New Coach Begins Season 'Optimistic' But 'Respects' Visitor

With a new coach, a new system, and an even dozen lettermen, Plymouth High's Pilgrims kick off their 1955 season in Mary Fete park tomorrow at 8 p.m. against Green Springs High school.

The Red and White is guided this year by Lew Pettit, in his first year of coaching, and the split T has been installed. Young Ray Elmer, a sophomore letterman, will direct the offense from his quarterback post.

The starting backfield is likely to have Marty Hampton, senior letterman, and Jimmy Hunt, a sophomore who won his letter last year, at the halves and Bud Berberick, another senior veteran, at fullback.

On the forward wall, Coach Pettit and his assistant, Bob Martin, seem ready to start Larry Taylor and John Fettes at the ends, Franklin Eckstein and Floyd White at the tackles, Mickey Hampton and Jim Fidler at the guards, and Jim Jacobs at center. All are regulars except Fidler.

The Pilgrims scrimmaged against Ashland freshmen and sophomores under the lights Thursday night in a controlled affair, each team getting 10 tries at the ball. The Pilgrims swept to a three touchdown win, showing a strong passing attack and a fair running game.

"I believe our squad will stand its ground against any other squad whose boys are more or less of the same size as ours. We have some speed and some size, and the team has come along with the new system quite well," Coach Pettit says.

"We want to have a winning season, and we are working on flaws as hard as we can. But we don't underestimate the Green Springs team, etc. Those we haven't seen it play. Our information is they have a new coach, a new system, and new faces, just like we do, but they have some size, too."

Lloyd Black, 71, Dies Suddenly of Stroke

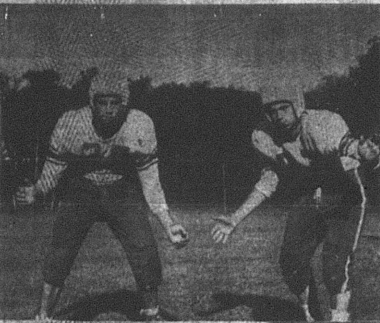
Butner Lays First Block of Scout Hut In Shiloh's Park

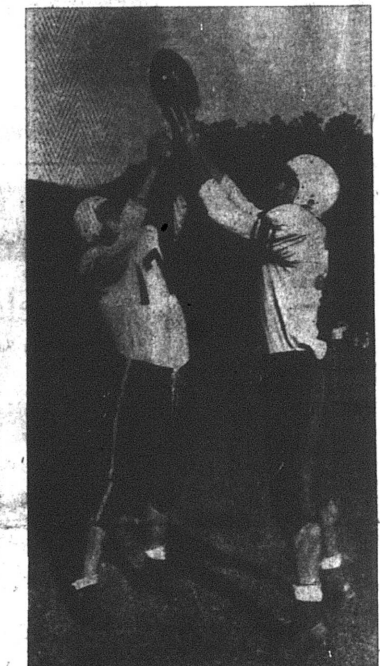

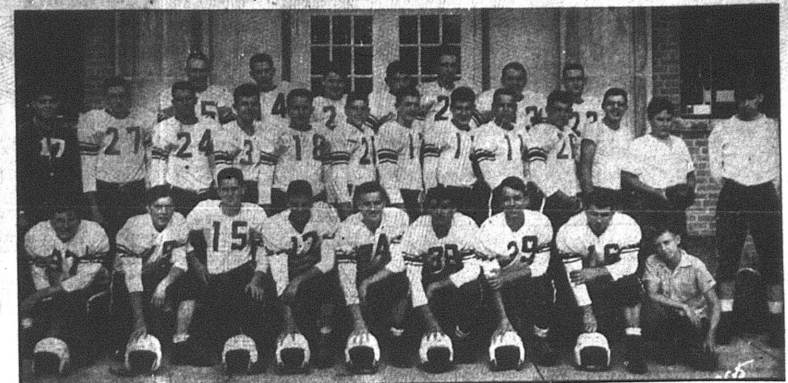
Class of 1944 Holds Reunion at Park; Renewal Set for '57

Roberts to Get Water By Paying for Line; Board to Share Cost

The Board of Public Affairs dealt Monday night with requests by residents in outlying areas of the village water service for additional pressure.

George Roberts, who lives near the sawmill in Route 98, told the Board he had worked out an arrangement to obtain additional water pressure with neighbors if the Board would approve.

His plan is to install a two-inch water line between his house and the nearest village main, paying the village for a one-inch line, the difference to be paid by the village.

Those who may wish to tap into the line later may do so but only by paying Mr. Roberts for a share of the cost, the Board decided, and made an entry on its minutes to this effect.

In other action, the ban on lawn sprinkling was removed. The Board decreed that since old lawns do not require watering now, the ban works a hardship on those who wish to install new lawns.

Although the price of water softening salt has increased 60c a ton, the Board learned, its contract with the supplier is in effect and the Board, which uses about 18 tons a month, still obtains salt at the old price.

Fire hydrants in at least four locations are either inoperative or defective and need to be repaired. Mayor Glenn West told the Board. Supt. Russell Moser was directed to make repairs at once.

In a policy decision, the Board voted unanimously to remove two persons from the list of billing for sewer charges because, while they live within the corporation, they will probably never obtain sewer connections.

Three others who requested relief from the bill were told that connection would eventually be feasible, and their requests were turned down.

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Feeders See Methods Of Bachrach, Knauts

Approximately 50 beef cattle feeder in Huron county attended the farm tour Friday.

Self-feeding operations, which are fairly new in the beef feeding program, were observed by the Bachrach farm, south of Plymouth. This method of feeding makes it possible to fill the feeders once a week rather than daily as is usually required. New methods of grinding both grain and hay for the self-feeder have been worked into the self-feeding system.

The group then toured the Hoffman farms where Burr Knauts had approximately 140 head of cattle on a dry-lot feeding program. Mr. Knauts reported that cattle were eating about one acre of chopped green corn daily. These cattle were started on dry-lot feeding and have continued to be fed chopped grass and corn silage alone throughout the summer. Gains were reported to be good and more economical than other feeding methods previously used on the Hoffman farm.

Donald Walker, IFYE delegate from Australia now on the Clarence Drown farm, and Camille-Louis Schoups, IFYE delegate from Belgium on the Hardesty farm, both gave excellent talks to the group as part of the afternoon program.

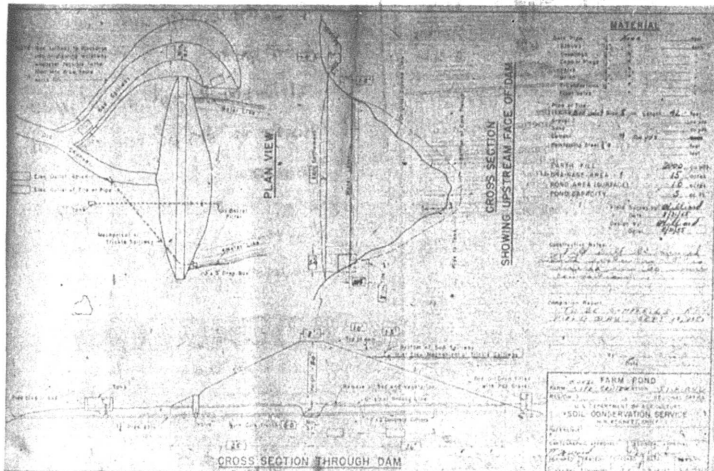

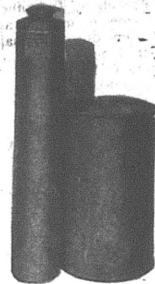
