Nimmons to Retire From Bank Jan. 15

After 52-Year Hitch

After 52 years of service, J. Elden Nimmons, president of Peoples National bank, will retire from active management Jan. 15.

Board of directors meeting Tuesday will determine if he will continue as president. It is likely he will be named chairman of the board. Next in line for the presidency is Carl M. Lofland, veteran vice-president of the bank.

Nimmons, 65, retired the bank's staff in 1936. The bank was located in the post office building. On Oct. 1, 1908, Peoples National bought the building and furnishings of the First National bank, which was in liquidation, and moved to its site at the northeast corner of West Broadway and Sandusky street. Young Nimmons went along with it and has been doing business at that stand ever since.

He plans to be occupied in the management of farm land with his brother, Mahlon, to do a bit of gardening, and to "try to keep up with my twin grandsons." They are Gregory and Girard Cashman, son of his daughter, Mrs. Earl C. Cashman.

Two veteran businessmen signalled a close to long careers of serving the public this week. After 35 years in the grocery business, 25 of them on the Public Square here, Harry W. Stuart locked the door of the stores at the southeast corner of East Main and Plymouth streets and went home to rest. He sold the building to Scott Hartz, and in turn the premises were sold to Wade McKown and John Kleer, proprietors of Weber's cafe here.

Ira D. Brougher, for long a second hand and antique furniture dealer at Shelby, announced he is liquidating his business in that city. An advertisement to this effect appears on page 8 of this issue.

Put Us Up Front

Dedicating his administration to "Putting this town up front", Alfred Parkinson took oath as mayor-elect Saturday afternoon and got his feet wet in municipal affairs at a four-hour organization meeting Tuesday night.

"We shall try to do things in a progressive way and get the town up front a little bit," Mayor Parkinson told his new council.

Innovations for the ensuing term include two meetings a month for the Board of Public Affairs, on the Mondays preceding the meetings of the council. Thurman R. Ford was unanimously elected president of the council, but not until his objections had been overruled by his colleagues.

Charles Lookbaugh was reappointed to his expiring term as cemetery trustee. Councilman Lowell Keith was named to replace W. Laurence Cornell on the park board, and Robert Lewis was appointed to succeed James C. Davis. Joseph F. Dush of Willard was unanimously reelected as village solicitor.

Mayor Parkinson appointed the following committees: Finance—Councilmen Maurice Bachrach and Clarence Ervin; police and fire, Omer Burkett and John T. Dick; water and lights, Lowell Keith and Bachrach; streets, Ford and Ervin; buildings, Dick and Burkett; rest room, Keith and Ford; cemetery, Bachrach and Ervin; endowment, Dick and Burkett.

After considerable discussion, the mayor's nomination of Willie Barnett as street supervisor was brought to a vote. With two councilmen, Dick and Burkett, dissenting, the appointment was confirmed.

Exactly as predicted, the council came square against the long-standing sewer problem. After some orientation discussion, it voted unanimously to ask Alden E. Silson Associates, Columbus consulting engineers, to accept \$1,500 down and the balance of its fee in six months before authorizing the firm to execute supplementary surveys to bring the village sewer plan up to date.

The permit to dump sewage into the Huron river expires Jan. 16. A condition of its renewal was that studies for a reduced sewage plan be carried out. Clerk Carl V. Ellis was instructed to make clear to Silson the urgency of the situation and the fact that a reduced budget makes the postponement of payment of part of the fee necessary. The council already had earmarked \$1,500 from the general fund for the purpose, based on an earlier Silson estimate.

Mayor Parkinson reported fees and costs of \$40.40 collected during December.

Bond of \$1,000 for the mayor, \$1,000 each for the marshal and patrolmen and special constables, \$5,000 for the clerk (as clerk of the Board of Public Affairs) and \$1,000 as an elected officer, and \$1,000 for the village solicitor was approved by the council.

Page Uncovers Old Copy of Shiloh Paper

George Page has turned up a copy of the Aug. 7, 1879, issue of the Shiloh Review, a five-column, eight-page sheet edited and published by John C. Higgins with offices in Brennenman's block.

The paper is in a fair state of repair, considering its age, but apparently Shiloh news was hard to come by even to those days.

For it carries only half a column of Shiloh notes. P. S. Gilmore advertises 18 pounds of white fish, \$1; two and a fourth pounds of white tobacco, \$1; 25 lamp chimneys, \$1; 11 pounds straight A sugar, \$1; five and a half pounds of Rio roasted coffee, \$1; 15 pounds of good crackers, \$1; 12 1/2 pounds of good butter, \$1.

J. C. Fenner and Nelson Orizer were attending the Republican senatorial convention at Ashland.

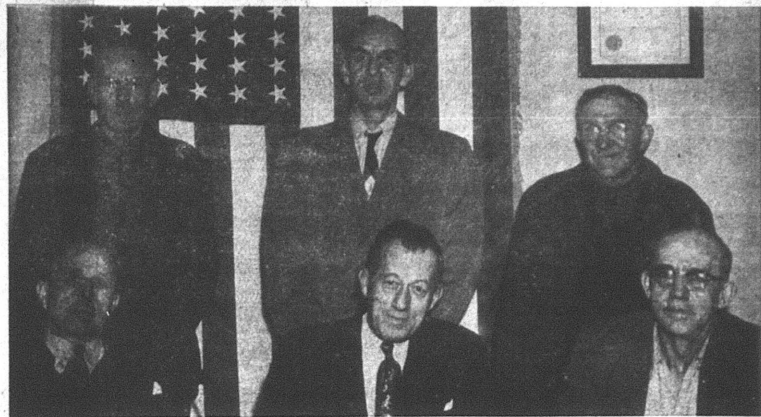

Damage was about \$250, is covered by insurance, and necessitated closing for one day only.

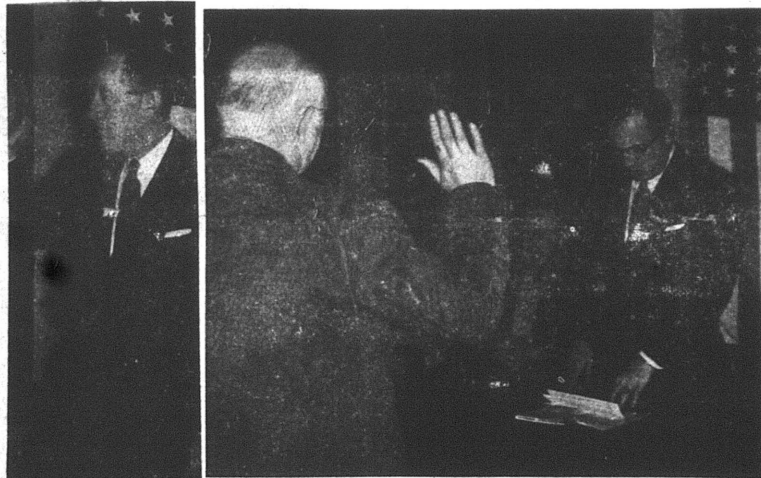

J. Page & Son listed "a large variety of the latest style dress goods - the prettiest line of prints ever brought to Shiloh." And John Brennenman advertised all wool suits for \$9, the finest Scotch in the market (presumably tweed, not whiskey), for \$15, and an extra good wearing suit for \$5.

And from the Bucyrus Journal the Review reprinted a piece relating the birth of a strange child to a Mrs. Kerough in that town. Half black and half white, it was, and Mr. Kerough was preparing to exhibit the child for a price.

Times haven't changed much, after all.

Further evidence: the Review has about as many typographical errors and omissions (as Brennenman spelled with only two n's) as this or any modern-day paper.

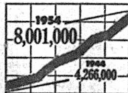

On Consolidation

It is good news that the school boards of both Shiloh and Plymouth are considering the possibilities of a consolidation with the construction of a new high school.

For our part, we see no objection. We think consolidation is the proper answer, and we believe that a majority of the patrons of the school districts concerned can be made to see that viewpoint.

Naturally, whenever consolidation is discussed (and it was proven quite graphically in nearby Greenwich) the first question is "Where will the new school be placed?"

A previous effort to consolidate foundered, we understand, because the intention was to concentrate the public schools in Plymouth. This was manifestly unfair, and we do not believe any of the present Plymouth board intend to insist upon such a solution.

In the first place, it is not possible to do so. There is insufficient land and the style of building is not particularly conducive to such a scheme.

Secondly, every—or nearly every—one—realizes that while Shiloh is not so large as Plymouth, the property owners and school district patrons have their rights, too. Not the least of which is that their children, or the children of the district, should not be required to travel excessive distances to school.

Thirdly, a school building is a nat-

It was a present from a wag in Silver Spring, Md., whose sense of humor sometimes goes to great lengths (last year he sent us a pair of red flannel shorts). It matches one of his wife sent our wife, and all we need now is a sleeping cap. Any volunteers?

And speaking of shoeing boys, what a pitiful sight it was Thursday night to see a dozen boys standing out in the cold in front of Mr. C's estimable est-

ural focal point for any community. It houses community activities, marriage receptions, wedding anniversary parties, and the like. To abandon a school building in any community without replacing it there is always a drastic blow to that town.

The logical place for a new high school, we think, is along the County Line road east of Plymouth and northwest of Shiloh. Its location there would mean that high school—from the ninth through the twelfth grades, that is—would have about two miles to go to school from the center of the community.

Many of them can walk. Some of them will have to ride a bus. Do they not also, for the most part, do so now? And what difference will it make to the Bloominggrove pupils if they have to ride a couple of miles further if they are certain to benefit by better opportunities in a bigger school, with more operating funds and a better faculty?

We have talked with a great many people, and except for one old diehard who wouldn't specify his reasons, we haven't been able to find anybody who's sincerely opposed to a consolidation along the lines referred to above.

The boards of education honestly seek an expression of opinion. Their members are everyday citizens elected for the purpose and anxious to respond to the will of the people. Speak to them on the street, call them by telephone. Or better yet, fill out the little blank below:

abishment with no place to go and nothing to do. They hadn't a car, couldn't go anywhere if they did, and there was nothing doing here.

Somewhere, somehow, somebody fell down on the job. We have been forthright in saying we don't think kids should be coddled, and that it's not necessary to provide entertainment to keep them out of trouble. These boys weren't out for trouble. They went home, to bed, early. But it's only right that they should have some place to go and something to do on a night when there's no school in session.

Why not open the school gymnasium for organized play?

The decision of Ohio high school principals to limit athletic competition in schools to boys under 19 years of age cannot be regarded by enthusiasts of sport as a good thing. Under the present rules, if a boy is 19 or going to be 19 before the season for an interscholastic sport starts, he is not eligible to compete.

Notice that Mansfield Senior High is moaning the blues because its football receipts were down \$9,000? This is what we mean. The argument is that a football profit means that other sports, with fewer spectators, can be financed. And to some extent it's true, but so far as we know there's no school wanting for a track team or a fencing team or a gymnasium, but not for want of equipment. And baseballs costing well over \$2 apiece run into money, true, but baseball can be made to pay for itself, too. It's all a matter of effort by the proper authorities.

Locally, the rule affects Plymouth High school's football schedule to the extent that everybody wants to know what's that status of Russ Wareham, the Butler Buzz. The truth is that Wareham is not over age on the 20-year limit, or wasn't when Butler played basketball here. His name was on the jersey roster—he isn't good enough to make the varsity. And authorities of the school report he was within the eligibility limit. Whether he'll fall within the 19-year-old limit is another question. In a way, it would be a pity that such a brilliant athlete should be deprived of his rightful opportunity to make an athletic name for himself. If his tardiness in school promotion is not due to laziness or shiftness on his part but rather to some outside reason, that it isn't been a factor, then it's too bad. He should have thought of the consequences of having arrived.

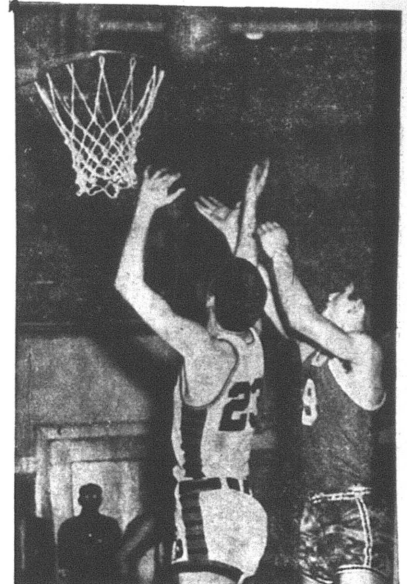

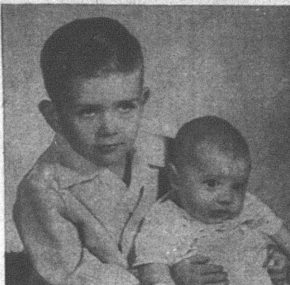

WILLARD DAIRY 10th Anniversary Report

In September 1945 Mr. Robert Hamilton purchased the Willard Dairy. At this time there was a total of 7 employees 1 retail route and 1 wholesale route.

In 1950 an expansion program was undertaken in remodeling the milk and ice cream plant. December Weather

Average temperature for December, 1955, was 27.4 degrees, or 2.9 degrees above normal. The highest was 58 on the 4th; the lowest 2 above zero on the 16th and 20th.
