

Engineers Offer \$97,300 Plan for Water Supply

An estimate of \$97,300 for an expanded water supply and distribution system from two wells on the Henry Chapman property in New Haven was laid before the village council Tuesday night.

Floyd G. Browne Associates, Marion, consulting engineers retained by the Board of Public Affairs to prepare studies and draft plans for the improvement of Plymouth's water supply, told the council the work as contemplated would cost \$82,700, with an additional \$14,600 for overhead such as engineering fees, legal fees, and the like.

The recommendation submitted by the engineers calls for two eight-inch tubular wells on the Chapman property at an estimated cost of \$15,500; a force main between the well site and the present water plant, estimated to cost \$35,400; extensions of Trux street, West Broadway and Riggs street water service, estimated to cost \$26,800, and repairs and changes to the present water plant, \$5,000.

The estimates are pegged high

though, the engineers told the council, to allow for any unforeseen change in price of building and construction materials.

How to finance the recommended system costing roughly \$97,000 occupied the council, the Board and the engineers for some time. Departing from the promise that the cheapest way - to issue general obligation bonds approved by the electorate against a maximum of five per cent of the tax valuation of the village, which is now \$3,034,597 - to finance the system does not stand a chance of approval because it would be turned down at the polls, the council turned to discussion of alternative ways of financing: sale of mortgage revenue bonds, to be retired from earnings of the water system. This would necessitate a higher water rate.

Just how much that rate should be was spelled out in some detail by the engineers: it amounts to a 10 per cent increase in rates. Annual operating cost of the system would be \$21,849, and would necessitate a \$21.55 per \$1,000 valuation tax rate for 30 years.

With a three-mill school levy and a one mill cemetery levy to appear on the November ballot, the council did not think a general obligation bond issue would be likely to attain a 60 per cent majority.

The possibility that Charles A. Hinsch & Co., present holders of mortgage revenue bonds on the system, would "open up" its bonded mortgage holding to encompass the \$97,000 fund requirement was investigated, and first signs are that the Hinsch firm will be willing to do so - naturally, for a healthy fee.

Irish Tenor Sings In Church Here

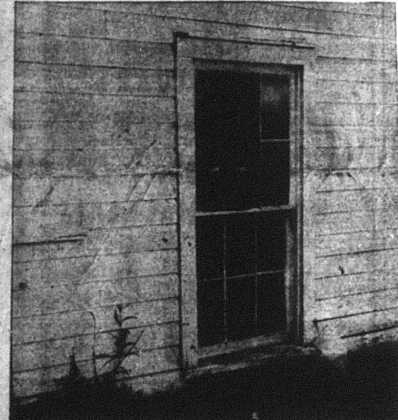

Crispin Closes Shelby Store After 19 Years

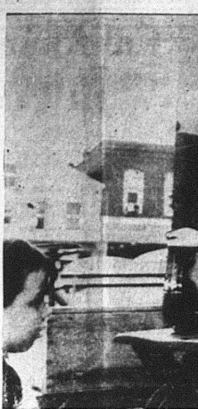

James Fetters seems preoccupied with some aspect or other of the lemonade business. At least, he's not paying much attention to his customer. So far as the editor is aware, he did rightly: she didn't have the necessary three cents!

Cheap money and low interest, say the economists, bring out entrepreneurs - the fellows who're willing to take a chance in a capitalistic system.

Hot weather and low rents (and where is there lower rent than in front of the bank?) bring out lemonade stands, whose operators usually drink up their profits promptly.

Latest entrepreneur is Fate Christian, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Miles S. Christian, who established a lemonade stand - only

he sells grape and strawberry, out of an envelope - in front of Peoples National bank during last week's hot weather.

The drinks were three cents the cup, whether half full or filled all the way up.

"I think I'll make out," young Christian told The Advertiser. "I don't have to sell many drinks to make some money. My overhead (Ed Note: he didn't really call it that; but that's what he meant) is low: I get the stuff to make the drinks at home, and the bank lets me have the advertising space for nothing."

Junior partner in the enterprise (his job is to shoo away flies and keep over-bloated customers on the move) is young Ronnie Fagg. Fate's chum and neighbor, and from time to time - as when The Advertiser's photographer appeared - James Fetters, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Fetters, sits in as substitute tinker, tanner.

"What I like about this job is you can give 'em lots of variety and if the pitcher gets empty, all you have to do is borrow some water."

It might be mentioned that young Fate comes rightly by his entrepreneurial spirit. His great-grandfather, D. Fagg, was a founder of Fate-Root-Heath Co. And he takes business advice - mostly having to do with the weather - from his great-uncle, John A. Root, cooperative weather observer here. And something of a businessman in his own right, too.

A young Plymouth High school senior, narrowly escaped death Thursday afternoon when his automobile struck the sixth car of a Baltimore & Ohio freight on the tracks south of the village in Route 98.

He was Erwin Renz, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Renz, who was headed south in the highway when the train passed.

Although the train's engineer reported to police that he approached the crossing at routine speed and applied the brakes promptly, there apparently was no way to avoid the accident.

Young Renz was proceeding at what he said was "normal speed." The roadway was wet from rains. It is surmised that he was unable to stop at the crossing, and slid into the train. The crossing is not equipped with flasher lights.

F-R-H, Union Agree On 8-cent Pay Raise

After lengthy negotiation, management of Fate-Root-Heath Co. and officers of its local union, Plymouth Ohio Mechanics Union, announced a new contract calling for higher wage scales this week.

To take effect from 7 a.m. June 27, the agreement calls for an increase of eight cents an hour across the board plus nearly a cent an hour in side benefits including insurance.

Union officials reported only one unsettled point of contention between the union and the company: the question of a no-strike clause. The company is said to want an all-inclusive no strike provision in the contract, invoking the so-called "umbrella" clause which "just about covers anybody in any case leading or tending to lead to a strike. That is, persons who aid, abet, counsel, suggest, threaten, or otherwise agitate for a strike would be precluded from activity during the tenure of the contract as well as strikers themselves.

Total monthly benefits deriving from the "side benefit" portion of the raise will amount to \$1.73 a man.

Although College Boy Son Checks Up on Methods —

'Plant Deep if Dry,' Ballitch

John Ballitch has to keep on his toes on his 140-acre farm in Dindinger road southwest of Shiloh because he has a son studying agriculture at Ohio State university who checks Dad's methods against proved scientific techniques.

Take this year, for example. Corn hasn't grown very well. Scientific answer: maybe bad seed, maybe not enough rain, maybe ground too wet. John Ballitch's answer: didn't plant it deep enough. When ground is wet enough during planting season, corn may be planted only an inch or an inch and a half below the surface, and it will germinate. Dry like it was this past spring, you've got to go deeper with it.

"My neighbors who've put the corn down deep enough have good stands. Mine isn't bad, but where it's poor I think it's because I didn't plant it down far enough."

Mr. Ballitch has a beef cattle-hog-chicken-grain farming program going on the old Oglesbie

farm, which he got in 1947 when he came up here from near Lucas.

He's feeding about 60 hogs right now, and will have perhaps 16 steers to market in September. "My neighbor swears the price will be up to 30 cents, but I wonder if that's right. I sure would like to see it go up."

High prices for good beef are not unusual for the Ballitch beeves. Two years ago, at Cleveland, Ballitch steers brought a 50-cent top, although last year they tailed off slightly. John Ballitch doesn't quite know why.

The Ballitch farm boasts about 37 acres of corn this season. About 12 of it, he says, will go to feed the hogs.

"I find it works out about that way - five hogs per acre. Then, too, we supplement a little bit with small grain. Barley makes good hog feed, but rye isn't very satisfactory."

Although when he started out

with hybrid seed (he tried half a bushel and it didn't do well) Mr. Ballitch is pretty much sold on

good hybrid seed and sticks to it, although he buys three different brands.

"You get more out of it for what you put into it," he believes.

Identifiers of the mystery farms for the past three weeks have been: Harry Aumend farm, Mrs. Lewis Lynch, Plymouth route 1; Warren Artz farm, Gary Cole, Shelby route 3; John Ballitch farm, Clayton Brooks, Shiloh route 1.

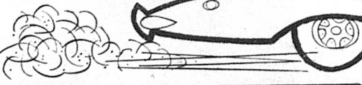

It seems pretty definite that New Haven schools can't be consolidated with District X. The Huron county board of education says it wouldn't be practicable.

We won't quibble with that conclusion because it is not in our best interests to do so, despite the fact there are some good and cogent arguments why New Haven school district should be joined to the new district.

It would be more desirable for New Haven schools to be consolidated with Plymouth, from our point of view, not only for what it would mean to Plymouth, but for what it would mean to New Haven. We think New Haven stands to gain more by coming here than by going to Willard. A girl who marries a man on the way up is usually happier than the one who marries a man who's already arrived. That working together that is necessary makes of both of them better partners.

Our board of education will appeal to the electors in the district for a three-mill levy this fall. We see no reason why it shouldn't be approved unanimously, though we doubt that will happen. One of the ways for our board to win over some who think we shouldn't have any more money — and there are a few — is to take steps to enlarge the tax base, which will at least give the illusion of doing something for the taxpayer.

One sure way of doing that is to open discussions with Mr. Bauer and the New Haven board leading toward eventual consolidation of the two school districts.

Hot as it is, we are a little reluctant to urge our friends and neighbors to take an interest in that which will only generate more heat: politics.

But the truth is that we have to have candidates. If they don't file petitions, a caucus will meet to parcel up the jobs to the same fellows who've been doing them, off and on, for a long time.

We, speaking for ourselves, would like to see some public-spirited women file for public office. Matter of fact, we have two of them in mind. One of 'em we know very well, and she's stubborn as all get about it. But she was stubborn once before, and with the deadline of a trip overseas staring us in the face, we talked her into it, and looked up a preacher.

Our point is that the best should serve, and those who do serve should serve because they want the job, not because it's foisted off on them.

This won't be the final word on this subject, but let this do for now: don't be so danged pig-headed about it. Don't feel that you can't afford to run for office, and serve if elected, because somebody will say nasty things about you. What do you expect out of life, anyway? Primroses and caviar?

July 21 is the last day to get your petition. August 10 is the last day to file it. Do something about it.

June Weather

Rainfall was light, totaling only 1.92 inches against a normal of 6.86 inches, a deficit of 4.94 inches. For the first six months of 1955 precipitation (rain and melted snow) totaled 15.60 inches against a normal of 22.34 inches, a deficit of 6.74 inches.

Despite the drought, wheat indicates a fair yield of good quality. Oats look fine and corn and soy beans fair, considering the lack of moisture.

July started off with increasing daily temperatures - 89, 90, 91 and 94 on the 4th.

Tuesday's rainfall amounted to 1.15 inches, the heaviest fall for a considerable spell. It occurred almost entirely between 7 and 8 p.m.

Around The Square with Phineas Whittleseed

It befalls a newspaperman from time to time to witness some of the ghastly aspects of life, and there has been no exception. In this day and age, the taking of life by law is the grimmest, the most gruesome sight of all.

Good fortune or bad, we've seen several. Our first was when the State of Iowa disposed of Walter "Dusty" Rhodes, a quarry worker who became enamored of another lady. His wife stood in the way of what he regarded as happiness and he took the fast way out. He killed her. It took him a long time to do it, but he did it, all right. He introduced her to trap shooting, which she took to with a duck dose to water, and one day he loaded a blasting cap in a 12 gauge shell and handed the gun to wife to fire. She did, and they picked her up with a whisk broom. The state caught up with Walter, and he stood trial, was found guilty, and hanged in the grey dawn of an April morning at the state pen at Fort Madison, right across the street from where Mr. Shaffer makes pens.

Newspapermen covering the courthouse and the sheriff's office are often appointed official witnesses by the sheriffs in Iowa (the sheriff of the county where the crime was committed supervises the execution) in return for past or future favors, and we were one.

Being young, and somewhat frightened by the prospect of seeing a man's life deliberately taken, we did what the other newspapermen were doing. We drank our breakfast, so, apparently, did "Dusty," for when the trap was sprung, it misfired, and he fell only a short distance, tearing the fleshy part of his throat and evoking his screams. We're not ashamed to admit we were sick with the rest of them. The second time he dropped, they did a good job of it.

Another time, it became our painful duty to organize a firing squad and shoot down a comrade in arms for a dastardly crime — betrayal to the enemy. There were eight soldiers on the squad, and one of those rifles (we did the loading) carried a blank, so that each of the shooters was condemned, in the back of his mind the idea that maybe he didn't shoot down the victim.

We happened to be on hand when Pierre Laval, the infamous French traitor, was silenced by a firing squad. We peeked over a wall.

And many times, when we lived in the Land of Sheba, we saw men hanged for various and sundry crimes. Once, a man who stole our dog (yes, the same danged beast that has now been hanged, but not for THAT crime. He was also guilty of a slight plotting against the emperor. The Ethiopians used to hang bandits (called shifita) on feast days and dangled them at each of the access roads to the capital, from which the condemned men who were left there to remind the populace that armed robbery is looked upon with disfavor by the empire.

In Ethiopia, there's no springing of a trap. They make the man stand upright in a wagon, under the gallows, and then hoist the rope. He kicks a little, but he hangs. Takes a little longer, but it's effective.

Elsewhere in that wild but delightful country, there are other means of dealing with heinous crimes. Attempted regicide (assassination of a king) is dealt with by wrapping the offender in long strips of cotton cloth soaked in paraffin. The culprit is hobbled so that he cannot run, and a long trail is allowed to dangle from his derriere to serve as a fuse. In the presence of the faithful, it is set alight.

And elsewhere, they dig a hole in the ground, bury the criminal up to his neck in the earth, spit honey on his head, and lead a path of driver ants to the honey. We've not seen this — we couldn't look upon it for long, anyway — and the piercing shrieks of the victims from a distance.

In the Arab world, we've seen boys whose hands or fingers have been cut off for stealing. And a woman whose tongue was cut out for gossiping.

So far as we could judge, in each instance (with one notable exception) the condemned lost his nerve at the last minute. Oh, we've read and heard tell of incorrigibles who maintain composure to the last, but we refuse to believe they're not helped with narcotics of some sort.

And one of the reasons they broke down, we think, is because they knew they were guilty. And they were sorry about it, and didn't want to pay.

Why we got onto this subject this balmy week of the Fourth of July is beyond me, unless in our subconscious there is a deeper attachment to liberty and independence than has shown up so far. Or maybe it was because something said last week by a man whom we honestly like that showed he was mad at us. He said, "I want to report a fire" or "I need a doctor."

An even then, there'll be a lot of technically false representations. Lots of folks, say D. B. F., think they need the doctor (particularly at stock time) when all they need is patience.

After a short business meeting, refreshments were served by Mrs. Vandervort. The class will not meet during July nor August. Mrs. Norma Burkett will be the September hostess.

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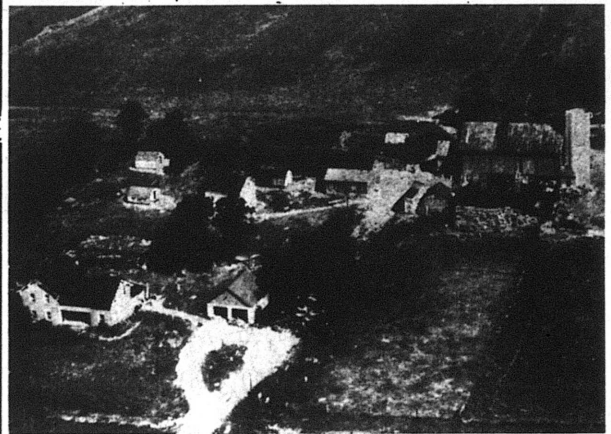
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
