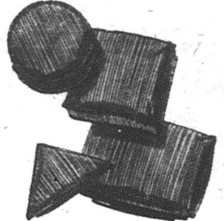

It is not an easy task for us to winnow the chaff from the grain with respect to the presidential candidates. We believe each of the principal candidates is made of the right kind of stuff, but we have reservations as to his principles, in some cases, and his record of performance, in others.

Firstly, we think it is basely wrong to cast stones at one candidate because his marriage failed. Erasers are placed at the ends of pencils because we all make mistakes, although a marriage is hardly the same as an arithmetic problem. Solemn promises are meant to be solemnly kept. In Mr. Stevenson's case, he can at least say he never was a philanderer, which is more than you can say for his opponent.

Secondly, we distrust the doctrines of the Democratic party so far as we understand them: high support of farm prices in the face of high productivity and over-production, cheap money and a loose management of the federal fiscal policy, invasion of the federal government as a public entity in fields better left to private enterprise, such as power.

Thirdly, we are not satisfied with the record of the Republican party. The incumbents are loudly taking credit for such advancements as social security and unem-

ployment insurance which are really the inventions of the Democrats. And when they were first advanced, the GOP and Robert Alfonso Taft booed them loudly, labelling them as socialistic in character.

Ike's first act was to give away to Texas the rights to off-shore oil. Until he had to work with a Democratic Congress, few of his ideas reached adoption in the form of law.

Mr. Dulles' feverish flight hither and yon seems to us to have confused and weakened our policies abroad. Say what you will about the Democrats, the Soviets never reached the Suez when they occupied the White House.

Charley Wilson's disease — hoof-in-mouth-disease — has unnecessarily weakened the military establishment, already given a serious blow by the Dulles policy of threatening war and then withdrawing all moral support from our allies. We proved once before, painfully, that Fortress America is a myth without frontiers on the Elbe and the Dardanelles.

But Stevenson's latest pitch — abolishment of tests of fissionable materials in bomb form — tips the scales, ever so slightly, we think, in favor of Eisenhower. Vote for Ike. And pray that he lives four years.

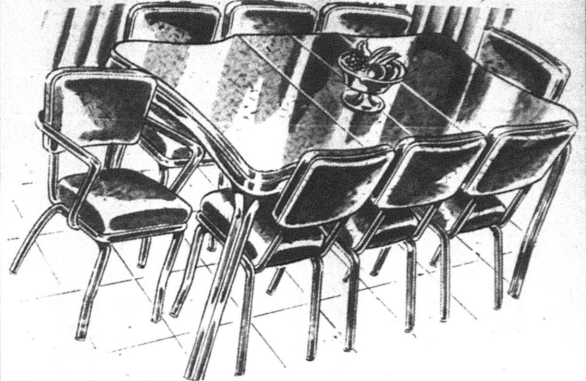

CONTRACTOR CAN MAKE MINOR CHANGES IN PLANS —

Work schedule on sewers north to south

"Once we go ahead with this plan, how's it going to be carried out?"

Engineers assume it would be the end of March before weather will permit construction and earthworks to commence.

Before that time, there's much to be done.

ITEM 1: SQUIRE, SANDERS & DEMPSEY, Cleveland bonding attorneys, will have to prepare an intricate financing program, preparing the bonds, advertising their sale.

When they're sold, the money is held in a depository for the use of the village in paying for men and materials.

Alden E. Stilson & Associates, consulting engineers, will need to prepare detailed specifications — and offer them to prospective contractors, who'll study them, decide whether to submit bids.

The bids will need to be advertised. And when they're received, they'll be read publicly. The apparent low bidder may not be the best bidder. Acting on advice of the engineers, village council may choose another bidder.

If his bid "proves" — that is, it checks in detail with his lump sum bid, has no obvious discrepancies of a mechanical nature that would throw the lump sum figure off — he'll be awarded the contract.

The contract will stipulate the work to be done in a specified time, but without a penalty clause would be included hasn't been decided.

Excavating will be done when the weather is right for it.

CONTRACTORS TEND toward "turt" activity — committing their forces to one sector as distinguished from the whole work, developing it to within 90 per cent of completion, then turning to other sectors. This is so because they want to hook everybody up to the sewer treatment plant at the same time.

Will the whole project take long? About a year, give or take a few weeks, is the considered answer.

Will it be installed exactly as it's drawn on the plans? Not exactly. Engineers and the contractor will have the right to alter plans consistent with con-

ditions and circumstances encountered on the ground. But the basic plans will not be altered.

And what about the streets? The contractor is bound to replace streets, curbs and sidewalks as they were before he started.

What time of year will my place be torn up? I don't want to miss out on a garden?

UNDECIDED, IT'S LIKE — the contractor will move south and west from the treatment plant site. That would bring him to the Richland county side of the village after the Huron county side, to the West Broadway area sooner than to Greenlawn cemetery.

"These questions are really technical ones which concern the engineer and the contractor," Stilson associates say, "but people have a perceptive way of wanting to know the answers, so we're glad to give 'em as best we can."

It is true that many trees will go. "They're lovely trees, certainly, but they are also beginning to cost you money. You have to keep them trimmed and away from power lines."

The plans are available for inspection by any citizen if he will call at a reasonable hour at the office of the village clerk. He may inspect them in private, in a suitable room (the council chamber will be provided and he will be free to make such notes and written observations as he may care. But he cannot make tracings or drawings. Reason: drawings belong jointly to the engineers and the village, and until the project is bid upon and awarded, the plans are a private matter.

"Everybody can come in to look at the plans," says Carl V. Ellis, village clerk. "We only expect the plans to be treated delicately and returned to my

office when they are no longer in use. We will cooperate with any citizen in making them available if he will call me by telephone at my office."
