A 23-year-old Partridge, Ky., man is in Huron county jail for his part in a cutting incident in a car which struck another driven by a Plymouth woman Saturday night. Lindbergh Tolaver, 23, faces prosecution as a hit-skip driver, filed by Mrs. Robert Lewis, 173 Sandusky street, and for cutting with intent to wound, filed by Chief Robert L. Meiser, investigating police officer.

TOLAVAR WAS DRIVING a car owned by Ed Laney, 25, Trux street, when an argument broke out between the two men. Tolaver allegedly to have drawn a knife and cut the arm of Laney. A physician told police if the slash had been an inch closer to important ligaments and vessels, amputation would have been necessary.

In the melee, Tolaver swerved into the path of Mrs. Lewis, whose car was severely damaged. He continued on without stopping, and was apprehended by Chief Meiser at the Trux street address, where the men went to continue their argument.

Markley defeats Wiles for two-year term; committee recommends 4 school sites

Donald P. Markley, Plymouth, defeated two opponents for a two-year term on the Huron Valley Board of Education. He led Allen R. Wiles, 374 to 365.

Final decision of the eight member site-committee is expected to be made known tonight at the New Haven Parent-Teachers association.

Four sites have been under consideration. Each member will grade the sites according to his preference. The board of education will choose the site.

PROPERTIES WHICH HAVE come under consideration are located generally in the New Haven area. They are the Robert Cole property, at the northeast

side of the intersection of Route 61 and Skinner road, the Joe Hawkins property at Routes 61 and 598, the Mattie Garrett property in Route 224 west of the New Haven Supply Co. and the Willard Baxter property at the northwest corner of Ft. Ball road and the Peru Center road.

All four have at least the 40 required acres. All are known to have water, nearness to power and gas lines, and all fall within the geographical and population center of the school district.

UNLESS STATE FOUNDATION funds are received before-hand, teachers won't be paid on Nov. 30, the board was told. The moneys are tied up by the

county and state authorities until a decision on the legality of the transfer and consolidation is handed down by the supreme court of Ohio. Yesterday was decision day, but The Advertiser was unable to learn if the court planned to give its decision then.

A SICK LEAVE POLICY applicable to teacher and administrative personnel was adopted on voice vote. Leave will accumulate at the rate of 1.25 days per month. Maximum leave allowed for accumulation is 90 days.

Three days of leave with pay will be allowed in the event of death in a teacher's immediate family. Additional leave may be

authorized at the discretion of the executive head.

Cafeteria supervisors will be reimbursed at the rate of eight cents a mile for all official travel, the board ruled.

Mrs. Fransens dies on Celeryville visit; long local resident

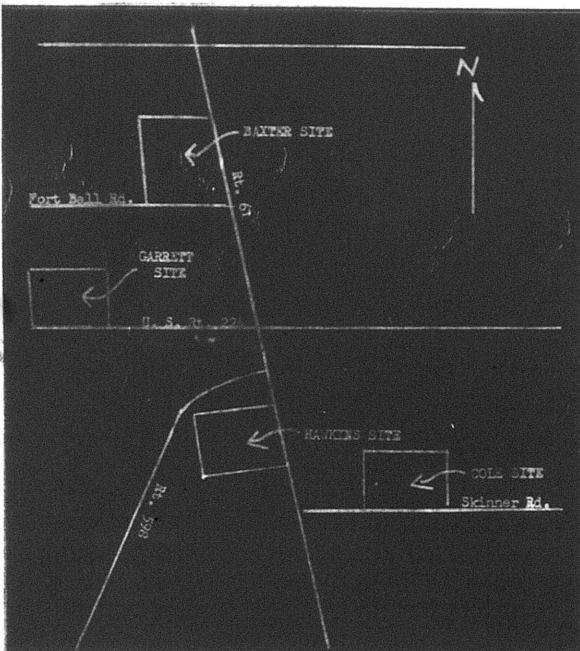

Depot reveals phase-out plan

Functional transfers of employees of Wilkins Air Force station will be offered to limited numbers of persons assigned to 36 categories of work, according to a tentative plan prepared by Shelby depot command.

These persons, if the plan is approved by higher headquarters, will be encouraged to move with the transfer of the function to other stations.

DEPOT OFFICIALS remained mum as to how many employees the plan will affect favorably. From private sources The Advertiser learned that about 45 Plymouth employees would be considered functional.

Categories of work which fall in the functional category are management, working capital funds accounting, monetary property accounting, budget, staff statistical services, including plan section, reports collection, audit and verification, and machine processing; staff plans and programming, data processing systems, staff procurement, local purchase items of central procurement; prime procurement, con-

tract administration, staff transportation, traffic management, terminal services, staff maintenance, shop production control, maintenance inspection, quality analysis, industrial engineering, maintenance engineering services, command workload control, vehicle and equipment repair, manufacture and repair section of the maintenance division, staff depot supply management, depot supply operations, including commodity control, cataloging, stock control, warehousing supplies, storage, inventory and disposal.

Not all civilians engaged in these sections will be considered functional, depot authorities said. Civilians working in mail units, in the offices of the adjutant, judge advocate, civilian personnel, manpower and organization, information services, surgeon, fire fighting section, plant protection, inspector general and installations, and in base supply, base maintenance, base transportation, base procurement and base comptroller sections will not be functional.

Personnel engaged in functional activity would, under the plan, be offered the opportunity to transfer with the function. If they refuse, they'll be separated with the notation, "inability to accompany activity."

When functional personnel get to the new site, they'll be assigned if their retention credits are large enough. If the retention credits aren't large enough, they'll be afforded reduction-in-force and monitoring privileges in the new activity.

PERSONNEL WHO ARE non-functional will be considered for appointment in the areas of their choice in all known existing vacancies for which they may be qualified.

Management activities at the depot will probably be phased out in the next 12 months, depot authorities said Monday. Equipment and supply stocks will be phased out over four years.

Those whose transfers would be to Warner-Robins Air Force base, Ga., will be going "early in 1958", the depot said.

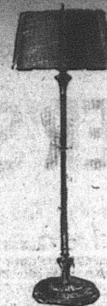

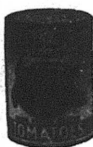

Warriors bow to Butler in snow flurry

Only a gallant defense kept Butler's Bulldogs from rolling up a bigger score during a high wind-storm with snow flurries there Friday night as Huron Valley's toothless Warriors closed out their 1957 season.

The final count was 13 to 0. The Bulldogs scored once in the opening period and again in the final canto.

THE STRONG WIND HELPED back Ed Taylor's punt after he had kicked it into a Bulldog defender on the fifth play of the game. Russ Wareham and Gary Meeks picked up 14 yards before Meeks rounded end from the 15. It was here one of the two officials who showed up to work the contest missed a flagrant off side, which would have cost the Bulldogs a score.

Wareham failed to crack off tackle for the conversion but the Warriors were offside and on the second try Dave Crunkilton sneaked for the point.

IT WAS PRETTY MUCH A see-saw affair in Huron Valley territory for the remainder of the half. The Warriors gained a net of 31 yards during the first two quarters and never advanced into Bulldog territory.

The cold wind and driving snow bit deeply into schoolboy fingers. There were nine fumbles during the first half. Ben Root and Tom Myers recovered three Bulldog bobbles between them.

For all their offensive superiority, the Butler eleven simply could not produce when the chips were down. Twice they were inside the 10 but fumbled. The Bulldog gained a net of 103 yards during the first half.

The Warrior defense was outstanding. It contained Wareham — his longest dash was 19 yards, late in the fourth period, and although racked up 106 of the 229

yards gained from scrimmage by the Bulldogs, he was bottled up when it counted. Furthermore, two rock-'em-sock-'em tackles by Tom Myers shook Wareham loose from the ball and Butler lost possession.

THE BULLDOGS STARTED to move in the second half. After Ted Fox failed to make good with an inside kickoff, the Butler eleven began to roll goalward. The Bulldogs punched to the Huron Valley two, where Meeks failed to get a first down, and Taylor punted out.

It was a dismal finale for the speedy Taylor. He simply could not get going. His bobble of a pitchout by young Bill Strine — and it may have been that the pitchout was short — felt into Butler hands on the Warrior one and in one play Crunkilton was in for the clincher.

Only once in the last half did Huron Valley move the ball with precision. Bill Strine hit Ted Fox with a pass that carried for 36 yards to the Butler 36.

BUT THE YOUNG SIGNAL caller did not enjoy much success with his aerial efforts. He had five tosses intercepted. And four times he was forced to eat the ball for a total yardage of 15.

To build for next year, Coach Lew Pettit has some line strength. Ben Root, Tom Myers, Dick Akers and Dennis McGinnis give him a nucleus of hard-charging forwards. Young Strine and Dick Fidler will be available behind the line and Duane Utis, if he wants to play, could have a big year.

The Warriors wound up with a four-won, four-lost, one-tied record, not bad. But had tight hatbands and an appendectomy and a bruised collarbone not derailed them, the Warriors would have had another unbeaten season.

For a Warrior eleven at full strength would have twisted the Bulldog tail this night, make no mistake about that!
