Coon given top school post by new Huron Valley district

Maynard J. Coon was hired as executive head of the newly organized Huron Valley Local School district organized Monday night.

Allen Wiles of Greenfield, Neil Slesman of New Haven, J. Harold Cashman of Plymouth, Haldon Echeaman of Plymouth, and Lauren Eitle of Richmond township, the new board, agreed to pay Mr. Coon \$7,500 a year plus \$500 annual car allowance. He received \$6,200 plus a \$300 car allowance from the Plymouth system. A three-year contract was authorized.

In the routine business of organizing the new board, Cashman was chosen president with Slesman as vice-president. Mr. Eitle was named temporary clerk for the evening.

OFFICIAL MEETING OF the board will be the second Monday at 8 p.m. of each month in the office of the executive head. For the present, Mr. Coon will maintain his office in the Plymouth building. He will move it to New Haven as soon as space is equipped, which is expected to be two months.

First snag in the meeting occurred when the problem of hiring a clerk was broached. Clerks of the former Richmond, Greenfield and New Haven boards had indicated they are not interested in the position. It was agreed the job is almost a full-time one. A suggestion was offered that the new clerk could also serve as a secretary to Mr. Coon, which would eliminate much unnecessary work. The former boards paid salaries which amount to \$3,200 a year. Eitle felt this amount is too much to pay, since the work actually would not be four times as much. No decision

was reached as to salary. The four clerks would continue at their present salaries for one month, so their books will be brought up to the end of the fiscal year as required by law. Earl C. Cashman, clerk of the Plymouth board, agreed to do the clerk's work for several months providing he can have help. This was agreed upon. In the meantime, the board will receive applications for the position.

Cashman, present as a representative of Peoples National bank, offered the bank's services as a depository of school funds. The Willard United bank also offered its services to the new school district. No decision was reached. Later a reference was made to state school regulations that banks located within the school district only are eligible to act as depositories, providing they offer the required collateral.

FIRST POSITIVE ACTION of the board came when Slesman moved that experimental kindergarten classes be held for 20 days at New Haven. The vote was unanimous for it. Children eligible to enter the first grade in the four schools may attend. Morning classes will be held at the New Haven building from July 8 to Aug. 10. Parents must transport their children back and forth. At present, only one teacher will be hired, but if enough children are registered for the experiment, another will be added.

The board approved Oct. 15 as the date for eligibility to enter the first grade in all four schools. A child must have reached his sixth birthday by that date. The cut-off date for the Plymouth school had been Oct. 15 while the other three schools used the Sept. 15 deadline.

All existing contracts held by teachers in the four schools will be honored by the new board. New contracts will be offered where needed. No salary schedule was determined. The board will review all salaries and the eligibility for increases which will fit into the new budget. At present, teachers in Huron county are receiving slightly more than those in Richland county and an increase is expected.

Coon suggested the board inform the state department that a maximum bond issue will be put in the November ballot. He outlined building needs to include a new high school, a multi-purpose room at Greenfield, and minor repairs to the other buildings.

COUNTY SUPT. RALPH W. Brown suggested the matter be determined at the next meeting as the state board is now in session

and will act on a bill proposed by Sen. Charles A. Mosher to give state aid to districts in their building programs as suggested by the Heller report. The board passed a resolution to hire Squier Sanders and Dempsey, Cleveland attorneys, to prepare the resolution which will be forwarded to the state board when the information is available. It must be filed by July 15.

Plans for the junior high school at New Haven were approved. Robert Pleunik will be principal of junior high school. This will include seventh and eighth graders. All four schools of high school will be housed in the Plymouth building.

Coon last in line

Termination of tenure of Maynard J. Coon as executive head of Plymouth public schools by his appointment as executive head of the Huron Valley Consolidated School district brings to an end 28 appointments to the post here.

New court law deprives citizen of small claim prosecution

Administration of justice in Richland and Huron counties takes a different turn as of now. Special circumstances affect New Haven and Plymouth townships.

Ohio's legislature has approved bills eliminating justices of the peace. Those who hold commissions now may continue to discharge their offices until Dec. 31, but won't draw any pay from county commissioners, who've been told they can't draw warrants to reimburse past dues.

Legally, Shelby will have a part-time municipal court, which will have jurisdiction over Cass, Plymouth and Sharon townships, among others.

SO WILL WILLARD, IN ALL probability Huron county has a population of just under 50,000, is thus entitled to two municipal courts under the new law.

The decision is that of the common pleas court at Norwalk. Since the judge of the court must be a lawyer after 1960, the situs of the court should, legislators

reason, be where there are lawyers available. In Huron county, Willard is the only community outside Bellevue and the county seat where there is more than one active attorney.

What it means to the citizen: You'll have to postpone any claims for unpaid bills, or suits for eviction of tenants who don't pay, until the state gives you a court in which to lay an action, come Jan. 1. Unless, of course, your bill is for more than \$300, in which case you can file suit in the common pleas court.

New Haven township hasn't any justice of the peace. Wood W. Arnold, Shiloh, has jurisdiction over Cass and Plymouth townships.

You're likely to find the cost of government going up. State highway patrol cases will be tried in municipal courts, thus depriving local (mayor's) court of revenues deriving from such cases. Monroeville stands to lose \$1,000 a month. Municipalities

relying heavily upon such revenues will have to tighten their belts or loosen private purse-strings. The latter is likely. Governments don't find it easy to cut costs.

If the statute of limitations (six years in Ohio) runs out between now and Jan. 1, you've got two courses of action:

1. Appeal to the justice of the peace (if in Plymouth or Cass townships) to make an exception in your case, perform for free (and it's against the law to offer him private payment.)
2. Take your liking with a mental reminder not to allow any unpaid bill to go six years without payment.
