

A previous effort to consolidate foundered, we understand, because the intention was to concentrate the public schools in Plymouth. This was manifestly unfair, and we do not believe any of the present Plymouth board intend to insist upon such a solution.

In the first place, it is not possible to do so. There is insufficient land and the style of building is not particularly conducive to such a scheme.

Secondly, every - or nearly everyone - realizes that while Shiloh is not so large as Plymouth, the property owners and school district patrons have their rights, too. Not the least of which is that their children, or the children of the district, should not be required to travel excessive distances to school.

WILLARD DAIRY 10th Anniversary Report

In September 1945 Mr. Robert Hamilton puchased the Willard Dairy. At this time there was a total of 7 employees 1 retail route and 1 wholesale route.

In 1950 an expansion program was undertaken in remodeling the milk and ice cream plant. After completion of this program, there stood a dairy of which to be proud, inside the most modern equipment to process and bottle Willard Dairy farm fresh milk, and outside were now 5 routes being delivered in new insulated trucks.

After the remodeling, the paper milk container was perfected and the Willard Dairy installed a paper bottling machine in order to give a complete line of Dairy products in the container of your choice. This was quite an achievement in Willard Dairy history, but its proudest accomplishment was to be the first in northern Ohio to have the bulk tank method of handling milk. This is how it works. Now, another step on the road of progress has been taken. Beginning this month, the half-gallon glass containers will be available for home delivery.


