Lutherans to Stage Evangelism Week

First Evangelical Lutheran congregation is one of 25 churches participating in the Mansfield Area Lutheran Evangelism mission May 6-11. Its pastor, the Rev. Robert F. Hall, will be chairman of the area mission-to-pastors committee and a prominent lay member, H. James Root, will be chairman of the lay visits committee.

Preliminary plans have been completed for one of the most ambitious religious projects in the church history of the Mansfield area.

More than 15,000 Lutheran from the 25 churches will participate through home visitations among their own membership and to the homes of the unchurched.

The event is a part of a nationwide program being sponsored by the 4300 congregations of the United Lutheran Church in America.

The Rev. Wray C. Smith, pastor of Mansfield's Holy Trinity Evangelical Lutheran church, has been named general chairman. Lutheran Churches in Richland, Ashland, Crawford and Huron counties will participate.

The area mission will have as its theme, "The Church... for a Better Life!" and, according to the Rev. Mr. Smith, membership of all 25 churches will call upon all active and inactive members of their churches "to inspire them to do a better job of evangelism in their every day lives." Visitation teams will also call on the unchurched to invite them to "join in the ever-increasing trend toward church membership evidenced throughout the nation."

More than 25 guest ministers from Ohio and adjoining states will occupy the pulpits of the participating churches during the week-long program. They will deliver the sermons for the opening of "Mission Week" on Sunday, May 6, and will preach each night thereafter through Thursday, May 10. The week of special services will be concluded on Friday, May 11, with a large closing rally attended by con-

gregations and visitors from all the participating churches. Place for the rally has not yet been decided.

Visitation of members, active and inactive, and to the homes of those without church affiliation will take place each evening preceding the religious services, which start at 8 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Smith said each church will organize visitation teams. They will assemble for dinner at their churches at 6 p.m., and start making their calls at 7 p.m., returning to the church in time for the services an hour later.

Fostoria VFW Band Plays Here Monday



Donald Bowersox, music and band instructor in the Plymouth school system, has resigned his position effective Mar. 31. Mr. Bowersox has accepted a position with the Catholic Youth Organization in Monroe, Mich.

He will be the district executive with headquarters in Monroe, but will serve a three-county area.

Plymouth High school band will play host to the national champion Fostoria V. F. W. band concert band at the high school auditorium Monday, at 8 p.m. in a special concert.

The Fostoria unit has won nine straight national championships and is trying for its 10th this year. The required number for the band this year is 1812 Overture, which conditions warranting, it will play in the concert Monday. "This versatile band is capable of playing, and playing well all types of music—from Beethoven to 'Big Horn Boogie,' a critic has said.

The unit has toured the nation, has played in Boston, New York, Cleveland, Miami, New Orleans, St. Louis, Los Angeles. It has appeared several times on radio and television. During the past few years, the band has served as official escort band for Presidents Truman and Eisenhower.

Band members are selling tickets in advance of the concert at 50c for students and \$1 for adults. Remaining tickets will be sold at bar door.

The high school band will present a short concert of about four numbers at 8 p.m. after which the Fostoria unit will play a concert of about one and a half hours.

Teachers Get Raises Of \$200 Annually As Wage Scale Fixed

Average raises of \$200 each were voted teachers of Plymouth Public schools, effective Sept. 1, by the Board of Education Tuesday night.

The salary schedule for the 1956-57 school year provides a minimum of \$300 for teachers with baccalaureate degrees and no teaching experience and up to \$3,740 for the same teachers with five years experience. Teachers with three years of college training will be scaled at \$2800 and \$3300 respectively. Those with less than three years of training are set at \$2600 and \$3100 respectively.

Teachers engaged in extra duty, such as coaching of athletics, will receive additional pay. Head athletic coach will get \$600 above the salary schedule, the assistant coach \$300, senior sponsor \$100, class paly sponsor \$50, advisor to the annual \$50. The Board reserved the right to give incentive pay for extra duty, superior teaching, and where there is a declared scarcity of teachers.

Donald B. Bowersox wrote the Board he is resigning his post as music instructor solely because he wished to seize an opportunity to advance himself, and not "because of any incidents that occurred during my tenure." He did not elaborate.

Tom Warren, music instructor in the Union and Shiloh schools, will be hired to replace Bowersox, subject to the acquiescence of Shiloh school authorities. He will also teach and conduct the summer band.

Absence of funds is likely to prevent the hiring of Lewis Pettit as recreation director in Mary Faye parking during the summer. The Board learned Robert Lewis, member of the park board, told the Board his agency has absolutely no funds with which to pay Pettit. Less public subscription is large enough to make up the balance of Pettit's salary (the Board has appropriated \$1500 no program can be carried out. Supt. M. J. Coon told the Board children under nine would not be included in the recreation program.

An electric mixer was authorized for purchase from cafeteria funds.

**ORDINANCE NO. 4-56
FOR THE INSTALLATION
AND USE OF PARKING
METERS ON CERTAIN STREETS
IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH,
OHIO.**

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of this Council that the regulation and control of the parking of vehicles, both motor and other, on certain streets is desirable and necessary; and Whereas, it is the opinion of this Council that such regulation and control of vehicles may be best obtained by the establishment of parking meter zones and the marking off of individual parking spaces in said zones; by providing for the installation and use of mechanical parking time indicators, otherwise known as parking meters, at and in conjunction with said parking spaces; by restricting the parking in said zones to reasonable periods of time; and by compelling operators of vehicles, who use the parking spaces so marked off and designated, to pay a portion of or all of the cost of establishing and maintaining such parking meters; parking spaces and parking zones. Now Therefore, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO:

Section 1. The word "Vehicle" as used herein, is any device or means by which persons or property may be transported or carried upon a street or highway, except such as are operated upon rails or tracks, or used under human power exclusively. The word "Person" as used herein, shall mean and include any individual human being, any firm, partnership, or corporation. The word "Parking" as used herein, means the standing of a vehicle upon a street or highway during a period of time exceeding two minutes, whether such vehicle is operated or not, and a vehicle or not such vehicle is accompanied by an operator. An "individual parking space" as used herein, is a paved portion of the street or highway, bounded by the street curb, or sidewalk, and of sufficient width, such as portion shall be designated and marked off by the Council, to allow a vehicle to be parked entirely within a "parking meter space" as used herein, is an individual parking space, as defined herein, for which a proper deposit has been made, and to which, a parking meter has been provided and installed. A "parking meter" as used herein, is defined as being a device or device which shall, upon the period of time during which a vehicle may be parked or stand in

a particular place, according to some law, ordinance or regulation; which has, as a part thereof, a receptacle or container for receiving and holding coins of the money of the United States, and a slot or opening through which such coins may be deposited; which has a timing mechanism which indicates the period of time during which parking of vehicles is permissible; which displays an appropriate signal when the aforesaid period of time has elapsed; and which also shows brief instructions at the manner of operation of the parking meter.

Section 2. The Council hereby decides and determines to establish parking meter zones on certain streets of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and to designate parking spaces to be designated and marked off in said zones as hereinafter provided; to cause parking meters to be installed in said zones at parking meter spaces therein; to provide for the operation, management, supervision, control and use of such parking meters, parking meter spaces and parking zones; to fix the time limitations and conditions for legal parking of vehicles in such zones and in such parking meter spaces, and the hours, day and night, during which such parking meters must or must not be used; to fix penalties for violations of the provisions of this ordinance; and to indicate time limitations by showing same on the parking meters or by other signs posted close thereto.

Section 3. Under the direction of the Chief of Police, all parking meters shall be placed upon the curb or sidewalk, except as herein provided, and shall be placed and located immediately adjacent to and in close proximity with and at the front or head of the individual parking meter spaces, one meter to be placed for each parking space. Each parking meter shall be placed in such manner as to show by a signal upon it that the particular parking space adjacent to it and for which such meter is placed and used, is or is not legally in use for the parking of vehicles. Each parking meter by its dial shall show the period of time for legal parking, and at the end of such period, shall show illegal parking. Notice to the public shall be given by appropriate signs setting forth the periods of time during which parking is permitted and the conditions thereof, which signs may be on the parking meter or on the immediate vicinity. Any vehicle which shall remain in an individual parking meter space after the prescribed time for parking has ended, shall be deemed to be parked illegally, but in no event shall it be considered illegal parking if the meter display shows that a proper deposit has been made for such parking. All parking meters shall be under the supervision and control of the Chief of Police of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and he is hereby authorized and empowered to place, install and remove, parking meters, or cause the same to be done, but only with

the consent and under the orders of the Council of said Village of Plymouth, Ohio. All parking meters shall be in conformity with the conditions and descriptions set forth in the definition of a parking meter in Section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 4. Under the direction of the Council, lines or marking shall be painted or placed upon the curb or sidewalk, to indicate the particular parking meter space for which the meter is to be used, and each vehicle parked in such parking meter space shall be parked within and between the lines so painted and placed. Said lines may be parallel with the street curb or sidewalk, or at the discretion of the Council. And it shall be unlawful for any person to park any vehicle across any such line or marking, or to park such vehicle in such position that the same shall not be entirely within the area so designated.

Section 5. When a parking meter space is parallel with the adjacent curb or sidewalk, any vehicle parked in such space shall be parked so that the foremost part of said vehicle shall be adjacent to the parking meter, and when a parking meter space is diagonal to the curb or sidewalk, any vehicle parked in such space shall be parked with the foremost part of such vehicle adjacent and nearest to the parking meter.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to permit a vehicle to remain in any parking meter space adjacent to parking meter placed at such parking meter space while said meter is displaying a signal indicating that the vehicle occupying said parking meter space has already been parked beyond the prescribed parking time.

Section 7. It shall be considered a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for the owner of any vehicle illegally parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance to be the operator of such vehicle, or to be an illegal parking, unless it be shown otherwise.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to deface, injure, tamper with, or willfully break or destroy any parking meter, installed under the provisions of this ordinance, or to render the usefulness of any such parking meter.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to deposit, or cause to be deposited, in any parking meter any slug, device or metallic substance or any other substitute for a coin or a ten-cent coin of the United States.

Section 10. The times during which parking meters shall be in operation shall be as follows: parking meters shall be in operation continuously, unless in some manner out of order or unless the Council otherwise decides. From the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning to the hour of 6 o'clock in the evening, on each and every day of the week throughout the year except on the following days mentioned hereinafter: All parking meters shall not be in operation on Sundays nor on the following named days which are hereby determined to be holidays within the meaning of this ordinance: January 1 (New Year's); February 12 (Lincoln's Birthday); March 17 (St. Patrick's Day); May 30 (Memorial Day); July 4 (Independence Day); First Monday in September (Labor Day); November 11 (Veterans Day); December 25 (Christmas Day). If any of such holidays shall fall on a Sunday, then the following Monday shall be deemed a holiday within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 11. When any vehicle is parked in any parking meter space adjacent to a parking meter, or in a vehicle, or person to parking such vehicle, shall within two minutes after such parking, deposit, or cause to be deposited, in such parking meter a ten-cent coin or one-cent coin of United States money in the particular parking meter which is adjacent to and placed for the use of such parking meter. The place or places provided for such coin, provided, however, that the parking meter shall be in operation as set forth in Section 11 of this ordinance.

Section 12. Upon deposit of such five-cent coin, said parking meter space immediately adjacent to said parking meter in which said coin or coins were thus deposited may be lawfully occupied by any person for a period of time not to exceed one hour after such deposit, and upon the deposit of each said one-cent coin, said parking meter space may be lawfully occupied by said vehicle for a period of time not to exceed twelve minutes for each one-cent coin. And upon deposit of two such five-cent coins, said parking meter space may be lawfully occupied by said vehicle for and during a period of time not exceeding two hours, the

time to deposit such coin or coins in the manner and within the time provided for in this Section shall be a violation of this Ordinance.

Section 13. That the amount of such deposit under this ordinance may be such as to have openings for the deposit of ten-cent coins, five-cent coins and one-cent coins, or may be such as to have openings for deposit of five-cent coins and one-cent coins.

Section 14. Parking meters for the Village of Plymouth as follows:

(1) The west side of Sandusky Street from Dix Street south to the Public Square. Parking to be parallel to the curb.

(2) The east side of Sandusky Street from the junction of Dix Street south to the Public Square. Parking to be parallel to the curb.

(3) The north side of the Public Square from Sandusky Street, east to the Public Square.

(4) The south side of the Public Square from Plymouth Street, east to the Public Square. Parking to be diagonal to the curb.

(5) The west side of Plymouth Street, from the Public Square, east to the south line of Lot No. 122. Parking to be parallel to the curb.

(6) The east side of Plymouth Street from the Public Square south to the south line of Lot No. 23. Parking to be parallel to the curb.

(7) The south side of the Public Square from Plymouth Street, east to Trust Street. Parking to be diagonal to the curb.

(8) The north side of the Public Square from Sandusky Street, east to Porter Street. Parking to be diagonal to the curb.

(9) Twenty-three parking spaces, in a diagonal pattern, on a double line, on the middle line of the Public Square, east of the intersection.

However, no parking space shall be established which will obstruct entrances into any vehicular driveway from private property to a street, the entrance to any alley, or within a street or alley intersection.

Section 15. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, acting under the instructions of the Mayor of said Village, to observe and report violations of this ordinance in the following respects:

(a) The number of each parking meter which indicates that the vehicle then occupying the parking meter space adjacent to such parking meter is in violation of the provisions of this ordinance for the use of which said meter is placed, is or has been parked in violation of any of the parking regulations established by this ordinance.

(b) The particular regulation or regulations which were or are violated.

(c) The state thereof number of such violations.

(d) Any other facts or information obtainable and pertinent to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation.

(e) Each such police officer shall attach to such vehicle parked in violation of any provision of this ordinance a notice, to be known as a parking notice, which shall state the exact date and time when it is attached, make or kind of vehicle, state the amount of parking meter, the particular violation or violations of the provisions of this ordinance and the name of the police officer issuing such notice, and a copy of such notice shall be filed by such officer in the office of the Chief of Police in the City Hall. A Thought on Young Drivers

Whether a young person of 16 years should have the right to operate an automobile is certainly a controversial subject. In Fremont high school youths resent the suggestion, and have conducted a survey to show that juvenile drivers do not cause accidents quite so much as adults do.

We were young once, and we hankered to have an automobile as much as anybody. And when we got a driver's license, and could have the family car, we had to observe certain rules: in by 10 p. m. on "date nights" by 8 p. m. otherwise; speed under 45 miles an hour at all times; pay for our own gas and oil; leave the car in better condition than when we took it.

There are, however, some good reasons to doubt that a 16-year-old is a responsible person with a 200-horsepower car. The solemn law of Ohio prohibits any person under 17 from working after 6 p. m., and from operating or servicing mechanical devices such as a slow printing press. If it's forbidden to let a 17-year-old operate a printing press, in which if he's darned careless he might lose a finger, then why shouldn't it be forbidden for a 16-year-old to operate a 200-horsepower automobile, with which he could take his own life and the lives of dozens of others?

whether juveniles nowadays are more mature earlier than they were when we were young. We haven't seen the results of the survey, but we wish to broach this question: hasn't the progress made by automotive engineers more than overcome in a negative way the progress made by young people in becoming more mature earlier?

The news the past week emphasizes this argument. Four teen-agers in Newton, Ia., took a car and went off on a jaunt. They told their parents and the sheriff they had been kidnapped. A posse was organized and a ring was thrown about the area. Then they tearfully admitted the hoax, but not until countless hundreds of hours of time of public servants had been wasted, many hearts had been torn by anguish, and many dollars of the public's money had been spent. And when the judge gave them 30-day sentences, there arose a hue and cry of impeachment proceedings because he was too harsh.

A doctor in Mansfield wrote his 16-year-old daughter a note, forbidding her to take the family sports car to Columbus on a shopping trip. She disobeyed, drove too fast, wrecked the car injured a companion, and killed herself.

It may be dangerous oversimplification, but we submit there are two conclusions from these incidents: you can't expect public punishment to work unless you back it up, and if you don't like the idea of public punishment, then do it at home and keep your kids out of the courts. And don't try to discipline a child by writing a note.

Discipline is the direct result of respect. Respect is necessary to obtain and keep discipline. Respect is taught in the home. There is no set formula for teaching respect. But unless it is taught, there is no discipline.

Don't expect the school teacher to teach discipline. He or she merely enforces it. Discipline is taught at home. It is built upon respect. If a boy or girl is not taught to have respect for his parents and his elders—and they must work hard to merit that respect—you can't have discipline. That's what causes juvenile delinquency, we think. Is there anyone to say us nay?

Tests Evaluate Behavior, Show Teaching Effect: Waltz

"Human behavior can be evaluated by testing, and by so doing many problems of adjustment and delinquency can be avoided," Melvin G. Waltz, superintendent of the South-Central school district, told the Mothers' club Mar. 6.

The need for testing students must be realized by the school's faculty, the school board, and the parents. He listed three main reasons for testing the school child: that the world has become so complicated there is now a need for guidance toward vocations that was not felt before; to have proper guidance, a testing program is necessary; to show the effectiveness of the teaching program.

Mr. Waltz showed his audience several types of tests which are used for non-reading children and for those who have learned to read. He explained the types of preference tests which older students are given to determine their likes and dislikes to fit them into the proper vocation.

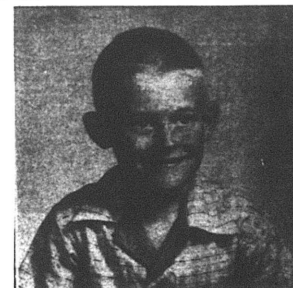

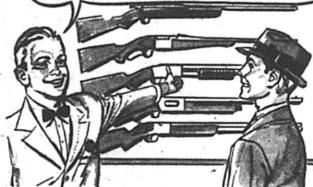

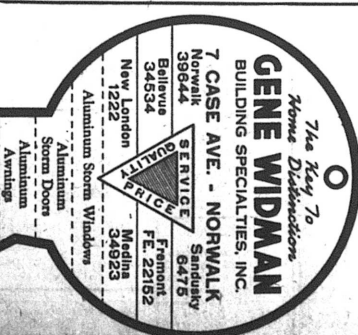
