Pilgrims snap skein of losses, 66 to 65

Plymouth's Pilgrims reversed form and habit here Tuesday night to defeat New Washington, 66 to 65, snapping an eight game losing streak.

A strong last period performance put the Pilgrims over, but it was tough and go in the final seconds. Ahead two points, New Washington was awarded a penalty shot. First one swished through the net, but the second teetered off.

IT WAS AN EVEN PERFORMANCE by the Pilgrims that produced victory. Five players scored a dozen points apiece: Mickey Hampton, Eddie Taylor, Ted Fox, Ray Emsel and Herb Caudill.

For the Dutchtowners, Paul Fike, All-Crawford county choice last year, lived up to its advance billing. He scored 11 times from the floor and five times from the foul line for 21 points.

It was a good night for Pilgrims fans. The reserves trounced the visitors, 36 to 30.

Cornell's five in two wins, loss

Cornell's quintet won three and lost one in weekend activity, but one of the wins was sweet revenge.

The restaurant, quintet dumped the Navy reserve five, 86 to 82, Sunday to avenge an earlier defeat.

Jake Berberich had 26 and Jim Nowakowski 23 in this one. Larry Schreck was right behind with 21.

Fifth loss for the season was recorded during a triple-header here Saturday. Ringide A. C. Mansfield, with only five players, eked out an 89 to 86 win, despite a 38-point performance for the losers by Stan Holthouse.

Per capita debt \$105, year's end survey shows

Looked at your installment credit settlement receipt lately?

Add to that balance, whatever it is, the sum of \$105.04 if you live in the village of Plymouth, or the sum of \$65.00 if you live in Plymouth local school district.

That's the per capita debt of each citizen — man, woman and child — in those two jurisdictions as of Dec. 31, 1956.

What's it for? Bonds valued at \$23,000 are outstanding on the village water plant. They'll be settled in 1972, finally. First mortgage of \$8,000 is still outstanding, at two and three-fourths per cent interest, to be settled by 1964. Second mortgage of \$15,000 is outstanding, at three and a fourth per cent interest, to be settled by 1972. Payments on it don't begin until 1965. The village is only servicing the interest and depositing in a sinking fund right now.

Indebtedness of the village-owned electric distribution system is \$71,000, at three per cent, due to be paid off in 1971.

TOTAL INDEBTEDNESS: \$94,000, as of the end of December. Amount set aside in sinking funds: \$27,068.58. Balance due: \$66,931.42, which amounts to \$39.95 for each citizen.

Board of Public Affairs as of Dec. 31 had about \$33,000 in the black to offset this debt. If debt had to be foreclosed and settled now, this amount would be available to do it. Per capita equity in it: \$19.70. Net debt

Record budget by school

A loan of \$12,000 by Peoples National bank at four per cent interest will carry Plymouth Board of Education until advance drafts on anticipated collections of property taxes are paid by the Richland county auditor.

A draft of \$5,000 payable by Apr. 1 and another payable May 1 were requested by the board Jan. 15.

Tax revenues of \$62,468.37 are anticipated for 1957.

A record-breaking budget of \$181,395.98 has been approved by the board. Of this, \$148,828.34 will be for expenses of the general fund and \$32,567.64 for bond retirement expense.

Property taxes in 1957 actually will be slightly less than in 1956. Additional funds from the state foundation will enable the budget to be enlarged.

State funds last year were \$49,929. This year they will be \$72,570.

Appropriations for teachers' salaries have this year been increased from \$79,000 to \$92,225.

Just how much new building Plymouth can undertake this year will depend upon two factors:

a. Whether the state board of education will authorize indebtedness beyond six per cent of the tax valuation of the district for a school which is not in a permanent site.

b. Whether the patrons of the school district will approve bond issues for construction purposes.

If the answer to the first puzzle is negative, bond issues of \$68,000 may be voted in the general election.

When the board knows what the state board will approve, it will cut the shoe to fit the leather. An architect will be engaged to prepare plans to construct such building as can be paid for.

Ford set to retire Dec. 31

This refusal to seek reelection of office is contagious!

Hard on the heels of Mayor Henry Young's announcement he will not file nominating petitions to succeed himself as chief magistrate of Huron county's only city, Thurman R. Ford, Plymouth's mayor, said he will not under any circumstances seek reelection.

Plymouth has no primary. Nominating petitions for the mayorship, clerkship, six council posts, three trusteeships on the Board of Public Affairs, three posts on the Board of Education and the treasurer's office will be received until 4 p.m. Aug. 5 by the Richland county board of elections.

Petitions require the signatures of 25 eligible voters who morally commit themselves to vote for the candidate, whose signature must appear to indicate he will accept the nomination.

At the same time, Republican circles are looking for "a capable person" to accept appointment as deputy registrar of motor vehicles. Mrs. J. Benjamin Smith, incumbent, will retain the post "for the convenience of the state" until after Mar. 1. She has no desire to retain it after that. Besides, she's a Democrat, and the job is awarded under patronage rules.

An applicant may apply to Carl V. Ellis, Republican committeeman.

CELERYVILLE GROWERS DON'T LIKE PROPOSAL —

Minimum wage fight to go on

Celeryville growers voted Thursday night to continue to oppose a minimum wage law for vegetable growers after K. W. Zellers, Hartsville, reported results of the fight so far.

About 150 attended the banquet in the Celeryville Christian church, highlight of the 12th annual two-day muck crop school.

Charles W. Lofland, Plymouth, was in charge of selection of topics for the school.

Research into soil and plant analysis was the theme of the topic, and reports by experts engaged in the research were given.

DR. FREEMAN HOWLETT, chairman of the horticulture department and in charge of the foliar analysis work, reported most of the minor elements are available in adequate quantities at the Celeryville substation. Boron appeared to be deficient, especially when onions were grown. Slight deficiencies of manganese and iron were also noted. Molybdenum, the new minor element under study, was found to be used in high quantities by celery. It was found that it may be necessary for some of this element to be added to the muck soil in the Celeryville area. Copper is found to be deficient regardless of the crop grown. The Celeryville sub-station was divided into 385

plots. Each of these plots was found to be considerably different in soil acidity levels and nematode infestation. The variation in soil acidity accounted for as much as 30 per cent reduction in the yield of celery. All the land at the experiment station has been treated for nematodes and will be treated for minor elements where they have been found deficient. A continuation of the foliar analysis and soil testing work will be carried on to reduce the various factors in analyzing research data.

Dr. W. E. Krauss, associate director, said the testing done and results now available are the most complete ever done at any experiment station in the United States.

Dr. C. R. Neiswander, department of entomology, and J. J. Milunas, of the Federal Food and Administration, reported on insecticide and fungicide tolerances of vegetable and fruit crops. Recommendations on the label have been followed consistently, they said. Mr. Milunas said there never has been a case of poisoning of the public by insecticide or fungicide residues on farm products.

KARL KAHLER, representing Ohio Retail Merchants association, reported that frozen foods now make up approximately seven per cent of all food pur-

chased. Peas, lima beans, strawberries, and prepared foods rate high in this group. Kahler stated that pot pies and television dinners now in demand may affect the vegetable grower since the housewife has a habit of serving only the prepared dinners and forgetting the importance of serving fresh vegetables with them. He suggested that local growers produce products acceptable by the chain stores. These include onions, radishes, washed potatoes, celery, leaf and bit lettuce. Carrots from California seem to be in demand because of their long slender varieties. Quality of Ohio grown carrots is comparable but they are not so attractive to the housewife. New products to be considered by the Celeryville growers might be string beans, cauliflower, bit lettuce and sweet corn.

The Friday session was concluded with a report on cooperative marketing by Emil Adamson, Marzetta, and Carl Deeds, Elyria. Both emphasized the need for growers to operate under one sales agency and to put out a standard product. Cooperatives appear to be the best tool growers can use in helping them earn reasonable prices for their products.
