Ray Einsel and Eddie Taylor formed the battery in Mary Fate Saturday afternoon as Plymouth's Pilgrims mounted a passing attack that swamped Maumee Valley Country Day school 48 to 6.

It was an aerial afternoon, as the Monawks passed on three of four plays throughout the game. All of the Pilgrim scores came directly from passes.

Taylor scored five times, each time after taking a short pass from the sophomore quarterback on a play he had learned only the night before. Once Taylor danced 30 yards down the south sideline with a heave that he snared on the Maumee Valley 30 after failing to Mohawk defenders out of position.

Marty Hampton, the principal offensive gainer for the Pilgrims with two lengthy runs of 55 and 45 yards, scored in the second period with a 25-yard dash off a toss by Ted Fox. Tom Marvin gathered in a 22-yard pitch from Hampton for the seventh Pilgrim score.

Maumee Valley was able to score only in the second quarter, after Gary Finkbeiner, the hero and the host of the Mohawk performance, had passed 22 yards to Ned Plummer in the end zone. All of Taylor's touchdowns were scored over Finkbeiner's position.

Early in the fourth quarter, Coach Lew Pett cleared the Pilgrim bench and gave even the lowliest scrub a chance to play. With some of the most seasoned performers in at times to balance the team, they did well.

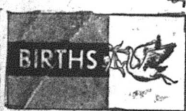

A Word on the Three Mill Levy

It is a little less than five weeks to the general elections, and we propose to devote our editorial attention between now and then to a study and eventual recommendations-of the issues that confront us and what to do about them.

Broadly, the issues seem to us to fall into three separate categories:

1. What shall we do about the schools?
2. What shall we do about the cemetery levy?
3. Whom shall we choose as village officials?

The board of education is asking for an additional three mills of operating funds at the same time as it asks for a renewal of the existing 6.5 mills.

It claims that the additional money is needed to furnish a minimum educational standard for all pupils in the Plymouth public schools; specifically, the funds would be used to hire another teacher, to afford increases in salaries of incumbent teachers, to provide additional storage space and laboratory equipment, and to expand the library.

So far as we are able, we have investigated the needs of the schools as represented by the board of education and we believe the claims are honest ones, and should be honored by the electorate.

We therefore urge every citizen to vote "Yes" on the question of a three mill levy for additional funds of the schools.

There are two vacancies on the school board, and three candidates have expressed a willingness and desire to serve. In principle, because service on local school boards, village councils, township boards and the like is not particularly remunerative financially, and requires a considerable expenditure of time and services which are rewarded mostly in a spiritual manner, we believe that incumbents should be returned to office if they want to serve again. Subject, of course, to the proviso they've been doing a good job.

So far as we know, nobody has any reason to question the kind of service Haldon Cheesman has been giving the board of education, and since he is willing to serve again, since he represents the rural aspect of the school district, we believe he should be reelected.

As to the other post, the voter must choose between two worthy candidates, each of them a parent, each of them an honest, honorable citizen devoted to the good interests of his community. Generally, we feel that a candidate whose children are still of school age is a better candidate than one whose children are already graduated. Not so in the present instance, however. Because Mr. Cunningham's children have graduated, we do not think he is any less qualified than Mr. Markley, both of whose children are still in school. The voter should make his choice on other grounds.

We tried to respond as politely as we know how that we don't make the news, we only print it. And when someone dies, or is hurt, or has an accident, that's what people want to know.

It always makes us feel good when we can devote the front page honestly and in accordance with the best decisions of our profession to whole some news: the schools, to mention but one subject. Few weeks ago, two-thirds of page 1 was given over the school news. Yet the other afternoon a lady from High Street berated us for doing so: "The schools are always asking for money, it's always gimme, gimme, gimme!"

Madam, we say again, the needs of the schools are paramount in our times. We intend to have more to say consistent with that thesis between now and the date of general election, and would give almost anything to see to it you don't get to the polls on that day.

Why this should be necessary is beyond us, but at the last two football games we have noted the same boy ignoring the national anthem and standing idly by with his cap on, chattering away merrily, when the Star Spangled Banner is played. Take note, sonny: this is your last warning. Next time we're gonna get down out of the stands and boot you so hard you won't know what hit you. And you're big enough to boot.

It's sometimes understandable (but never forgivable) when one of the older generation forgets about the music. But in this day and age, when kids at school have to salute the flag and sing the anthem practically every day, there is absolutely no excuse for failure to pay respect. And so long as we're around, we'll bend every effort to see that it's done.

We saw a man pulling a wheelbarrow in Route 598 the other day, not pushing it and he was pulling it when we came back. Struck by the thought that he had obviously pulled the darned thing a considerable distance, we stopped and asked him how come.

"Just don't like the looks of the got-durned thing," he said, "so I pull it, not push it."

Oh, me, whatta world!

More folks have rushed up to us since the end of last week, thrusting great stuff into our hot little hands, muttered something about those "g---d Yankees" and fled off about their business!

Come to think of it, what would've we done if we'd lost? It amounts to a considerable pile, and no, Mother, you won't get any new hat out of it.

Best part of the win is that Mrs. Tom Moore has to bake us a cake. She's not up to singing that dandy little rhyme about "I'd a Know'd You Was Gonna Win I Wouldn't Have Bet Wit'cha" but it fits.

And J. Ben Smith, the pride of Ward 3, has to decorate our outstretched palm, not to mention Donald Ford, the gay caballero of the rural route. Harold (pardon, Reinhard Harold) Mack forked up a couple of bucks, somewhat sheepishly, and admitted he was wrong.

Moral of the whole thing: every dog has his day. Last year, with the wreath hung on our door and the big photograph of them peaky injuns pasted on our door, we had to eat crow.

Now if we can only steer 'em home in the Serious, as Ring Lardner used to say, we'll bathe in champagne.

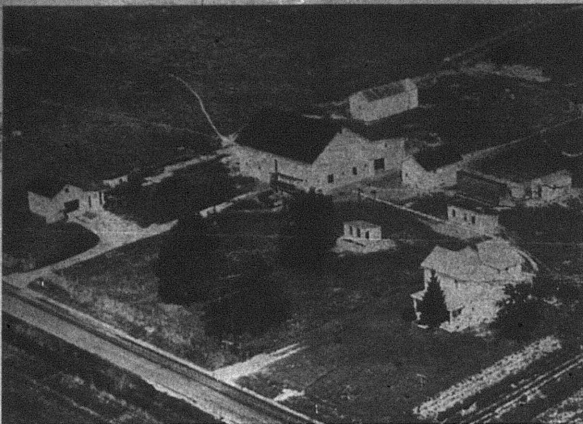

No Fence Post Cutting for Mr. Gilger —

Home-Grown Fences Not Cheap

The farmer who figures to cut fence posts from a second growth of native Ohio timber had better sharpen his pencil and figure some more, in the opinion of Bob Gilger, veteran farmer who has worked the Carl M. Lofland homestead for 22 years.

From his experience, Mr. Gilger says, "the second growth stuff lasts only two or three years, whereas locust posts will last longer. And at 40 cents apiece for eight-foot posts, how can you cut 'em yourself and make out?"

For this and other reasons, the fine stand of deciduous trees in the woods in the north portion of the 103-acre farm will remain untouched.

This assures that they'll continue to be home for raccoon - "Carl and I were out there Sunday and saw a lot of 'coon tracks" - and deer - "I saw a doe and a couple of young ones coming out of there the other morning."

The Gilger operation is a tidy one. Mr. Gilger and his son, John, farm about 300 acres on three farms, one of which belongs to John's father-in-law.

"It takes a lot of equipment, but we've got it, and if you're careful not to run afoul of the government on this acreage business, you can do all right," opines Mr. Gilger.

This season, their wheat production ran to an average of 37 bushels to the acre, and they had one portion that did even better than 40. The wheat seed is their own product, saved from the previous year.

Not so with their corn, they re-

port. "We buy Dekalb hybrid every spring - it's good seed, and the Dekalb people give you just about everything under the sun in the way of information about the growing period and germination time and such," say Bobs Gilger. Funny thing about corn, he reports, is that one year corn that looks like it ought to be good corn doesn't go so far in feeding bogs as corn that doesn't look so well. Why this is true Mr. Gilger frankly doesn't know, but he suspects it may have something to do with sugar content.

So one year it'll take more corn to feed a bunch of hogs than another year, and the average farmer doesn't take the time or make the effort to ascertain exactly how much will be required to bring hogs up to market weight.

The Gilgers have for nearly 35 years engaged in poultry husbandry, with the emphasis upon one good husband for each 15 Leghorn wives. "We've sold hatching eggs to the Shelby Hatchery for as long as we've been farming," Bob reports, "Of course, at this time of year we sell some others, because pullets are just coming in."

The Gilger hens are kept penned up - those you see running around are already sold but not delivered. The same is true with the Holstein bull. "After a bull passes his first year, you've almost got to keep him penned up. Otherwise, if he gets out you're liable for anybody or anything he hurts, and they sure hang you higher than a kite for bull damage."

The Gilger herd consists of only

three Guernsey milkers right now, but there are four more heifers due to freshen shortly. Their milk is sold in bulk.

The farm is the Lofland homestead, where the veteran Plymouth banker was born more years ago than he cares to recall. He takes an active interest in it because he owes it and

is responsible for it, but half the battle is having the right kind of farmer on the ground, he says.

That handsome pile you see in front of the house blew down in a storm last fall and had to be removed. Its disappearance did not stop Mrs. Mabel A. Stewart and Mary Margaret Blackford from identifying it within a few minutes of each other Saturday morning, but Mrs. Stewart was first, and won the prizes. She should call at The Advertiser for them.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO FIXING THE RATES TO BE CHARGED FOR USE OF WATER IN FIRE PREVENTION SPRINKLING SYSTEMS.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING FOR ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS UNIFORM ALLOWANCE FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO THAT: The Police Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio shall be allowed annually, an expenditure equal to One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for uniform allowance for the members of the Police Department. The Chief of Police shall first approve of each proposed expenditure and the purchase shall be ordered and billed through the Village Clerk. SECTION 2. This ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety and shall go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency being that the provisions herein made are necessary in order to retain the competent services in the positions on the Police Department.

Finally you mount the chalkboard to the frame. A piece of scrap aluminum bent into a U shape or a discarded venetian blind set screwed to the bottom of the frame makes an excellent trough for a piece of chalk.
