Auditor refuses to take certification of back sewer bill

Richland county's auditor flatly refuses to accept certification of a delinquent sewer service charge of \$24.20 against lot 181, formerly the property of Leon Motter.

He said so, in a letter dated Apr. 17, addressed to Clerk Carl V. Ellis.

"We are of the opinion," Auditor Norman L. Wolfe wrote, "that we have no right to accept a certification for this kind of delinquent account and therefore respectfully refuse to do so."

What Wolfe's action amounts to, he said, is that the inclusion of a charge of this kind on our tax rolls would threaten the legality of the entire tax bill on that particular parcel of land and we have, therefore, refused to accept certifications of this kind from all of our taxing sub-divisions.

1. It can file for a writ of mandamus in Richland county common pleas court, throwing the whole sewer ordinance into judicial review. If the writ is upheld, the auditor would be compelled to accept the certification. This would be an expensive way for the village to test its controversial sewer tax policy.

2. It can alter its policy and file civil suit against Motter for the amount claimed, which might also put the legality of the ordinance into judicial review, assuming Motter would elect to change defense counsel and fight the issue through the courts. Question: can be defended himself for less than \$24.20?

Remonstrance pfft, Shiloh board acts to nullify petition

BULLETIN

Shiloh school board counted 155 signatures to a counter-remonstrance petition yesterday. Deadline for filing is Monday.

Shiloh school patrons received stern lectures in a public hearing attended by about 175 of them Monday night, and when the lecture had been read, effective remonstrance appeared to have been dissipated.

Protagonist during the three-hour forum was Leland D. Wolfersberger, whose first ascension among a number of risings to his feet was greeted by a smattering of applause. It was significant that applause died out as the evening wore on, and Mr. Wolfersberger himself became the target of attacks by elected officials.

One of them was Mrs. Helen Wilson, Belleville, a grandmother who has served 12 years on the Richland county school board.

SHE OBTAINED RECOGNITION from S. A. Stine, director of new construction to the state department of education, who was moderator, and sternly read off Shiloh school patrons and Wolfersberger particularly.

"The county board has worried about you folks up here in Shiloh for 12 years," she said. "Only last year you refused to consolidate with Plymouth, and you, Mr. Wolfersberger, said you especially wouldn't go in with Plymouth. You can't care very much about the future of your children. We are thinking about your children. You are not. And we haven't let county lines interfere with that thinking. You," turning to Wolfersberger, "had better remain silent, for you've never served on a school board and don't know the problems."

Mrs. Wilson's strong remarks were applauded loudly. Then Prosecutor Theodore Lutz, an element of hidden strength for those favoring the consolidation, said he thought her observations were well put, in the best sense of democratic government, and worthy of congratulation.

From this point Wolfersberger was done. Although he rose several times, he did so before a withering barrage of questions directed by Dale B. Kinney, Richland county school superintendent, that he never seemed to answer specifically. One of these was for an alternative plan to consolidation.

Here Wolfersberger bestowed the coup de grace. "We are not against consolidation," he said, "we are against going ahead so fast."

The speed of the consolidation machinery appeared to upset not only Wolfersberger but Harry

Ferguson, another proponent of remonstrance.

FERGUSON'S POINTED observations seemed to disturb the steers of consolidation until he ran afoul of Wallace Harnly, president of the Shiloh school board, who flung a sheaf of newspaper clippings at him and asked him to read them aloud. Ferguson declined, saying the information he sought was not there.

The issue devolved upon the question of the speed of consolidation and whether it had been reported accurately. Kinney had explained that a tight time-table was in force to arrange the consolidation. South-Central, he said, would not consolidate unless it could also get a bond issue on the board, who flung a sheaf of newspaper clippings at him and asked him to read them aloud. Ferguson declined, saying the information he sought was not there.

With a remonstrance period of 30 days required by law, the new board would have only 20 days in which to organize and get a bond issue on the ballot.

On these affirmative terms, South-Central agreed to go along with the consolidation.

The consolidation move was launched by the Shiloh board and by the Richland county board. Ferguson wanted to know why the Shiloh board hadn't discussed the matter with the people first. Lutz said the machinery laid down by the legislature doesn't admit of discussion of a motion before it is made.

"I can't see, folks," he said, "how your rights as voters, taxpayers and citizens have been compromised in any way. The action was taken and here you are ready to remonstrate with the law, exactly as envisaged by the law."

data regarding the new board, to serve after the next general election. Huron County Sup. Ralph W. Brown replied it would be appointed from among the present membership of the South-Central and Shiloh boards, to serve until November, when the membership would be elected.

Three would be elected for four years and two for two years. Wolfersberger's arguments apparently derived from a conviction that Shiloh as a community will perish when its high school is removed. "It is Shiloh's biggest business," he claimed.

He said he had talked with State Sen. C. A. Mosher and with the president of the state board of education at Columbus, which gave him hope that action by the General Assembly will give help to small schools. The Rev. Russell Hoy, 17th district member of the board, said he was not so confident as Wolfersberger this would transpire. He said the Assembly is in no mood to provide needed funds, a fact which Stine reiterated.

Now that spring is here, there is a certain excitement among the younger ones over new nests and new feathery families. We know we have a family of cardinals living on one side of us, and one of our neighbors has detected an extremely robust flicker who starts tapping for his breakfast on a telephone pole outside his bedroom window some time just before dawn.

We have something else, too. Moles. With the first grass cutting, it looks as though we have a colony living under our front yard. They are supposed to dig their house tunnels near water. I wonder if there isn't a hidden stream under our yard which the Board of Public Affairs has missed. If we use our power mower too often, I think they may become disgusted with noise and move. This is my first experience with moles, and I would like to see one. Then he (or she) can go back home.

ONCE WE LIVED WITH ants. Not the ordinary kitchen kind which drive a housewife to distraction, but huge ones about an inch long. They were called driver ants, and wonderful to watch so long as one was not winding his way up your leg. They would crawl up to the head, then snap, a good, hard snap, too. They never left a mark. More than once we had to strip to get them off. The first year we lived in our native mud house in Ethiopia, we must have had a queen living somewhere under the garden. Days would go by, and no ants. Then you would walk out to pick a flower, and there would be literally millions and millions covering every bit of the ground. Occasionally we would have them come out of the woodwork and up the walls in the house. One word, formicid, which is Italian for ant, brought the whole household into instant action. Everyone rushed out for eucalyptus branches, which we put along the floors. They would not cross them, and eventually, we would line up to go back into the wall. of one subject a day for 176 days (a school year) can be offered in place of the present 30½ units in Shiloh High school.

Richland County Board President Lewis Rhinhardt rose from the floor to offer his resignation and let Wolfersberger or any other Shilohian "carry the ball on this school issue. We've worked long hours to try to help you and solve your problems, and you frankly have not been fair to your local board. All you do is squawk, criticize," he said.

He pointed out that compliance with post card surveys had been less than satisfactory.

STINE AT THIS POINT said that as a member of the so-called nine per cent board (the group which decides whether a local school district shall be authorized to bond itself to nine per cent of its tax valuation) he would vote against such a proposal.

"Shiloh hasn't the qualifications and can't meet with the policies of the board, and I would vote against it."

Under the six per cent maximum, Shiloh can raise only \$37,000.

Wolfersberger rose for a feeble and garrulous, circumlocutory observation, saying South-Central doesn't want Shiloh, whereupon a voice in the balcony sought recognition.

It came from a husky, ruddy-faced chap later identified as Albert McGill, formerly a member of the Greenhigh school board before it was consolidated with

South-Central.

He begged for forbearance in signing a remonstrance petition. And he said that more than 1,000 signatures have been affixed to a petition praying the Huron county school board to effect consolidation with Shiloh at once.

This was the last straw. It demoralized organized opposition to consolidation and Wolfersberger was routed. The crowd dispersed in rapid fashion, many of them stopping outside the door to sign a counter-remonstrance petition.

"Unlawfully interfering, etc., with electric light power or street railway property. Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures or destroys or intentionally permits to be injured or destroyed, disconnects, displaces, cuts, breaks, taps, ground, or makes a connection with or wilfully or maliciously interferes with any pole, pier, cable, tower, wire, legally erect-

ed, put or strung, electrical apparatus, appliance or machinery used in the construction or operation of an electrical railway, electric light plant, plant used in generating or transmitting electricity, or any meter, pipe, conduit, wire, line, post, lamp, burner, heater, machine, ractor, or other appliance or apparatus used in the construction or operation of any such electrical railway or electrical plant, from duly registering the quantity of electricity supplied, or interferes with the proper action or just registration by such meter, or alters the index in such meter, or, without the consent of the owner of such electrical railway or electrical plant, wilfully or maliciously diverts electric current from any such wire or otherwise wilfully or maliciously uses, or causes to be used, without the consent of the owner of such electrical railway or electrical plant, electricity manufactured or distributed by any such electrical railway or electrical plant, shall be fined not less than five dollars, nor more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not less than thirty days, nor more than one year, or both."

Sec. 12512.2 applies similarly to water meters.

All meters have now been sealed. Any breach of seal will be considered in accordance with the foregoing.

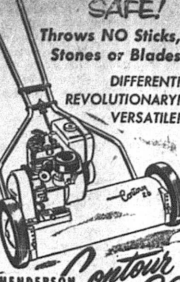

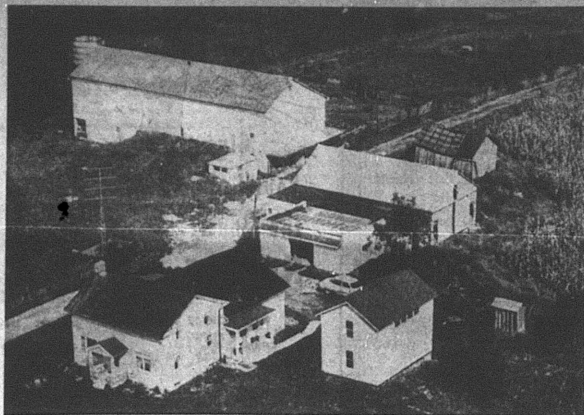

THE LONELY BARKER

for the sake of the neighbors as well as your own family to do something about it. The younger he is the easier it is to break him of the habit.

Start off by putting him in a room by himself with his toys for short periods of time during the day. If he gets used to being alone during the day, nights alone won't seem so fearful. He may discover after his first few howls of rage that it's doing him no good. If he persists, however, order "quiet" every time you hear a yip. If this is ignored, accompany the word "quiet" with a rap on the door.

If this too fails, go into the room and administer a folded newspaper to the backside along with a loud "quiet". Repeat this as often as necessary. He'll finally realize that you're within earshot and paper reach.

Your next step is to leave the house, or rather let him think you've left. Close the front door with a resounding bang, tiptoe back to the puppy's room and wait for the barks. At the first sound rap on the door, repeat your "quiet" order. The pup may be so surprised and puzzled as to how you got back into the house that he'll be quiet for the rest of the day. If not, you'll just have to repeat the routine supported with trips into the room.

Feeding Tip: All dogs need a certain amount of fat in their diet. Active dogs, such as those that hunt or run in the country, need more than the usual quota. One way to make sure your dog is getting just the proper amount is to feed him all-purpose dog food such as Fris-Tes.

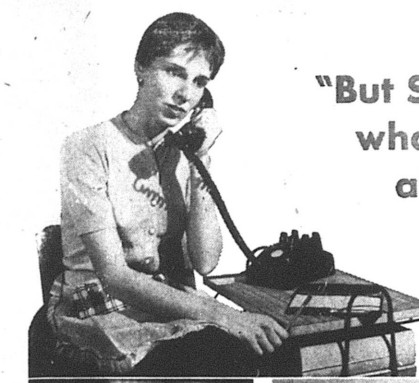

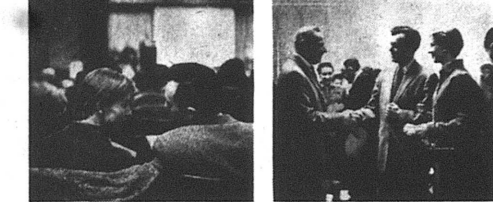

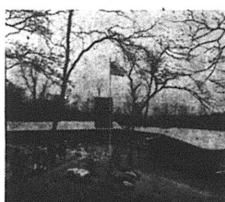
