State Sets Back On Sewer Permit

One-Side Parking Set for Sandusky, Plymouth Streets

What's behind the refusal of the State Water Pollution Control board to renew Plymouth's permit to dump raw sewage into the Huron river for a whole year?

It's not a personal thing, officials of the board said this week. It's more an effort by the board to urge municipalities cited for pollution to move faster in clearing up the condition, they said.

"We've followed more or less a long-range plan in re-issuing our permits in Plymouth since the legislature indicated more action was desired," a spokesman said.

"Note that two years ago the village was required to bring the Stilson sewer survey of 1947 up to date, and the council was asked to go to bat for the bond issue.

"You were defeated, which was expected, in Plymouth if not here in Columbus. Plymouth was one of only three towns in the state to turn down a sewer bond issue.

"So the permit was renewed, with the stipulation that you were to re-investigate the abbreviated sewer system, which would cost less — about \$275,000, if I recall correctly.

"Then we learned the council thought the 'piecemeal' solution would be more expensive in the long run than the 'whole hog' method. We think so, too. So the permit was renewed again, requiring the village to bring the survey up to date and to begin to lay aside funds so that mortgage revenue bonds wouldn't cost you so much when the time came to sell them. The council interpreted this — and correctly — as a call for a sewer usage tax, which we understand to be in force.

"Compliance with the 1955 renewal was therefore only 50 per cent. You still hadn't the survey brought up to date, Stilson now says the work is in hand. That will bring compliance with the 1955 order, and with this new 1956 order, up to 100 per cent.

"Now that the survey is up to date, the board wants to know what plans are made to finance the sewer improvements — the abbreviated plan if not the whole thing.

"You will have to consult your bonding attorney, whom we understand to be Henry Crawford of Squires, Sanders & Dempsey at Cleveland, to learn how far you can go financially and then you will have to cut the shoe to fit the last.

"But we aren't picking on Plymouth. We're doing the same thing with a lot of towns. The legislature wants action and it's the board's duty to get action. At the same time, we realize the problems of all of these little communities and we don't mean to be nasty about it. But, still, we want action."

With a prospective \$100,000 expenditure for water extensions and a new water supply confronting the council this spring, another \$400,000 for the sewer system would be a burden that will probably defy carriage.

Enforcement of a 10-year-old agreement with the state highway department to prohibit parking on one side of Plymouth and Sandusky streets was voted by the village council Tuesday night, but the expected fireworks didn't come off.

In fact, the voters of the petition to submit the controversial parking meter ordinance to a referendum didn't even appear.

So the council came to grips with the agreement to ban parking in Plymouth street and Sandusky streets by authorizing the erection of signs to that effect on the east side of Sandusky between the Square and the end of the curbing, and the corporate line of the village and the west side of Plymouth street between Birdfield and the beginning of Route 98.

The sum of \$119.20 was quoted as the probable cost of the signs. A letter from the Water Pollution Control board limiting the renewal of the sewer permit to Aug. 15, was read and filed.

Maurice Bachrach reported his investigation into the petition situation in Greenlawn cemetery had produced an offer from George BeVier to trade three acres of land adjoining the cemetery for a similar plot near the water plant. The matter was referred to the cemetery trustees with tentative expressions of approval.

The question of a private vs. a public sewer was broached by Thurman R. Ford, who asked for a definition. By common consent, the doctrine of "what's in the main sewer and the house belongs to the propertyholder and is his responsibility" was adopted.

In connection with a survey of the village fire department, inspectors of the state fire bureau wrote they were "disappointed to note the village fire apparatus and equipment are stored in a flimsy, frame building, which is a very serious risk to safety in the village." They invited attention to a report dated Mar. 21, 1950, condemning the present fire house and recommending "strongly that immediate action be taken to provide a fire-proof building in which to house fire equipment, making provision for meetings for firemen and for the drying of hose."

An ordinance to provide for a fine of \$50 and or 10 days in jail to persons who do not give vital information after a traffic accident in the village was passed as an emergency measure.

Mayor Alfred Parkinson explained the move as necessary to enable the village to collect and retain fines for such offenses. Heretofore enforcement was laid under state law and fines revert to the state.

A coterie of insurance agents descended upon the council for opportunity to bid upon fleet insurance of village vehicles, which number seven. The council dealt at length with the question of liability and collision coverage and agreed to ask all interested bidders to stipulate in writing the type and price of insurance offered, subject to specifications which the council will promulgate.

P-TA Votes to Stop Spring Festival; Dance to Be Held

Because its profits were too small for the work involved, the annual spring festival sponsored by the Parent-Teachers' association and the Mothers' club will not be held this year.

The P-TA voted Thursday night to suspend the affair, which has been presented several years, and to sponsor instead a dance Apr. 28. The Mothers' club will not be affiliated in the promotion of the dance.

For its part, the Mothers' club has postponed a spring dinner, similar to the Thanksgiving dinner, but the matter could not be brought to a vote at its last meeting.

The club's objective is to equip the elementary cafeteria with folding tables and benches, at a cost of approximately \$400 each. Four have so far been acquired, six more are needed. The board of education tentatively has plans to buy another. If two more can be earned by the dinner, only three more will be needed.

At Thursday's P-TA meeting, Betty Reed and members of the high school girls' basketball team presented new rules of girls' basketball, and Frank Garber, coach of the team, briefly discussed physical education for girls.

Some Truths

It appears that we are to have a referendum to confirm or set aside the solemn and deliberated action of the village council in passing a parking meter ordinance. We very much regret this development, because the democratic process shows a sign of weakness in Plymouth when a legal ordinance is questioned in this manner.

The councilmen who passed the measure are the same men whose names were placed into nomination by the forces who now oppose what they do. It does not speak well for the leadership of those who were among the "outs" before November, 1955, that the candidates whom they handpicked and supported are now acting in a manner which they disapprove of.

Whatever side one takes, he is bound to find argument. Nevertheless, there are some absolute truths that need to be said.

One is that parking meters are intended to solve a revenue problem more than a parking problem.

A corollary — and it is more important than theorem stated above — is that the village is pitifully short of operating funds.

This is in part due to bad fiscal management. It is also in part due to a more or less universal feeling hereabouts that the village administration can be run on peanuts.

The truth is that the village administration is almost an insult to the intelligence of Mr. Average Citizen so far as its efficiency of management is concerned. This is no reflection upon the men who run it. It is a reflection upon the amount of money available to run it.

The village hall is an abomination. The equipment we have to do with is obsolete. The Board of Public Affairs is using antiquated machinery that no right-thinking businessman would tolerate for a minute. It not only costs us money to run it, but we are losing money in hidden costs everyday because it doesn't do enough things.

We are paying bodies to do work that could just as well be done by machines that, although their initial cost is high, would soon pay for themselves.

The alternative to parking meters — or any other measure intended to raise municipal revenue more or less painlessly — is a special levy for municipal operating purposes. The levy falls on the property owner directly, and although he can pass the added cost on to his tenant in the form of higher rent, rents are pretty high anyway and most folks won't stand for an increase. They'd rather leave town. Sixteen percent of the value of the houses in this village are owned by the state of Ohio. Those who live in them can ill afford higher taxes, would probably vote them down.

These are truths. They admit of no argument. Those who wish to debate the issue can go on from there.

In most communities, the materials needed for the 30-minute workbench will cost under \$15. The bench may be fastened together with nails or screws. The top surface is Tempered Preswood, popular for this use because it has been found so satisfactory in industry.

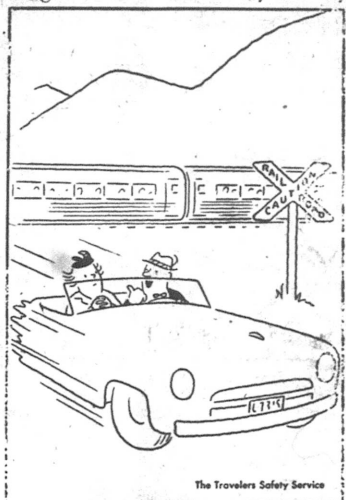
Rose-Red City of Petra

Young Samuel John Postema, son of the John Postemas and grandson of the Sam Postemas, wrote this report of his trip to Norway, which Phin thinks is well done. The lad is a student of Ralph Cok in the Celeryville school.

"The grades from five to eight went to Norway to see the jail. We saw where the prisoners were kept. There were about 14 men in jail. They each had a little place to stay. In the middle there were a couple of tables.

"When we got there we went to the court house. We sat down in the back of the room. The lawyers then chose the jurors. The lawyers got up and asked them the questions. After they asked questions, they had a recess.

"We also went to the probate judge. He told us what he does. We asked him a few questions, so he answered them, too.

"Then we went to the health department. There the men gave us a book about health. We looked at the books that he had around there.

"We left there and went to another floor. There we saw all the books that had cases in them. There were about 2,000 books in the library. We also talked to the judge. He told us what he does with the books.

"After that we went to the Alvin hotel to eat dinner. There the table was set for us. We all had a good dinner. We all had to pay for our own dinner.

"Then we went out to the cars. We all got in the same cars that we came in. We got home about a quarter of two. Then we went back in school. We did the studies we usually do in the afternoon."

There is \$900 worth of fence bought and paid for that isn't up, because there isn't anybody to go down and put it up. There is much work that needs to be done with the road, and with the filling of the field, and clearing out the stream.

If a man gives you an automobile, you don't expect him to put gas and oil in it, keep it washed and maintained, do you? Nor do you expect your neighbor to come over with his hose and spray it down and clean it up every week?

Then why expect a few public-spirited suckers to go down there and work their heads off to keep it in shape?

Everybody yaps about having things — a swimming pool, to mention but one item. But how many want to look after 'em, or pony up the dough in the tax bill to pay for looking after 'em?

Pardon us while we wait're sick and tired of this. What ought to be done is put a special one mill levy on the ballot to maintain the park, and charge enough — 50c for a picnic table is absolutely ridiculous — for the use of it by non-residents of the village so that it can be made to pay.

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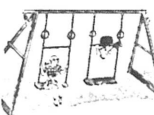

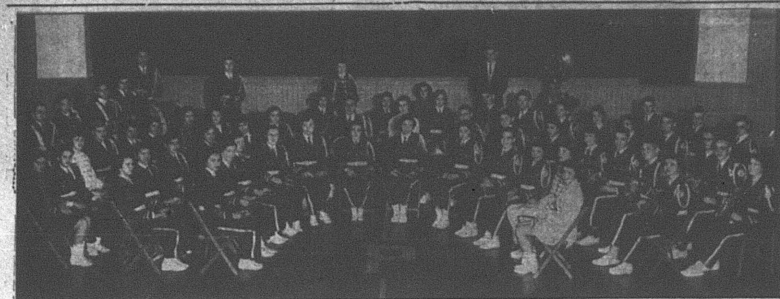

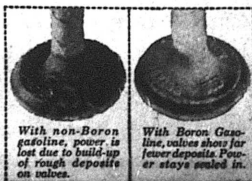
