Council Hears Plan To Build Fire House On 25c Donations

Citizens may be asked to contribute to the cost of a new fire house, which would also house the police department, at the rate of 25c a brick, the village council heard Tuesday night.

A plan advanced by Mayor Glenn West and endorsed by councilmen and Fire Chief Dalton F. McDougall would call for donations of 25c each, or multiples thereof, to be built into a new fire house. Site of the building, estimated to cost \$15,000, would be in Portner street where the present fire house is located.

The plan arose after the council had heard a committee consisting of Councilmen J. Benjamin Smith and W. Lawrence Cornell term the Hoffman warehouse an unsatisfactory prospect for purchase as a fire house. The building is in need of considerable remodeling to make it suitable as a fire house, the committee reported, and Councilman Royal W. Eckstein. So questioned the advisability of even considering purchase of the structure because it lies on land owned by the Baltimore & Ohio railroad.

Burr Knapp, manager of Hoffman farms, notified the council before it convened that as he had not had an opportunity to consult with his principal, James Hoffman of Mansfield Tire & Rubber Co., he could not discuss price of the building and would therefore not attend.

In other action Mayor West reported that Huron county commissioners are at work on repair of streets on the Huron county side of the village. A resolution requesting Richland county commissioners to do as much for streets on that side of the village was passed unanimously.

At the request of New Haven township trustees, the council approved a resolution requesting the Huron county engineer to prepare a survey to ascertain probable cost of reducing the slope of a hill near the Huron river in Plymouth east road. The hill was represented to the council as a hazard to safe driving.

An emergency measure to make supplemental appropriation of \$875 to buy water softening salt for the village water station was approved unanimously.

An ordinance establishing a rate of 60c a thousand square feet up to 60,000 square feet and 50c a thousand there after for fire sprinkler systems was passed on first reading. The Fate-Root-Heath Co. has informally indicated to the village it will not object to the rate, which would amount to \$35.48 annually for protection as proposed in its plan No. 4.

The council was told that annual inspection of the village jail conducted by the Huron county visiting committee found deficiencies in cleanliness. Lavatory facilities and absence of paint on the walls

were cited. A Baltimore & Ohio engineer will appear here Monday at 10 a.m. to discuss with the council suggestions for the repair of the bridge over its right-of-way in West Broadway.

Huron county's prosecutor, Bernard W. Freeman, has the recovery of findings against Lincoln Sprowles "well in hand", the council was told, and on advice of Solicitor Joseph F. Dush agreed to go along with Mr. Freeman's plans.

A request of Richland county commissioners two weeks ago to repair the Trust street bridge has produced results, the council advised. Work has started on repair of the pedestrian walks over the bridge.

The material is small, not particularly fast, but wiry and much of it is experienced behind the line. Marty Hampton, senior letterman who was lost to the second last season during the first contest at Buckeye Consolidated High school, will lead the returning veterans.

Other backs with experience are John Fetter, also a senior, Jim Hunt, sophomore passer, a junior, and Ray Einsel, a sophomore, as well as Tom Marvin, a senior wingback who read sweeps dominated the Plymouth attack against Townsend-Wakeman in the season's

closest last fall. Veteran linemen are Franklin Eckstein, who played at tackle last year, Ben Berberick, a guard, and but Jim Jacobs, a center, all of whom are seniors, Mickey Hampton, a sophomore, Larry, Taylor, another soph, and Floyd White, a tackle.

Sterling Memories Around The Square Of Another Day

It was just a small story in a daily newspaper. It said that Andrew B. Sterling is dead. He wrote "Wait Till the Sun Shines, Nellie", "Meet Me in Saint Louis, Louie", and "What're Ya Gonna Do When the Rent Comes 'Round?". Not to mention that ever-popular "When My Baby Smiles at Me".

He was 80 when he died. Who among us does not recall with pleasure the words of that hit of 1904, when the fair was staged at St. Louis: "Meet me in Saint Louis, Louie, Meet me at the fair; Don't tell me the lights are shining, Anywhere but there. I will be your tootsie-wootsie, We will dance the hootchie-kootchie. Meet me at Saint Louis, Louie, Meet me at the fair?"

The electric light was just gaining prominence then. And Little Egypt was dancing the hootchie-kootchie, the fore-runner of many ecdysiasts which include Gypsy Rose Lee, perhaps the most famous of them all. Next to Lady Godiva, that is.

The hootchie-kootchie didn't last long. But its spirit did. It was the beginning of the end for prudery and the Victorian morals which held our growing republic in check. It was the beginning of a new era for women: smaller families, less hard work at home, the vote.

Andrew Sterling couldn't have known it then, but his song spoke for a new generation. And another song he had written, "Wait Till the Sun Shines, Nellie", which had had its vogue earlier when it was the custom for entertainment to be confined to the parlor and singing around the old upright, spoke for an earlier era.

But Sterling wasn't finished. He wrote "What're Ya Gonna Do When the Rent Comes 'Round'" to express the panic of those who couldn't pay their bills during the hard times period after World War I.

And finally, he wrote "When My Baby Smiles at Me", a song which has become the trademark of the flapper era because it is the theme song of Ted Lewis.

How much of a full life Mr. Sterling must have known! For in four songs he depicted the entire span of man's life: courtship ("Meet Me in . . ."), marriage ("What're Ya Gonna Do . . ."), parenthood ("When My Baby Smiles . . ."), and old age ("Wait Till the Sun Shines . . .").

Only the young, they say, deserve the fair. And only the old who want to remember will enjoy the sterling works of Andrew B. Sterling, America at its best.

Doctors, lawyers, policemen, firemen, insurance men, and grocers won't have anything to do, because folks in heaven don't get sick, in trouble, have fires, or die. But they'll always have a job for a newspaperman, for the folks on one side of heaven will want to know what those on the other side are doing.

We watched some kids take a bath the other p.m., kids who've probably never had the luxury of a bathtub in their whole lives. The water was by courtesy of the Man Upstairs, and it ran in a ruvelud down through some brambles and briars, and the three of them stood there stark naked, the sun glinting off their browned-by-blood bodies.

But they got clean. The soap lathered nicely in the little stream, much better than it does in our wash stand, and there was no tell-tale line of hardened dirt at the edge of the basin when they had finished.

There were two boys and a girl, and the boys must have been nine or ten and the girl about eight. Yet they went on unconcernedly and without false modesty, scrubbing themselves and having a good time in the water, which is what all kids should do whether they are washing or swimming.

And as we drove away we couldn't help but recall the days when we were eight and nine and we built what we kids used to call the "B. T. B." - bare tail beach. We went to a plumbing establishment which was located on the bluff overlooking Ross' brook, and we took a discarded water boiler or two, tugged them down to the gnarled roots of an old willow, and we filled them with water and sank them against the roots to dam up the creek.

Then we chinked up the leaks until we had the water, which so far as we can remember was always mud-colored and boiled and now again filled with leeches, up to our necks and a bit higher. Then we took off our clothes (now why in heck didn't we take 'em off when we were putting the darn dam in?) and had us a swim.

There was sewage running into that creek, and cows used to drink by the dozens less than 200 yards upstream. But so far as we knew nobody ever got sick, unless it was from eating the green apples that hung from the trees on the top of the bluff.

And we think those kids that swam in that creek, about a dozen boys all told, were a darn sight healthier than those who've never had a bath in a creek.

Since those days, we've had all sorts of baths, and they've been as varied and as interesting as any you ever heard tell about. Like the time, boy, tired, and covered with grime and grease, after having baled a dozen medium tanks from a mudhole in southern Germany, we stormed into Baden Baden, the famous spa.

A fraulein suggested the baths, and we made for 'em. We shook off our clothes and hopped into the hottest confounded bath in captivity. The water was about hip deep, and the tub was a tiled pond about a dozen feet across each way. The water was sulphurous in content and smell, and then the hot mud issued forth from the outlet. At first it was frightening, and then that wonderful feeling you get when the hot water reaches the aches and pains came over us.

We relaxed and began to enjoy it but were aroused from our snoozing by a harsh sensation on our back. We looked up and nearly jumped from our skin. A hausfrau with a long-handled brush stood there and she was gesturing to us to roll over. Not since our Mom had invaded the bath room on a Saturday night many years before with a long-handled brush to get us clean for Sunday school had that happened!

But roll over we did, and if there is a place on our body that the missed, we can't think where it might be. She scrubbed and rubbed till we thought the skin was off, and then she motioned to us to get out.

We staggered out of the pool and stood there, more dead than alive. Then she compounded the felony by squirting an ice cold stream of mountain water against us. After the first shock, it felt fine. The Germans had something, take it from us.

And in Italy, in '47, we used to visit a man named Bonasini. He was a monster of a fellow and indeed had been Carnera's sparring partner. His therapy was to put overworked and slightly paunchy businessmen into his "heater", a box lined with about 150 bulbs of perhaps 75 watts. A small stool was inside. Sit on the stool, he locks the box up, and sets the alarm clock for 30 minutes. After a bit you begin to roast, just like one of these things you see in a fancy restaurant. The perspiration runs off you like nobody's business.

And at the end of 30 minutes, he opens the door, throws a towel about six yards long around you, and lifts you up bodily to lie upon his table for 15 minutes, "steaming in your own juice", as he used to put it.

Then the shower. After that blessed hot water had run upon the shoulders and back for a few minutes, he'd turn on the hose. This was a two-inch job which spouted water piped directly from the bay of Genoa. Cold? No! God!

Then he'd rub the body with alcohol and a mitt made, we used to think, of steel wool. We always splurged and took a cab home. We had to.

In Africa, we used to go to Sciasciahamna, where our friend Pettinelli had a hacienda. And there was a mineral spring that he'd fixed up. The water always ran 105 degrees. And it was slightly radioactive. It made you feel good all over.

So when we saw those little Mexican (or maybe they were Puerto Rican) kids in the stream last week, we harked back and thought of the baths like that we'd taken over the years, and figured we weren't any the worse for it.

Now, slightly fat and nearly forty, we like the tub. But kids ought to take baths like those kids did. Makes 'em grow up better.

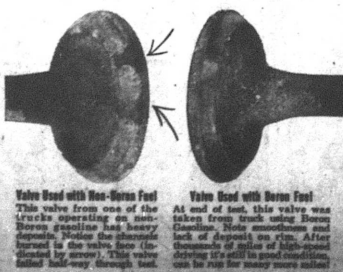

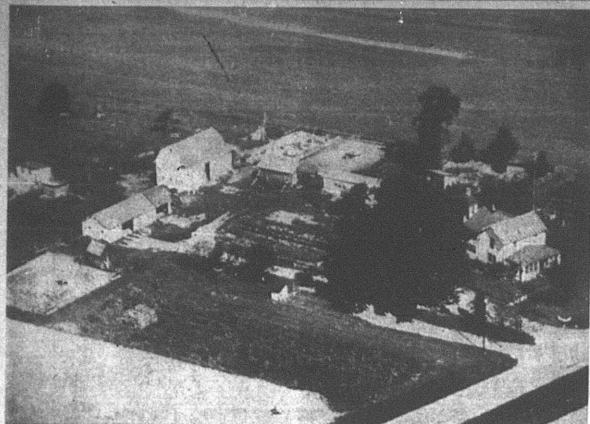

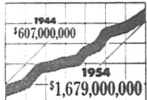

Resolved, that bids be received until 1:00 p.m. on the 2nd day of Sept., 1955, and that notice to all banks in said school district and to all banks and banks as may be necessary be given by publication as provided by law. Said board of education reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to further.

Resolved, that said board of education shall meet at its regular meeting place on the 6th day of Sept., 1955, at 8:00 p.m. for designation of depositories.
