

Fackler protests 'irregularities', Cass to select ASC slate again

An election in which Cass Township farmers will vote Agriculture Soil Conservation community committees is forthcoming.

Dorman Wright, administrative assistant in the Ohio Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office, says that until the election is held, the present committees will continue to represent Cass township.

Wright said no date has been set for the election, but indicated that it would be held after the three-member state committee meets to consider an appeal filed by Fackler of Shelby route 3, that the Aug. 20 ASC elections in Richland county be declared invalid.

The state committee has no set meeting dates, and unless a special meeting is called, it possibly will be three weeks before the appeal is considered.

PRIOR TO THE AUG. 20 countywide elections, no nominations were made in Cass township. Ballots were picked up in Plymouth and Jackson townships, however, and Cass township farmers used them to write in the names of five, who in addition to Fackler were Edgar Davies, Ross Fackler, Alden Loftland and Carl Sparks, none of whom were community committeemen last year.

This write-in vote, according to Fackler in his appeal, was considered null and void.

The Cass township vote was one of the objections Fackler has as to the "procedure" in which the county-wide election was conducted.

Fackler's appeal was prepared and filed with the Ohio ASC committee Aug. 27 by John G. Wood of Lucas route 2 president of the Associated Farmers of Rich-

land County, Inc. Fackler, secretary of the organization said "procedures" rather than "results" of the election prompted filing of the appeal.

Fackler cited in his appeal a section of the Ohio ASC committee handbook, revised in June, 1955, which states that ballots "shall contain sufficient blank lines to permit voters to enter the names of candidates of their own choice."

SINCE NO NOMINATIONS were received from Cass township by the set deadline, the ASC office had said that the present committeemen in Cass would continue to represent the township.

Other objections in the appeal pertained to the procedure in which votes were tabulated, the checking of the eligibility of the voters, and the number of votes cast in Troy Jefferson, Milfill and Perry townships.

Fackler said in his appeal that identification envelopes containing the ballots were removed and only

the ballots were shown the tabulation board. "Under this procedure the board is unable to check voters' eligibility and therefore any number of unidentified ballots may be inserted for tabulation."

Fackler also said that at no time was the county office manager consulted on the eligibility of any voter during the counting by the tabulation board.

He asked in his appeal that elections in Troy, Jefferson, Milfill and Perry townships be declared invalid because of the low number of farmers taking part in the election.

His appeal states that in Troy only nine voters balloted of a possible number of approximately 125 farmers eligible. "A similar situation showing very poor voting representation was indicated in the balloting of . . . Jefferson township, 13 voters out of 200 estimated."

Fackler called for new elections to be held in all townships of Richland county.

Mayor's leave given 30-day extension

Convinced it can't take action short of filing charges of misconduct, which it knows wouldn't stick, the village council with some reluctance granted another 30-day extension of the leave of absence of Mayor Alfred Parkinson Tuesday night.

Solicitor Joseph F. Dush told the council he knew of no way to remedy the situation. Councilman Lowell Keith in mild, even tones said "If he can't be here, I think he should resign," to which Councilman John T. Dick replied, "that's up to him."

KEITH APPARENTLY HAS done some thinking on the matter. He retorted, "I know it's up to him, but I don't see anything wrong in asking him — not telling him — to resign."

Clerk Carl V. Ellis said Parkinson told him two weeks ago that until a decision as to Parkinson's assignment is given by Federal Electric Corp., Lodi, N. J., the mayor would not be able to give the council a definite decision.

On Dick's motion, seconded by

Omer Burkett, Parkinson's leave was extended 30 days.

The bombshell tossed into the middle of the last meeting, labelled "another postponement," was a dud. Patrolman Frederick Lewis asked the council its intentions and how soon they might be put into effect.

The council glumly replied the matter has been tabled for the time being.

Routine reports of village officers produced some discussion about streets and sewers.

THE COUNCIL LEARNED its share of the repair of Plymouth East road is \$1,300, to which Councilman Charles V. Vinasdale took exception. "Did we get to see any estimate of the costs before the work was done?" he inquired. He got no answer.

The council accepted an invitation of the Chamber of Commerce to outline facts and figures surrounding the proposed sewage disposal system Sept. 20 at 8 p.m. in the elementary school.

The penultimate contest will pit Townsend-Wakeman's Rough Riders and Berlin Heights Lodi and LeRoy, traditional rivals who share the same home gridiron — Richman field at Lodi — will ring down the curtain at 8:50 p.m.

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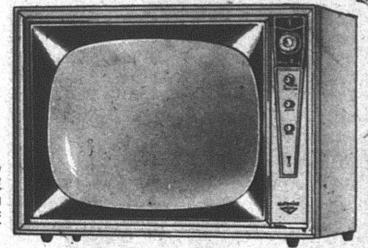
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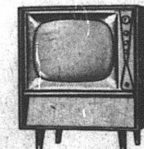
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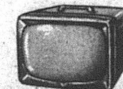
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Miss Stroup to speak

FIRST OF A SERIES ON SEWER PROPOSAL —

Carriage trade set ball rolling to clear water of sewage

As a service to the public, The Advertiser begins today a series of articles relating to the controversial sewer disposal plant bond issue. The articles represent long and detailed inquiry and reflect the views of the general election. If readers wish to comment, they are invited to do so. Letters must be signed to receive consideration, but names will be withheld if requested. Difference of opinion is healthy and encouraged. It must not, however, be vituperative.

It was Labor day, 1936. Ohio was paralyzed by low business turnover, no constructive thinking, no planning, no notion of how to overcome what were plainly hard times.

The carriage trade of Sandusky bay wasn't hurt much. Eggs were still two cents apiece, gasoline was 16 cents a gallon, and you could hire a laborer for 45 cents an hour.

As was its custom, the carriage trade scheduled a Labor day celebration in its yacht clubs. Competitive swimming was a feature of the event.

REMEMBER THE UNITED STATES, headed by the peerless Jesse Owens, had just returned from Berlin, with a thumping team victory in the last Olympiad before the war.

The American swimming team had its hands full with Japanese who were allowed to gulp oxygen between heats, but won a convincing victory.

Especially the women. One of their number — the beautiful Eleanor Holm, who became the bride of Art Jarrett, a band leader, and of Billy Rose, the nonpareil showman — had been suspended from the squad by its manager because she allegedly drank champagne on the boat going over.

So the carriage trade thought it had a good thing when it invited three of the winning women in Sandusky bay on Labor day.

What happened was a good thing for all but the carriage trade. For one of the girls pulled her weary body from the water and, with a grimace, remarked: "My God, this water tastes horrible."

THERE WERE THOSE in the carriage trade who heard what she said and began to take notice. Remember it was 1936. People weren't taking notice of much of anything.

But the carriage trade — thinking of its precious playground developed for its own use over the years — began to realize that its pleasures were being blighted by the people.

Sewage dumping into Sandusky bay was spoiling the swimming, boating, and fishing. Sandusky bay and Lake Erie had become a huge cesspool. What it was then, in 1936, was only a shadow of what it was to become.

Now the carriage trade has always been jealous of its recreation. Duck hunting, swimming, fishing and boating — long considered the universal sports of a gentleman — were plainly compromised by polluted water.

And the carriage trade took action. Leaders among it set began to agitate for correction.

They began in clever ways. But the program, planned in part, will only for the remainder, didn't materialize until the 94th legislature passed the State Water Pollution Control act.

This was in 1946. It was amended in 1951.

What the act intended was to clean up Ohio's waters to preserve the public health, protect the public's natural resources, and develop the water supply.

THE STATE WAS AL ready bound by an international treaty with Canada, outlining the Lake Erie Basin and setting boundaries beyond which waters beyond which cannot be transported.

What it then sought to do was clean up the lake — and the Ohio and Mahoning and Cuyahoga rivers, chiefly — and to do so it had to cope with wastes of two sorts: industrial wastes and the refuse of people working for industry, directly or indirectly.

... The quiet village of Plymouth was a prototype of hundreds of communities in the state in the thirties.

Its raw sewage was disposed of by simple — and unsanitary — methods. There were 68 known places, as of May 30, 1936. (There are nine now.)

The remainder of the dwelling houses, business places and factories were equipped with flush toilets, which dumped into a jerry-built system of drains that were euphemistically called sewers.

A sewer, says Webster, is "a conduit usually covered, to carry off drainage, as of a city; any large drain." A sanitary sewer is one such which carries off sanitary wastes.

Most of the sewers were of private construction, installed by private householders to carry off sanitary and storm fluids after flush toilets became the vogue.

Plymouth's growth over 100 years, up to 1936, was without plan. No municipal sewers had ever been constructed. Only twice in its long history has the tax-paying electorate been called upon to pay for general sewerage construction.

Most of the sewers were of private construction, installed by private householders to carry off sanitary and storm fluids after flush toilets became the vogue.

THEY COULDN'T HAVE cost much. Householders didn't have much money then. Average family income in Plymouth in 1920 was \$640 (those were 1920 dollars); using the Treasury department's scale of values, to reflect the devaluation and inflation of the dollar since 1920, it works out to \$2,304. There wasn't much money to do it with.

For the most part, the sewers ran east and west, into the one drainage creek, the Huron river.

Private sewers were laid mostly in Richland county side of the village. No record was kept of them, save in the memories of the householders who installed them. Where they are now is anybody's guess, substantiated in part by exploratory digging by municipal employees since.

Two things are certain: they became village property when the real estate in which they are situated passed to the village title and village upkeep, and they were an unsatisfactory means of disposing of waste matter. The state says so.

So, in 1947, when the Water Pollution Control board began to function, it directed villages and cities to correct the problem. Everybody had to start from scratch. Federal funds were made available on a loan basis to pay for engineering surveys.

Plymouth obtained by council action in 1947 \$7,000 to hire Alden E. Stilson Associates, Columbus, to do the work.

It was completed that year. Estimated cost of a sewer system and treatment plant: about a quarter of a million dollars.

This apparently satisfied the state. At least, a plan had been formulated.

Renewals of the permits to dump raw sewage in the Huron river were perfunctorily obtained. There never was any disposition by the village authorities or its council to move ahead with the project. Apparent reason: too expensive, we can't afford it.

In 1954, under pressure from the Water Pollution Control board, the council moved to act. Its decision was reluctant. None of the council believed the village could afford the bill, now swollen by inflated prices and by additional sewer conduits (because the village had grown) to \$335,000.

A BOND ISSUE OF \$125,000 was requested by the council. What it meant was that the credit and value of the village as a community would be placed under mortgage for \$125,000 in return for funds with which to construct the system. Additionally, mortgage revenue bonds and special assessment bonds would be sold to obtain another \$200,000.

The issue was defeated by a thumping majority, seven to one. And the council put the question aside for three months.

Renewal of the permit in 1955 was contingent upon completing surveys and study of the inception of a sewer usage tax. This was applied in the spring of 1955, in the amount of \$12 a household a year (more for businesses, factories and schools), and the state granted renewal of the permit.

This year, the state cut down on the term of the permit. Instead of a year, it granted a permit for nine months. The permit expired TWO WEEKS AGO. It has not been renewed. The village is liable to a fine of \$500 a day for dumping raw sewage into the river with no permit.

That's why the issue is on the November ballot.

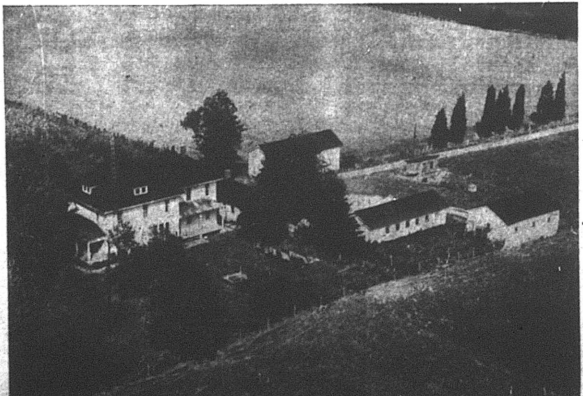

Treasury gets all kinds of letters

How would you like to answer over 1,500 letters daily?

According to Avery C. Hand, Jr., Richland county savings bonds chairman, this is the number of personal letters that people send the Treasury department daily regarding their savings bonds.

"Out of many letters fall charred pieces, water-soaked paper, remnants which once were savings bonds," the county chairman says. "Each letter tells a different story, sometimes humorous, often tragic, but never dull or monotonous."

ANY HURRICANE, FLOOD, or similar disaster will swell the mail with letters from people whose Savings Bonds have been washed

away or destroyed. They need money in a hurry, or they are anxious to obtain duplicate bonds, Mr. Hand points out.

Some of the most interesting case letters the Treasury receives are isolated ones, however, like the fellow who was buried in his best suit, which was the safe-keeping place for his bonds. After the funeral the family remembered that his bonds were buried with him. They wrote the Treasury to find out if they had to exhume the body in order to get the bonds. The Treasury said no, and issued duplicates.

Mr. Hand says there are people throughout the state who have lost savings bonds or had them stolen, and have done nothing about them under the mistaken impression they

can't be replaced. "This is not true. The owner can get a substitute bond when the original is lost, stolen, or destroyed," he emphasizes. "All he has to do is write the Treasury and state the facts. If his savings bond has not been cashed, either by himself or the co-owner, he'll get a duplicate in a hurry."

Since 1943, two years after Series E savings bonds were first issued, the Treasury department has replaced over \$68 million in duplicate savings bonds to registered owners. "Most of them were quite surprised to find," the county chairman says, "that the Treasury department replaces lost, mutilated, or destroyed bonds as a part of its regular service to bond owners."

Raders like to watch things grow

"I should know that picture," smiles Mrs. Paul Rader. "I've lived on the place for nearly 15 years."

Knowing where you live is one thing, and knowing how and why you live there is quite another.

For the Raders, the simple explanation is they like to watch things — and people — grow.

THE THINGS ON THE 80-acre Rader spread in Guthrie road south of Shiloh are 19 head of whiteface Herefords, bred and raised on the farm, for the most part; a herd of Hampshire hogs, some bred on the farm of Lyle Hamman, who is Mrs. Rader's brother-in-law, and some on the farm of Fred Dawson, Richland county commissioner who lives at the foot of Guthrie road.

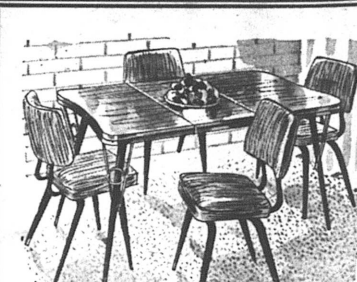
