

Strine appointed to head high school; four teachers hired

Wayne Strine was hired as principal of Huron Valley High school on a three-year contract at \$6,000 annually by the new school board Friday night. He will move his family to Plymouth.

In other action, the board:

1. Hired four new teachers.
2. Appointed a librarian.
3. Hired a clerk and assistant.
4. Engaged an architect for the new building.
5. Raised teacher salaries.

New teachers are Mrs. Iva

Tucker, fourth grade instructor in New Haven elementary center; Miss Barbara Everts, second grade instructor in New Haven; Miss Marilyn Collier, girls' physical education, English and history instructor in the high school; and Charles Lutz, a June graduate of Bowling Green State university, who will be assistant music director and instructor of vocal music in elementary classes.

Mrs. Milton Shantz, who has a master's degree in library science, will be head librarian.

EARL C. CASHMAN, Plymouth, was appointed clerk of the board at \$1,800 annually. His assistant, who will also be secretary to Supt. M. J. Coon, will be Mrs. Kenneth Myers who got a \$1,000 raise to \$3,225.

Charles Marr associates, New Philadelphia were hired to prepare plans for the new high school and for modifications to the Greenfield elementary center.

All teachers in the former Plymouth system received annual raises of at least \$300 — and some got \$400 — to bring their salary levels to within \$100 of the Huron county salary schedule.

Peoples National bank was appointed official depository funds for the school district.

A special meeting will be held at 8 p.m. today for assignment of pupils. Budget hearing will be chosen by July 15.

Next regular meeting of the board is July 8 at 8 p.m.

Chamber asks mayor candidate for claims court

Candidates for mayor in the November election — and their nominating petitions are due by Aug. 7 at 4 p.m. — will be asked by the Chamber of Commerce to declare in advance whether they will operate a small claims court.

Ohio law provides that mayors may enforce collection suits.

The Chamber voted, unanimously Thursday night to request candidates for mayor to state in advance whether they will receive complaints and enforce collection and implied that candidates who won't do so (it's voluntary; the law doesn't require mayors to do it, but allows them to do so) won't get the Chamber's support at the polls.

The move was dictated by the collapse of justice of the peace services after passage of the controversial county court law which provides for municipal court jurisdictions in lieu of justices of the peace.

Boys escape hurt in midnight crash

Three Plymouth youths, narrowly escaped injury or death at 10:10 p.m. Sunday when a Mansfielder struck their car in a collision that took his life.

The boys — Dennis McGinnis, 16-year-old son, of the Kenneth McGinnises; Duane Utis, 16, son of the Woodrow Utises; and Buddy A. Berberick, 18, son of the Theodore Berbericks — were driving north in young McGinnis' vehicle when Alvin Roane, 23, headed south in Bowman Street road a tenth of a mile north of Route 96, lost control of his speeding car and sideswiped them.

Roane's car careened into three trees. He was dead on arrival at Shelby Memorial hospital. The boys were not hurt.

Young McGinnis was able to drive his car on its own power.

New PO rates

Rates for special post office services will go up Monday, Acting Postmaster Raymond L. Brooks says.

Money order fees will be increased five cents.

Insurance fees will be raised five and 10 cents.

Special delivery fees will go up 10 cents, from 20 to 30 cents.

Special handling fees are increased five cents, also.

The increases are in line, the postmaster general announced at Washington, D. C., with the desire of Congress to place all services of the post office department on a paying basis.

Fire believed to have been caused by lightning which struck the telephone system gutted the H. James Root cottage in Plymouth East road Saturday evening.

The occupants, Mr. and Mrs. James P. Nowakowski, were absent when the fire broke out.

Both electric clocks in the house were stopped at 7:40 p.m., but fire authorities believe the blaze smoldered for some time before bursting into flame.

MRS. NOWAKOWSKI HAS been staying at Fremont with her mother while awaiting arrival of their second child. Mr. Nowakowski who is an instructor of English and social studies in the high school, was visiting his wife at the time.

He has been engaged as an insurance salesman during the summer.

But he failed, unaccountably, to provide insurance coverage for his household furnishings, which

are almost a total loss.

"MY BROTHER-IN-LAW, who knows about these things," Nowakowski said Monday, "thinks the appliances can be rescued. But the rest of the stuff is a complete loss. I am afraid."

T. S. Taylor new Methodist minister

The Rev. Thomas Sheldon Taylor has been appointed pastor in charge of the Plymouth and Shiloh Methodist churches and will preach his first sermon Sunday.

Chronister jailed after bank robbery

The Sunday school teacher turned bank robber is at it again, with no more success than before.

Elmer Eugene Chronister, 37-year-old two-time loser, has confessed to robbing Lucas State bank of \$3,000 Tuesday at 12:58 p.m.

With a Negro companion, whose identity he steadfastly refused to reveal, Chronister entered the bank at gunpoint. The companion held two women clerks and another customer at his while Chronister scooped up \$3,000 in cash. They fled in his 1941 Oldsmobile sedan and headed for freedom.

RICHLAND COUNTY SHERIFF's deputies alerted a five-county police network and the car was contained in the area of Ashland county road 71 and Route 603, near where the latter enters Route 42.

Less than two hours later, Chronister was back in the hands of the law, the third time in his checkered career. The companion left the car in flight.

In 1948 he was sentenced to 15 years in the federal penitentiary after conviction by a federal grand jury for robbing a bank at Chronister was trapped.

Sheriff Long dies of heart ailment

Richland County Sheriff Emmett P. (Doggie) Long, 54, for 13 years chief law enforcement officer of the county, died in Peoples hospital, Mansfield, Sunday night.

He was stricken Sunday evening at his new home in Upper Lucas road, near Mansfield. With Mrs. Long, who survives, he had worked there during the day. The heart attack came just before dusk.

RUSHED TO THE HOSPITAL by his chief deputy, Tony S. Capodonna, who was summoned by Mrs. Long, Sheriff Long lingered until 8:30 p.m.

He began his career in the sheriff's office as a deputy to Walter Underwood in 1932. After serving four years in this post, he won election as sheriff on the Democratic ticket in 1936. After completing this term, he returned to his trade — electrician — and worked eight years at it. But the call of politics was too great and he threw his hat in the ring in 1948. Successful at the polls, he was twice reelected. His tenure of office as sheriff was the longest in the history of Richland county. In December, 1956, he was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage and was absent from his post for several weeks while undergoing treatment in Mansfield and

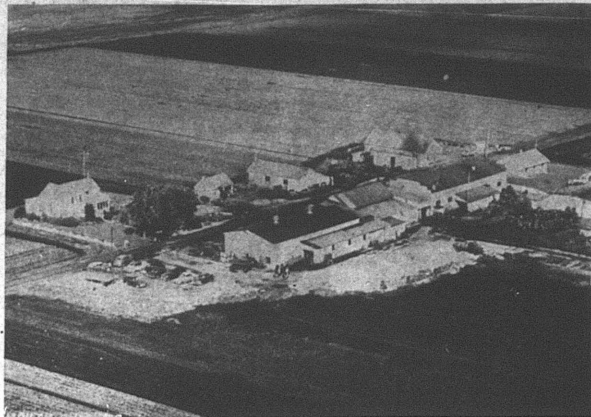

Manager Tug Mellott's revitalized P.O.M. Giants were to meet Bachrach Co.-New Haven Supply Braves for the contest which should have decided the first half flag.

MELLOTT SHOOK UP HIS lineup after last week's disastrous outing against the lowly F-R-H Cubs and sent Freddie Buzard from third to second, Doc Cunningham from catcher to third and Chip Paddock behind the bat. The shift worked out well for all concerned. Buzard and Paddock, at least, found their batting eyes and got two bingles apiece.

Lefty Joe Boyle will be seeking to avenge his defeats at the hands of the Braves, who will counter with Terry Linday.

(Assuming that wet grounds force postponement of last night's contest, the Braves and

Giants will play Saturday afternoon.)

Manager Larry Root's Firemen-Legion Reds fell into poor luck last week. With two players off on vacation, the Reds couldn't quite cut the mustard and lost two, although they were challenging the Braves in the sixth when a threatening rainstorm forced the umpire to call the game.

THE BRAVES SHAPE UP AS the strongest team in the league unless Mellott's shifts pay off for the Giants over the long pull.

It was no secret the Giants were down the middle, except on the hill, where Boyle is potentially the best pitcher in the league.

The green-clad nine had a centerfielder who didn't much care about outfield play, although he has a good arm; a catcher who cost them runs by interference with the batters, and a second baseman who was too small to do them much good.

Now the little second sacker is comfortably ensconced in left, where he electrified the crowd Thursday with a shoestring catch. The catcher is at third, where he is happier, and the centerfielder is behind the bat, where he did

all right for himself, considering it was his first try.

Within a few days, the Welcome Wagon, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, will call upon them to extend greetings in behalf of the business community.

But it isn't enough that businessmen should make the Taylors — or anybody else, for that matter — welcome. Newcomers deserve the friendly "hello" of every man, woman and child in a community.

Be sure that you don't fail to make them welcome.

There remain a little more than 60 days for public-spirited citizens to make up their minds that public service is necessary, desirable and worthwhile.

Nominating petitions for six posts of the village council, the mayor's post, village clerk, treasurer, and five seats on the Huron Valley Local School board must be filed not later than 4 p. m. Aug. 7.

Doubtless some of the incumbents will wish to run again. This is a good thing. We thus retain the advantage of experience, and the decision of the electorate, if favorable, may be rightly construed as a public endorsement of the policies and demeanor of the candidates seeking reelection.

It is our hope there will be plural choices for each office. And that candidates will stand up for one program or another.

We have heard a considerable amount of comment of late concerning the situs of the proposed high school. To these comments, we offer this suggestion: one way to have

some say in the decision is to run for office yourself, or to propose a candidate whose ideas run parallel to yours.

In either case, it means taking sides, which is certainly no sin. And there is this to keep in the back of your mind: Plymouth will soon be the most expensive town in either county to live in.

If you think you ought to get more for your money — and this is certainly no slur upon the incumbents — then be sure you nominate candidates who stand for economy.

Of course, it's a little hard to lock the barn after the horse is gone, by which we mean that by waiting so long for necessary public improvements we have passed into the higher cost bracket. And the situation is bound to get worse instead of better.

The board of elections of either Huron or Richland county will be glad to furnish information. All you need do is ask for it.

We're a little teed off. It's about the Girl Scout house. Ten years ago, this newspaper took the lead in soliciting funds to buy the building, which never proved satisfactory, for various reasons. That's why — and the only reason — we're sticking our nose in.

The agreement between the park board and the Girl Scout organization stipulates that title to the building shall rest with the board but control shall remain with the Girl Scouts. The agreement is irrevocable and the board is entirely within its legal rights in refusing to allow the Girl Scout organization locally to dispose of the building. Besides, it has the notion of converting the building to a tool house.

BUT LET THE BOARD CONSIDER TWO facts: one is that the agreement permits the Girl Scouts to resume control of the building at any time, which they're unlikely to do because by location, facilities and size the building is manifestly unsuited to their purposes. The other is the agreement can certainly be revised by mutual consent so that our Girl Scouts can dispose of the building and take the money to pay their own way in the Appleside area, which they have just joined, and for other useful purposes.

The need for a tool shed, we are certain, is important. But not so important that we have to practice moral unfairness to a fine organization which depends for its support entirely upon public benefactions.
