

Pilgrims swamp Ashland reserves, 49 to 0

If he doesn't score another point all season, Eddie Taylor has nothing to be ashamed of.

In a stellar performance at Mary Fale park Saturday afternoon, Taylor romped 44, 35, 60 and 79 yards for touchdowns and bucked for an extra point for 25 markers, bringing his season total in two games to 43.

The Pilgrims downed Ashland's reserves, 49 to 0, in a contest which saw Plymouth rack up 531 yards from scrimmage, plus another 45 in the air. Ashland wound up with a net yardage of eight, all on the ground.

THE RED AND WHITE asserted its superiority early in the game. On the first down series,

Taylor danced 44 yards for a score. Jim Hunt bucked for the extra point.

When the Pilgrims gain come into possession, Taylor repeated. This time he went 35 yards.

Before the first quarter was up, the Pilgrims had another score when Jim Hunt went 73 yards for a punt return. Mickey Hampton racked up the extra point. The Pilgrims added another 21 points in the second period. Taylor took a pitchout from Dick Akers and romped 60 yards, reversing his field twice. Ray Emsel hit Ted Fox between the eyes with a 24-yard heave nine plays later to raise the count to 34. Jim Fidler nailed another toss for the extra point.

LESS THAN 51 SECONDS later, Taylor took a handoff from Emsel on his 21, snaked through the entire Ashland eleven, reversed his field three times, and went untouched into pay dirt. Even against second-stringers, it was a classic performance of broken field running.

Duane Utiss got the final Pilgrim score with a two-yard buck in the third canto.

Taylor raced through tackle for the conversion. It was a dull contest. The Plymouth coach of strategy had rigged up a two-way telephone system between the bench and the press box, intending to have an experienced spotter advise the Pilgrim defense. Even before the spotter could conclude the apparatus wouldn't work, there was no need for it.

The Pilgrim band cavorted during halftime in what was, for it, better than average exhibition. A small but enthusiastic crowd witnessed the slaughter, dodging raindrops during the 48 minutes of travesty.

The Pilgrims open their 1956 North Central conference schedule at Seville tomorrow at 8 p.m. against weak Barber eleven coached by Dick Brockett.

Whether Mickey Hampton, who was carried from the field with a twisted knee, will be able to play is problematical. The Pilgrims (on form and past record are favored to win by three touchdowns, although Coach Lew Pettit will pro-

bably hold down the Pilgrim gunfire to avoid revealing his hand to Berlin Heights scouts.

THE BIG COUNTER OF THE season, so far as football at home goes, will be played here the Friday following against a steadily improving Berlin Heights squad.

On Tuesday, Oct. 9, I expect to make a motion to the Plymouth Board of Education to adopt a resolution asking the Richland county board of education to effect a consolidation between the Plymouth and Shiloh school districts.

I am doing this because I feel this is a step that is absolutely essential if we are to assure our children the best education we can give them.

Knowing this to be somewhat of a controversial move, am inviting all of you to this meeting, so that you may make your wishes known to your respective boards and so that you may gain further information or have your questions answered.

To this end, I am inviting to this meeting Mr. Dale Kinney, county superintendent; the members of the county board of education, and the members of the Shiloh board of education. We also expect to have a letter from Dr. Hay, our representative to the state board of education, which will give us the attitude and intent of the state board as he sees it.

At this meeting you will be able to get the information you want and your questions answered. You will be able to voice your opinions and will help in deciding whether this consolidation will take place, and how soon.

If you have any interest in our children or our schools, it is your duty to come and help us decide this vital issue.

The meeting is Tuesday, Oct. 9, at 8 p.m. in Plymouth High school.

Only pupils happy as water pipe fails in local school

An already sorely beset Board of Education came to grief Tuesday afternoon. A water pipe in the elementary school burst and flooded the basement.

While workmen drilled through the floor of the elementary school to seek the source of the leak, pupils were dismissed and told to return until the water pipe can be repaired.

Employees of Roth Bros., which installed the pipe eight years ago, worked much of Tuesday night to find the leak, which they said was spewing water at the rate of 875 cubic feet an hour.

With insufficient funds to operate the schools comfortably between now and the end of the year, the Board of Education will now need to find sources of money with which to pay for the repairs.

There is no doubt that his resignation will be accepted.

Thurman R. Ford, president pro tem of the council, has been acting as mayor since Parkinson obtained a 30-day leave of absence nearly six months ago. The council has extended that leave on request since that time.

Ford will succeed officially to the mayship. His elevation formally will create a vacancy on the village council and the need to elect a new council president.

Married and the father of a son, a junior in Ohio State University, Parkinson has lived here since he was assigned to Shelby Air Force depot.

Two boys avert death when train hits car

Two New Haven youths narrowly escaped death Sept. 19 when their sedan stalled on the Baltimore & Ohio crossing northwest of here and was struck by a 95-car freight. They were Doyle Tuttle, 18, and his brother, Jethrow, 13.

The smaller boy received minor elbow and back injuries when he leaped from the car seconds before it was hit by the train bound from Newark to Willard.

The boys live in Route 598 south of the crossing. They were driving a 1951 model car. It stalled on the tracks after Doyle Tuttle had seen the lights of the approaching train. The locomotive struck the car, whose front end was astride the tracks, and turned it end for end. Seventy cars of the train crossed the point of impact before the engineer, W. B. Fowler, 60, Newark, was able to bring it to a halt.

There is no flasher warning light at the crossing.

Essay contests mark newspaper week

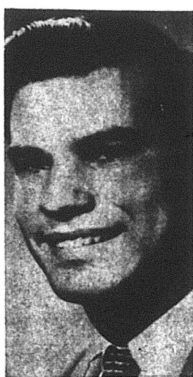

A 29.01 per cent sampling of opinion of patrons of Shiloh local school district shows a narrow margin for consolidation with Plymouth and erection of a new school midway between the two villages.

Supt. Homer V. Beard announced Tuesday that 168 replies were received to 579 cards sent out by the Shiloh board on the order of the Richland county board.

TO QUESTION 1, WHETHER support would be given to a bond issue to build a new school midway between Plymouth and Shiloh, the response was 85 in favor, 81 not in favor, with two no opinions.

TO QUESTION 2, WHETHER a bond issue would be supported if no specific location of a new school is stipulated, the response was 29 for, 120 against, 19 no opinion.

ON QUESTION 3 — The matter of an outside survey — opinion was almost equally split: 33 for, 99 against, 36 no opinion. Fifty-seven patrons pencilled in comments of various types.

We admire the forthright courage of Mr. Cook, member of the school board, in openly stating he is for consolidation of Plymouth and Shiloh schools and that he intends to do something about it.

For he knows that his notion is an unpopular one, particularly with his colleagues, and to some extent among patrons of the school district. His motion may fail of a second.

It may be worth while to invite to the board's attention the intent of Robert's Rules of Order in such parliamentary proceedings, and we quote from our dog-eared copy: "The seconding of a motion does not necessarily imply endorsement of it, but that the seconder may wish it to be subjected to a vote. Seconding a motion merely forces the body to ex-

press an opinion."

By the same token, failure of a second must be taken to mean that members do not wish the matter to be brought to a vote.

The board has had time to study the matter, and it is reasonable, we think, to expect the board to make up its mind. Surely, after this time, it is unreasonable for the board to hold that it has insufficient information.

For our part, we are still for consolidation. But if the board can cite cogent and effective reasons why consolidation is an unsatisfactory solution, we shall back the board in its decision and work with it toward some other solution.

In any event, it is the citizen's duty to attend the meeting.

Ralph Felix, good citizen

Although he has made no secret of his intentions, the resignation of the Rev. Ralph M. Felix as pastor of First Presbyterian church comes as a blow to us.

He has earned his retreat. For 37 years he has served the Christian ministry well and faithfully, and now he has reached the point when social advancements of the type he has always preached permit him to lessen his burdens somewhat.

Of two facts we are certain: he will never lay down the spirited and vigorous encouragement of Christian principles among the faithful, the faithless, and the back sliders, and he will not likely be told of how valuable and valued he was until he is long gone away.

Toward the end of September, we always experience that delightful feeling that we are about to witness America at its best — at games.

The World's Series is upon us — and there need be no doubt as to where our sentiments, and our money, lie — and young men all over the nation, for fun or for money, mostly the latter, are beginning to kick the pikein.

Every four years we are snatched up in America's greatest game, politics. The adversaries this year are not less illustrious than in previous ones, despite the almost universal opinion the Old Man will win hands down.

WE MAY BE PARDONED, WE THINK, for the appellation: he was that to us when we served on his staff many years ago. It is that way in the Army. The unit commander may still be slicking down hairs on his chin with warm milk, but his subordinates habitually refer to him as the Old Man.

A great many people think Mr. Eisenhower will wind up a convincing victor. It takes a conservative thinker like David Lawrence, and if there are more conservative thinkers in our modern history, few have ever broken into print, to point out that a Democratic win over Lee and the Republicans is not so fantastic after all.

He points out, rather convincingly, that Stevenson is an odds-on chance to recapture the Solid South, which deserted him in 1952, principally because of the leadership of Governor Shivers of Texas. And so we dug into this a little. Here's how it looks:

With this bloc of electoral votes, Stevenson need only win his home state, Illinois; Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Michigan, Missouri, Rhode Island, Washington and West Virginia to move into the White House.

It is that way in life. We all come to expect it. Doubtless his parishioners will wish to remember him when the fateful day of his departure comes, and we hope to be among the contributors.

But the real reward to any man engaged in such work is to know and see and feel and hear that what he does is appreciated. And the way to do it is to tell him so, to show him, every day. When you pass him in the street, tell Ralph Felix what a fine chap he is and what a good job he has done.

And if you're a little bashful, tell his wife. She will tell him, and besides, she deserves every bit as much praise as he does.

His total of electoral votes would be 273. He needs 267 to win.

Thus the Democrats are in an enviable position. With the Solid South sewed up, all they need do is concentrate upon four cities: Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston and Detroit.

Not that three of them aren't Democratic strongholds in normal times, anyway. But if the party can get out the vote like it has gotten out the registrations, it can pile up more than enough urban lead to offset any rural, downstate-or-upstate votes in the Republican column.

The other states are usually Democratic. Little Rhody, Minnesota, Washington, Missouri and West Virginia have strong Democratic candidates running on the local ticket: men like Theodore Green, Hubert Humphrey, Warren Magnuson.

If you were running Adlai's campaign, wouldn't it be a lot easier to concentrate your heavy fire on four cities than to spread it about — and thus weaken it — all over the nation?

If we had to bet on the outcome of the November elections, we'd bet on Eisenhower winning by a small margin. But we'd also copper that bet with something on Stevenson coming close.

The distressing thing about all this is that unless we country folks get out and vote to beat the hell, we are apt to lose the election by default. Makes no difference whether you're Republican or Democrat, if you allow one group of people to run an election, you lose.

Another sad fact is that Ohio doesn't count for much. The Democrats won't be losing anything if Ohio goes to Republican. They're not counting on it. And they won't be frightened if New York, New Jersey and California go GOP.

But when you're watching those election returns, keep your eyes open for what's happening in Massachusetts, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Missouri and Arizona.

If they go Democratic, Adlai's in. Don't say we didn't tell you.

Laugh of the week: after what we've said openly about the man and his character, and called it to his attention by sending marked copies, George H. Bender this week sent us a dun for campaign funds. Fat chance, George. We go along with P. H. Root on the matter — anybody but you.

Other Plymouths, towns same size have sewers

What the other fellow has is, claims an outstanding social psychologist, the motivation of the American white citizen.

It's what makes him put himself into hock with the bank or the loan company. So much so that installment credit is the basic characteristic of American family life.

What the other fellow has collectively has less impact on the average white citizen than what he has individually, but in regions where the venturesome spirit has not been siphoned off or run stagnant, it counts.

SO HERE'S A LOOK AT what other towns have in the way of sewer treatment services and what it costs.

Plymouth, Mich., is a city of 6,649, official 1950 census. City authorities estimate it is now 8,114.

The tax duplicate of the corporation is \$16.73 million, based upon 35 to 40 per cent of real values.

Raw sewage in Plymouth is treated in facilities managed by the Wayne county road commissioners. Plymouth taxpayers support the system through the county administration tax structure.

Cost? A nickel a thousand gallons of water used. Tapping charge? \$400. A new system, to implement the old one, maintains the same charge for tapping, but boosts the water charge to 12 cents a thousand gallons.

Why a new system, when the old one was only started in 1940? Plymouth has grown so much. New industry has been attracted by modern facilities. Twenty-five per cent of the tax bill is paid by industry within the corporate limits. In 1940 the figure was only four per cent.

MARK UP ONE TOWN that found a sewer system to be a good investment.

Plymouth, Ill., "the best little town in Western Illinois", was founded in 1832. Once it had a population of over 1,500. That was when oil fields in that region came into production. Population now is estimated to be 275, an increase of 21 since the last official census.

Tax duplicate of the town: \$1,027,663, representing 60 per cent of the real worth of property in its corporate limits.

But little Plymouth, which in the past five years has built a new school building, constructed a new gymnasium, and bonded its school district to the legal limit to do it, has a sewer proposal before it. The village board is actively pursuing ways of implementing the proposal.

A little closer to home, consider the village of Lodi, 37 miles east of this place. Population at the last official census was 1,560. Estimated population now: 1,885.

A sewer treatment plant has been installed. It services the village. Same type and capacity as that planned for Plymouth.

COST TO THE USER: 60 per cent of his water bill. Present minimum in Lodi is \$4.50 per quarter for 6,000 gallons. Board of Public Affairs has asked for a 25 per cent increase. This will make the sewer bill amount to \$3.60 a quarter for the minimum user, or \$10.80 annually. Tax levies to settle general obligation bonds bring the local cost per household to \$19.

Why was it so cheap? City fathers had the foresight to install suitable sewer conduits many years ago. The expense of installing a treatment plant was kept below \$100,000.

"The penalty you pay for delay," says Royce Eaken, superintendent of water, light, power, and sewer at Lodi, "is increased expense when you get down to doing it. We certainly found that out."

That's what other towns have. And the state board of health insists that's why the sewer issue will appear on the ballot in November.

Here's a new dessert idea: Cook quick-cooking rice in reconstituted frozen orange juice. Stir in a tablespoon of butter, and some sliced dates and slivered almonds or other nuts. Serve warm with cream.

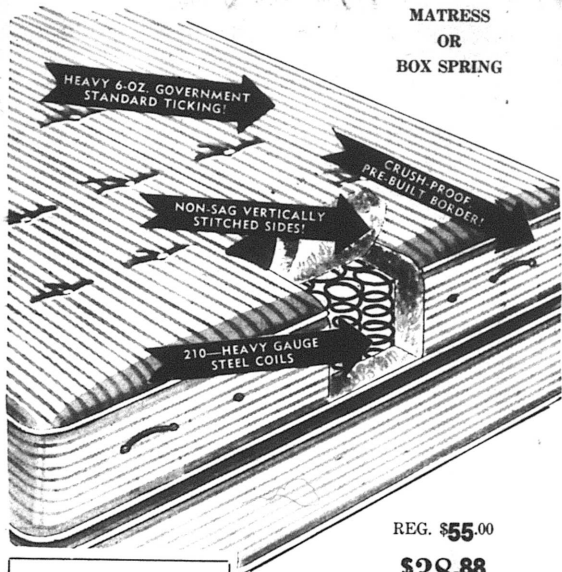

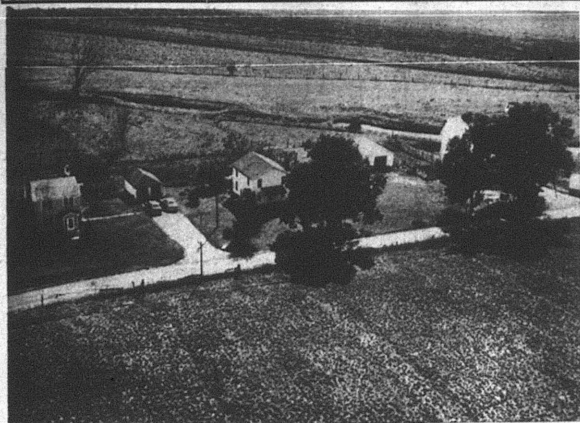
