

Buhl to Preach as Lutherans Start Evangelism Week Sunday

An Editorial

Next week is Evangelism week for First Evangelical Lutheran church. Its pastor and parishioners will engage in an assiduous effort to encourage the seldom-attenders and the unchurched to heed the word of God by attending worship services during the week and the weeks following.

The effort is a commendable one, and Lutherans deserve credit for undertaking such an important and worthy task. Laymen and ministers alike are cooperating in the endeavor throughout the Mansfield area to bring Christians back to the church.

A man said to us the other day that tolerance is often abused. The doctrine of "you go your way and I'll go mine" is all right so far as it goes, but the word of God as set forth in the Bible reads: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Light". The Christian faith is not a tolerant one, nor was it intended to be. Jesus said those who believeth in Him will be saved.

By implication, one must conclude that only unless one follows Jesus can he be saved. Even the most unchurched do not deny that we are all sinners and need salvation. What they seem unable to grasp is that recognition of a condition requires doing something about it.

Doing something about the need for salvation means hearing the word of Him who saves.

At the same time as Lutherans — and Christians everywhere, we hope — undertake a back-to-church crusade, let us also hope they will remember one of the most important dicta of the Bible: "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only."

We have too many Sunday Christians. Being a follower of Jesus is a seven-days-a-week, 52-weeks-a-year, all-your-lifetime job.

The evangelism program of the Lutheran church, as indeed of every church, is intended to emphasize that fact. We hope its import will not fall upon deaf ears and unheeding hearts.

Death came while the former Plymouth businessman was undergoing treatment for a previous coronary attack five days before. He had worked all day April 21 at manual labor. When he stopped that night, he told his wife he would never again undertake such heavy work. A coronary attack the next morning put him in Shelby Memorial hospital. A second attack Friday took his life.

Since he left the Public Square here, his business career had been marked by one success after another. From 1933 to 1938, he managed the Plymouth branch of the hardware owned by his father, C. A. Roush, and J. C. Sutter. He left here to join the Shelby operation as partner and Shelby manager. Nine years later, he was incorporated as Shelby Hardware & Appliance, Inc., and shortly thereafter Mr. Roush obtained managing control.

After the death of his father, he managed numerous business properties in Shelby and erected three others. At his death, he was preparing to open Shelby Furniture Co., at the site of the hardware and appliance business he had liquidated almost a year before. The opening was scheduled this week. Although he had engaged a manager, he intended to have an active part in the business and was to continue management of 25 retail properties in Shelby. Mrs. Roush, a son, William, and a daughter, Judy, and his mother, Mrs. Grace Roush, survive. Their home is in Plymouth Township about 2 1/2 miles from the city. The funeral will be at 2 p.m. from the Day Funeral home there. Interment was in Oakdale cemetery.

Week to Be Spent In Exhorting Christian To Attend Services

The Rev. Albert H. Buhl, director of missions, Synod of Ohio, United Lutheran church in America, will be guest minister Sunday at 8 p.m. as Plymouth Lutherans begin Evangelism week.

In cooperation with 27 other Mansfield area Lutheran churches, the local church will engage in an intensive week of encouragement for everyone to join with the congregation at regular services.

The Rev. Vernon Hess, regional director, Lutheran evangelism mission, New York, will preach Sunday at 11 a.m. on "What It Means to Be a Christian."

Pattern of the week is unique. Church workers will meet for dinner each night at 6 p.m. Between 7 and 8 p.m., by vow, they will visit persons who may not be associated with any church. Evangelistic services will be staged in the church each evening at 8 p.m.

The guest minister has achieved an impressive record in a 23-year career as a Lutheran pastor. Upon graduation from Mt. Airy seminary, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1934, he was called to a pastorate at Belmore, L. I., N. Y. He served four years, and thereafter at Denver, Colo., nearly seven years before transferring to Akron. There, he was associate pastor of Trinity Lutheran church.

In 1950, the Synod elected him full-time superintendent of home missions and church extension. He has been headquartered in Columbus since.

As director of missions, he investigates growing conditions for unchurched areas, recommends mission locations, assists in finding mission developers or pastors and guides new congregations in financing and organizing until they become self-supporting.

The effort by Mansfield area churches is the first such evangelistic move in 19 years. The Plymouth church has never before been engaged in an official evangelism week.

As First Evangelical Lutheran Church Opens Evangelism Week — Church Grew with Village, History Shows

It was customary then to engage the preacher for a year's term. In January, 1844, young Lane emigrated to the new church.

Eastman assisted to the post. He received more votes than Lane, and the latter regretfully ended his pastorate in that year. He served other churches until he died in 1879.

The Rev. Mr. Eastman was an unlucky pastor. At least, his church went down hill over the next five years. In January, 1849, the Rev. E. Eastman was completed, but a debt of \$800 was still due. Because the congregation could not raise the money to discharge it, Mr. Eastman was forced to resign.

A firm believer in church education, the Rev. Mr. Crouse organized the first Sunday school in 1850. It functioned as a union school for pupils of all religious faiths, and it met Sundays at 6 p.m.

Lured by Wittenberg college at Springfield, the pastor resigned in 1855. He was unwilling to start a chain of occurrences that has repeated itself over the years: pastors often leave to enter teaching or college work.

For the next 22 years, seven pastors occupied the pulpit, and the church consolidated its position in the community of man and God. In 1877, the Rev. George W. Miller came here, to serve seven years.

Plans were laid to erect a new building. New members were received into the church. When Miller left in 1884, the way was open for the new church.

In that year, the Rev. John Hall, a young pastor, was assigned here. He was the grandfather of the present pastor. Two years later, the cornerstone was laid. The building was erected at a cost of \$9,000, of which \$2,000 was in a mortgage.

On Feb. 1887, the church was dedicated. The Rev. Mr. Hall was the pastor at the dedication, at which he was guest preacher, to raise the money to cancel the mortgage. This he did by \$79.

The Rev. John Hall left for another charge in 1888. A son born here during his tenure is now pastor of the church, 13 years it has stood. This building was erected at a cost of \$9,000, of which \$2,000 was in a mortgage.

School taxes in a consolidated Plymouth-Shiloh school district would increase to about 20.50 mills, according to experts of the state department of education, the two Boards of Education were told.

But a consolidation seems to be the only solution to a "growth without a corresponding increase in financial resources," the working paper says, and two restrictions on districts not designated as permanent high school centers:

1. Indebtedness beyond the statutory 6 per cent is denied such districts.

2. No state aid from the recently voted fund would be available, \$7 million was voted for 1956, \$10 million for 1957.

Consolidation would allow a total of \$323,000 to be raised by the two districts, based on present valuations of \$7,513,210, if the full nine per cent should be voted.

"Admittedly, the \$323,000 possible through a nine per cent limit will not completely meet the anticipated needs. Combination of the two districts would provide eligibility for the additional state money," the working paper said.

Applications for a combined district for state aid would "be given high priority," the working paper said. No state money could be obtained unless a consolidation is effected.

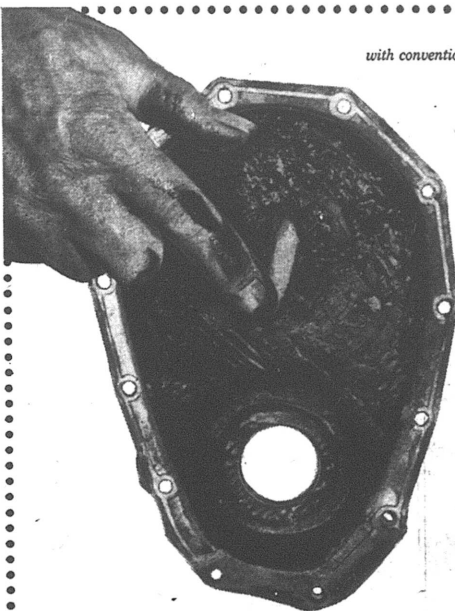

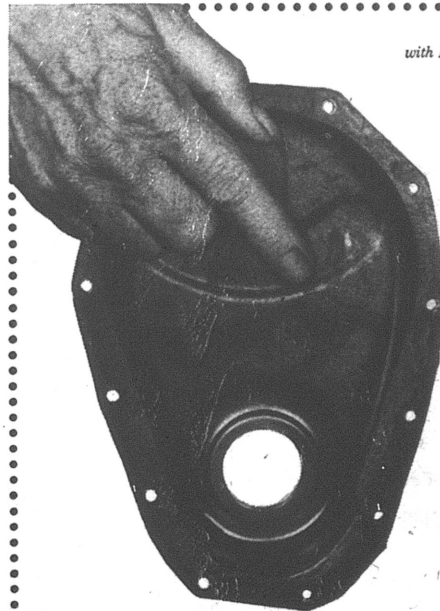

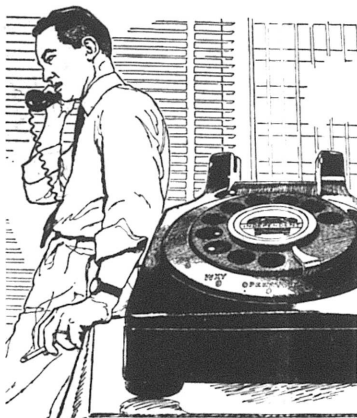

Our Recommendations

Once again it is primary election time. Voters of both political stripes must express themselves as to which candidates they wish to carry the party banners in November.

But interest in a primary is routinely low, and it is the duty of a newspaper to exhort the electorate to rouse itself from its lethargy to vote. Particularly if there are some candidates who should be elected or defeated.

To those in Huron county, we commend the candidacy of Bernard McClure for Republican nomination for Sheriff. Last week we published a news story about what our colleague in Monroeville thinks. So far, there has been no effort by the incumbent to overcome the evil presumptions against his qualifications to hold public office that were made by Mr. Leek at Monroeville. We can only conclude that Mr. Leek speaks truth. If this is so, McClure is entitled to the vote of Republicans in Huron county.

On the Richland county side, the principal contest is for county commissioner. Two incumbents, John Selby and John Friday, seek renomination and reelection. Voters should consider whether these two men have served the electorate well, first of all. Let them not

think of whether their competition is adequate. That would be wrong. It is right that the feeling of "turn the rascals out" should predominate in any consideration of a candidate who is also the incumbent. If he has been a rascal, turn him out. If he has not been a rascal, reelect him.

It is as simple as that.

We feel the interest shown by some of the county commissioners in this part of the county leaves very much to be desired. It is many years since Plymouth township has had a county commissioner, and there is no candidate now. Mr. Brooks was induced to file for recorder.

So, for our part, we shall vote for a change. Virgil Yarger will get one of our votes.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and costs, and be imprisoned not more than Ten (10) days, or both.
