

Explosion rocks village, gas blast burns Charles Hockenberry; condition critical

Forgetfulness said cause of accident at Bell street home

A blast at 8 a.m. Monday rocked the village, destroyed a new frame building at the rear of 39 Bell street and critically injured its owner, Charles Hockenberry, 39.

He is in Willard Municipal hospital, where his condition is described as "very poor".

HOCKENBERRY WENT TO the new frame building, measuring about 20x20 feet, shortly before 8 a.m. He returned to his house and when he reentered the shop, where he rewound armatures and repaired electric motors, he lighted the small gas burner.

The resultant report was heard for several hundred yards. It came from an explosion that blew the roof off the building, thrust its sides into the neighboring yards and sent Hockenberry to the floor, badly burned about the face and hands.

M. L. Mellott, Baltimore & Ohio agent here, said, "I saw it all happen. That roof went 30 feet into the air."

Neighbors and employees of Plant 4 of Fate-Root-Heath Co. rushed to Hockenberry's aid. He was partially pinned under the southwest corner of the building, but was freed in a matter of moments and rushed in the McQuate ambulance to Willard.

"It was a miracle," said Fire Chief Dalton F. McDougal, "that there was no fire." Only a few smoldering bits were detected in the rubble.

THE IMPACT OF THE explosion broke window panes as far away as Porter street, where Judson A. Morrison reported two broken panes. Some panes in the parsonage of First Evangelical Lutheran church were broken.

The blast tipped the storm windows from the home of Roy Carter, next door to the north of the Hockenberry place, and left them unbroken. But the windows they were protecting were saved in.

The boiler of the kitchen, to the south of the Hockenberrys, also was damaged. It is surmised that leaking gas had collected in the shop building, which Hockenberry had only recently constructed. He formerly rented quarters in the Cornell hotel building.

The building was not covered by insurance, it was reported.

Fire Chief McDougal laid the explosion to forgetfulness Tuesday morning.

"The Hockenberrys had a hot plate out in back of the building, which was connected to the main gas line at the southwest corner of the building that blew up. It was the job of the two boys to disconnect this 19-foot hose each night. They did so on Sunday and on Monday their father apparently forgot about it, so when he turned on the gas Monday he didn't realize the back of the building would fill up with gas. That's what exploded — that gas in the back that ran out of the disconnected hose to the hot plate."

Lutheran church gets home for aged

Gift of a 23-room mansion on a two-acre plot in Ashland paved the way today for the establishment of the Good Shepherd Home for the Aged by Lutheran churches in Plymouth and the nine-county central Ohio area.

One of Ashland's most beautiful residences, the three-story brick-and-stone mansion in Center street was the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Clark. Mr. Clark was the co-founder and president of Dr. Hess and Clark, Inc. He died in 1942. Mrs. Clark died last year.

The gift is a memorial to Mr. and Mrs. Clark and their son, Marshall, who died in 1954. The donors are another son, Donald E. Clark of Ashland, and two daughters, Mrs. Thomas W. Casey, Fairhaven, Mass., and Mrs. Robert D. Ingman of Ashland, and the Clark Foundation. No

monetary value was made known. It is believed the gift amounts to over \$200,000. All furnishings, fixtures and equipment in and about the premises are included.

THE MANSION, BESIDES its multiplicity of rooms, contains spacious third-floor ballroom. It is English Tudor in architecture. Unoccupied, but continuously maintained, it is described by architects as "ideal for economical conversion into a comfortable home for the aged, and of a type far removed from and superior to the institution-type homes existing in many parts of Ohio and the nation."

The gift comes to the board of trustees of the Good Shepherd home through a transaction which includes a lease agreement containing "guaranteed performance" clauses for a period of five years,

and upon successful completion the property then goes to the Good Shepherd trustees in final ownership.

The lease agreement requires the trustees to show funds of \$100,000 before launching operations of the home.

The agreement, however, permits the trustees to enter possession of the premises to begin alterations with half of the total amount required, or \$50,000.

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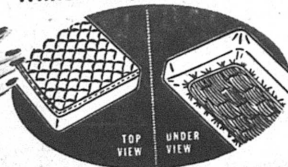

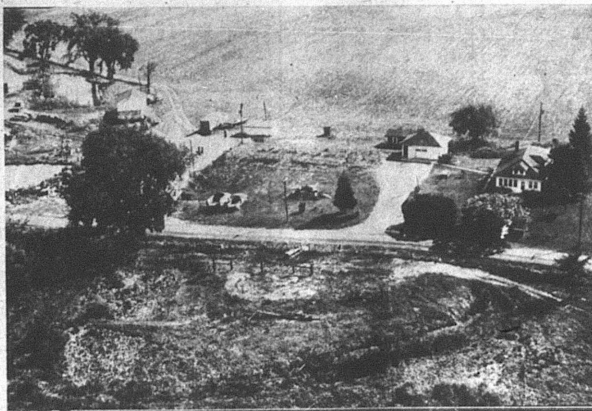

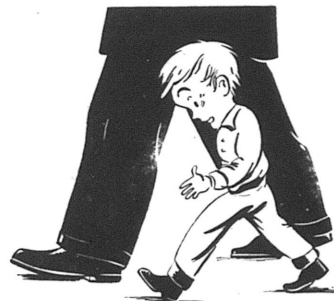
