## No change in service foreseen if B&O wins try to stop Nos. 245-6

No change in rail service to Plymouth will be effected if B & O trains Nos. 245 and 246 between Willard and Chicago, Ill., are discontinued. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has proposed to do this in applications filed with Ohio and Indiana authorities.

Applications to the Public Service Commission of Indiana and the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio request authority to make the changes coincident with the general change of schedules on Oct. 28.

Trains Nos. 245 and 246 now operate between Wheeling, W. Va., and Chicago, via Willard. The two trains would continue in service between Wheeling and Willard, and through mail, express and passenger cars would continue to operate between Wheeling and Chicago. However, after Oct. 28 these trains Nos. 8 and 9 between Willard and Chicago.

Lack of patronage and continued heavy financial losses from the operation of these trains between Willard and Chicago are responsible for the proposed changes, B & O officials pointed out.

The last run of Train No. 245 would leave Willard at 5:30 a.m. on Oct. 27, while the last run of Train No. 246 would leave Chicago at 8:30 a.m. on the same date. Railroad officials report total direct expense of operating the trains between the points involved was \$532,443, while revenue totaled \$179,000, resulting in a direct loss of \$353,443 in 1945. The combined direct revenue for the entire annual operation of the trains was \$480,000 to the B & O.

## Rough Riders surprise league in first annual pre-view here

A surprising Townsend-Wakeman eleven, smartly coached by Tony Aiello, upset the dope in the first pre-view of the North Central conference here Friday night.

The Rough Riders showed they won't be doormats of the new league by thumping vaunted Berlin Heights, 12 to 6, after eking out a 7 to 6 defeat of Plymouth's Pilgrims.

The Pilgrims knelt in prayer, as is their custom, at the outset of the first match of the evening before about 350 well-chilled fans. That prayer was all they had for the first five minutes. The Rough Riders pushed them ruthlessly from their 40 after the kickoff in a sustained drive that covered 60 yards before Tom Friend scooped over for the score from 12 yards out. Big Bing Reynolds booted the conversion.

Plymouth was unable to gain on the first series, punted, and forced the Rough Riders to fumble on their own 28. Jim Hunt took Ray Einsel's pitch around right end to within spitting distance of the goal, from where Einsel scooped

over. Ted Fox tried to convert, but the pass from center was poor. The whistle blew before either team was able to get going again after Hunt's kickoff.

IN A BATTLE OF TIGERS, Berlin Heights came off the better. Paul Olson, husky running back, carried the burden of Coach Soag Sanders' multiple offense and carried successfully to the Lodi 21 before Dewey Acord, the other half of the Berlin Heights attack, whipped around end for the score.

Lodi was able to advance into Berlin Heights territory after the ensuing kickoff, and racked up three first downs. John Ferguson carried the mail to the 32. "We Berlin Heights held," Lucas' punt was held on fair catch on the winners' 24 when the game ended.

## Pilgrims begin season against Green Springs

If the Green Springs Bobcats lose their season opener to Plymouth tomorrow night — and the signs are they will — they can blame 1) the New York Central railroad and 2) the Ohio Highway department.

The railroad is an accessory before the fact. Work on the right-of-way in Seneca and Sandusky counties (Green Springs, like Plymouth, is halved by the county line) necessitated a number of laborers. High school boys jumped at the chance to work for \$75 a week, refused to quit when Coach Bud Rutherford nixed the call for candidates for the 1956 season on Aug. 20.

THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT is an accessory after the fact, but just as guilty. Eight Green Springs youths, including four starters, were involved in a head-on crash on a narrow bridge in Route 113 west of the village. Result: eight fewer men on the squad, reduced to 21, and four regulars lost for the season (The squad was down to 15 until school started.)

Fortunately for Rutherford, the accident did not involve his two all-Star Wood county league players, Marv Fought, senior halfback, and Dale Solze, end.

But the mishap did take his quarterback, Jerry Schroek, and so with only 10 days to go before the pre-view at Bloomdale Friday night, Rutherford had to switch from the solt to the single wing. Green Springs lost 0 to 13.

"You don't need a quarterback with the single wing — anybody can call the plays — and if you've got a boy who can run like the dickens and one good blocker, you can make it work," Rutherford says. "But without those other eight boys,

we can't scrimmage at all."

THE NEW YORK CENTRAL railroad isn't painted so black as Green Springs as Rutherford's observations would suggest. The boys who are reporting before the opening of school are in first-class physical condition. "Now if they can only learn assignments and play patterns before the Plymouth game, we'll give Plymouth a real scrap," says the young Kent State graduate, who was a roommate of young Charles Hannum there.

The Bobcats ran up an 18-game losing streak before winning two last year. Probable starters are Solze and Carroll Dexter, ends; Jack Little and Leroy Humbert, tackles; Mike Lippert, and Don Beard guards; Don Gilbert, center; Jim Joseph, quarterback; Fought and Joe Salazar, halfbacks and Jack Humbert fullback.

Green Springs is a community of 1,200 in the northern part of Seneca county. It is exactly 40 miles from Plymouth by the fastest and safest route: Route 224 to Route 99, thence to Monroeville, turn left in Route 20, proceed through Bellevue, turning into Route 113 two miles west of that city. Route 113 runs 11 miles to Green Springs. Turn right at Main street and proceed three blocks to the school, a handsome new structure. Driving time: one hour.

Coach Lew Pettit thought his Pilgrims did well Friday night "after they got rid of the butterflies."

He plans to start Ted Fox and Jim Fidler on the flanks, Jim Jacobs and Duane Uiss (if he's recovered from poison ivy) at tackles, Don Barnhouse and Jim Wasterman at guards and Franklin Eckstein at center.

## Celeryville school seeks funds for new building

A drive for funds for a new elementary Christian school building at Celeryville will be made this week.

The building being used now was purchased from the Willard Board of Education in 1922. It has become inadequate both as to type of construction and to size. Several architects have been solicited in order to determine the cost of a modern elementary school building.

A recent survey by the community showed a need for immediate action. Present enrollment — about 35 — has outgrown the facilities. A census of the community indicates the enrollment

will have at least a 50 per cent increase by 1960. Plans are being considered for the establishment of a kindergarten and the addition of a ninth grade.

The school will be built and operated by free will gifts of the members of the school society.

Fred Van Zoest, chairman of the planning and finance committee announces that members of the drive committee met for instructions and an inspirational address Monday evening. Following the address the drive members will call upon the people of the community to ask for donations for the school.

## School question needs aid

It is not too much to hope, we believe, that patrons of the Plymouth and Shiloh local school districts will accede to the request of the boards of education by participating in the postal card poll.

Both boards report spasmodic, sporadic and spastic response to their appeals.

There is no reason why the cards should not be filled out and returned. It requires no signature. It needs only an expression of opinion without the dreaded sticking out of the neck.

If there are those who have not re-

ceived a card, a call or a note in the mails to Superintendents Beard or Coon or to the clerks or members of the school boards will suffice to obtain one.

**This has gone far enough. If the people want consolidation, let them speak up now. If they do not want it, let them also speak.**

There are nearly 1,200 boys and girls whose futures are at stake. Don't they deserve the benefit of a few minutes of consideration of the issues involved and the expressing of an opinion on the post card? We think so. Act now.

## On throwing rocks

A man whose business ability we respect and whose judgment we trust told us the other day he wouldn't go to village council meetings to complain about what he's certain is mismanagement because he'd be "throwing rocks at my cash register."

We never looked at it that way. Certainly few have done any more complaining about mismanagement, or what we think to be mismanagement, than we have, and our book-keeping system, modest though it is, doesn't reflect losses attributable to anger with the position we take or don't take.

There may be some losses. Part of them are due to the natural orneryness of people. It's like in a crap game, there are always more no bettors than yes bettors.

Folks would rather say "I stopped my subscription because he came out against Joe McCarthy" than admit the cold fact: Joe McCarthy is a dead

pigeon, and the editor — dang his hide — was right.

Fact is, we're selling more copies of The Advertiser and sending more out to paid-up subscribers than ever before. We honestly think this is because we are delivering a quality product, one people recognize for what it is regardless of what they think of the editor's personal beliefs. (And make no mistake about it, the editor knows a majority of the people don't agree with him.)

And that's the kind of advice we would give the man who is afraid of throwing rocks at his cash register. If you deal in quality — and this chap does, more so than his competitors (if you'll tell us and inquire politely, we may come to you who he is) — and are regular, punctual and fair about it, no amount of honest complaining will hurt the cash register very much for very long.

Or at least that's the way it seems to us.

**FOR ONE THING, THE CHAP HAS A** name that doesn't ring of New Englandism, although Yankees can't seem to realize that most of Poland, England and U. S. citizenship of latter day immigrants. The Portuguese and Italians are in great number in Providence, R. I., and Fall River, Mass., two historic New England cities.

There are more Irish in Boston than in Dublin. Once, early in World War II, a refugee family in Boston, name of Cabots, which fled from Poland, applied for U. S. citizenship in the district court. In connection with the application, a petition for change of name was appended. The family wished to change its name to Cabot. Logical, neat, easy to pronounce, and sensible. But not in Boston.

It so happens there is another family of the same name in that city which prides itself on its earlier settlement. Matter of fact, its pride had become legend there, in the poem which goes:

"Here's to good old Boston,  
The land of the bean and the cod,  
Where the Lowells speak only to Cabots,  
And the Cabots speak only to God."

The Cabots filed a cross-petition to deny the application of the Cabotsky's.

This prompted a devil-may-care copy reader on the rim in the city room of the old Boston Transcript to pen these immortal lines:

"Here's to good old Boston,  
The land of the bean and the cod,  
Where the Lowells speak only to Cabots,  
And the Cabots are Jewish, by God!"

This levity is not appreciated in small town New England. We were intrigued with conclusions the author's is purported to have made about small town life in Yankee-land: that a first family of the town is willing to have knowledge of an illicit romance of one of its daughters become public property than to let it be known that any of the family has been accused or guilty of stealing.

Certainly this is a misconstrued sense of values. Stealing is petty larceny, in our code of laws, and punishable by minor sentences or fines. Illicit love affairs are foolery, particularly if seduction, carnal knowledge of a female below the legal age of consent, adultery, spouse-stealing, or public exposure and witness is involved.

And it's peculiar how folks want to keep things quiet that shouldn't be kept quiet, and how they want to spout off facts that should be kept on the kew-tee until the time is ripe.

We've always thought it a bit indecent (and we admit we're old-fashioned and Victorian on this) for a lady to reveal that she is in a delicate condition until that condition reveals itself.

**BUT SOME OF THE THINGS ONE READS** — and hears — are so fresh (and we don't care how you take it) that you wonder if the publishers (one who broadcasts, reveals, tells or prints news is a publisher, whether or not he has a newspaper or radio or TV station) were there to witness the deed.

What brings all this to mind this tepid and steaming Labor day weekend is the news that a lady in New England, wife of a school teacher, has published a novel which is said — not by her — to be an expose of what goes on in small town life in Yankee-land.

We haven't read the novel. It hasn't hit the book store yet. What's out is mostly advance publicity from the publishing house, naturally anxious to whoop up a strong sale of copies.

Of course, the author is in the chins already, because a motion picture outfit has taken an option on the yarn.

But things have happened. Whether they're connected to the writing and publication of the story is problematical and depends upon how you look at it. For one thing, her husband, who was an elementary school principal in their town, got booted from his job. The story from the board of education is "there were personal difficulties be-

## Unhealthy water, state argues

The Huron river is dangerous to public health and safety so long as Plymouth dumps untreated sewage into it. The state department of health says so.

It cites statistical data collected by laboratory technicians to prove it. Example: at the outlet of the Huron river into Lake Erie, a sample of water taken weekly was averaged over a 12-month period. The average was 21,700 coli bacteria per 100 milliliters of water.

U. S. Public Health service approves 5,000 coli bacteria per 100 milliliters of water as a minimum satisfactory standard of safe raw water supply prior to treatment in municipal waterworks.

Cumulative coli bacteria at the outlet of the river into Lake Erie naturally represents dumping of Plymouth, Monroeville, and other towns downstream. "The state water-pollution control board asserts."

"At every place below Plymouth, the coli bacteria count exceeds 5,000 per 100 milliliters of water."

That figure of 5,000 coli per 100 milliliters of water applies only to simple water treatment by small communities. The figure for larger cities, with elaborate water treatment plants, such as are common in communities like Toledo, Cleveland, Lorain, and the like, is 20,000.

"The count at the outlet of the Huron river is a measure of the broader accepted standard of 20,000 coli per 100 milliliters of water," the state board of health says.

**CONCLUSION: DON'T** believe those who say the water is purified after it runs over sand and gravel a few miles. They don't know what they're

talking about.

Why hasn't there been an outbreak of disease, then, if the water is so impure?

The state board of health cites several statistical tables to overcome this argument. Unfortunately, none is broken down to individual communities such as Monroeville.

But do people in Monroeville become sick because the water they drink contains sewage from Plymouth?

Nobody knows. Physicians report diseases attributable to water parasites and bacteria when there is evidence they are directly attributable to ingested water. But what of those which are carried by water, or may be carried by water?

Who knows what causes infantile paralysis? Scientists know, but they don't know how it's carried. It could be water, sewage-laden water, they argue. Until they know it isn't, they suggest that water should be kept free of sewage bacteria.

And who is Plymouth doesn't use Lake Erie as a playground. Of a recent Thursday, no less than 42 residents of the village disappeared themselves in Sandusky bay for the afternoon, at fishing, swimming, picnicking.

What risk were they taking? "In 1953," reports the department of health, "a report was made on a pollution survey of Lake Erie, conducted by the division of water of the department of natural resources with the cooperation of the division of sanitary engineering of the department of health under a \$100,000 appropriation by the Ohio legislature. This survey also included checks on tributaries of Lake Erie."

"In this survey, it was reported that of 28 bathing beaches checked across the width of the state on Lake Erie, only 11 were found acceptable throughout the entire survey period. This is based on the U. S. Public Health service standard of not more than 1,000 coli bacteria per 100 milliliters of water. All other

beaches had a higher bacteria count either part or all of the time."

**HAS THE FARMER ANY** complaint?

Citing a similar report, the state department of health says, "Pollution discharged to the streams has had a serious effect on some of the legitimate water users. Livestock water supplies have been reduced in quality by wastes in some of the sub-basin streams. This damage has occurred principally in tributaries of the Portage, Huron, Black, Rocky and Chagrin rivers."

Does a fish that swims in polluted water become unsafe for eating? Doesn't cooking destroy the bacteria? Perhaps.

Only perhaps, says the state. Does pollution inhibit or depress the development and breeding of fish? Emphatically, yes, says the fish and game commission.

Upshot of the whole problem? Would you, John Citizen — or Mrs. John C. — drink a quart of water taken from below the Plymouth East road bridge? And if you did, what would Dr. Faust, Hannum, Butner say about it?

That, argues the state water pollution control board, is the reason why the sewer bond issue will be on the November ballot.
