Remonstrance bid leads Shiloh board to call for hearing

Remonstrance petitions with more than the required number of signatures are reliably reported to be circulating in Shiloh school district, guided principally by Leland D. Wolfersberger, a self-styled "debunker", and this news has prompted the Shiloh board of education to take action.

It will conduct a public meeting Monday at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium to overcome what it believes to be "misinformation, confused public opinion fanned by steers of the remonstrance petition."

S. A. Stine, director of new constructions of the state department of education, will be moderator of the meeting. The Rev. Russell Hoy, 17th district representative on the state board, will appear. So will Richard County Prosecutor of the Common Pleas Theodore Lutz, Richland and Huron County Supts. Dale B. Kinney and Ralph W. Brown will be there.

The board has heard at least 12 arguments favoring a remonstrance petition which it believes to be the products of "misinformation, deliberate falsehood or just plain confused reasoning."

These include:

1. The board took the consolidation action in a secret meeting.
2. The board is hiding funds, not making a fair representation of the moneys available to Shiloh to go it alone.
3. All taxes paid by residents of Shiloh school district will be paid to Huron county.
4. Shiloh pupils won't be allowed to compete in the Richland county fair.
5. Elementary pupils will have to spend more time on bus.
6. The high school at Shiloh isn't overcrowded.
7. If a remonstrance petition is invoked, the citizens can decide for themselves on the November ballot.

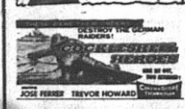


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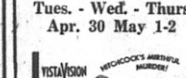

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THE PROPOSED TELEPHONE INCREASE

The adjustment that may be made in the present level of local telephone rates will be determined by The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio after complete and thorough investigation. The increase finally authorized may or may not be the amount requested by the Company.

Telephone rates are based on three primary factors: (1) An audit of our books by accountants of the Commission to determine our income and our expenses. (2) The fair present value of our telephone property and plant, less depreciation, as computed by qualified engineers of the Commission after an inspection and count of the items of our telephone plant, and (3) the determination of telephone rates that will give us a fair return or profit or profit on our telephone plant. These are the steps provided by the Statutes of the State of Ohio in fixing rates and charges.

The following unsolicited editorial appearing in the Clyde Enterprise under date of April 11, 1957 sets forth the independent opinion of one forthright Editor in our territory. It is quoted by permission.

"We note with interest that the mayors of communities served by the Northern Ohio Telephone Company may in the process of banding together to fight the company's proposal, now before the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, to raise substantially its rates and charges for telephone service.

In a way we can't blame the various communities too much for organizing to oppose the increases. It's natural to be against increases sought by the utilities companies, and then too, everyone is naturally against paying more for good and services. Especially now, with the cost of living gradually increasing, folks are particularly conscious of any price rises proposed for any of the everyday services they consider essential.

But is this attitude fair to the telephone company? With the cost of their operation unquestionably going up month by month, it would seem that they should be entitled to raise the price for their services to the point where they can make a fair return on their large investment. Why should the telephone company work for little or no profit, when the rest of us are continually getting higher prices and wages in order to keep up our standard of living and thrive?

The group which opposes the phone rates increase claims the company seeks an inequitable high increase in the price for its services. But are these people authorities on telephone rates? By what right do they claim to be the judge of what these rates should be? How in the world do they know what phone rates should be, to give the company a fair and equitable return? We find it hard to believe that any community, (most of which themselves are these days currently fighting for increased operating funds through increased taxation of one kind or another) is in any position to squawk when any utility asks for a fair increase in rates.

The organization opposing the phone increase is currently engaged in trying to collect 25 cent per head from all subscribers of the Northern Ohio Telephone Company in all exchanges of all districts in its growing system. It is figured that an average of 25 cent per head would raise more than \$24,000 with which to fight the phone company. Quite a tidy sum for someone to use over a period of a few months in an attempt to knock off the company's request!

We have no particular brief for the phone company, except that we think they are entitled to some increase in prices, the same as everyone else in these days of rising costs and prices. And we think they are entitled to the same consideration for their proposed rate increase by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio as the gas and electric companies, and other telephone companies, are always given.

After all, isn't the Public Utilities Commission in a better position to pass judgement on the company's requested increase than is a group of municipal officials, from a dozen or two towns, both large and small? Many of them actually don't know any more about what telephone rates should be than we do.

We know it is the popular thing, to oppose a utility when it seeks an increase in rates, but is it the fair thing to do? Why not let the PUCO, which is in a position to know these things, do the investigating and deciding, without a lot of hullabaloo and excitement?

And don't say we wrote this because we get a lot of business from the phone company. We do not. We get the same amount of business from them that other small town papers and print shops get, we suspect, and no more.

We just think the phone company deserves fair consideration for its request, without a lot of baiting and name-calling.

All the Telephone Company asks is an honest and fair appraisal of the economic conditions that face us just the same as they face everyone else."

the tax duplicate. It is empowered to do this. The decision is strictly in the field of policy. The board has decided to do it this way, and that's that.

The sixth fact is that county auditors don't like to encumber their already difficult jobs with additional detail, and they understandably resist additional informally - moves to add more bills to the tax duplicate. If the bill remains unpaid, for some years, a tax sale can be conducted, and the political subdivision which certified the past due bill can eventually collect its money.

It is worth noting here that much of the volume of delinquent taxes in Ohio counties represents assessments due on properties which are not worth the value of back taxes.

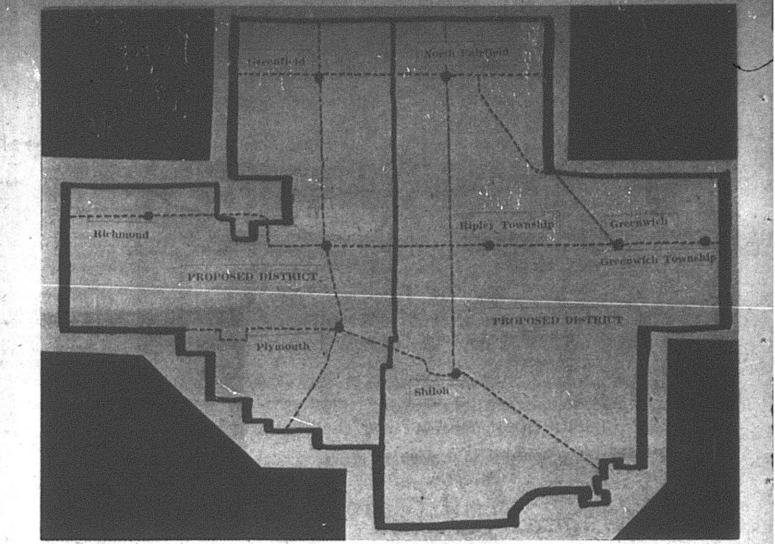
A seventh fact is that the council does not wish to allow any citizen to "get away with murder", i. e., to escape paying taxes which all other citizens pay. In the present instance, an example is, to be made of the recalcitrant taxpayer, to prove to the public the council is doing its duty by all equally and fairly.

IT WOULD PROBABLY BE CHEAPER TO sue the man outright. He can't very well defend himself before any court for \$24.20, and would probably be better advised to pay the money than to fight the assessment, which he might - and nobody has made any bones about the fact the sewer tax ordinance rests on shaky legal foundations - upset legally.

But the board doesn't want to do it that way. At least one of its members argues that the sewer tax is a little different from electric and water bills, which have to be paid in good time for services and goods delivered and used. The sewer tax, he submits, is a kind of "payment in advance for services not yet installed" and it really doesn't make much difference whether the money is collected now or six months from now, so long as it is collected.

The final fact is that no trustee of the board of public affairs, or member of the council, or any administrative official of any village, is required to submit to abuse, nor to deal with official business outside his office. This means that if you've got a squawk about utilities, appear at the Board of Public Affairs meeting, first Monday of each month. And if your squawk is about policy on utilities, NOT TO INCLUDE THE FACT THAT WATER HASN'T BEEN TURNED ON IN YOUR HOUSE FOR REASONS OF WHICH YOU'RE AWARE AND OF WHICH YOU KNOW THE COUNCIL IS AWARE, then turn up at council meetings, first and third Tuesdays of each month.

It is true you can't expect good government if you wash dirty linen in the streets instead of in the council chamber.

There was an illuminating discussion around the council table a week ago Tuesday, one which should have been recorded verbatim and made available to the general public. Because it brought out some facts about life that all too folks appreciate or even understand.

The first is that the mayor, whether Mr. Ford or anybody, has very little power. By statute, he can organize and administer justice through a mayor's court, and he can give orders to the police department. But beyond that point, more or less, he has no powers, can't even vote on ordinances, except in cases of the votes, and then not on fiscal matters.

THE SECOND IS THAT THE INCUMBENT has lately been abused a great deal by important citizens who are not entirely innocent. Not innocent because they have been informed they're barking up the wrong tree if they expect the mayor to "do something for me". He can't even if he wants to.

The third is that while general policy is laid down by the village council, particularly with respect to utilities and administration thereof, the actual book-work, the day-to-day execution of the policy, is carried out by the Board of Public Affairs. The board is jealous of its prerogatives and you wouldn't want it any other way - and the council tries to be scrupulous about not interfering with purely administrative routine.

Such as whether the water is turned on or off or whether a power bill is collected or not collected.

The fourth fact is that existing legislation authorizes the board to follow several procedures in the collection of past due accounts. One of them is to shut off the water service. Matter of fact, he board can shut off any municipal service at its good discretion, without reference to state or county requirements, so far as the board is legally advised.

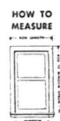

R. E. Nixon, 70, dies; Plymouth native

A native of this place, 70-year-old Robert E. Nixon was returned to his grave here Apr. 17.

An East Cleveland builder and civic leader, Mr. Nixon died in Lakeside hospital after undergoing surgery. He lived at 1200 Shaker boulevard there.

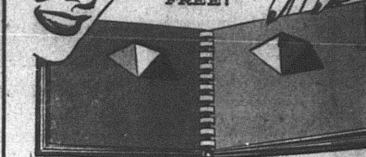

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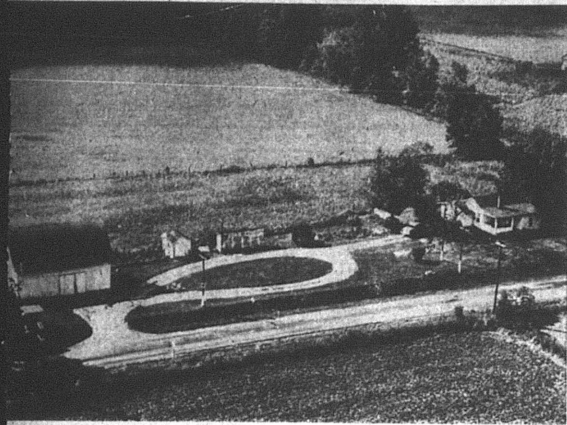

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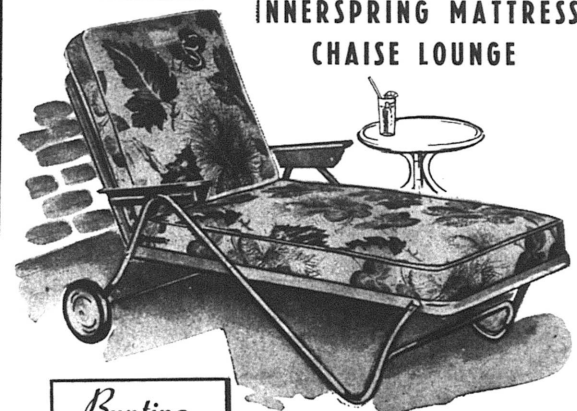
