"All things come to those who wait" is the cry of Plymouth High's basketballers today — they won their second game in 17 starts here Tuesday by trouncing North Fairfield, 83 to 67.

Ted Fox's brilliant shooting from his guard post highlighted the Plymouth offensive. The little youth dumped in a dozen buckets and eight penalty tosses for 32 points. Herb Caudill had 18 and Frank Ousley 15 before he fouled out.

For North Fairfield, which is playing its last season as a separate school, Roger Conway scored 22 and Wallobenstein bunched in another 16 from his center spot.

Behind a point at the end of eight minutes, the North Fairfield five couldn't cope with a smooth-running Pilgrim offensive, which delighted a small but vocal gathering with a strong second period.

They went to the dressing room at half time with a 41 to 32 lead. But if the first half was well played, the second was even better — at least one point better. Plymouth made 43 in the final 16 minutes.

It was a complete night-for-the Pilgrims. Their joy-veins whipped the visitors, 46 to 35, as Mickey Hampton got hot with 21 points.

Shiloh to Meet Jays With Title at Stake

A request by Bellville school authorities to switch tomorrow's game to a "neutral court" was turned down by Shiloh authorities Monday.

Only a game away from the first Richland county basketball title in their history, Shiloh's Lions have two advantages working for them in their key contest with Bellville tomorrow night.

For one thing, they'll be playing at home. For another, they're hungry.

The Lions aren't often defeated at home, on the bandbox floor which has served the Shiloh club for too long.

And just how hungry they are was clearly demonstrated Friday night when the Lions applied the pressure in the last 20 seconds and snatched victory out of the fire, 72 to 71, over Butler.

Ordinarily, any sideline expert would expect Shiloh to be a dozen points' better than the Bulldogs. But Butler has been playing over its head lately, and fancies itself in the role of giant-killer.

With a third of a minute left, the Lions were down three points. And here's how it happened: Ernie Cochran, Butler's high-scoring guard, hacked Larry Barnard. Barnard converted his first try, missed his second. Otis Hughes popped in the rebound, tying it up.

Then, with a shouting crowd on the benches, Larry Humbert was awarded a charity toss and converted it.

The Lions managed a three-point lead at halftime, 37 to 34, and clung to a one-point lead at the end of three periods, 53 to 52.

Hughes was high scorer for Shiloh with 28 points, George Poffenbaugh 24 and Jack Hall 12.

For Butler, Cochran had 20 and Gary Meeks had 16.

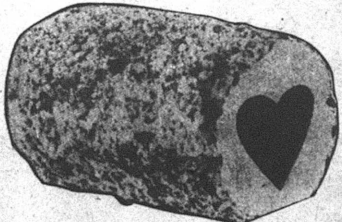

What's good for Plymouth is good for us. We like the good, abhor the bad, and are willing to work for the good. Our good, your good, everybody's good. The turnout tomorrow will show just how many others feel the same way.

What the Public Expects

The number of defalcations of persons elected to public office has suggested to some thinking citizens the need to set down a code of demeanor for persons holding places of public trust. The firing of Wolf Ladejinsky because he invested in a company doing business where he was doing business merely points this up.

We have heard of late several ideas about what we as electors and taxpayers have a right to expect of our elective and appointive officers of government.

And for the guidance of those who may wish to be guided, we give a few of these suggestions here.

The public has a right to expect — to demand — absolute honesty. Telling the truth, and holding the reputation for telling the truth, is an absolute essential for one who holds a place of public trust, from dogcatcher to Senator.

A corollary to this is that the officeholder should be scrupulous about incurring and discharging debts. "Bad credit" is what we hear about some of our public servants. It is not a good thing to hear. We should have none of this going through bankruptcy or similar proceedings and then holding ourselves out as an honorable citizen who deserves public office until every penny of the debt has been paid. Little has been said about the cost and financing of our proposed parking meters. I understand that the meter company is to receive \$2.50 per meter, per month, until the meters, costing \$66 each, are paid for.

If there are to be 135 meters, this would be \$337.50 to start with. Should the meters fail to produce this amount or the balance due, then the meter company takes 75 per cent of whatever revenue is received.

The meter company will get \$8,910 or 178,200 nickels. All repairs cost extra. Can these meters be serviced without extra expense to the village?

To start with we will have to drop in 6,750 nickels, a month, before the village gets a nickel.

The estimated \$2,000 net revenue the first year would mean over 3,000 nickels per month or a total of over 10,000.

In last week's Mansfield Journal it stated that Loudonville's council again took up the question of loss of revenue from parking meters, but again deferred any action on the subject. Figures presented showed that revenue from the meters had dropped from \$8,899 in 1951 to \$6,734 in 1955.

Considering the increase in traffic, the figures should be a warning. I don't think that parking meters are warranted in a village the size of Plymouth. Every one hates them.

Blanks for filing personal tax returns have been mailed, Huron County Auditor Bernard F. Kean says.

Legal date for the start of the filing period, which extends to Mar. 31, is Feb. 15.

For the convenience of farmers a list of livestock and farm commodity prices is advertised in this newspaper. Since Jan. 1 a tax lien date for personal property taxes, the prices advertised are those in effect on that date.

Farm inventory forms were mailed in time for this inventory period to Jan. 1 and should be already completed except for extending the amounts. Instructions are printed on the inventory form, they appear on the personal tax blanks and in addition a separate set of instructions in larger, bolder type accompanies each of the returns. Errors can be eliminated, Mr. Kean says. If farmers do not mail the information, rather than asking for a replacement of these forms at the auditor's office.

County auditor personnel will extend the totals from the farm inventory forms to the personal tax returns, but the inventory should be completed at home, or prior to the auditor's office. "The vast majority do comply with this request, which is the tax-payers responsibility particularly the professional farmers," Mr. Kean says.

Get Facts, Not Sentiment On Consolidation: Coon

"All problems must be weighed, and sentiment must not enter into the picture," Supt. M. J. Coon said of the proposed consolidation of Plymouth and Shiloh school districts Tuesday before the mothers' club. His remarks were recorded for reference at the Parent-Teachers association meeting tonight.

Economists say the area of which Richland county is a part shows a trend toward a boom period. Mr. Coon pointed out. This necessarily will mean an increase in school enrollments. Now there are ten classes coming into the school system for each one class graduating. At this rate of increase, Plymouth can hope for a grace of about two years before additional building will be imperative. "Shiloh is facing the same situation, but

more acute. There they have less time," he said.

The superintendent pointed out that more classrooms are needed for the various activities of the school program, such as the band. When it was organized, there were 30 members, now there are 55 although the same amount of room space is occupied.

Speaking of the financial problem which underlies the consolidation talks, Mr. Coon stated neither school could ever hope for enough money on its own taxation to take care of its needs adequately. The problem might be solved for five or six years, but no longer. Pooling their resources financially, and having a combined enrollment of a larger number, the two systems can be given extra money by the state.

As only one meeting has been held by the Plymouth and Shiloh school boards, Mr. Coon said he was unable to answer the question of what would be done with the Plymouth High school building. "If the schools combine, the splitting of grades into various buildings would have to be worked out, as has been done where consolidation has been carried out."

In the long run, Mr. Coon said, the teacher problem would not be solved immediately. The supply of teachers is shorter than the demand, but he feels that over a period of several years, that the teaching staff could be put to more effective use.

During the business meeting after Mr. Coon's talk, the club agreed to purchase two tables for the all-purpose room of the elementary school instead of one, providing there is enough money in the treasury. The last table purchased cost \$360, and the price has been raised slightly. Mrs. Robert Kesler, treasurer, reported a total of \$762.86 in the treasury.

This early-American dessert, championed by every generation, continues to be a specialty at many fine restaurants.

Superb of flavor, it's truly simple to make. The dry ingredients (flour, sugar and spices) have the butter "cut in" as for a crumb-type topping. As step two, combine delicate unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Alternate layers of the crumb mixture and the liquid in a square pan, and the pudding is ready for baking. The dessert can be cut into squares or spooned into serving dishes, and you'll have a moist gingerbread cake marbled with spicy crumb mixture. Serve hot or cold with a favorite fruit sauce.

Old Fashioned Molasses Pudding

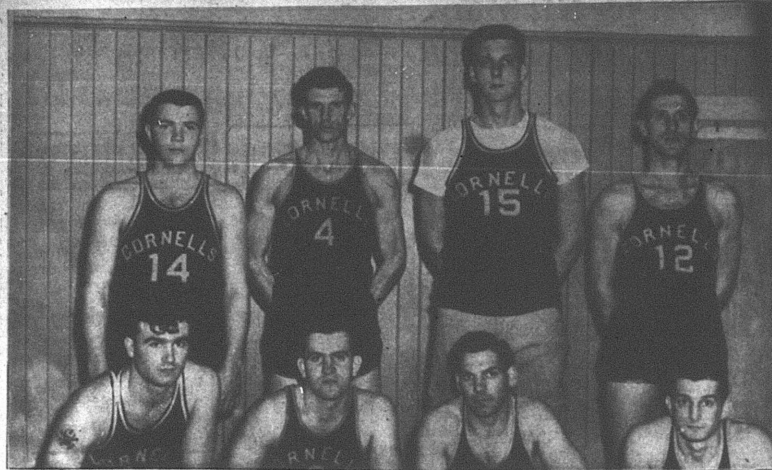
2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour 1 cup butter or margarine 1 cup sugar 1 cup unsulphured molasses 1 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1 cup water 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 2 3-cup baking soda 1 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 3-cup baking soda 1 1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift together flour, sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Add butter; cut with two knives or pastry blender to resemble coarse meal. Combine unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Alternate crumb and liquid in a greased 8 x 8 x 2 inch square pan, beginning and ending with crumb. Stir gently only 2 or 3 times with a fork. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. When ready to serve, blend together cream cheese and milk. Cut cake into squares, place spoonful cream cheese on top of each square. Top each serving with Orange Sauce. YIELD: 9 servings.

Orange Sauce

1 tablespoon cornstarch 1 cup orange juice 1/4 cup sugar 2 teaspoons grated orange rind 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 orange, sectioned

Mix together cornstarch, sugar and salt in a 4-cup bowl. Blend in orange juice and orange rind. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Add orange sections, heat.

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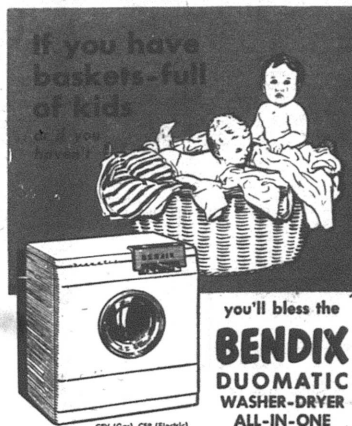

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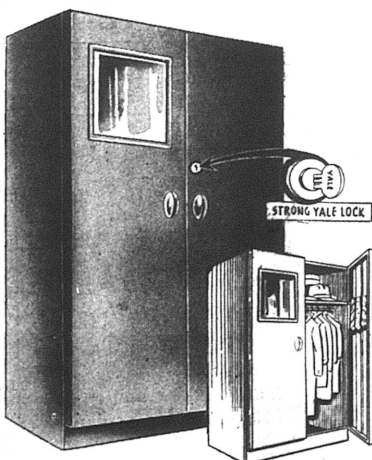

Englands Return Off 7,000-Mile Trip Miss Williams Wins

A 23 day, 7,000-mile trip to the West coast and back, with side excursions into old Mexico, terminated Feb. 5 for Mr. and Mrs. George England, of Route 603, and their son and daughter-in-law, the Dean Englands, Mansfield.

The Englands left Jan. 13 and from Springfield, traveled over Route 40 to the home of a son, Gordon, in Henry county near Calhoun, Mo. While here Dean and John traveled into old Mexico, a trip of about 200 miles, on a fishing excursion.

The party visited Carlbad Canyons at White City before leaving for El Paso, Tex. and a brief excursion into Mexico.

It was spitting snow, Mr. England relates, as they left the ca-

vers, and they drove through a blinding snowstorm after they left El Paso for Amarillo. The next day the storm stormed them just the way from Amarillo to Miami, Okla. "We left Texas just in time," he said. "If we'd been a day later, we'd never have made it."

"All in all it was a wonderful trip," he concludes, "a trip well worth the cost and one I'll always remember. And it was all made possible by Jimmy Brook of Bowman street road. If he hadn't volunteered to do the chores on the farm during my absence I couldn't have gone. A good neighbor is a pretty wonderful thing, too."

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Agreement Near On Fire Contract

Village officials and trustees of Cass and Bloominggrove townships appear to be one step nearer to the signing of a fire protection contract as the result of a council meeting Feb. 8.

Mayor Moser Robert confirms the council agreed verbally to enter into a joint fire protection contract with Cass and Bloominggrove townships that will give all three sub-divisions an equal say in the operation of the Shiloh volunteer fire department.

A three-year contract will be drawn up for approval at the next meeting of council, Feb. 22, which will give all three sub-divisions an equal share in the expense and operation of the department. The fire chief's salary will be increased from \$200 to \$300, with each sub-division contributing one third.

The department will be under the supervision of an advisory board, including George Harrington, council president; Ray Kirken-dall, Cass township board of trustees chairman; and Dewey Hamman, Bloominggrove trustees chairman. Auxiliary fireman will be named by the townships to help on rural calls, with each sub-divi-

sion paying firemen for calls in its area, which includes time spent cleaning up the truck and drying out fire hose. The tank truck is to be maintained by the townships.

A spokesman for the Cass and Bloominggrove trustees, contacted Monday, said all they knew about it was "what they read in the papers."
