

Dr. Hannum to quit Plymouth May 15 for Strongsville office

After 25 years in the practice of medicine here, Dr. Charles L. Hannum will close his office on the Square effective May 15 to move to Strongsville, where he will open a medical practice.

Dr. Pierre E. Haver will occupy the office space which Dr. Hannum is vacating.

"It's not easy," said Dr. Hannum Monday, "to leave this town, but this opportunity has a challenge that I feel I must accept."

An appointment to the staff of a metropolitan Cleveland hospital is in the offering, Dr. Hannum said. In it he will specialize in pediatrics, for the practice of which he has prepared himself by attending special graduate schools

over the past several years.

DR. HANNUM WAS NEWLY graduated from Western Reserve university when he came here a quarter century ago. Here he raised his family, two girls and a boy, served on the board of education, and settled eventually at 110 Plymouth street.

This property is on the market. The Hannums will live in Midleburg Heights.

No replacement for Dr. Hannum has yet been found. The Chamber of Commerce bestirred itself Thursday to investigate possibilities of obtaining another

doctor. Dr. Hannum notified the placement bureau of the Ohio State Medical association at Columbus that a practice would soon be vacant here.

The same office told The Advertiser Tuesday morning. "We would like to be able to say you'll get a new doctor tomorrow, but there just aren't any. We've got many hundreds of opportunities like yours listed here. The demand for doctors is greater than the supply. And new doctors tend to gravitate toward large hospital facilities."

New Haven man lies near death after truck crash

A young New Haven High school teacher holds grimly to a thin thread of life in Lodi Community hospital, to which he was rushed at 4:15 a.m. Monday after colliding with a truck a mile east of Homerville in Route 224.

He is James Ralston, 23, of Nantiglo, Pa., a roomer with Mrs. Mabel McPadden, who was returning to his teaching duties after a weekend with his family.

State Highway patrolmen of the Medina station reported Ralston apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his sedan and rammed the rear of a truck driven by Harvey Weston, Harmony, Pa., who told police he was travelling at 50 miles an hour.

The truck was badly damaged and the sedan a total loss.

Ralston was rushed to Lodi Community hospital, where Tuesday his mother was informed he has a fractured skull, crushed chest and severe lacerations of the head and body. He was only semi-conscious.

Cancer drive slated for village Monday

Plymouth residents will be solicited Monday night in the annual cancer drive for the Plymouth-Shelby-Shiloh Cancer Society chapter.

Headed locally by Mrs. Carl M. Lofland, solicitors will call at every residence in the village beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Chairmen for four parts of the village divided from the Public Square are Mrs. D. J. Ford, who will have the northeast part of the village; Mrs. George Eby and Mrs. Lofland, northwest; Mrs. Samuel G. Schroeder, southeast, and Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., southwest.

The solicitors will call for their money cans at the Peoples National Bank, and the money will be returned to Carl M. Lofland there.

Plymouth contributed more than its goal of \$550 last year. It is hoped the amount will go over again this year. Part of the monies collected remains in the three towns to help cancer cases who remain in their homes. The remainder is contributed to research.

The cancer clinic of Mayfield General hospital is available to area residents on an appointment basis. Any person desiring information concerning the clinic may call Mrs. Paddock.

Village gets \$4,880 bill, due since 1953 for retirement fund

Cheer up, citizen, if they put you in jail for not paying your taxes, you'll have company — important company.

State of Ohio notified the village Tuesday night that it is behind \$4,883.57, since October, 1953, in paying its share of contributions to the employees' retirement fund.

Clerk Carl V. Ellis says he never received a bill. The state says it sent one every six months. Whichever is the case, it will have to be paid, and the general fund will be hard put to do it.

NOR WAS THIS THE ONLY drain on the fund foreseen at Tuesday's meeting. On motion of John T. Dick, the council agreed to advertise for bids for a new police cruiser, for the second time. Police Chief Robert L. Meiser, told the budget wouldn't stand both a patrolman and a cruiser this year, said he'd do without the patrolman.

But until the school consolidation issue clears, the council won't be able to say whether a sewer bond issue will go on the November ballot. Mayor Thurman R. Ford said, "for my part, the answer is yes." But Councilmen Dick and Charles Vanasdale said, "We can't say for sure, yet."

For nearly 70 minutes the council debated the Leon Motter sewer tax problem, acknowledging that Motter has the village in a bad spot. It will cost at least half the amount owed to collect the bill.

And, as Vanasdale pointed out,

with some bitterness, "The Board of Public Affairs wants us to certify the bill to the auditor. It'll cost us five or six dollars just to publish it, and then we don't have any guarantee we'll get the money." The bill totals \$24.20 and was certified to the Richland county auditor by emergency ordinance.

HENRY TRAUGER WAS fired as street supervisor on a contract expiring Jan. 1 at the rate of \$3,600 annually.

He reported two pairs of rubber boots have disappeared, without trace, and that some user, perhaps a grocery, is dumping spoiled fruit and greens in the village refuse disposal lot. He was told that conviction of the offense can result in a \$50 fine.

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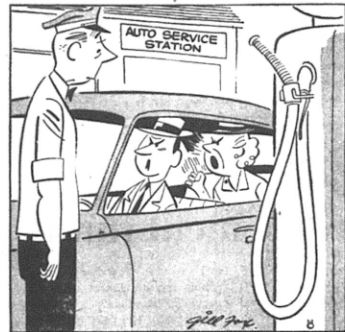

Vote on zoning slated May 7

New Haven township voters will be asked to approve a draft zoning regulation in a special election May 5.

Prepared by a five-man committee — C. Raymond Clark, chairman; E. Beryl Miller, Cloyce Slesman, Edward Rang and Jesse E. Ruth, secretary — the draft law divides the unincorporated parts of the township into residential, commercial and business, industrial and manufacturing districts.

No provision of the proposed regulation affects the use of farm land for agricultural purposes in any way.

RESTRICTIONS PROPOSED in the regulations:

Roadside stands must be at least 30 feet from the traveled portion of a road, and must be equipped with adequate off-the-road parking facilities.

Chemical plants, fat or glue distilling establishments, fertilizer manufacturing plants, explosive manufacturing, dumping or stor-

ing of animal or vegetable offal and refuse, junk yards, scrap yards, slaughter houses (except in industrial zone), contagious disease or insane hospitals, commercial aviation fields, and cabins where transient use is not restricted to 15 days or less annually are prohibited in residential or industrial districts.

Race tracks and tents used as residences are prohibited.

Single-family dwellings may not be erected on plots of less than 15,000 square feet in size. Two-family dwellings, may not be erected on plots of less than 30,000 square feet in size.

Apartment houses or living quarters above business establishments must provide for 2,500 square feet of lot area for each family.

NO DWELLING MAY BE erected on any lot having a frontage of less than 100 feet.

No building or structure may be erected within 50 feet of a road.

A side yard measuring 10 feet on each side of a dwelling must be included in any plans for new construction.

Rear yards measuring 15 feet in depth must be included in any plans for a new building.

First floor living space of any new dwelling house for one family must measure at least 800 square feet.

For a two family dwelling, the ground floor must measure 500 square feet of floor space.

All dwelling houses must allow for a minimum of 200 square feet for parking of vehicles used therein.

A BOARD OF TOWNSHIP zoning appeals is established in the draft. It shall include five members appointed by the township trustees for one year each.

Maximum fine of \$100 is laid down for proved violations of the regulations.

Rules of the Ohio building code are not superseded, the drafting committee says.

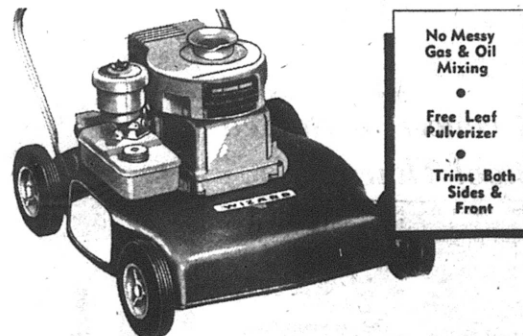

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'Two women in kitchen OK if'

"They used to say no kitchen is big enough for two women," says Mrs. C. H. Neidermeier, who lives in Route 298 in Auburn township, "but take it from me, it simply isn't so."

"Nobody," she claims, "could have a better daughter-in-law than I've got."

The Neidermeier household best speaks kindly care of family heirlooms and diligent, efficient management of the land which has supported the Neidermeiers for two generations.

MRS. NEIDERMEIER HAS been widowed two years now, and before that her husband was sick-

ly for several years. Today she operates the 132-acre place with the assistance of her only son, Phillip, who lives at home and farms nearly 100 acres of his own east of the family place. They rent another 80 acres from his paternal grandmother.

"We've got a complete line of modern machinery," Mrs. Neidermeier reports. "We've got three tractors and a new binder and a new cornpicker and a nearly new elevator. We don't have much livestock, although we have had as many as 34 cattle at one time. We're grain farmer and we work as hard at it as we can."

One of the developments of

modern America that she doesn't care for is the breakdown of family respect. "Some parents don't realize how much children mean until it's too late and some children never realize what good parents mean."

Another development that she decries is the attitude that you can get something for nothing. "Work on a farm a little while and you soon learn that God gives you out of the land about what you put into it. You've got to take care of it."

FOR ONE WHO HAS LIVED all her life in Crawford county and only once traveled out of Ohio — and then only to Michigan — Mrs. Neidermeier is remarkably well informed as to political, economic and social developments.

But no amount of attention to what goes on around you, she has found, will produce the one desire which outweighs all others in her household right now: good health.

"If this chest condition doesn't clear up soon," she asserts, "I'm going to have to do something drastic about it."
