Mrs. LaBarre Victim Of Document Racket

A 19-year-old Detroit, Mich., youth awaits action of Michigan Superior-court because he allegedly mulcted bereaved persons in a document racket, Plymouth authorities learned this week.

One of his victims is Mrs. I. E. LaBarre, whose mother, Mrs. Emma Myers, died 10 days ago. Shortly after Mrs. Myers' death, a package was delivered by Railway Express agency with collect charges of \$3 plus freight. The waybill read "documents and securities." Mrs. LaBarre paid the charges, opened the package, found nothing but three mimeographed sheets of radio listings.

The package was turned over to R. Earl McQuate, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who investigated through Mansfield Better Business bureau. He learned a number of packages of a similar

nature had been delivered by the carrier.

Meanwhile, Dr. LaBarre notified Federal Bureau of Investigation agents.

Before FBI men could tackle the problem, an answer was forthcoming from Detroit. A 19-year-old boy who had innocently enlisted his father's help in forwarding the packages was apprehended and gave a full confession to police.

He sought funds with which to buy a seat on the New York Stock Exchange, he told Detroit police. His father helped him carry the packages, which numbered more than 500, to the carrier's agent in Detroit.

Mrs. LaBarre is poorer by \$5.76, Detroit police report the boy has no assets, and probably the money cannot be recovered.

Clerk to Receive Referendum Bid Before Tuesday

With only seven days remaining before the controversial parking meter ordinance becomes law, opponents of the measure have completed referendum petitions and will submit them to the village clerk before Tuesday night.

Once assured of the validity of the signatures, which must be equal to 10 per cent of the ballots cast here for governor in 1954, the village council must accept the petition or reject it.

To accept it, the council will need to rescind the measure. To reject it, the council will need to approve a motion to table effect. This must be done in 10 days.

The referendum will then be submitted to the electorate in the May primary.

Enforcement of the 10-year-old agreement with the state highway department will remove 10 revenue-producing parking stalls from the council's plan to install about 180 meters in the business section.

There is no legal parking in the east side of Sandusky street within the village limits.

The measure would become law at midnight Thursday, 30 days after the ordinance was passed by a five to one vote.

Petitions have been opened for signature at four business places and about 150 persons have signed them.

Specially painted eggs will fetch high prices on the high school lawn Sunday at 2 p.m. as the Chamber of Commerce stages its first annual Easter egg hunt.

Harold Dietrich, chairman of the civic committee, which is managing the affair, announced today there will be three classes of competition—pre-schoolers, children in the first through third grades, and those in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades.

In each class, the golden egg will be worth \$1, the silver egg 50c, and the finder of the most eggs will receive \$1.

Areas will be demarcated so that children of the three age groups will be confined to sections where eggs have been hidden.

Mr. Dietrich will be assisted by his committee: Royal W. Eckstein, Sr., Robert L. Meier, Karl S. Lindauer, John J. Fackler, Robert J. Wechter and Harold Ross.

The committee will meet early Sunday to hide the eggs.

"There will be plenty of eggs for everybody, and if the youngsters will stay in bounds, everybody will have a good time," Mr. Dietrich said today.

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State Lab Begins Brucellosis Testing

A state brucellosis test laboratory started free, voluntary tests for Richland county farmers at the fairgrounds at 8 a.m. yesterday. The laboratory will remain at the site until Apr. 30.

Area samplers will be sent to rural areas of the county, the Richland county agent announced, but farmers wishing information—whether with respect to dairy or beef cattle—may communicate with the laboratory or with the agent.

"There is no scientific proof that undulant fever is passed by milk," the agent asserts, emphasizing that infected animals, proved by the milk ring test followed by a blood test, can be retained on the farm.

If sold, however, they must only be sold for butchering.

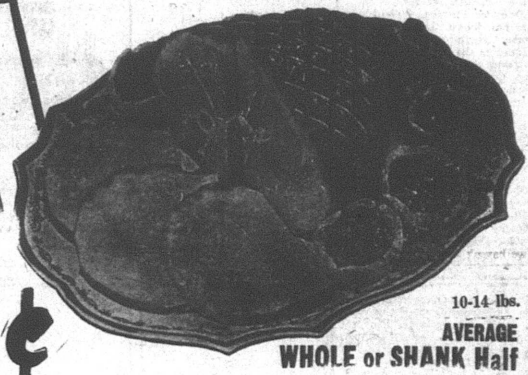

And once there was a reconnaissance in force successfully employed to surprise the Germans, who didn't think the Yanks were so backward.

Who's got a mule now? We saw a piece of the other day about a mule auction in Missouri, and another in Memphis. They are in use, we suppose. Part of the mechanization of our life is the elimination of horse- and mule-drawn wagons. And when they did it, something went out of living as we knew it.
