

South-Central's Eleven to Play at Mary Fete Park Here

Plymouth's Pilgrims will play eight interscholastic grid contests in 1956, plus a league preview here Sept. 7, according to the schedule released by the North-Central conference.

Berlin Heights and the newly formed South Central school district in Huron county have formally entered the league and will field 11-man teams for the first time in September.

South Central is the result of the consolidation of Greenwich, North Fairfield, East Greenwich and Ripley local school districts. The team, as yet without a coach and not named, will play its home games in Mary Fete park, Plymouth.

The Pilgrims are the only team in the conference which will meet every other team in the league. They will play six conference games.

The schedule calls for four home games - South-Central on Sept. 21, Berlin Heights on Oct. 5, Lodi a week later, and Jackson-Burgoon on Nov. 2.

Both the season's opener at Green Springs and the closer with Jackson-Burgoon are non-league games.

Mary Fete park will be the scene of seven interscholastic contests during the season, plus the preview Sept. 7. There will be contests for solving either the Pilgrims or the South-Central team on Sept. 14 and 21, Oct. 5 and 12, Nov. 2 and 9, and Nov. 9.

LeRoy's Red Raiders will use Richman field as their home base until they can get a field built. Melvin J. Waltz, secretary of the conference, stated in releasing the schedules of all seven teams in the loop.

The preview will be played at Mary Fete park, Sept. 7, with proceeds to be paid to the league to defray league expenses.

"Polio Isn't Licked Yet" is the slogan for the 1956 drive. Mr. Coon announces. Some 30,000 cases of polio were reported last year, he reports, and at the end of 1955 there were 68,000 polio victims looking to March of Dimes funds for help.

"This campaign knows no color or creed," Mr. Coon appealed, "and I know of no other need that is more worthy. Any and all gifts will be appreciated, not only by me and my helpers but most of all by the folks who have had polio and need these funds to learn how to breathe and how to walk once more."

Council Approves Parking Meters

With only Councilman Lowell Keith opposed, the village council voted Tuesday night to install parking meters.

On motion of Councilman Maurice Bachrach, with second by Omar Burkett, Solicitor Joseph F. Dush was instructed to draft an ordinance for first reading Feb. 6.

This came after the council had heard a representative of a park-meter manufacturer outline prospective revenue from 188 recommended meters about the business section. Taking \$70 annually as the revenue of each meter (\$20 lower than nearby towns' average

he said revenue would total \$13,160 a year. The meters rent at \$2 each a month.

Over three years, village revenue to the general fund would amount to slightly more than \$13,000.

Councilman Keith opposed the motion because he said he had polio business colleagues and found overwhelming disapproval.

Clerk Carl V. Ellis notified the council to be prepared for an explosive situation when non-payers of sewer tax billings are cut off from water after Jan. 25.

Unless an ordinance combining the posts of village clerk and clerk of the Board of Public Affairs is passed at once, the council learned, Carl V. Ellis is liable to a disallowance of all monies paid him in his capacity as board clerk. Solicitor Dush was instructed to prepare the ordinance or approval at the next meeting.

After the minutes of the last regular meeting carrying approval of a motion to hire Willie Barnett at \$4,000 a year as street commissioner had been read, the council was unable to reach agreement with him as to annual salary.

He was holding out for \$4,000, but Councilman Clarence Ervin came up with a compromise offer of \$3,500, which Barnett declined. The trouble developed, Councilman T. R. Ford told his colleagues, because Sexton Lyke Biddinger of the cemetery refused to work with him at a smaller salary. Biddinger draws \$3,300.

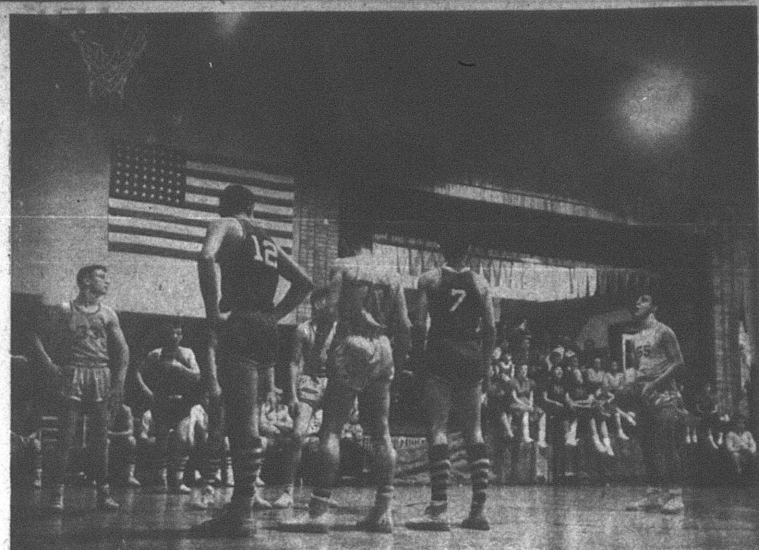

After Careful Study of Mr. Eisenhower's Agriculture Message —

What Can Be Done to Help

We have studied carefully President Eisenhower's recommendations of the Congress with respect to agriculture, and we think that for the most part they are sound.

But we do not feel that their immediate enactment — and the possibilities of that are those of a snowball in Hell — will alleviate the pressure upon farmers in Richland and Huron counties.

The price-cost squeeze started, as Mr. Eisenhower points out, five years ago, and it was aggravated by the pursuit of policies carried on too long. But this does not change the fact that it is here, and we are all suffering because of it.

We saw a report by an industrious Associated Press writer that agricultural state senators and representatives don't think the program will render immediate assistance this, an election, year.

The farm vote is important, and statesmanship must be tempered with plain horse-sense politics to solve the problem and at the same time retain the grip on the reins that will enable the solver to be on hands after Nov. 6, to solve the problems.

The price of hogs and wheat and corn during the three months just prior to Nov. 6, 1956, will have a lot to do with whether Mr. Eisenhower or the Republican nominee, whoever he may be, is elected.

And the price of hogs and corn and wheat right now will determine, is determining, whether we can buy a new press.

Retiring land from production is a sound and necessary step in overcoming the over-production problem. But it takes time. And there are many of our subscribers who can't afford to wait that long.

So what can be done about it? Well, if we were sitting in the seat of J. Harry McGregor in the House of Representatives, this is what we would propose:

1. Take all farms under 115 acres out of the acreage control program. They do not have that much effect on prices, anyway.

2. Appropriate funds to a specially organized government bank to be loaned against appropriate risk assurances for the seeding and growing of durum wheat, which is not now controlled either as to acreage or marketing. Implement this appropriation by sending qualified experts to the areas concerned to supervise its seeding and cultivation. This will establish what we long have felt is an important integer in the wheat business: reward for quality, not quantity.

3. Utilize federal funds to loan to hog producers moneys amounting to the difference between present hog prices and the figure of a year ago, to be carried at four per cent interest, and settled within two years. Hog prices thus subsidized must be converted to

saleable pork within 30 days of the date of loan. Borrowers must contract to reduce hog "plantings" (i. e., farrowings) by the percentage by which present prices differ from prices of a year ago, to prevent recurrence of a hog glut.

It seems to us, after long and careful thought, that this short-term solution offers the best opportunity to bail out our friends and neighbors — who were lured into the dilemma by the danged federal government in the first place — of their current difficulties.

Mr. McGregor, why not give it a try?

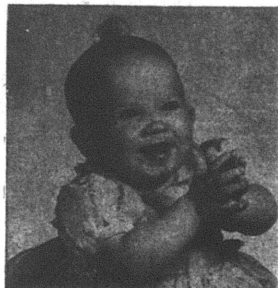

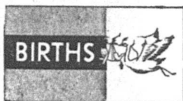
