Four Shiloh Boys Jailed, One Gets BIS In Ashland Thefts

Infant Child Dies At Shelby Hospital

To undergo a nasal operation, James C. Davis, North street, entered Mansfield General hospital Sunday and was released Tuesday.

Four-month-old Patricia Laugbaum died suddenly in Shelby Memorial hospital Sunday at 5 p.m.

She was the third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Duane Laugbaum, Shelby route 3. Her parents, her two sisters, Marilyn and Duane, and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Predmore, Shelby, and Mr. and Mrs. Donald Laugbaum, Crestline route 1, survive. She also survived by her great-grandfather, Wilford Matthews, Plymouth, and her great-grandmother, Mrs. Ella Sutter, New Washington.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. from the McQuate Funeral home with burial in Greenlawn cemetery.

Sentencing of four 18-year-old Shiloh boys who admitted thefts from automobiles in four communities has ended, Ashland police say, a long series of delinquency.

The four Charles, Hughes, James Hamman, Jack Bird and Ned Lofland, and three minors, all of them members of the Shiloh High school basketball quintet were apprehended at 11:5 a.m. Feb. 14 by Ashland police after they were alerted by the night watchman at F. E. Myers Pump Co.

A passerby noticed suspicious actions by the car, driven by a 16-year-old, and called the watchman.

The boys readily admitted the thefts, which included tires, auto accessories from the Western Auto Associate store in Shelby, shirts from the Peoples store there, beer from a Walnut street address in Shelby, and dozens of blankets, hub caps, radiator caps, cameras and other auto accessories from parked cars in Mansfield and Ashland.

The thefts for which the boys were arrested occurred Feb. 10, 11 and 14, although the youngest of them admitted to probate Judge Mildred Myers a long series of thievery starting with a lamb from a neighbor.

The four 18-year-olds were sentenced to seven days in Ashland county jail and a fine of \$100 plus court costs by Ashland's municipal judge. The comparatively light sentences took the village of Shiloh as much by surprise as did the arrests.

The juveniles were treated separately. One 17-year-old, highest scorer on the basketball team, was placed on probation for a year, required to report each 30 days, required to attend church, boost his grade level in school, had his

driver's license suspended, and a curfew applied.

Another 17-year-old, a lad who never before had been in difficulties either with police or at school, was left off with a reprimand and permitted to play with his team in the Richland county tournament.

The youngest, 16, because of a long pattern of thefts, and because he was a driver of the car, was sentenced to an indefinite term in the Boys' Industrial school at Lancaster. Judge Myers agreed to suspend execution of the sentence until her return from a short vacation. On Mar. 15 she will receive the report of the juvenile officer at Ashland to determine whether a change of attitude as professed by the boy warrants further suspension of the sentence and placing him on probation.

The juvenile hearings were assisted by the Rev. T. M. Sheesley, pastor of three of the boys; Don Hamman, Richland county juvenile officer; and Supt. Homer Beard and Coach Harold Daup of Shiloh High school.

The hearings were painful exposures of delinquency on a high scale. Parents of each boy sat beside him as he testified.

In each case parents testified they did not know what the boys were doing after dark.

After the initial shock, Shilohans wondered why gossip among school children and suspicions among adults had not headed off the serious crimes earlier.

None of the boys confessed to heavy drinking, although one 18-year-old, Hamman, was said by Ashland police to have consumed a pint of whiskey between the end of the Shiloh-Ontario game at Mansfield and the time of arrest at Ashland.

Coach Daup told the court, "I am not a policeman. I try to instill in the boys the proper attitude and behavior. I can't follow them around all the time. And, of course, we of the school have no control over the boys when school is not in session."

He was visibly shaken by the ordeal. A Shiloh boy himself, his real life as a leader and confidant of high school boys is widespread.

Fire Contract Puts Three Over Chief

A three-man advisory council will manage the Shiloh volunteer fire department under the terms of an agreement reached Feb. 22 by Shiloh village council and Cass and Bloominggrove township trustees.

George Harrington, council president; Ray Kirkendall, chairman of the board of trustees, Cass township, and Dewey Hamman, chairman of Bloominggrove township trustees, will comprise the council.

Fire Chief Merton Benedict will receive \$300 a year under the agreement. Volunteer firemen will get \$1.50 an hour to fight fires and while maintaining equipment.

One monthly training session will be paid for at the rate of \$1.50. Costs of operating the department will be equally divided among the three sub-divisions.

It is expected that Chief Benedict will be nominated for the office of chief, for a one year term beginning Mar. 1. The nomination must be confirmed by the advisory council.

What Difference Does It Make

How much difference will it make if Ike decides not to run again?

The dispatches from Washington make much of what he's going to do, but they don't seem to suggest that we'll all go to Hell in a wire bucket if he doesn't run again.

Why, then, all the concern? For our money, Dick Nixon wouldn't make the kind of president we feel we ought to have, but we don't for a minute suggest that he'd sell us out to the carpetbaggers. And if the pendulum should swing to the other party, so far as we can see neither Honest Ave Harriman nor Adlai Stevenson nor Frank Lausche nor Robert Meyner nor Estes Kefauver would be apt to sell us out, either.

It is natural that a good man should be missed when he quits his job, and Ike has been a good man for the job. But he's not world beater. The farmer is as bad off now as he was when Ike took over. There are more unemployed in Mansfield and Plymouth and Shelby now than when Ike took over.

Certainly, he has been good for the country. And a change was needed. But we are a little tired — and if we know Ike, he's a little tired, too — of all this talk that he's indispensable.

We had too much of that in the Thirties and up to 1945. Nobody would believe us then, but it is plain to my damned fool that F. D. R. wasn't anything near the god he represented himself to be.

It is a sad duty to cover and recount the sordid, heart-rending details of the delinquency at Shiloh. But it is a duty that must be faced up to and discharged, and that we did.

One boy recounted details that were astounding for their clarity and multiplicity. The probate judge remarked she was impressed with the tremendous detail he had remembered of a long career of stealing.

He said he started out by swiping a lamb. His mother made him give it back. From that point, it appeared to us, his mother apparently stopped making him do anything good, because from then on he stole and stole.

He said he then took reflectors for his bike, and was not detected. Then he pinched other bike items, a shirt, and then he got a car. He was only 16, old enough to have a license in this state (and we think it ought to be changed), and he apparently wanted stuff for it.

Not that his folks weren't easy-going so far as money goes. He got all he needed. Didn't have an allowance, but got what he needed.

He and his buddies swiped fender skirts, reflectors, flashlights, tires, tail lights, cameras, tools, jackets, tool kits, hub caps, bumper guards, blankets — impediments of various shapes and sorts that made a stack in the judge's rooms about five feet high.

He told in detail how and when and where and who was with him when he got it. Most of it was in Richland county, beyond the judge's jurisdiction. But warrants for the most active among the boys had been sworn in Richland county and they must answer to justice there.

They stole beer and other drinks in Shelby, but were not heavy drinkers, except for one, who consumed a pint of whiskey between the time he was out of the ball game at Mansfield and the time he was arrested in Ashland early on the morning of the 14th.

They gave the names of football and basketball players at Shelby who had tipped them off that the beer and other drinks were where they could be stolen. And they mentioned other names, names that are too close to home. Names of kids who were cited as close friends of kids here. Didn't be surprised if the sheriff's car pulls up.

And how did this all happen? What hours was the boy keeping? Well, said his mother, I can't tell you. My husband both work and we get to bed early so I can't tell you when he comes home.

If Ike runs again, we'll wait until we see what develops before coming out for him. We're registered Republicans, but thank God this is a free country and as Republicans we don't have to take what's jammed down our throats by the professional politicians unless we like it. We can always change our voting habits and cast a ballot for the other side.

We join with her many friends in wishing Mrs. Emma Hostler the happiest returns of the day. Until she broke her hip several months ago, she remained active as a gardener and fancier of flowers. Only the infirmities of that hip prevent her from so doing today.

But there is another thing we noted: in what other country of the whole wide world would the chief executive see to it that an ordinary citizen who has reached the milestone of 90 — or 80, or 70, or 60, or any other, for that matter — should receive a birthday card from his office?

Why did the boy go out of town to do this? Mostly, he said, they got started out of town to get something to eat, after a ball game sometimes, and then went into delivery. There's no place to eat at Shiloh after 10.

Didn't his folks suspect something was up? Yes, they admitted, they did suspect something, these past few weeks. One boy's mother said she told his father she didn't trust the boy, and the father testified that he had questioned his son on the matter.

But that's all they did. And when the judge said "industrial school at Lancaster," he turned on the water works. This cocky, enormously self-confident young punk — and that's what he was, carrying on in an arrogant fashion before the judge, brusk and rude in his replies, no manners at all — turned on the water works.

From his and other testimony, a newspaperman tries to find the pattern, to learn what factors develop this sort of thing.

And from Thursday's hearings, and Friday's testimony, this newspaperman comes up with these:

1. Every one of these boys was allowed to have a car of his own as soon as he was legally able to drive it.
2. None of the boys was required to meet curfew at home. When he violated curfew, his parents merely scolded mildly, or said nothing.
3. None of them was a good student in school. They showed histories of minor trouble with discipline, attentiveness, performance.
4. Many of them were only children.
5. Every one of them whose name we recognized has been coddled — in part by the police, in part by the school authorities, in part by their parents. Kids who got into trouble and rather than follow the idea of "sock him hard for a minor offense, then he won't do it or anything more serious a second time," they were let off lightly and allowed to go free without any stigma of any kind and permitted to boast among their friends: "I sure told them characters off."
6. Few of them were churchgoers. One said his mother went to a church in Shelby and he went to Crestline, but he went seldom and never with his parents.
7. None of them had been taught moral courage. One said "if I didn't steal then other boys would call me 'chicken'."

As Superintendent Beard of Shiloh remarked to us in the corridor, "we've got a whole of a rehabilitation job to do." And that we have — all of us.

Where's the first place to start? Stop coddling these kids. Stop giving them so damned much. Make 'em earn what they get by honest work. And keep them off wheels until they're old enough to serve in the army.

Because it's a truism that you can't very well raise hell in Shelby or Ashland unless you've got the transportation to get you there. And in darkness, when most of the devilry goes on, there's no public transportation.

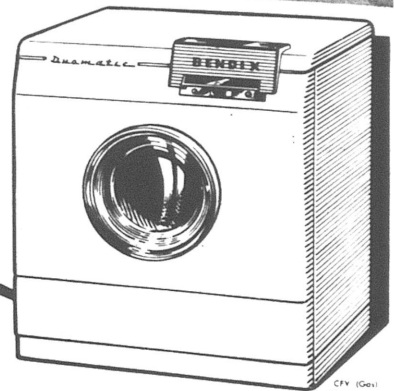

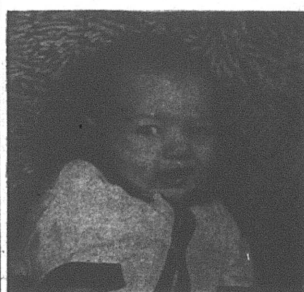

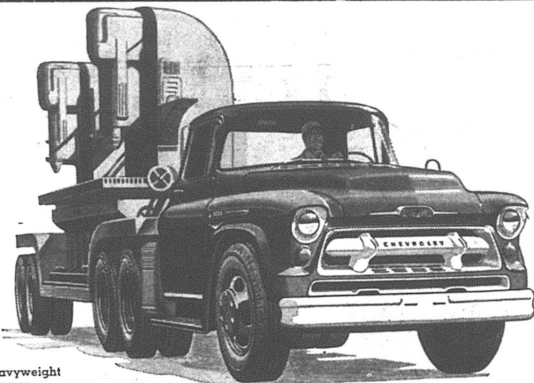

On the Sidelines

By THE OLD TIMER

The completion of the scholastic basketball season, so far as local teams are concerned, turns attention to the spring. And since there isn't much in the way of a spring athletic program, high school athletes don't have anything else but love to turn their thoughts to.

At least, that's the way it has been years gone by and Coach Lew Petit deserves credit for his efforts in endeavoring to revive baseball.

Say what you like about football and basketball, the truth is — and the man who says otherwise is simply talking through his hat — that baseball is our national game. We ought to cultivate it more.

There has been a lot of griping about what major league television has done to minor league ball. Yet, in those towns where minor league ball has closed up shop because of financial troubles, they don't stop playing baseball.

Take Toledo, for instance. The Sox are gone, victims of as glorious a rooftop as anybody ever got from the Perinis and the Milwaukee Braves. What Don Wolfe, sports editor of the Blade, will do for local sports news during the summer is, however, no problem, for independent ball and local league competition will attract more friends.

Jake Striker pointed out at the elementary school Thursday what a boost Little League ball has given the national game. And junior Legion ball, of which he is a product.

We have gone along with the

idea that folks won't go down the road to see minor league ball when they can watch the Indians (the implication is that the Indians are major league, and there is some question about that) on television. Folks go down the road to see or hear a high school play or band concert when they can stay home and watch some movie or other on TV, don't they?

The answer, as we see it, is to encourage local participation in hometown baseball. We'd rather see two teams of fellers we know, whether good or bad, than two teams of guys we don't know. The interest in big league ball is not because it is big league so much as because, through the wonderful medium of American sports pages, the players are known to almost everybody who is in the slightest bit interested in baseball.

A man supports a team because he knows its players, even though he may never have seen 'em. And he goes to a game against another team mostly because it has the league championship sewed up or because it's a league leader. How many turn out to see the Yankees and Baltimore, for example? Or Brooklyn and the Pirates?

What can be done about it?

Baseball has values that no other sport can approach. We ought to do something about seeing to it that it survives.

It takes a lot of sweat and drive by some interested sportsman to get local baseball going. Some concession to the spectator must be given. The games have to be played when people can see 'em and they must be good games.

Encouragement of kid baseball is the only salvation for baseball. We've got to start with midget leagues. Then graduate into Babe Ruth leagues, and then junior Legion ball.

The Old Timer got started with midget ball a couple of years ago. It thrived, but not without sweat and hard work. Not without encouragement from such as W. M. C., who kicked in some much-needed money when we were short, and the Community club. Not without unselfish service from such as Cap Akers, Jim Ryan, Jim Gavis and Guy Cunningham.

And we got that support as much because of interest in baseball as interest in boys.

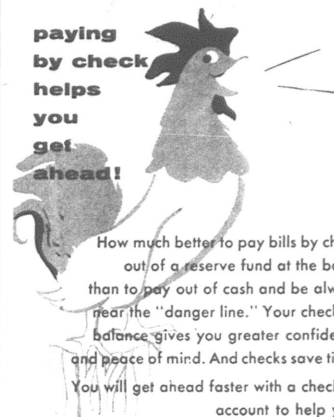

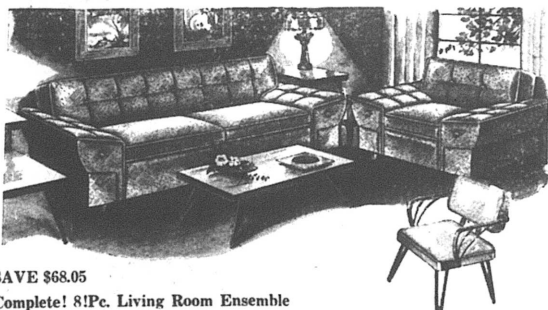
