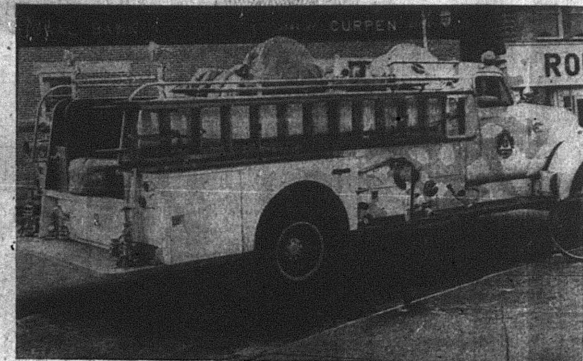


Civil Defense Group Gets New Equipment -- \$45,000 Worth!

Cleveland I. (for Indian) Pennant, only one year old, who died Sunday before 28,504 persons in Municipal Stadium, Cleveland, was interred yesterday at Comiskey park, Chicago, Ill. Martin Marion, lay preacher, and 34 dirge singers in the white uniforms of the Chicago White Sox rendered the final rites.

Weldon M. Cornell of this place, who witnessed the death of young Pennant, his godchild, Sunday, was an honorary pallbearer. Press of business and revulsion of the pitiful final collapse of Pennant combined to prevent his presence.

Young Cleveland Indian Pennant was taken ill in Washington a week ago, and frantic efforts of his physician, Prof. Alfonso Ramon Lopez, of Ybor City, Fla., prolonged the agony, which degenerated into three successive attacks of Detroititis Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Pennant's emotional condition was not enhanced by a grief inspired in a New York enclosure where Dr. Charles Dillon Stengel's medicalizations and admonitions were producing rallies in his patient. The Yankee Contender, against an attack of over Red Soxular activity. Pennant's parents, Henry Greenberg and Myron Wilson, stood in tears at their beards while he was laid to rest. The embalming was performed by William Pierce, a talented southpaw expert, ably assisted by Orestes Mino, a Latin American maseio.

Maumee Valley Day, Pilgrims to Play Here

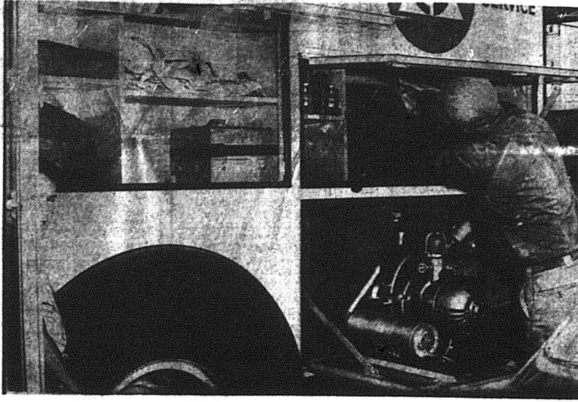

World War I Vet Has Surprise — Old 1918 Buddy

Back in 1917-18, two Marines of the 23rd Regiment, 2nd Division, were close buddies, almost inseparable. They drew K. P. together, went on pass (when they could get one) to see what France was like arm in arm.

After the Armistice, they separated, never to see each other face until Sunday, when John J. Cosky of Rochester, Pa., dropped in on William Wechter, of Trux street.

Accompanied by his wife, Mr. Cosky had been visiting in Detroit, Mich. At her urging, he drove through here looking up his old World War I buddy, with whom he had several times corresponded.

The two old Marines reminisced and shed a tear or two all afternoon. Mr. Wechter reports, "I knew that face, but I couldn't quite place him until he told me who he was." Mr. Wechter says.

Only other World War I buddies of the Plymouth veteran living near here are Tom Crabb, who lives in Maple street, and Harry Snider, brother-in-law of Ned Earnest, who used to live here, now calls Akron home.

Two Die as Trench Falls in New Haven

A sewer trench they were digging near the New Haven Methodist church collapsed on Henry Chapman, 44, and Wilbert McKenzie, 52, at about noon Sept. 15, and Chapman died of the injuries shortly after in Willard Municipal hospital.

Mr. McKenzie, 52, succumbed to his injuries Sunday.

The men, members of the church, were donating their labor to excavate the trench. They had followed a tile increasingly deeper, and at the point when the trench collapsed it was 10 feet deep.

Chapman was buried to his chest. Hastily dug up, he was rushed to the hospital, where he for a short time regained consciousness. He soon after lapsed into a coma from which he never rallied, and death was pronounced at about 1:15 p.m.

Neil and Harold Slessman were operating a power digger while Chapman and McKenzie followed with tiles.

McKenzie received the lesser injury. He has a punctured lung, several broken ribs, and a possible fracture of the sternum. His condition is listed as "fair and improving."

Mr. Chapman, who celebrated this year the 25th anniversary of his graduation from New Haven High school at the same time as his daughter and his niece were graduated, was a prominent and energetic grassland

farmer. His home is in Route 61 near the New Haven cemetery, where he was laid to rest Saturday after funeral services were said in his church by the Rev. James McGaw.

His wife, the former Ruth Slessman, and two children, Janet and William, both at home, survive, as do his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Chapman of Plymouth route 1, two brothers, Donald, New Haven, and Frank, Greenwich, and six sisters, Mrs. Ted Close, Detroit, Mich.; Mrs. Edward Postema, Mrs. Joe Rosenberry and Mrs. Walter Buchanan, all New Haven; Mrs. Frank Schoen, Bellevue, and James Buchanan, Greenwich.

He was a member of the international Order of Odd Fellows at New Haven, and had long served as adviser to 4-H clubs there.

Funeral services for Mr. McKenzie, who lived in Route 598, were conducted yesterday by the Rev. G. C. Heffelfinger, pastor of Willard's Lutheran church, with burial in New Haven cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Alma; two sons, Richard, New Haven, and Gordon; a daughter, Mrs. Shirley Gordon, Greenwich; a step-mother, Mrs. W. McKenzie, Willard; a brother, Charles, Elyria, and several half-brothers and sisters, including Roy Evans, Plymouth.

PUCO Expert Says Crossing Not Unsafe

A Public Utilities Commission of Ohio inspector has reported to his superiors that he does not think the Baltimore & Ohio railroad grade crossing in Route 98 south of here is dangerous.

In a report dated Sept. 16, the inspector, C. E. Parshall, says that of five accidents which occurred at the crossing since Oct. 29, 1951, four of them were the result of a train striking an automobile.

He submitted six photographs with his report, purporting to prove that "there are the required two standard railroad crossbuck signs, and they are directly on tangent highway for several thousand feet and can be easily seen."

However, the inspector added, "I have discussed this crossing with Mr. T. E. Johnson, superintendent, Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Co., and he advised as that he would gladly remove and install a new modern reflectorized crossing sign in each of the two highway approaches of the crossing in place of the present crossing signs."

In another portion of his report, Inspector Parshall states "adequate visibility of the location of this railroad crossing can be had several thousand feet from both the north and the south, also the visibility of approaching trains in all four angles of the crossbuck is adequate from 700 to 3,000 feet from the crossing near main track rail."

The inspector stated he had asked Mr. Johnson to have weeds and debris and trees removed from each of the four angles of the crossing, and to install reflectorized crossing signs in the two approach angles of the crossing in place of the present crossing signs. "I cannot agree with Mr. Padcock (the publisher, who filed the letter of complaint) in his statement that this is a dangerous crossing . . . and I recommend that this complaint be dismissed," Mr. Parshall wrote.

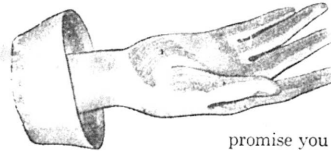

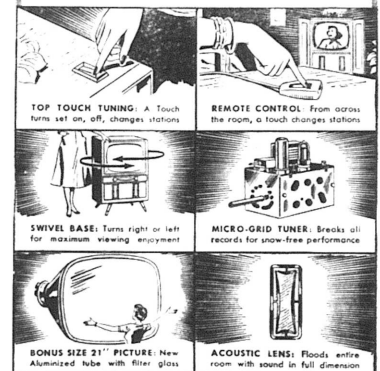

"Sooner or later, he added, relief must necessarily come, but in the meantime, these small villages will continue to be subjected to harassment and threats of injunctive action."

We don't know the senator, but if this is an example of the kind of enlightened thinking he's supposed to give the constituents of his district, then we'd just as soon not know him.

Because the senator is so wrong it's painful. Assuming he was correctly quoted, come on, Ben Strango is too good a newspaperman to take any chances on that score.

week, we haven't yet read of a community under 3,000 in population which is faced with a sewer disposal system outlay of \$400,000 or \$500,000. Matter of fact, the plant itself doesn't cost a fifth of that figure, even for a village of 3,000. It's not the plant that runs into money, it's the correcting of the bad thinking and bad planning done by folks who have gone before us and who failed to put down satisfactory sewer mains.

As in the case of the Plymouth plans, the big cost is in the sewer lines, not in the disposal plant. Secondly, Senator Latta doesn't pay any mind at all to the proviso built into the bill — by which Shiloh a village of 625 or so, has benefitted — which permits the community which honestly can't swing the project financially to be exempted from the provisions of the bill.

This doesn't sound to us like a crucifixion of the community upon a cross of sewer disposal plants, as Senator Latta suggests.

Thirdly, the senator doesn't know what he's talking about when he says that some alternative methods will work. Just what are they? Septic tanks? Sorry, Mr. L. Experts have proved they don't work. Not for long, anyway. And they're certainly a lot more expensive than a sewer plant. If you can come to this village, Senator Latta, and show any three persons of your choosing that it would be cheaper for each household to install a new septic tank and connect it up in an approved manner than it would be to install a sewage disposal system such as that which is planned for the village by the sanitary engineers, we'll apologize to you, pay your expenses, vote for you next time, and press a \$100 bill into your hot little hand.

But until that time comes, you'll pardon us for saying your stuff is balderdash, pure and simple, not a kind of thing we as Republicans want from our party leaders — not even for campaign purposes (and if that's what it was, be good enough to label it), and certainly not the kind of thing that shows loyalty to these house committees the west out and tried to wipe out the errors of their grandfathers and great-grandfathers.

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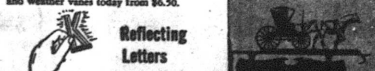

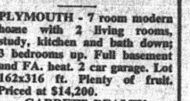

With an attack that worked well when it worked at all, Plymouth's Pilgrims opened their 1955 football season at Mary Kate park Friday night with a 29 to 12 thumping of the Green Springs Bobcats before 400 fans.

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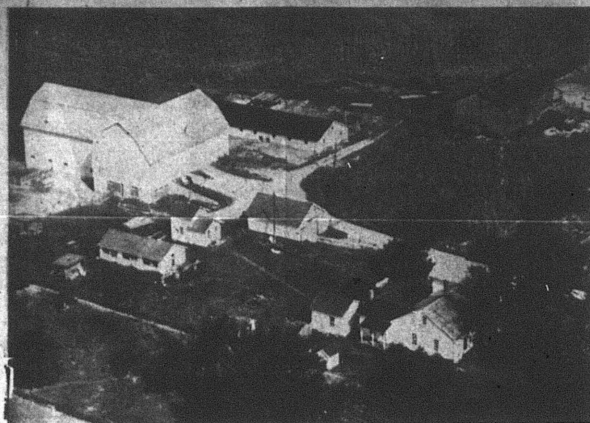

McCarter Has Hog 'Gimmick'

John McCarter lives on the Kebecker farm in Champion road, just south of Daninger road, and for those who might just be interested, he has a gimmick about raising hogs that's profitable and easy to use.

He shoots for the off market. His sows drop their piglets at odd times of the year, and Mr. McCarter takes the fattened pigs to market at a time when deliveries are slow. This tends to keep the price up.

This in June and August, you'll find newborn piglets on the McCarter place, and again in December. And this year they'll be by a Spotted Poland boar, a well set up sire whose presence on the place was chosen because he'll get a good bacon-type, long-in-the-barrel hog.

This is the year for the Spotted Poland boar. Last year, it was a Hamp. And the year before, a Berk. The veteran farmer, who hails originally from Indiana, where we raised hogs and muttons, started with a pure strain of Berk. These he crossed with Hamps. Then he brought in the Spotted Poland. Result: a husky, good eating, easy-to-take-care-of hog that's ideal for the market because it's a bacon hog.

"Once you've been raised with produce, though, it gets in your blood," laughs Mr. McCarter, and they operate a farm produce market in Route #61 outside of Shelby.

It's not all milk-and-honey, the farmer's lot these days, he says, to illustrate his point he tells what happened to a fine herd of brown Swiss cattle. "I bought those two Ayrshire heifers for \$150 apiece and when they dropped their calves, we had Bangs disease. I had to sell all of the Brown Swiss. Two heifers set me back \$300 and the loss of the herd was well over \$3,000."

The farm covers 220 acres. "They'll let me grow 26 acres of wheat and I've got no great com-

plaint about that. We raise all the corn we need. Just as soon as the weather turns a little and we get some rain, I'm going to cut these hogs and start pouring the feed to them, because I figure the market'll drop about the end of November."

The hog population on the McCarter place will then drop con-

siderably from its present 100 head, but December farrowing will bring it back up.

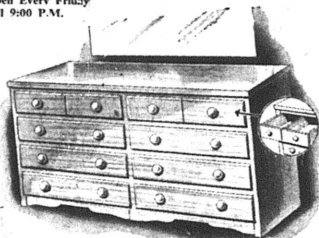

Add whole wheat cereal gradually to rapidly boiling water; stir constantly until thickened; cook slowly 2 minutes. Combine white sauce, cooked whole wheat cereal, ham, onion, and parsley; mix well. Chill thoroughly. Form into 8 croquettes, 2 inch thick. Mix water and egg. Roll croquettes in crushed corn flakes, then in egg mixture, and again in crushed corn flakes. Bake in shallow pan in hot oven (400°F.) 20 minutes. Serve with mushroom, cheese, or tomato sauce, as desired. Yield: 8 croquettes.
