Council may fight auditor's refusal to act on ordinance

If Norman L. Wolfe, Richland county's auditor, is sued in a mandamus action, the village council was told Tuesday night, the court's decision would turn on the point of whether he has the right to refuse to accept the certification for delinquent sewer service charge.

There would be no test of the legality of the sewer ordinance, Solicitor Joseph F. Dush said. "I feel," he stated, "the county auditor has absolutely no right to put upon the legality of any ordinance, regardless of its character. That is a matter for a court."

The council tended to agree with Dush and instructed him to pursue his suggested course of action: study the legal aspects of the matter for another two weeks, then bring in a report.

POLICE CHIEF ROBERT L. MEISER sadly won out 1954-model police cruiser will be sold and replaced, the council decreed. Bids will be received for a replacement with trade-in.

Renters of residential property will be required to pay \$15 security deposit for utilities hereafter, the council decreed, and penalties for delinquent utilities bills were raised from five to 10 per cent.

A contract of labor between the village and Henry M. Trauger as street supervisor was entered into and signed. He will be paid at the rate of \$3,600 a year.

Huron county's road department has come up with an estimate of \$2,700 for resurfacing streets on that side of the village. Since only \$3,400 is available in the appropriation, and there are some streets in Richland county needing attention, the street committee will meet tonight to pare down the requirements on the Huron county side.

The cemetery board requested the renewal of the one mill operating levy, to be submitted on the November ballot.

ANNUAL VILLAGE CLEAN-UP days will be Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 21, 22 and 23. Huron county residents will be served May 21, Richland county residents the next day, and business houses around the Square on the next day.

General fund balance was \$6,151.12 on May 1, Clerk Carl V. Ellis announced, and balance in the sewer service fund was \$14,031.11.

Delinquencies in this fund are so small, Board of Public Affairs President Robert L. McIntire told the council, that the Board sees no reason to change its policy, "even though there is a slight increase in the amount of delinquencies."

"We don't feel the sewer service fund is as yet a proprietary business of the village and we don't need to be so difficult about enforcing collection. When the time comes, we can always send Mr. Moser to the offender with a wrench to turn the water off."

Delores A. Moser, widow of Charles A. Moser, seeks \$150,000. Mrs. Phyllis M. Ayres, North Fairfield, mother of Moser's children, has filed suits of \$50,000 each in behalf of the two surviving children, Marsha, four, and James, nine.

Five persons died in the crash. Reeder is defendant in each instance.

Wade L. McKown, 34, co-proprietor of Weber's cafe, died instantly early Thursday morning when his sedan left Springmill road in Jackson township and struck a tree.

Death was caused, Richland County Coroner Dr. D. C. Laven-der said, by a fractured skull and multiple head and chest injuries. Police required three hours to remove the body from the car, which went 675 feet in a ditch before hitting the tree. Police surmised McKown, who was returning from a business trip to

Youngstown, fell asleep at the wheel. The crash occurred at about 3:30 a.m.

An open letter for John Q. Citizen, general delivery, Shiloh, Ohio

You will, I hope, forgive us if we respond to your inquiry thus publicly.

What good, you want to know, did it do the opponents of consolidation to wash that dirty linen in public.

First of all, let's look at the record. The consolidation with South-Central was admittedly not the first solution that was proposed. And the Shiloh board of education continuously sought to effect a bigger consolidation, hoping that New Haven, Greenfield, Richmond and Plymouth would join in with South-Central also.

Secondly, turmoil in South-Central, in part generated by intense personal feelings, had resulted in a situation that was obviously unhappy. And the South-Central board of education insisted — and rightly, we think — on respect of what it considered was an obligation to the patrons of the district to put a bond issue for a new school on the ballot promptly. It had wished to do so in July, in a

special election, but was willing to go along with the consolidation if a guarantee was given that a bond issue would be forthcoming no later than November.

Thirdly, and this is the real point, nobody made clear, in the local press, at least, that time was of the essence. Neither daily nor weekly newspaper was informed that a condition of the adherence to a consolidation move by South-Central was that a bond issue absolutely had to go on the ballot in November.

This left only 21 working days in which to organize a board from the membership of the two consolidating boards, to float a bond issue resolution, and to file it with the board of elections of Huron county.

If we as a newspaper were remiss, lay the blame upon the tendency of school boards to want to conduct discussions of this type without the presence of newspaper reporters. As was reported by Supt. Ralph W. Brown at Shiloh, the boards caucused during

their discussions. No reporter can butt in on all the caucuses, whether or not he is welcome. And if parties to those caucuses wished to discuss the matter privately, they were within their rights, so long as they took no formal action privately.

Let's hope they've learned a lesson. It's always better to tell all the facts, and to volunteer them freely and openly. Don't rely upon newspaper reporters to dig for the facts, because some newspaper reporters aren't so energetic as the best.

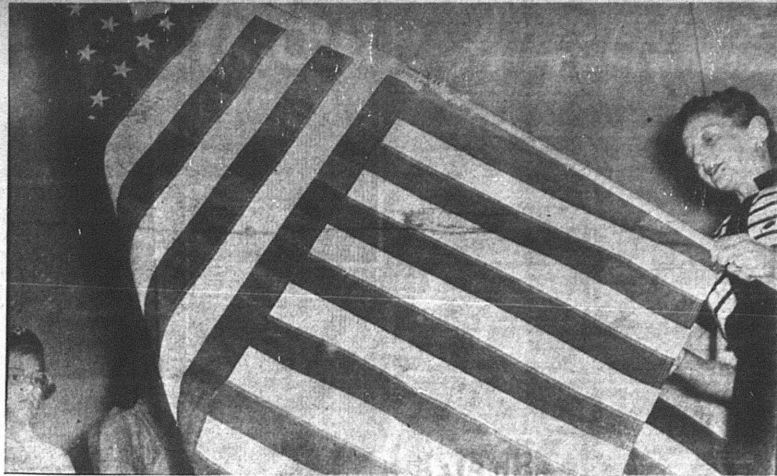
What it all amounts to is that rural communities are changing. Television, radio and better transportation have brought the world outside to the milking parlor and the hog pen. Folks in the country see and hear and get a taste of the advantages of city life and wish it for themselves, without accepting the disadvantages.

And they have an obligation in doing so. You can't dance unless you pay the fiddler. You can't expect to get

the whole story unless you let officials, whether elected or appointed, tell the whole story without fear or favor. And you can't expect to get leadership unless you are willing to let elected and appointed officials put their necks out — and yours, too — for progress.

This is no brief for big city journalism in a small town. Names still make news, and we intend to keep it that way. But you wouldn't settle for a half-baked job by your local doctor, would you, knowing you can get a well-done job in the big city? Then why expect your local newspaper to settle for a half-baked job? And why criticize it when it does the full job and in doing so stamps on your toes?

For our part, we think Shiloh will survive the washing of dirty linen, if that is what it was. Sometimes a family fight between Ma and Pa over Junior's schooling makes for clearer air. And when the air is clearer, why Junior always benefits.

Good ground comes high, however. And what's good ground? "Why, this sandy stuff north of my barn. It'll give you 100 bushels of corn an acre if you get a good season."

Not like last year, though. "We didn't get the seed in until the middle of June, as it was so wet, and then we had a killing frost toward the third week in September."

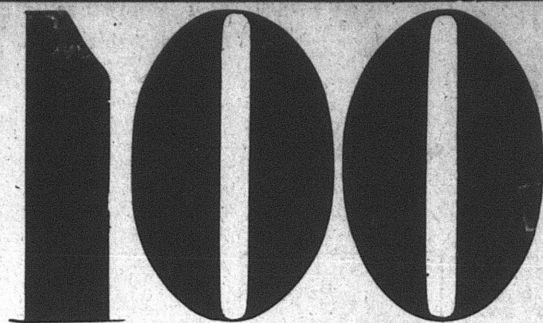

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO FIXING SECURITY DEPOSITS FOR UTILITIES AND PENALTIES FOR LATE PAYMENTS, AND DELETING AN EMERGENCY. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO THAT:

SECTION 1. From and after the 7th day of May, 1957 a deposit of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) shall be required to be made with Clerk of The Board of Public Affairs as a Security deposit for each applicant for any of the utilities services of the Village, after the 7th day of May, 1957.

Except that a user of the utility's service of the Village who is also the owner of the property where the said use is to occur may obtain exemption from the security deposit herein provided for by executing a statement of his said property ownership to the office of the Clerk of the Board of Public Affairs. Upon termination of all utilities services of the Village, any remaining portion of the said utilities services deposit unused for paying any utilities bills, shall be returned to the Customer.

SECTION 2. From and after the 7th day of May 1957, a penalty of Ten (10) per cent of the bill shall be added to all bills for utilities services purchased from the Village of Plymouth not paid on the due date.

SECTION 3. This ordinance is an emergency measure and shall be for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety and shall go into effect immediately, the reason for this emergency being that the provisions in connection with utilities bills herein made are necessary in order to properly operate the utilities of the Village of Plymouth for the protection of the lives and property of the people.
