Ford whips Lasch; Akers, Keith elected by conservatives

of New Haven township, Floyd Steele and Virgil Baird were unopposed for trustee of Plymouth township.

For Huron Valley board of education, J. Harold Cashman, Neil Slesman and Latwien Eitle won four-year terms. Donald P.

Markley and Haldon Cheesman seemed to have won two-year terms, although Markley and Allen Wiles were only four votes apart.

Incumbents won reelection to the Huron county board of election. They are Harold Heyman

and Lyle Smith. Hugh Griffin was the third member elected.

INCUMBENTS ALSO WON reelection in the Iroquois district, although dissident Shiloh candidates polled a strong vote locally. The \$890,000 bond issue was ac-

corded a favorable vote, 725 to 690, but it was not large enough to carry.

Cent a day goal of chest drive

"If every family gives a cent a person a day," said Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., director of Plymouth's first Community chest drive, this week, "we'll more than make our target of \$3,300."

One cent a person per family a day amounts to \$10.95 a year, she pointed out.

The chest drive gets off the ground Monday, Armistice day, when:

1. Written appeals to each family in the Plymouth and New Haven mailing area are posted at the Plymouth post office. Each contains a pledge card and an explanation of what the money's for.

2. THERE WILL BE NO HOUSE-TO-HOUSE CANVASSING OR SOLICITING.

3. A committee of four — R. Harold Mack, Mrs. Donald Akers, Mrs. Donald Fetters and Don Willett — will visit retail business establishments to seek donations "appropriate to the revenue the business draws from the community."

4. A thermometer-type

gauge of paid donations is placed on the Peoples National bank building by a publicity committee headed by Whitney J. Briggs and Thomas F. Root. Members are Mrs. Clarence Mack, Mrs. Miles Christian, Mrs. R. Earl McQuate and the Rev. Mos Rutan.

5. Separate drives for eight agencies die on the vine in favor of one combined campaign. These agencies are the American Heart fund (\$125), the American Cancer fund (\$625), the Girl Scouts (\$250), Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts (\$450), Plymouth Midget League (\$250), Salvation Army (\$500), American Red Cross (\$500), Huron Valley High school band (\$350), and Mary Fete Park recreation fund (\$100).

First donation to the chest was received this week from the Rev. Dr. F. B. Heibert, retired Lutheran pastor who once held the Plymouth charge. He sent in his donation from Akron, saying he wished to remember the town where he passed so many happy years.

Warriors wallop Rough Riders, 14-7

Fired-up Huron Valley dumped the Townsend-Wakeman, 14 to 7, in a North Canton conference contest here Tuesday night before a small, chilled but delighted Dad's night crowd.

It was a welcome reversal of recent form for the Warriors and the performance of Duane Utiss, who scored eight points, was the standout.

AFTER A POOR FIRST half, in which the Rough Riders took a one-touchdown lead on the strength of Jerry Klucas' 28-yard-end-around play in the second period, the Big Red came back to play brightly in the third period.

Big Jim Root burst through from his tackle spot to block a punt by Darrell Wolfe and Utiss was a Johnny-on-the-spot. He caught up the pigskin and romped untouched some 42 yards to pay dirt. Utiss was given the ball for the point after touchdowns and he converted handsomely.

The Warriors got a break in the fourth canto and capitalized on it. After Utiss and Bill Strine had brought the ball up to the Warrior 36 in seven plays, Ed Taylor was forced to punt. Two defenders infiltrated the defense and he was lucky to get the boot away.

It was a good one, down to the 15:29, where Tom Friend fumbled it. Ted Fox was upon him like a coyote after a rabbit and when the smoke had cleared, the Warriors had possession.

UTISS HAD TWO SHOTS

at the right tackle slot before Coach Lew Pettit sent in young Danny Carter with the play. He handed off to Taylor, who threw 18 yards to Fox in the end zone.

The redoubtable Utiss, who gained 83 per cent of the Warrior yardage, was good for the extra point.

After three lackadaisical contests, the Warriors looked something like a football team, in the last half. Tom Myers, an underclassman, and Jim Root played especially well.

BEHIND THE LINE, ONLY Utiss stood out. If he can do as well tomorrow against Butler, to take some pressure off Taylor, the Warriors have a chance to down the Bulldogs.

Defensively, the Warrior line felt little to be desired, giving up only 111 yards. Through the air, the Rough Riders got 36.

The Warriors got only 84 yards on the ground and 18 in the air. But those 18 were big ones.

Flyers bomb locals, 18 to 0, at Norwalk

A listless Warrior eleven dropped its third straight contest at Norwalk Saturday night, 18 to 0 to a previously winless St. Paul's squad.

It was a miserable exhibition of football by the visitors, who penetrated inside the 20 yard line only once.

SENSING THEIR FIRST victory after they moved crisply and with success against the vaunted Warriors, the Flyers piled it on in the last half.

The St. Paul's eleven struck first midway in the first quarter. Ed Taylor punted from his own eight to the Huron Valley 46, where John Wise gathered it in and ripped off 45 yards before he was bounced out-of-bounds on the Warrior one by the same Taylor.

Paul Minor pounced over for the score on the next play.

THROUGHOUT THE FIRST period, the demoralized and spiritless Warriors gained only 26 yards, as against 92 for the Flyers.

Early in the second period, the Warriors added another touchdown. Taylor punted out to the 50, whereupon Minor threw twice to George Potts for important gains as the Flyers rolled up four first downs en route to pay dirt.

Late in the third canto, Taylor's punt from the Warrior 43, after the only sustained move the visitors made all night, was blocked. It rolled to the Huron Valley 20, where Taylor fell on it.

It took the Flyers five plays to get the touchdown. The big one was an 18-yard toss from Minor to Joe Seck in the end zone.

The Warriors never were a factor in the lethargic contest. They rolled up a net of 11 yards from scrimmage in the second half, only 39 in the first half.

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On the Sidelines

What's the matter with the Warriors? After winning 13 straight, they've dropped three consecutive ball games and looked progressively worse doing so. Fans who pay the freight want an accounting, which is hard to get, because even those who ought to know don't know quite what's happened.

SO HERE'S AN EFFORT to piece together some elements of explanation. Admittedly, they all add up to the immeasurable — desire.

Item: "The boys aren't blocking, they aren't playing ball." True. No matter how much disorganization there is in the backfield, any humpty dumpty can gain some yardage if his line puts out.

Item: "The boys, especially the seniors, are sore about the class play deal." This came about when the coach of the play called a rehearsal, which was to occur on a

Monday after the Warriors had been beaten. The grid coach is alleged to have said, "Make up your minds, boys — it's either drama or football!" This is said to have tied off some of the seniors, who feel that since theirs is a small class they've got to spread themselves thin.

But is it any reason to lay down on the coach, whose job it is to produce a good team that plays hard and well, win or lose?

The O. T. knows something about the play, knows some of the seniors went off half-cocked about it, knows there was a parley between administrators and coaches to straighten it out.

But who's running the school, anyway? Players or teachers?

ITEM: "THE PRACTICES are dumb-head shows, and there isn't enough head-bumping." When you've got a small squad, you've got to be careful about scrimmages during the season. Paul Brown doesn't scrimmage once the season has started. Whether it's true or untrue that there aren't enough practices isn't for the O. T. to say. And this is neither attack nor defense of the coach. But there's this: how can you fault a system that produced 13 winners in a row?

ORDINANCE NO. 17-57

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO THAT:

SECTION I. The following supplemental appropriations be made:

1. From the Water Fund Six Hundred and Twenty-five Dollars (\$625.00) for D-10 salt, softens.

2. From the Electric Fund Fourteen Hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$1,475.00) for employees.

4. From the General Fund to the Safety Fund Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for Fire Department expenses.

ENTRANCE TO THE EDISON CLUB. swank entertainment spot at Maumee maintained by Toledo Edison Co. for its employees, is through an old water conduit, down which is laid a catwalk with no railing.

At its upper end Oct. 18, a lady (wife of the Bowling Green publisher) stooped over right in front of Phin and picked up a handsome, three-stone diamond ring, obviously a gentleman's. It lay amid leaves and the usual debris you find at such places.

TWO HOURS LATER, WE SAT DOWN AT a table opposite some folks whose names we still don't know. We told them now we'd seen the lady pick up the ring.

The man across the table extended his left arm. There on his little pinkie was the very same ring.

"And what's more," he told us, "the lady who found it went to housekeeping here in Maumee over 30 years ago right downstairs from us, and we hadn't seen her since she moved away 29 years ago."

Of such little things are the dramas of life made.

R. F. H. TELLS US ABOUT A YOUNG minister friend of his who was asked at the last minute to pinch-hit for an ailing domine. The sick preacher was of the old school who wrote his sermons in a notebook, loose leaf variety.

The substitute was handed the notebook by the regular minister's wife and told to use the sermon already prepared.

All went well until he got to the bottom of page 6. "And Adam said to Eve," he read aloud, getting to the real point of the sermon.

Then he flipped the page and discovered to his

consternation that the sense of the sermon didn't hold up. A page had fallen from the notebook. The young preacher turned back and unthinkingly repeated the last line of page 6 again: "And Adam said to Eve..." and flipped it over. Still upset, he said aloud "...there seems to be a leaf missing."

WE PASSED THE WEEKEND READING the fascinating story of the 2,900 American soldiers who were captured in the Korean show.

The Army made a detailed, 49-month study of each of them. And here's what it found:

13 per cent of the soldiers — and they were run-of-the-mill Americans, not chosen or singled out for any special reason, just officers and enlisted men who'd been captured — were out-and-out cowards who turned Commy right off and became hard-core collaborators.

13 per cent of them resisted all form of blandishment by the Reds. Three per cent were unconstructed, uninitiated anti-disciplinarians, the kind that finds its way to the guard house and the penitentiary. Ten per cent were of the finest sort, those who kept up morale, talked up the ideals and truths about America.

75 per cent were soldiers who "played it cool", men who did what was necessary to keep the Comnies happy by signing declarations, denunciations, other forms of anti-democratic claptrap in order to obtain favor with their captors, mistakenly thinking it was the right thing to do, not realizing all they had to do was to refuse in a group.

THE UNFORTUNATE CONCLUSION the Army, suggests, is that since these soldiers were average run-of-the-mill Americans, the breakdown in prison camp is a true reflection of the kind of people we are.

And that's something to ponder about. Just think about it — only one in 10 Americans is really worth a damn!

IN HURON COUNTY, FOR FARM-TOWN WEEK

Average investment per farm \$37,000

Average investment per farm in Huron county ranges from \$25,000 to \$50,000, while in the United States the average is now over \$25,000, Huron County Agent John Wells says.

The investment required per farm worker is about \$15,000, compared with \$13,000 for industry.

Commercial farm operations, such as specialized dairying and broiler production, represent investments of \$50,000 or more per worker.

COST OF LIVING INCREASES have been attributed to a rise in food prices. Farmers have sometimes been blamed for this increase in food price, he says. However, statistics show that in 1925 an hour's take-home pay would buy 5½ loaves of bread, or 1¼ pounds of steak, or 3½ quarts of milk. In 1956, an hour's take-home pay, on the average, bought 11 loaves of bread or two pounds of steak, or eight quarts of milk.

This decrease in amount of money necessary for food, in relation to income, has been brought about by the technological advances in agriculture, Wells claims.

Research, education, conservation and electrification are some of the means by which farmers have increased their efficiency in

production and marketing. "This has made it possible for the consumer to eat more and better foods," Wells says.

"In 1956, the average consumer ate 85 pounds of beef compared with only 56 pounds in 1951. Similar increases have been noted in broiler consumption, citrus fruits, greenhouse tomatoes and eggs."

THE MANY PROCESSES necessary for marketing farm products require the services of 10 million people, Wells says. Over six million people are employed in plants producing materials and supplies for farmers.

In Huron county alone farmers receive nearly \$14 million for the sale of all farm products, of which the majority is spent within the county boundaries on operational costs, machinery investment and family living.

THE FARM PROGRAM, farm surpluses, the consumers responsibility to the food supply and distribution, are some of the problems that will be discussed at farm-city meetings throughout the county this week, Wells announces. "This type of exchange of information will help people understand the problems of our national economy. I urge all civic and rural groups to cooperate in exchanging information, especially during farm-city week."

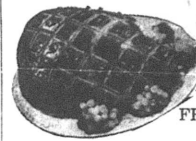

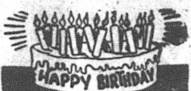
