Hawkins' site recommended for new high school location

Property of Joe Hawkins in Route 61 was nominated Monday night by the site committee as first choice for the proposed Huron Valley High school building.

The committee, composed of former board of education members of the Richmond, Greenfield, New Haven and Plymouth local school districts, recommended the property as its first choice. The

other three properties were recommended in the following order: Baxter, Cole and Garrett. The Hawkins land, which comprises 48 acres, is accessible from both Routes 61 and 598.

STILL AT A STANDSTILL over the court decision affecting the legality of the Huron Valley school district, recommended the payment of bills amounting to

\$2,867.07 for November. This makes a total of \$10,081.95 in unpaid bills, for which there are no funds available until monies can be released from the Richland county auditor, Norman L. Wolfe.

Clerk Earl C. Cashman reported all teachers will be paid regularly until the first of the year. A sum of \$17,521.20 remains in the general fund. The cafeteria fund this month showed a deficit of \$407.06. This was due to a large purchase of potatoes to be used in the various school buildings and will be made up later. An average of 658 children is served lunches daily in the district.

Recommendations of the insurance policy survey were given briefly by Robert Docherty, who presents the Hartford Fire Insurance Co., and James C. Davis, of the Lofland Insurance agency Plymouth.

TWENTY-FIVE POLICIES now cover all the buildings and contents in the district. Only the Plymouth and New Haven elementary schools were found to be fully and adequately covered during the survey. Policies covering the other school installations do not give the fullest coverage possible, Docherty stated.

He recommended the policies be consolidated into two. The present total insurance bill for the district on the existing policies amounts to \$1,273.79 per year. The most complete total replacement coverage would amount to \$1,830.68 per year. This figure would replace \$1,148,220 valuation.

A change-over in insurance coverage would take at least five years to allow the existing policies to run their course. Further study will be made by the board at a later meeting.

Mrs. F. M. Brinson, who has been a substitute teacher in the Plymouth sixth grade, was hired as a regular teacher on the salary schedule, which raises her slightly from the substitute rate of pay.

Ohio Supreme court refused yesterday to approve a writ of mandamus forcing Richland County Auditor Norman L. Wolfe and ex-shiloh clerk Ronald R. Howard to surrender funds and records belonging to the Plymouth and Shiloh school districts.

The ruling means the court upholds the contention of Howard and other Shilohans that transfer of the two districts to Huron county in one resolution was invalid.

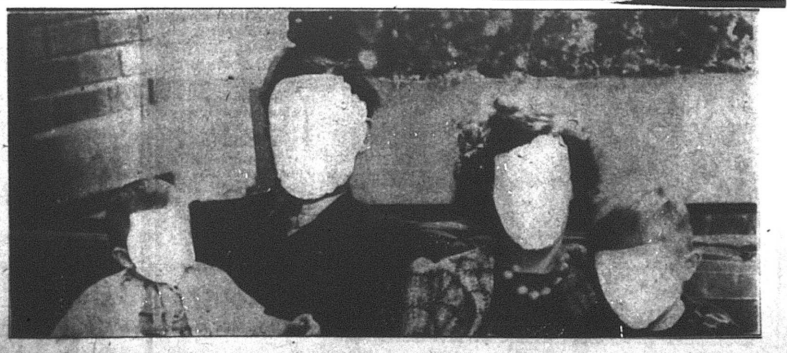

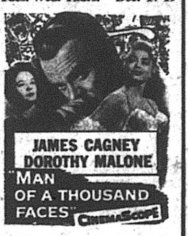

Warriors top loop with three victories

It might not be that way after tomorrow night, so take a good look now!

You may never see it again, and it's been a long time coming. Huron Valley's Warriors lead the Huron-Erie league with three wins and no losses. It's the first time a local basketball entry has led its league this far in the season in 16 years.

TOMORROW THE WARRIORS go on the road again, to play Berlin Heights in its junior Madison Square Garden. Coach Snag Sanders has a powerful ball club that downed Greenwich's Shamrocks Friday night, 54 to 52, by coming on strongly in the last period.

Friday night at North Fairfield the Warriors found a weak sister in the Indians and won about as they pleased, 54 to 40. Coach Lew Petit let most of his first stringers into the ball game and didn't need the eagle eye and sterling floor play of Ted Fox. It was fortunate. The boy has a bad bruise on one leg that hampers his movements.

Palmer and Fox, nevertheless, led the scoring with 13 and 11. Conway and Sweeting had 14 and 12, respectively, for the losers.

SATURDAY NIGHT THE WARRIORS returned to the wigwam and downed Townsend-Wakeman, 60 to 52, as Billy Strine walloped the nets for 21 points. Fox and D. Palmer had 12 apiece. The Warriors galloped off to a big first period lead with a 17-point effort and although outscored in the final half, won with ease.

The Warriors will play New Washington on Dec. 27 instead of Dec. 28. Coach Lew Petit announces. Game time is 7 p.m.

It should be an even-Stephen proposition at Berlin Heights tomorrow. Depending upon how the Warriors take to the big floor, the lead in the league could very well remain here by the time the last whistle blows.

On the Sidelines

By THE OLD TIMER

Who remembers Dizzy Kirken-dax, one of the greatest softball pitchers of all time?

He played hereabouts when softball was at its height, back in the late '30's and early '40's. And he was great shakes, too.
A name of Finlay, Diz, burling for the Toledo Red Men tobacco club, whose manager had discovered him in 1933 after a 4 to 3 licking the chewers took from a Findlay team for which Diz pitched.

SO DIZ WENT TO PITCH for the Toledo team and began

to roll up a record that nobody, absolutely nobody, ever touched. In 1935, at Soldiers field, Chicago, he won the world title for the Red Men. By 1940, he was pitching for a Lima team and won the world title again.

That year, he pitched 72 games, winning 68, losing only four. And his fame had spread as far as Puerto Rico and Cuba, where he pitched for money, in exhibitions.

LATER HE SIGNED WITH the Ferguson Auditors out of Columbus. He lost a 1 to 0 verdict in 13 innings at Cleveland for the state title. A chintzy pop fly dropped out of the left fielder's glove for a two-base error and a runner who had reached first on another bobble ran home.

The winners didn't get a hit. Then Diz signed with the F. Wayne Zollners, forerunners of the Zollner Pistons basketballers who are now the Detroit Pistons in the National Professional Basketball league. In three seasons he won 108, lost only 16.

In 1949, Diz went to Toronto, Canada, and won the dominion title with the Toronto entry two seasons hand running.

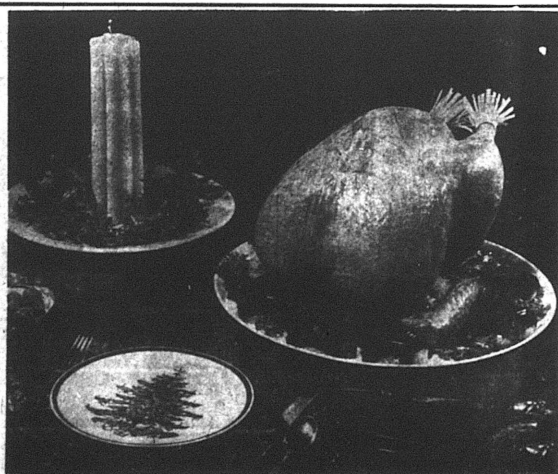

Pragmatic practicality

It may be a long time before formal action can be taken, but the board of education has some worth-while notations to work on in the recommendations of the site committee.

The committee was, above all, practical in a pragmatic sense when it unanimously proposed the Hawkins site for the new school.

We hope the site may be available, that it may be obtained, and that a satisfactory school can be erected upon it.

Regrettably, the site is a little over two miles from the middle of town. There is nothing to be done about that. In a consolidation it had to be.

But it could have been a little over three miles. The committee was pragmatically practical in recommending the Hawkins site.

The support of the Plymouth voter is necessary to obtain approval of a bond issue. It is highly unlikely the Plymouth voter would approve an issue which would finance a new school north

of Route 224.

There are other advantages to the Hawkins site. It's big enough, it's accessible from two highways. There are building upon it that with relatively small remodeling would be suitable for vocational training centers that our patrons seem to want and insist upon in the face of Admiral Rickover's admonitions to the contrary.

If the elected authority of the people at the county level would learn some pragmatic truths from such as this committee, perhaps everybody's burden would be easier.

At least we wouldn't be living from week to week for the call from Columbus with the fate of the consolidation.

But, as the old saying goes, "For want of a shoe..."

It would be wise for all of us to keep some of these facts in mind when the culprits run for reelection. That's the democratic way.

med into them too fast.

Doubtless they'd have been all right if they'd been given the right training to prepare them for such a fight. But they lacked the "well-rounded" look.

Which is our point, fundamentally. It takes the well-rounded scholar to run the kind of world we're living in and the world of tomorrow.

A CRASH PROGRAM WON'T PRODUCE that. If it were left to us, we'd listen to such as Admiral Rickover and former President Hoover (for which see Nov. 28 Time magazine).

Our national high school program isn't satisfactory. We have boasted overlong and over-much that we have many more secondary pupils than the Europeans. So far as number goes, that's true.

But it's a fact that European secondary pupils know more at a given age than ours do. And that's what we'd correct, if we were put in charge.

Doc Faust remarked the other night that what is needed is less emphasis upon palaces for school buildings and more emphasis upon the level of instruction and the quality of teaching.

The good medico is absolutely right.

ON EVERY HAND, WE HEAR THAT LOCAL control of schools is desirable. It may be so. As local control of schools has been exercised in America over the past 40 years, we think the evidence is damning. Local control certainly can't cope with a crash program, because local control of schools won't provide the money fast enough.

It follows, we think, that if you want to catch up to the Russians at once, start a crash program. Eliminate, or severely curtail, local control of schools. You can't it otherwise.

For our part, we'd play the cards a bit closer to the vest, give leadership on a national basis so that our secondary program is sounder, with more emphasis on academics, and gamble on the theory that a well-rounded scholar will pay off more in the long run than the student whose mind has been filed to a pinpoint of knowledge of nuclear physics, or analytical chemistry or whatever.

NOR CAN THE PROFESSIONAL EDUCATORS get off scot-free. In Ohio, for example, when the state board wanted to raise qualifications for the diploma to two years of a natural science, the pros fought against it. They won, more's the pity.

Now we don't want to touch off an argument with any pro to the effect that standards in some schools are high enough that the change wouldn't mean much. If this was the case, what harm would be done in getting down on record the fact that Ohio high school graduates are required to complete two years of science?

Gentlemen, your slip was showing. And in taking such action, the professional educator got himself a bloody nose.

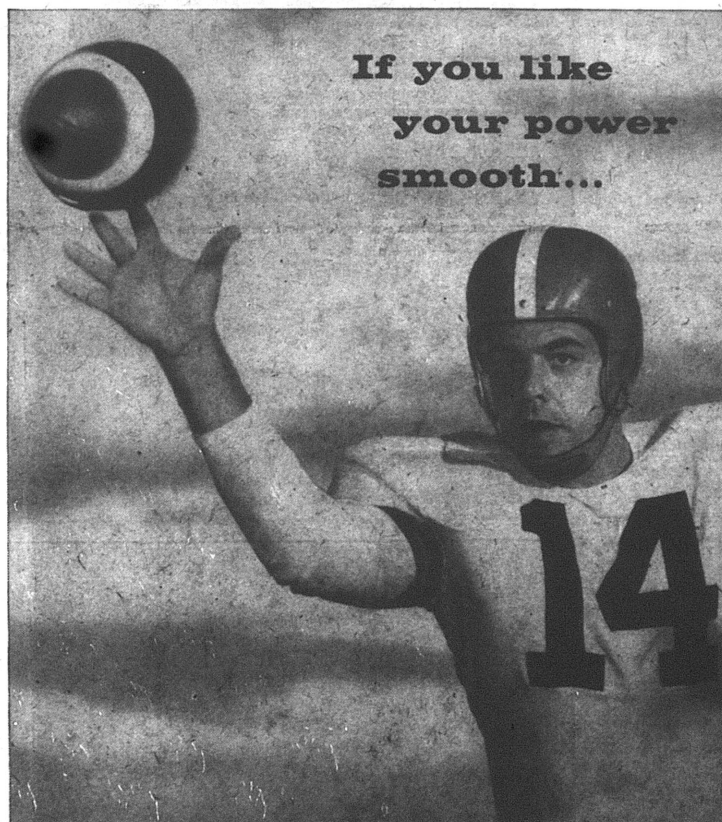
SECONDLY, WE ADMIT THE SOVIETS have, in one program, surpassed us. They've launched some satellites, which are harbingers of evil things to come.

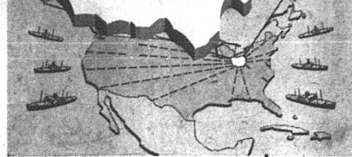

ORDINANCE NO. 21-57
An Ordinance establishing a "Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund Board" pursuant to Secs. 3310.01 to 3310.24 inclusive of the Revised Code of Ohio, and authorizing the expenditure of funds of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio from the General Fund of said Village in payment of the initial premium in the newly created Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund.
WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Ohio has repealed Sections 741.81 to 741.88 inclusive of the Revised Code of Ohio, and
WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Ohio has duly enacted Sections 3310.01 to 3310.24 inclusive of the Revised Code of Ohio, and
WHEREAS, this Village is now legally obligated to establish a "Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund Board" which shall administer the provisions of the newly created Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund, and
NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, as follows:
SECTION 1: There is hereby established a "Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund Board" to administer the provisions of the "Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund Act" for the Village of Plymouth Fire Department which shall have and exercise all of the powers conferred upon it by law or as herein provided.
SECTION 2: Said Board shall consist of five members who shall be chosen as follows, and who shall have the following tenure of office:
A. Two members shall be elected by the legislative authority of the Village of Plymouth;
B. Two members shall be elected by the Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth; and
C. One member shall be elected by the members elected in A and B above.
Election of Board members set forth in A and B above shall be held each year on the First Monday in December, and the election of the board member set forth in C above shall be held on or before the Second Monday of December of each year.
SECTION 3: Said Board shall forthwith hold an organizational meeting at which time the Board shall elect a chairman and a secretary. Such secretary shall keep a permanent and complete record of the proceedings of the Board. The secretary shall have all other duties which may be thereon imposed by law.
SECTION 4: The Clerk and Treasurer are authorized to expend the sum of Three Hundred and No-100 Dollars (\$300.00) of the monies of this Village for payment to the Treasurer of State, to the credit of the Volunteer Fireman's Dependents Fund.
SECTION 5: That in order to provide immediate protection of the public health and safety, and to facilitate the immediate implementation of the laws of Ohio specifically R. C. Secs. 3310.01 to 3310.24 inclusive this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall become effective immediately.
