After 35 Years of Experience with Grandchildren and Cows — Rebers Sell Calves, Buy Cows

The V. L. Rebers have been married 35 years, and have a good crop of 10 grandchildren — the newest only 10 days old — to boast about, as well as a fine record in the raising of cattle.

Their formula for cattle is the exact opposite of their formula for grandchildren: sell 'em while they're young, and buy when they're ready to produce.

In the whole 35 years, they can remember only once that they raised a calf from birth to producer. Mostly, they sell the calf when it's big enough and buy milking heifers or freshened cows.

Money-wise, the Rebers figure they can make just as much on that system as by hanging on to the calf until it has eaten its

way to production size.

The Reber farm is a 79-acre place in the east side of Bowman street road a fourth of a mile south of where the road joins Route 178 west of Shiloh. It was formerly owned by George Page, veteran Shiloh hatchery man and once publisher of the Shiloh Review.

Right now, the Rebers have sold off all but seven milkers, whose produce they take by hand rather than by milking machine.

"You've got to stick at it if you want to be able to milk day in and day out," laughs Mrs. Reber. "Stop a while and your arms get cramps."

Crops this year turned out well for the Rebers despite the dry growing season. Oats and wheat re-

turned well, they report, and the corn appears to be as strong a crop as last year.

Living on a well-traveled county road (and the opening of the new bridge has increased traffic in Bowman Street road, the Rebers say) means your kids get out to school promptly when the snow falls, because the road is plowed out quickly.

The Reber farm lies in the Shiloh school district, although most of the grandchildren frequent Shelby schools.

The Rebers' youngest child will be 18 this week. She's off helping her next oldest sister, who brought the third grandson and tenth grandchild into the world Friday night.

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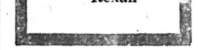

JULY WEATHER

July, 1955, was the warmest July on record at this station (23 years). The thermometer hit 90 and above on 16 days, with a high of 98 on the 27th. Even the nights were hot, with three in the 70's, 23 in the 60's and only 3 in the 50's, with a low of 56 on the 11-13th. The average for the month was 77.2 degrees, or 4.4 degrees above normal.

Rainfall totaled 3.54 inches or .18 above normal. Of this total, 2.99 inches fell in the first half of the month, and only .55 inch in the last half, leaving pastures burned up.

Despite the lack of moisture, corn made good progress and may still produce a good crop. J. A. R.

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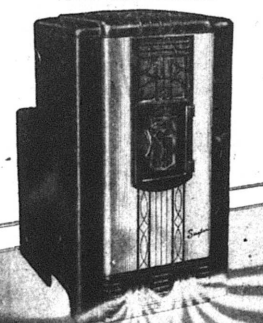
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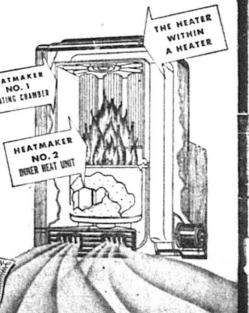
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The Band Deserves Support!

Once a year, the high school band presents what is called a festival for want of, perhaps, a better name, for the purpose of raising money.

Nobody would disagree with the statement that band activities are good for our young people and constitute sound, honest training for their lives as adults. The benefits of music alone, leaving aside for the moment the benefits of friendly camaraderie, are worth the expense.

We had cause for pride in our band last year. Unheralded and unsung, the band took top ratings in the district contest. For a unit that was organized only six years ago, in its present sense, at least, the band did exceptionally well.

A good deal of the credit was due the band instructor, and we publicly came forward at the time to give that credit to him. Unfortunately, he is gone now, and the band will appear under the baton of a stranger.

This is no reason to say the band

deserves any less support. On the contrary, it deserves more. We need to show the young people we are appreciative of their efforts even when they are handicapped, to some extent, at least, by a strange leader.

doesn't do what Illinois and Indiana do.

This state is a great breeder of standard-bred bloodstock for trotting and pacing, but a great number of horses go out of state and stay there. Why? It costs money to train and campaign a horse, and the stakes are greater on the eastern seaboard. Illinois and Indiana encourage local breeding - and local racing, which is more important - by scheduling a number of stakes events for home-bred colts and fillies and keeping outsiders out. The prize money starts at \$25,000. That's going a long way toward keeping the best here, and making for better racing in the state.

We spent our childhood with legs outstretched in a sulky, clucking to an old sidewheeler named Sam J. Napoleon, who wouldn't turn to the right for thy life of him. There were the days when a harness horse was "scored" at the head of the stretch, rather than started behind a fancy white barrier hooked up to a gleaming Cadillac.

Sam J. paid the taxes and a lot more in his day, and we'll not soon forget the afternoon at Flemington when he wouldn't turn and the starter, old Steve Phillips of Xenia, said over his public address system, "Mr. Paddock, bring that horse down here in line and on stride or it will cost you \$50." Sam J. wasn't turning, and Dad sent for a table leg in the barn. Told to flog him behind the ear for his stubbornness, we did so, really laid it on.

Sam J. turned, paced three straight miles in under 2:06, took the stake and the cup, went on to his best year. Even won a race for amateur drivers for us when we were only 16. And the sports writers said something to the effect that "Sam J. Napoleon whipped 11 other pacers in the feature event yesterday, but it took another leg to do it."

The departure of the horse from the farm made a lot of advantages for a good many folks, but something that was valuable when the boy was taken away from the horse.

(Our old man would say, were he alive, "You can take the boy away from the horse, but you never can take the horse away from the boy.")
