New Haven township voters will be asked to approve a draft zoning regulation in a special election May 5.

Prepared by a five-man committee — C. Raymond Clark, chairman; E. Beryl Miller, Cloyce Sessman, Edward Rang and Jesse E. Ruth, secretary — the draft law divides the unincorporated parts of the towship into residential, commercial and business, and odlustrial and manufacturing distance.

No provision of the proposed regulation affects the use of farm land for agricultural purposes in any way.

RESTRICTIONS PROPOSED

RESTRICATION
in the regulations:
Roadside stands must be at least 30 feet from the traveled portion of a road, and must be equipped with adequate off-the-road parking facilities.
Chamical plants, fat or glue

Chemical plants, fat or glue distilling establishments, fertilizer manufacturing plants, explosive manufacturing, dumping or storing of animal or vegetable offal and refuze, junk yards, scrap yads, slaughter houses (except in industrial zone), contagious disease or insane hospitals, commer-cial aviation fields, and cabins where transient use is not restricted to 14 days or less annually are prohibited in residential or industrial districts.

Race tracks and tents used as

Race tracks and tents used as residences are probibited.

Single-family dwellings may not be erected on plots of less than 15,000 square feet in size. Two-family dwellings, may not be erected on plots of less than 30,000 square feet in size. Apartment houses or leving quarters above business establishments must provide for 2.500 square feet of lot area for each family.

NO DWELLING MAY BE erected on any lot having a front-age of less than 100 feet.

No building or structure may be erected with a 50 feet of a road.

Rear yards measuring 15 feet in depth must be included in any

in depin must be included in any plans for a new building.

First floor living space of any new dwelling house for one fami-ly must measure at, least 800 square feet.

For a two family dwelling, the ground floor must measure 500 square feet of floor space.

All dwelling houses must allow for a minimum of 200 square feet for parking of vehicles used therein.

A BOARD OF TOWNSHIP zoning appeals is established in the draft. It shall include five members appointed by the township trustees for one year each.

Maximum fine of \$100 is laid down for proved violations of the regulations.






