Tidswell Claim False, SCS Chief Asserts

Claims by Valoris Tidswell, North Fairfield farmer, that he never participated in the crop support program are false, Robert E. Finlay, office manager of the Huron county ASC committee, said Friday.

In September, 1953, Tidswell placed 1,391 bushels of the 1953 wheat crop under CCC price support loan, Finlay said, and in April, 1954, he delivered the wheat to the Boughtonville elevator for the account of the Commodity Credit Corp.

Further, Finlay said, Tidswell was seeding 95 acres of wheat for harvest in 1954, despite the fact that wheat allotments had been established for the protection of the loan program which was supporting the price of his 1953 crop.

Finlay called on Tidswell to admit that a quota of 41 acres of wheat on his 265 acres of cropland was a fair allotment by comparison with his neighbors' quotas.

Tidswell has been served two subpoenas to appear in Federal District court, Toledo, to answer to charges that he had intended the wheat quotas established for him last year.

Shiloh School Board Buys Old Garage For Conversion Into Classroom Space

100 Pupils to Be Put In Remodelled Site; Consideration \$7,000

Sale of the 40x70 feet brick garage at Mechanic and Main streets, Shiloh, to the Shiloh Local School District board of education was consummated Friday.

The building will be converted into a study room and two classrooms for about 100 seventh and eighth grade students.

Remodeling operations will start as soon as practicable, the board announced.

Consideration was \$7,000, paid from current assets of the board.

Purchase of the building will solve the space problem in Shiloh schools for the immediate future. It will also probably mean an end to discussions intended to lead toward consolidation of Shiloh and Plymouth school districts, observers were agreed.

Two who declined use of their names said they thought the Plymouth board "has been none too enthusiastic about consolidating and now that we have acquired the additional space, they won't feel we're under any compulsion to consolidate right now."

They said that acquisition of the space probably "improves Shiloh's position a little bit in the long run, because now we aren't under any pressure, and we can sit down and deal with the Plymouth board on equal terms."

The building was formerly occupied by Stanley Huston, then engaged in the farm implement business.

A survey recently conducted by Robert Lehman Associates, on a \$175,000 grant approved by the State Department of Education, may tip the scales in favor of consolidation.

The Shiloh board has agreed to make no public gesture for or against consolidation without unanimity among members and unless the Plymouth board consents.

The Lehman survey will go into detail with respect to housing and other factors relating to the two schools. Its report is hoped for by Sept. 1.

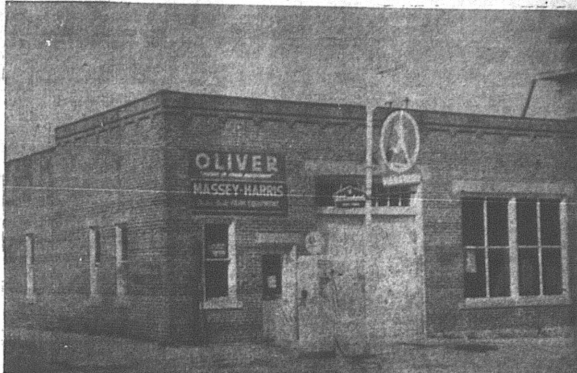
Mayor Asked to Ride Donkey at Tiro

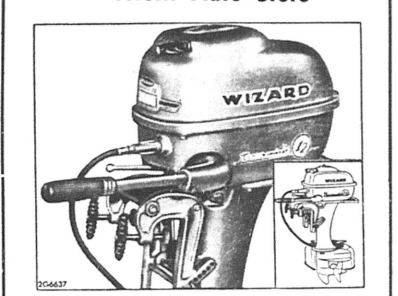

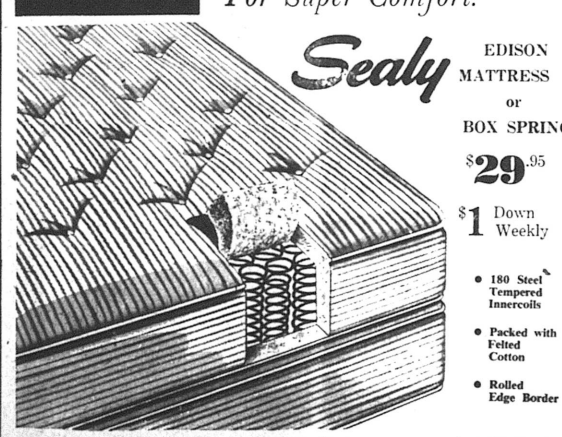

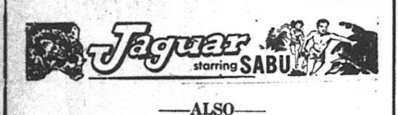

Gas Rates

Ohio Fuel Gas Co.'s proposal to raise rates for natural gas should give us all food for thought. There are some unfortunate facts to consider.

First, it is difficult, almost impossible, for the village to learn the true facts of costs and the figures which govern the permitted six per cent profit of the company. It would cost the village perhaps \$2,000 to make a fact-finding survey. Perhaps, after it is done, the facts would show that the average 26 per cent increase is warranted. We do not think so, but there is that possibility.

Second, increases are in order, all down the line. There is no question that it costs more to provide the service now than formerly. The question is how much more.

Third, a delay will serve us no purpose in the long run.

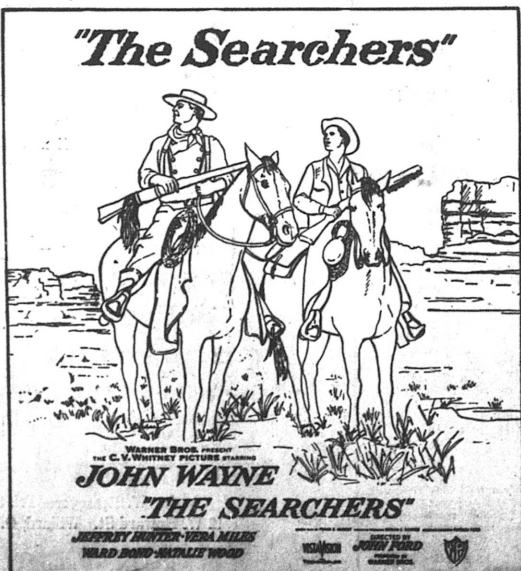

OHIO FARMERS to receive 2¢ per gallon refund for gasoline used on the farm!

A bill making farmers exempt from the 2¢ per gallon federal excise tax on gasoline and special fuel used on the farm was passed by Congress on March 28, 1956.

The refund to Ohio farmers will total over 2½ million dollars annually. It will reduce the individual farm gasoline bill in the state by 10%, based on present prices for regular gasoline.

In March, 1955, Farm Bureau, on behalf of its farmer members and patrons, initiated action for repeal of the 2¢ federal tax on gasoline used by all farmers in their farm work.

At that time little hope was held that Farm Bureau would successfully accomplish its goal. However, success came with the passage of Bill H.R. 8780 in March of this year.

This is another example of how Farm Bureau is working on the interests of you and other Ohio farmers. It offers another good reason for supporting your Farm Bureau Education and your local Farm Bureau Cooperative. It's simply a matter of progress, attained by working together.

TO GET YOUR REFUND...

fill out Form 2240... available at any Farm Bureau Cooperative.

First refunds will cover gasoline and special fuels purchased and used on farms after December 30, 1955.

To get your refund, you will have to file a claim after June 30 and before October 1—showing gasoline used during the first six months of this year.

Claims are to be made on Form 2240, which must be filed with the United States District Director of Internal Revenue for your district.

You may also request a refund on gasoline which is used on your farm by a custom operator or neighbor in connection with cultivating or spraying or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

In future years, claims will cover an entire fiscal year—July 1 to June 30.

Copies of Form 2240 will be available June 1. Farm Bureau patrons will receive necessary forms from their Farm Bureau petroleum servicemen. All farmers may get the form at local Farm Bureau Cooperatives.

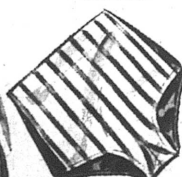

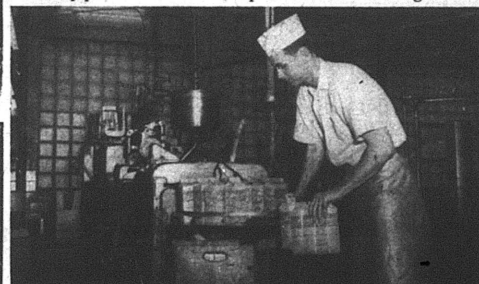

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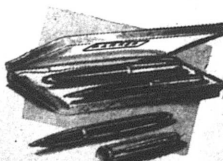
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
