole truth.

To do so in the recent instance is to call to everyone's attention the fact that the laws of the State of Ohio need revision promptly so that businessmen in small villages can serve their communities without risk of such incendiary and abusive treatment as is given in the examiners' report with regard to the president of the village council.

Legislation to this effect was introduced at Columbus, in part through our initiative, and it should be passed, but it is unlikely that the legislature will do so this year, more's the pity.

The gentleman — and he is every bit that — involved was accommodating the village as an official, not as a businessman, and he did not profit by the transactions. Rather, he lost money on the whole business.

Nevertheless, it is true that he did it, and he admitted it like the man he is, and he knows it was not entirely proper to do it.

But what can you do under the circumstances? Suppose he were the only dealer in those commodities in town? Would the village be forced to go out of town for the items needed? Would the citizens and businessmen of the community like that? Wouldn't they be justified in disliking it?

Royal Eckstein is one of the best — if not the best — councilmen to serve his village for a long time. He has done so honestly and fairly, with his heart in the right place, and we are sick and tired of these stories that there were more hands in the till.

The hand that was in the till has been disciplined. The matter is closed. Let's have no more talk of more hands in the till. When there are, and we find it out, we'll print it.

But it's abusive, libellous, dangerous to speak of innocent folks robbing the till.

Nor was there any intention of cutting into the Boy Scout program. The league's emulsary, Senior Davis, opened negotiations with the Scoutmaster and a satisfactory agreement was reached: Scouts will be moved up an hour, the game will be set back almost two hours, and everybody will be happy.

Likewise, a few civic-minded souls turned out and gave generously to the collection box. Results: first night's operations were paid for in full, with a balance of 58c in the treasury.

The league hasn't asked for any organization money, which civic-minded souls (read Phineas Whittleseed) contributed to back up promises to the boys.

The league is by no means closed. More players are welcome. Nor is it set dead. The losers certainly don't expect to take it lying down.

But there was one thing we noticed: too many of the boys were willing to get up before they tried. Got scared by bigger boys on another squad. Funny thing about it, in some cases the boys who did the most grumbling before the game were on the winning squads when the contests were ended.

The game, we repeat, is not always to the size of the boy in the fight, but often to the size of the fight in the boy.

Of late we have been approached by several fund-raising ventures, and we have given as we were able. But on totting up our year's expenses, we see a fairly large amount of money which we gave as a business house to support what was represented to us — and we believed to be — civic enterprises that would help to make our community better.

Looking back on it, we see we gave too much to some and not enough to others. That was to be expected. And we honestly feel that R. E. M. has the right idea, and we commend it to the attention of the Community club when it reconvenes in the fall: why not a community chest here? Generous giving, whether in cash or in a genuine pledge collectible four times a year, would enable a community-wide organization to amass funds which would be available for disbursement as its board of directors might determine, invariably most to the group most deserving and needy.

This plan would eliminate many of the fund-raising activities, would tend to keep money for charitable or beneficent purposes from going out of town, and would enable money that is given for such purposes to be used where it is most needed.

It also would make those bodies which depend from the public purse resort to the form of financing which law and custom dictate: the whole taxpaying public, instead of a few honorable and hard-working citizens upon whom the whole burden now mainly falls.

Like many of our suggestions, this one is offered in all honesty and sincerity, for the good if our community. And like a good many of them, it will probably not be followed. 'Cause we're outsiders, something we can't help, and don't expect ever to be able to change.

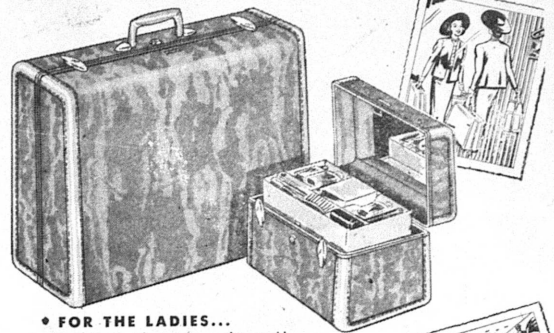

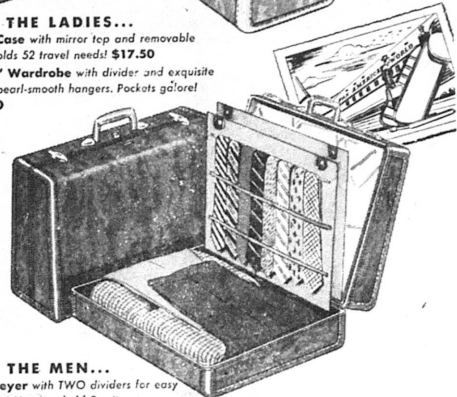

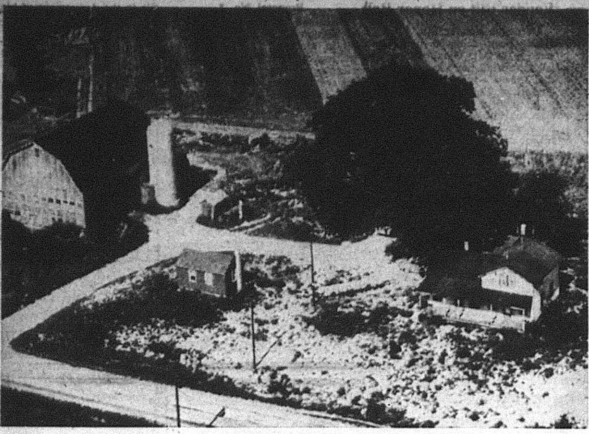

No Economist, He Just Figures

For 50 years, man and boy, Harry Aumend has farmed the rich soil of Richland county, and over those years he says he's learned some important lessons: "It just makes me tired to hear the city feller complain about how much the farmer gets, and even more tired to hear the farmer squawk about how well off the city feller is."

Mr. Aumend never studied economics in school, he reports, but he's done some plain and fancy figuring since he left school, and he's come up with one disconcerting fact: a farmer with only 80 acres of ground can't survive on farming alone.

"I know, I've been trying it for a good many years. The land tenure pattern is one bugaboo: if your fields are cut up into, say, seven or eight acres apiece, it takes too damned much time and effort to farm it."

"Another problem is that the restrictions on acreage of corn and wheat hit the small fellow hardest. Why, I used to grow 25 or 30 acres of wheat, now I

can plant no more than eight. It takes 10 acres of wheat to pay for my taxes, my insurance and my fertilizer, so you can see where I am."

The Aumend farm lies astride Route 98 halfway between Plymouth and Tiro, and the Aumends have been on it 13 years.

"Just figure out for yourself what a farmer can get out of an 80-acre farm if he's got a three-year crop rotation program going: they'll let him grow 15 acres of wheat, and if he's lucky he'll get 30 bushels an acre off that ground. At \$2 a bushel, that's only \$600 a year. And take corn next: 20 acres with a yield of 50 bushels an acre, selling for \$1.35 a bushel, will bring you \$1,350. Hogs have been selling more or less for 17½¢ a pound, and the average hog weighing 200 pounds will bring you \$35. Multiply that by 60, which is the number of hogs you can feed on about 20 acres of corn, and you've got another \$2,100. Other stuff on the place, hay and such like, maybe some eggs, apples, and other produce, might bring

you another \$1,500. So there you have \$5,850 annual revenue before you've started to figure your costs.

"And those costs are high. Take wheat. Seed wheat is \$12 a bushel, and you need two bushels and a peck to the acre. Fertilizer is \$60 a ton, and you need 300 pounds to the acre. So for every acre of wheat you've got \$33 put in before you've got anything out."

"What the government is doing is to force the little fellow either to grow bigger, which he sometimes can't do, or to get out, which he can't afford to do, because he's got to eat."

Harry Aumend speaks with conviction. He's experienced the trials of a small farmer ever since he left home.

To augment his income, he has done just about everything. Now he drives a school bus route for Plymouth pupils, with whom he is a popular and respected confidant.

Mrs. Aumend, who submitted to serious surgery at Mansfield General hospital this past winter, is recovering nicely.

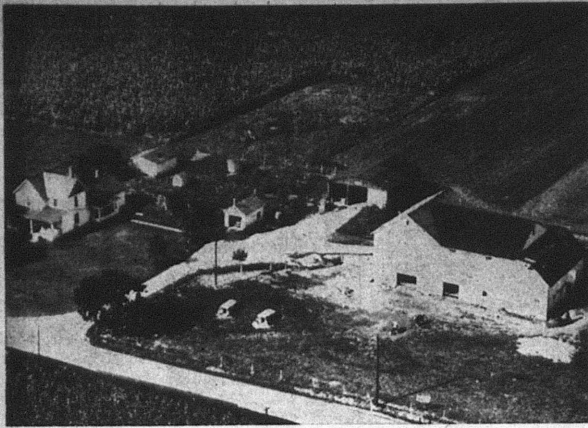

'100 Acres Make Money:' Artz

"If I had another 50 acres, I'd just leave the old truck set."

That's Warren Artz's opinion of how much land it takes to make a living in Richland and Crawford counties.

For nearly a generation he's been farming 50 acres in the west side of Route 39 north of Tiro, and augmenting his income by trucking livestock to Cleveland for a fee.

"The way machinery is built today, and the way they've improved seed yield, it'd be better to have 160 acres, and certainly just as easy."

Mr. Artz is particularly

proud of his hogs this year. He has four young sows due to farrow in another month. They were the same young gilts which farrowed this spring and gave him 40 piglets, only three of which died. The piglets are four months old now, and growing fast.

"Usually I let a newly delivered sow rest a while, but these were such good mothers I bred 'em again, and I'm just as hopeful as I can be about 'em."

His experiences in the Cleveland markets have taught Warren Artz that buyers at the slaughtering pens prefer a long, lean, York-type hog,

but he's not certain that the price differential for this type of hog is worth the bother.

"It takes a little longer to raise that kind of hog, and the difference in price hasn't been enough to make it really worth while," he says.

A dry spring has affected germination of seed corn in his fields, and he's about made up his mind to let it go. His son, Herbert, across the road, ripped up two fields and re-seeded.

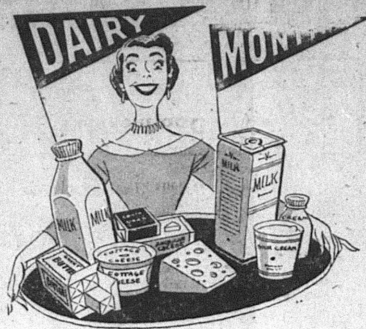

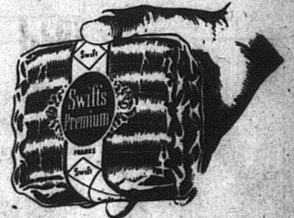
