

School Board Votes To Do Poll Ordered By County Board

Plymouth Board of Education agreed unanimously Tuesday night to comply with a request made last week by the Richland county board of education to conduct a public opinion survey concerning consolidation with the Shiloh system.

The Shiloh board made a similar decision at its regular meeting Monday night. Both boards received identical letters from the county board asking for a poll of opinion in the two school districts. The letter pointed out that since both districts cannot adequately support schools alone, the situation would have to be remedied, but it was felt that public opinion should be sampled before any decision were made. It suggested a new high school be built between Plymouth and Shiloh.

The Plymouth board also agreed Tuesday night to request the county board to create a citizens committee, to study the school problems of the county. After one year of study, proposals could be made to be placed on the ballot for vote at a general election. It also suggests the county board employ an impartial outside agency to make a school survey of the county in view of reorganization and subsequent location of any new building needs. The board feels that its suggestions, if carried out, will give an unbiased opinion for further action.

The school budget for 1956-57 was announced and approved. Clerk David Cook pointed out that the new budget totalling approximately \$146,000 shows an increase of nearly \$40,000, over the 1954 budget, which was approximately \$107,000. Harold Cushman, president of the board, observed that when he became a board member seven years ago, the yearly budget was half of this year's.

At the regular meeting July 10, the board turned down a proposal to purchase 50 new desks to be

used in the elementary school for seventh grade pupils. The costs of the desks, \$537.50, was prohibitive. Consequently, the seventh grade classes will again be held in the high school building. The room now used by the band will given over to the class, and the band will use the auditorium for practice.

A note in the amount of \$11,500 to the Peoples National bank was also renewed at this meeting. The money was borrowed earlier this year to pay current expenses of the school. It was hoped that enough tax money would be available this month to lower the debt. The loan must be paid before the end of this year under school regulations.

Chamber of Commerce will meet in the elementary school auditorium today at 8 p.m., president R. Earl McQuate announces. "We propose to discuss important business and therefore hope for a strong turnout," he said.

Whopping Budget Calls for \$40,000, County Share \$21,000

The loser of a substantial quantity of currency, wrapped and tied in a tight little roll, can recover it upon proper identification as to denomination and the contents of a note enclosed with it, Police Chief R. L. Meiser reports.

Shiloh Hits Cow

A Shiloh steer struck and killed a Jersey steer in Route 178 early yesterday.

George Spiger told Plymouth police he was unable to avoid hitting the steer, which with a companion animal was wondering aimlessly in the road. It belonged to Jack Reynolds.

Spiger's car was substantially damaged.

The steer was bled and will be converted to beef.

Ted Hartzell, Willard, was fined \$20 and costs in police court Tuesday on a charge of reckless driving.

Headed toward Mansfield on route 178, Hartzell overturned his car in front of the Jack Reynolds home outside Shiloh at 4 a.m. Tuesday. He and his passenger, Robert Younger, also of Willard, were taken to Willard Municipal hospital by McQuate's ambulance. Both were cut severely.

A whopping municipal budget calling for expenditures of \$40,000 — an increase of \$10,536.65 over last year — was unanimously approved by the village council in special session Saturday afternoon.

Revenues locally will account for only \$18,972.35 of the anticipated costs, and Richland county sources will be expected to make \$21,853.30 available to the village. This compares with about \$8,000 last year.

The principal increases have been laid to higher wages and salaries in some departments, notably law enforcement, fire protection and street maintenance; repair and maintenance of the village cemetery, the streets, and Mary Kate park, and for sewers and drains.

One reason why anticipated revenues are lower than normally is that classified property tax receipts are steadily declining. The council approved a budget anticipating \$900 revenue from the classified property tax in 1957. The figure in 1954 was \$3,473.43.

Sources attributed this situation to business practices. Retail and manufacturing establishments are holding smaller inventories, particularly when returns for personal property taxes are due.

The departure of some businesses which normally held big inventories is another contributing factor.

Another reason why anticipated revenues are lower is that persons who are likely to be interred in Greenlawn cemetery are not dying fast enough to produce the usual annual revenue of \$1,500 from the sale of lots there. Anticipated revenue for 1957 is only \$900.

The council thus guesses that 12 fewer persons will die in 1957 than expired in 1956.

Additional expense is attributed to the police department, where personal services are expected to be up by \$900; to the street department, where they are up \$200; the fire department, where they are up \$1,025, and the cemetery, up \$700.

The council took no action to correct the firemen's relief fund absence.

Sewer and drainage expenses are estimated to cost \$1,500, and street repair \$1,200.

One reason why the county is asked to contribute so much more this year is that the general fund balance is so low — about \$6,400 lower than last year at this time.

Meiser Resigns; Gas Increase Approved

Mayor Parkinson's Resignation Precipitated

A new gas rate ordinance calling for a 26 per cent increase over a five year period was approved unanimously by the village council Tuesday night, but the big news was the resignation of Police Chief Robert L. Meiser.

Waving an envelope bearing the return address of the Federal Electric Corp., Lodi, N. J., Meiser said he refuses to operate a police department without adequate equipment and told the council he is resigning at once, to take a post in the security organization of the firm which operates the Distane Early Warning project under joint United States-Canada management.

At the same time, Mayor Alfred Parkinson told the council by telephone he expects to be detained at his post in DEW-line until late in 1957, and asked that council meetings be changed to Saturday nights.

After discussion, the council instructed Clerk Carl V. Ellis to notify Parkinson this cannot be done. The move is expected to precipitate his resignation.

Before accepting the controversial gas rate ordinance with one minute concession, the council heard a tour de force by an acknowledged rate expert, W. D. Betsch, vice-president in charge of rates for Ohio Fuel Gas Co.

A caucus with the company's rate men out of the room resulted in one small concession. The delay of payment penalty clause, which the Fuel Gas company said would

save consumers about \$360 a year, was stricken from the ordinance.

Considerable time was occupied with the passing of emergency legislation relating to the sewer bond issuance the parking meter ordinance, to insure compliance with state law respecting placement of issues on the general election ballot.

The cut-and-dried, routine atmosphere of the proceedings, were enlivened by the appearance of the police chief, who had been on "Plains" in an angry mood, he charged the council had begrudged the department its rightful needs. "The police department takes in more than enough to pay for a new cruiser every year, and what happens?" he asked. "You expect me to do the job with a beat-up useless cruiser that won't go faster than 38 miles an hour, with a front-end shimmy and squealing brakes."

After Meiser left, Councilman Clarence Ervin observed he thought Meiser was "miffed" because he didn't get a new cruiser. He's a grown man, and should have learned that lesson at the same age I did, when my father took me over his knee for such conduct."

No further action was taken. Meiser has been marshal nine years, having taken the post two years after he was released from the Corps of Engineers of the army. He is 43.

Col. C. Phelan Dies; W. P. Schafer Dead

A malignant tumor of the brain caused the death Tuesday morning of Col. Christopher Phelan, husband of the former Betty Brown of this place.

Funeral services were conducted today at 11 a.m. at Hawthorne, N. Y., his home, with interment tomorrow with full military honors in Arlington National cemetery. In addition to his wife, Colonel Phelan is survived by two daughters, Kathy and Sarah, and a son, Christopher Stacy.

He had been hospitalized about six weeks ago.

William Prellip Succumbs

Funeral services were conducted Friday at the McQuate Funeral home for William F. Prellip by the Rev. Robert F. Hall, pastor of First Evangelical Lutheran church.

Mr. Prellip died July 11 in Willard Municipal hospital. He had been in failing health for some time. He was 72 and resided in Townline road, Ripley township.

He is survived by his wife, Mary, two daughters, Mrs. Frank Lillo and Mrs. Tony Lillo, both of Willard; Mrs. Harold Widmer, Mt. Pleasant, Mich.; Mrs. Glenn Boyce, Deshler; Mrs. John Rumbaugh, Shelby; and Mrs. Louis D'Alessandro of Orrville; two sons, Dale of Norwalk, and Harold of Willard; four sisters, two brothers, 15 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren.

Burial was in Greenlawn cemetery.

Funeral services were conducted July 7 in Los Angeles, Cal., for the brother of Mrs. Lou Hankammer, William P. Schafer.

Mr. Schafer died Independence day in the Veterans hospital, San Fernando, Cal., after a year's illness. He was 78.

He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war, having served in the Ohio National Guard. A banker, he had made his home in California since 1915.

He is survived by three other sisters, Mrs. Cora Day of Elyria, Mrs. Eva McLaughlin of Orlando, Fla., and Sarah Smith of Norwalk, died in 1953.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. John Remaly at the Bender Funeral home in Greenwich at 2:30 p.m. Saturday. Burial was in Edwards Grove cemetery.

He was a member of the Masonic Order and the Ripley Congregational church.

Besides the son in Shiloh, he is survived by two other sons, Virgil of Willard, and Frank of Shelby; a daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Williams of Willard; 17 grandchildren; and 12 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Priest Loses Barn in Fire; Ellis Loses Machinery

Plymouth volunteer firemen answered a fire call at 11:30 a.m. Thursday at the farm belonging to Mrs. Golda Priest off West Broad, way.

Unable to save the burning barn, firemen concentrated on keeping the flames confined. The barn burned completely to the ground within a few hours. A combine and grain wagon, belonging to William Ellis, who farmed the land for Mrs. Priest, were lost in the blaze. A small amount of hay stored in the top of the building was the only other lost.

The fire was discovered by David Sexton, who ran into the house adjoining the barn to tell father, Chester Sexton, that it was on fire.

One Killed, Five Hurt In Weekend Mishaps At Mansfield, Willard

A 16-year-old Celeryville girl was dead, three others were seriously injured, and the driver arrested on a charge of manslaughter in the second degree as the result of a 100-mile-an-hour chase Saturday night.

In another mishap, the linotypist in The Advertiser miraculously escaped death when his late-model Ford sedan struck a curb in Mansfield, flew 90 feet through the air, overturned twice, and plunged down a 27-foot embankment.

The dead girl is Glenda Watkins, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Armita Watkins, live on the farm of John F. Stambaugh in Beaver road west of here.

Her brother, Kenneth, 18, driver of the car which went out of control in Route 99 three miles south of Monroeville, snapped off a 10-inch tree, hit a steel pole, ran over a spring-toothed harrow and halted against a barn, is in jail.

Policemen had been pursuing the vehicle north in Route 99 after having received radio reports the car was proceeding erratically.

The Watkins girl's body was found in the car. Joyce Green, 15, Willard, was unconscious near it. Earnest Watkins, 22, Shiloh rural, uncle of the dead girl, had a broken back. Judy Watkins, 15, Willard, was removed with Earnest Watkins to Norwalk Memorial hospital with undetermined injuries.

Kenneth was found by police wandering in a daze near the scene, in the yard of the farm of Alvin Fritz.

He is in Huron county jail on three charges, of resisting arrest and reckless driving in addition to the manslaughter charge.

Harold Davis, Jr., 24-year-old dead linotypist in The Advertiser, overturned his sedan in Fourth Street road, Mansfield, at 1:15 a.m. Sunday.

He was knocked unconscious and sustained severe bruise scars to his right hand. How he escaped death or serious injury at the least mystified Mansfield police, who filed a charge of reckless operation against the youth. His employer paid a fine of \$10 and costs of \$6.20 in a Mansfield court Monday morning.

The car was a shambles.

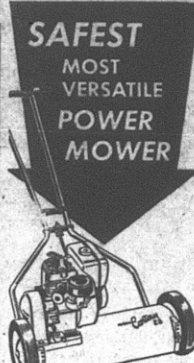

"Reason your readers couldn't identify our place is probably because it's just been painted," says Emery Grauer, who lives on the old Burgoyne place just east of Ganges.

On Parking Meters

We have until now held our peace on the subject of parking meters, confining our attitude to a sincere effort to get all the facts before the public as they came to light.

The letter received late last week rouses us from our summer lethargy, and the whopping big municipal budget merely compounds the sin.

The opinions voiced in the letter seem to be sincere and, we must confess, sound. It is not fair to castigate all businessmen of the village, because all businessmen do not oppose parking meters. They do not necessarily favor them, but they straddle the fence.

Not every businessman in the village is a signer of the petition calling for a referendum. Some of them who did put their signatures to the document because they felt the issue should be brought to a vote.

It is plain now that the council, in its earnest endeavor to allow argument on the subject to be brought to bear before passing the controversial ordinance, committed a strategic error. On hindsight, it would have been wiser to pass the ordinance as an emergency measure.

While this would have deprived the public of its right to initiate a referendum, those who organized in opposition could have carried the question to the common pleas court to obtain an injunction.

This would have required the village council to fight the issue before a judge duly elected by the people on legal, rather than emotional, grounds, when the issue was hot, and when there was a chance for the issue to be won.

But there is this to remember: the structure of taxation in America lies firmly on the principle that those best qualified to contribute to the support of government should pay the most.

Every community our size for several miles has parking meters. They seem to be a necessary evil of life. They exist primarily to raise money for municipal purposes. Every business community we know of fought like hell to defeat them. And we do not know of one that, now they are in and paying off, would take them out.

Be these facts as they may. It is important to keep in our minds that raising of municipal funds outside a nuisance tax — if you will call it that — means taxing those who live on fixed incomes that are already over-strained. Some of them maybe your mother. If she can bear it, well and good. If she can't, what then?

DOGS AND ACCIDENTS by Dr. E.M. Gildow Director, Friskies Research Kennels

Since most dogs are playful and venturesome, you may be called upon occasionally to provide first aid following minor mishaps. Major accidents will require a veterinarian's care.

A dog hurt in an accident nearly always suffers shock, which should be treated before cuts and breaks. Cover him

Dog of the Week:

CHIRUAKUA



Smooth coat: One to six pounds in weight. Coat, soft, silky, close and glossy. Long coat: Two to eight pounds in weight. Coat, soft, silky, flat or slightly curly, with undercoat. Colors: solid, marked or splashed. Fifth in popularity.

Warmly and administer a stimulant. Coffee with cream and sugar is excellent. Don't give alcohol; it is a depressant.

Apply pressure bandages or tourniquets for bleeding wounds. Don't keep them in place too long, for damage to the tissues may result. Stop excessive bleeding by holding a boric-acid pack against the wound as tightly as possible until it can be properly bandaged. Deep cuts should be stitched.

Broken bones should also be treated professionally. Straighten broken legs, taking care not to cut a blood vessel with the sharp bone edges. Apply a splint, a stick or straight piece of wood, by laying it along the leg and taping it above and below the break. Never move a dog with broken ribs, pelvis or shoulder blade. Send for a vet.

A dog may bite when in pain. Loop a bandage around his muzzle, tie a knot under the chin, bring it around the head and knot again behind the ears.

Puppies are occasionally knocked unconscious when they chew electric cords. Here, as in drowning, artificial respiration should be given. Press in and out on the dog's ribs just back of the front legs, at the rate of about 20 pushes a minute.

Feeding Tips: Although some fat is essential in a dog's diet, don't add too much. Most commercial dog foods, such as Friskies, already contain enough. Too much fat may reduce the food eaten by growing pups so they don't get sufficient essential nutrients for normal growth. In older dogs, it may cause overeating.
