Chest X-Rays, test for diabetes offered free to all Dec. 13

Huron county's health department has scheduled free X-Rays to detect tuberculosis and free diabetes tests at Cashman's Shoe store here Friday, Dec. 13, from 4 to 8 p.m.

"These X-Rays and tests are free to the general public and to food service personnel," says Charles H. Edell, county health commissioner, "and we urge all to avail themselves of this service."

EVERY CITIZEN OVER 15 years of age is urged to submit to the TB test.

All food service personnel in Huron county are required to undertake the X-Ray tests.

ANY PERSON OVER 30 years of age who wishes to submit to the diabetes test may do so, Dr. Edell reports. "It's a simple procedure," he says. "This gives everybody a chance to eat that extra piece of pie or cake or candy. Eat an extra piece of desert or candy after your lunch or dinner. State laboratory technicians will remove a small amount of blood for the test. It's fast, effective, and may be the way to save your life. Diabetes if detected early can be controlled with a minimum of difficulty."

He urges overweight persons over 30 who have a history of diabetes in their families to submit to the test.

Navy-bound man watches house burn to ground

A Navy-bound father saw his household effects nearly destroyed in a high wind Nov. 27 as Plymouth firemen battled a blaze in the house of Harrison Jacobs four miles southeast of here.

Damage was estimated at \$15,000 to the house owned by the Rev. A. T. Law, Lyons.

Plymouth Fire Department was summoned at 8 p.m. by a neighbor. Ray Arnold, 10, saw flames shooting from the roof.

Some 6,500 gallons of water from the local apparatus and from the Shelby water truck were poured onto the blaze in a futile effort to contain it. The seven-room house was all but leveled but furnishings and household goods were partly removed by neighbors.

The 100-bed, \$1,800,000 Fisher-Titus Memorial hospital is being hailed as the prototype of many community and suburban hospitals to come.

THE BASIC PHILOSOPHY behind the design of the hospital is to encourage the patient to rapid recovery in an atmosphere that parallels home life as closely as possible.

ly as possible.

The grim institutional aspect of old style hospital design has been completely abandoned by H. E. Beyer and Associates, Detroit architects, in favor of a one-story ranch plan.

There are seven wings to the hospital. Surrounding these wings are a number of landscaped courts and gardens.

THE CENTRAL FOCAL point of the hospital is the garden court. This is completely enclosed by wings and glass walls. Here

a recuperating patient can stroll in leisure along flower edged paths.

The maximum number of patients per room is four. The rooms are furnished in comfortable modern furniture and the beds are power-operated.

With the flick of a finger, a bed-ridden patient can move his bed into any number of positions. All rooms are individually air conditioned the year around.

THE SURGICAL AND MEDICAL facilities of Fisher-Titus include spotless operating rooms and maternity rooms that would do credit to the world's finest hospitals.

Fisher-Titus hospital was made possible by the \$1,000,000 contribution of two former Norwalk residents, Mr. and Mrs. William A. Fisher of the famous automotive family.
