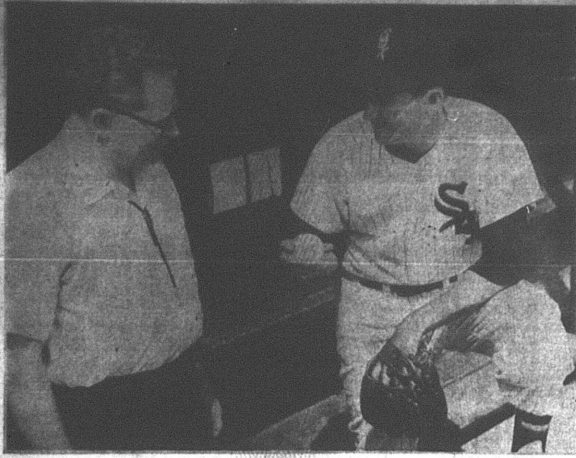


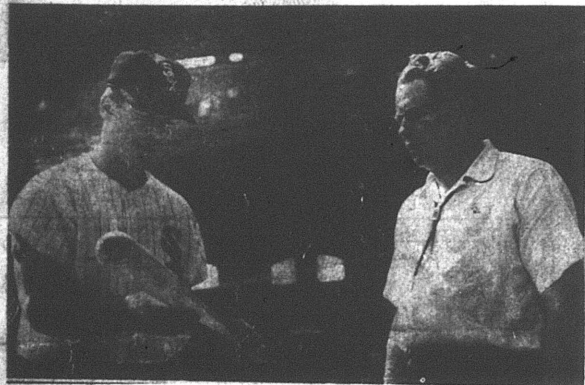

School Curriculum Set by Board Here

Except for a deficiency in emphasis upon conservation of natural resources, which will be corrected at once, Plymouth public schools offer a course of study quite parallel to the state requirements as laid down in the Revised Code of the Ohio school laws.

The Board of Education passed on voice vote in special meeting Tuesday night a resolution declaring the following course of study to be required here:

1. Language arts, including reading, writing, spelling, oral and written English and literature.
2. Geography, history of the United States and of Ohio, and national, local and state government in the United States.
3. Mathematics.
4. Natural science, including instruction in the conservation of natural resources.
5. Health and physical education, including instruction in the harmful effect of narcotics and their illegal use and instruction in the effects of use of alcoholic beverages.
6. Fine arts, including music.
7. First aid, safety and fire protection.

The Board adopted as policy that every pupil shall have been exposed to the teaching of American history before he enters the ninth grade.

Mrs. Lybarger Loses Father at N. Auburn

Father of Mrs. Frances Lybarger of this place, John A. Alt, a retired New Washington farmer, died Aug. 21 in Shelby Memorial hospital.

Three Schools Open Tuesday; Teacher Vacancies Still Exist

Plymouth, Shiloh and New Haven schools will open Tuesday at 9 a.m., their respective superintendents announce. A half-day session will be conducted in all three schools Tuesday and the first full-day session will commence Wednesday morning.

Plymouth Teachers Meet Monday, Coon Announces

Plymouth Supt. M. J. Coon has called an elementary teachers' meeting Monday, Labor day, at 9 a.m. and a meeting of high school teachers half an hour earlier.

No principal has been appointed to succeed Frederick C. Kreutzfeld in the high school.

Bus drivers George W. Cheesman, Harry Aumend and Carl Carnahan will follow the same routes as last year. With the exception of County Line road and Tru street, bus pupils from these streets are asked to be ready at 8 a.m.

Elementary pupils will be directed to their assigned classrooms when they enter the building. High school pupils will gather in the auditorium where Mr. Coon will assign rooms.

Tuesday's session will close at noon. Pupils will not need to carry lunch. The cafeteria will open Wednesday, with last year's prices prevailing. 25c for pupils 30c for high school students, and 35c for teachers. Extra milk will be furnished at two cents per half pint.

Price lists of work books and supplies will be sent home with the pupil, Mr. Coon announces. All pupils should carry notebooks and pencils the first day.

Seven teachers new to the Plymouth system will join the system this year. They are Kenneth Nixon, teacher of mathematics, advisor of the Mayflower, and sponsor of the eighth grade; Mrs. Mildred Flegm, home economics instructor, Future Homemakers of America, advisor, and sponsor of seventh grade girls; Robert Martin, science teacher and assistant coach of physical education; Lewis Pettit, head coach, physical education teacher, and sponsor of the ninth grade.

Also, James Nowakowski, English and speech teacher, sponsor of the junior class, and librarian; Byron Millard, English and Spanish instructor, advisor to Future Teachers of America, and book custodian; Donald Bowersox, music supervisor and driver training teacher.

Superintendent Coon will teach chemistry and direct the junior and senior class plays.

Mrs. Marjorie Smith will again teach commercial subjects. She will sponsor the tenth grade. Frank Garber is back as industrial arts teacher. He will be sponsor of seventh grade boys.

Robert Whitaker, senior class sponsor, will teach social studies.
