Board Reverses Policy on Water: Owner Pays Now

In a reversal of policy, the Board of Public Affairs decreed Monday night that henceforth all expense incident to furnishing of water to a building lot, including tap, will be borne by the property holder.

This answer will be given to persons now building or intending to build homes, the board said.

Solicitor Joseph F. Dush was empowered to undertake negotiation with property owners between the village water plant and the new Chapman well site to enable a water main to be laid between the plant and the well.

Burton Forquer was unanimously approved for classification as skilled laborer with the water and light departments at \$1.75 hourly.

Carl A. Fife & Sons informed the board that wells in the present water plant can be cleaned and tested at \$15 an hour plus cost of materials. Floyd G. Browne and Associates, Marion, told the board the work could be completed for less than \$1,000. The board voted to ask the village council for an appropriation of that much for the purpose.

Informed that existing ordinances permit the mayor and the fire chief to half building of any housing not meeting with prescribed standards as to sanitation and fire prevention, Mayor Parkinson said he would deal with the matter privately.

Want to do about peddlers brought about a lively discussion. When it was over, the council agreed to charge peddlers \$1 for a permit and to insist that full particulars be filed with the police department when the permit is requested.

Apr. 26 and 27 — commencing Thursday morning — have been set as clean-up days. The village truck will call at homes to collect rubbish, trash and debris other than garbage if placed in a sturdy, portable container. The container must be light enough to be lifted by one man and must be placed at the curb.

After two weeks, the council is still unable to find a man to undertake relief of the police chief of dirt, illness and vacation. The present special patrolman is employed at Willard and is not available throughout the day.

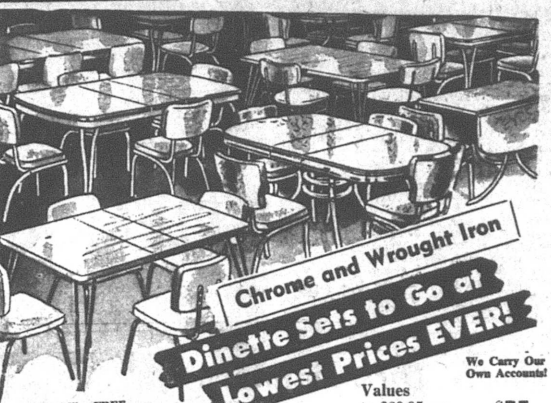

The lamentable developments at Greenwich in connection with consolidation of four school districts seem to have given the Plymouth Board of Education reason to pause in its progress toward eventual consolidation with Shiloh.

We think this is as it should be. Nobody in his right mind would wish the same occurrence here.

Now the Richland county board asks for an expression of intent. It wants to know — and we think this also is proper — if the Plymouth board will take the initiative in proposing consolidation with Shiloh.

It has asked that a statement of intent be furnished by Saturday. Its request was made in a polite and measured manner, without the atmosphere of compulsion or pressure as was the case in Huron county, and it should be answered in the same manner.

The Shiloh board seems united in its willingness to consolidate. One candidate for reelection served notice that he believes in consolidation and told his constituents that if they don't believe in consolidation, don't vote for him. He told a good many constituents, long before the election, and the fact he was given a whopping vote indicates to us, at least, that voters in the Shiloh school district favor consolidation.

It may be argued that these voters have no other choice. That is an argument which may or may not have merit. It does not concern us here. What matters is that sentiment is strong in the Shiloh district for consolidation.

Because of the developments at Greenwich, the Plymouth board rightly feels it should have the benefit of a wider sampling of opinion and a stronger expression of sentiment by the patrons of the Plymouth school district before going ahead.

Aside to the nice lady who called us last week: most of the so-called social items should be in our hands on Monday, morning, because the press turns over at 2 p.m. Tuesday. Take your Advertiser apart some day and lay pages 2, 7, 3 and 6 on the floor. That's the stuff that runs first. Pages 1, 8, 4 and 5 run on Wednesdays.

When there're more than eight pages, we run the press on Mondays, which means we have to have the news on Saturday, already set in type by Monday at noon.

Now a linotype machine will run only so fast. Even with a wizard running it. So the stuff should be in realer.

We're always glad to have news telephoned in to us — it saves us from digging ourselves. But that clock keeps running despite what we do, and so we have to have the news not later than Monday at noon.

Which also explains why we do a lot of telephoning on Sundays.

The Chamber of Commerce comes to grips with the recreation problem tonight, and we feel sure it will do what's right. The plan cooked up is a sound one, and a reasonable one, and everybody should support it.

A park doesn't make any money for a town. It shouldn't. The park exists as a place of recreation for every citizen in the town, young and old.

If this should have to be sought at the general election in November, we would be disappointed. While we do not doubt that voters would support consolidation, we feel strongly that the loss of time in effecting consolidation would be harmful to both schools.

If a consolidation of the Shiloh and Plymouth school districts can be effected before the fall term begins, planning may proceed so that in another year, perhaps less, a bond issue to pay for a new three- or four-year high school can be laid before the voters.

The only alternative to placing the issue in the form of an initiative petition on the ballot in November is for patrons of the school district to express their views to the Plymouth board at once, preferably before Saturday.

Clubs of a social and fraternal character, and the American Legion, and the several church groups, might consider the question in proper sessions and transmit their views to the board.

In this manner, the local school board can have a good sampling of opinion and act accordingly. It is reasonable that the board should want a wider expression of opinion. It is the board's duty to get it, and the citizen's duty to give it.

It is not necessary that this should be done at the expense of the public at the general election. It can be done now. Let them know immediately how you feel about it.

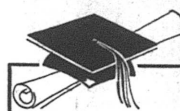

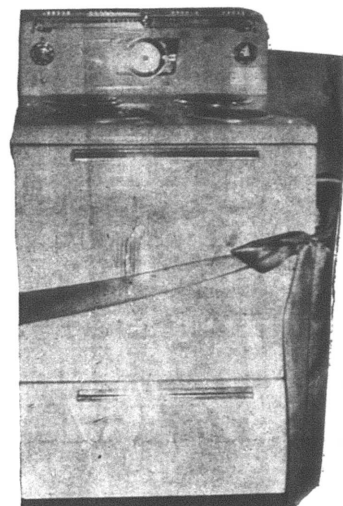

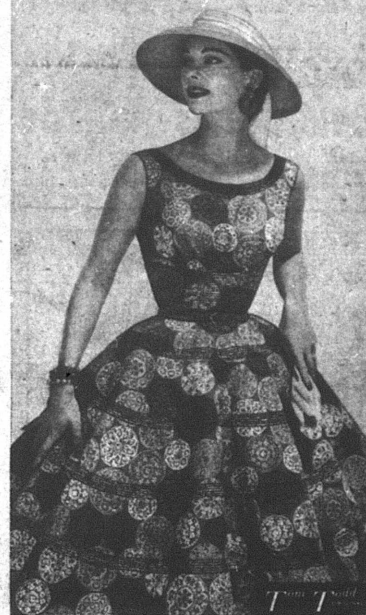

\$14,000 Bond Issue Set on Ballot Nov. 6

As a step toward rectifying an admittedly troublesome sewer situation, Shiloh village council voted Apr. 11 to ask for a \$14,000 general obligation bond issue in the general elections in November.

Mayor Robert Moser told the council the amount is the legal limit to which the village may obligate itself, since outstanding obligations have yet to be settled and the state will not permit a corporate village to assume debt beyond a set percentage.

The issue, if authorized at the November elections, will furnish funds to improve storm and sanitary sewers now extant. It will not be for the purpose of installing any treatment plant.

The utilities committee will meet with Neil McCarron, Shelby district manager, Ohio Fuel Gas Co., to discuss a new gas rate contract. The village has already informally indicated its desire to combine with Lucas in proposing a new contract at rates less than what the company proposes.

No applicant has yet come forward for the post of village marshal, vacated by A. C. Henry, Mayor Moser said.

Official legislation of Shiloh village council will hereafter be posted in certified copy at five places within the village, the council decreed Apr. 11.

Copies of ordinances and resolutions of the body will be displayed at First National Bank, McQuate's grocery, the village hall, the fire station and the post office.

Dr. C. O. Butner, an accommodation to the village, has offered to sell the two-way radio apparatus presently installed in his sedan to the fire department for \$250. He needs a new set to cope with a 12-volt electrical system.

May 1 and 2 have been set as clean-up days. Rubbish should be placed at the curbstone in portable containers of a strong nature, the council said. The village truck will collect the rubbish and dispose of it.
