Civil war battle story in old sheet

George Streit advertised groceries in his shop in the Old Fellows building and J. M. Holton promoted nostrums in the Plymouth Drug store at the southwest corner of the Square.

Lead story was the battle of Chickamauga, clipped from the Cincinnati Commercial, and a local bit reported the death of Thomas Bodley, a Plymouth soldier serving as a first lieutenant with Ohio volunteers, in that bloody engagement.

THUS A NEAR MINT COPY of The Plymouth Advertiser of Saturday morning, Oct. 3, 1863, labelled Vol 10, No. 49, reflects its times.

It was found and exhibiting this week by Fred Brown, Willard, whose son-in-law, Jay W. Brown, is assistant manager of Plymouth Drive In theatre.

Mr. Brown is an incunabulist and rare stamp, newspaper and historical item collector.

The Advertiser reported the death by suicide of a Dr. Grifphy at Havana. He used a razor on his throat.

AND THERE IS AN ITEM about the marriage of Philemon T. Light of Plymouth to Miss Sophronia Barlow at her father's home in Olenia. It occurred Oct. 1, 1863.

J. K. Kirtland lost half of the index finger of his right hand in an accident at John Beelman's establishment. He was sawing gun stocks and the hand slipped against the saw.

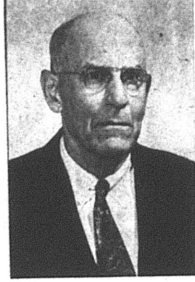

Four councilmen decline to run for reelection, two undecided

With only 13 days remaining in which to circulate and file nominating petitions, a single avowed candidate has appeared and four councilmen have said they won't file for reelection.

Hard after the \$4,300 annual pay of the combined jobs of village clerk and clerk of the Board of Public Affairs is Carl V. Ellis, incumbent. He is completing his second two-year term in the office.

SALARY OF THE OFFICE was raised \$600 annually by the village council last week in an emergency ordinance. Clerk's job now pays \$2,100 annually. Post of assistant clerk, which has come

years been considered a family affair, is \$2,200.

Councilmen Charles Vanasdale, Omer Burkett, Ira Brougher and Clarence Ervin declare they can't be persuaded to run again. Burkett is the dean of the council.

Councilmen John T. Dick and Lowell Keith are wavering. It is understood Keith will run if he can induce at least two other candidates who subscribe to his economy-line to file with him.

MAYOR THURMAN Ford said he wouldn't run for reelection several months ago and intends to stick to it, he said Friday.

No candidate for the office has come forward. There has been

support for Whitney J. Briggs, a former mayor. Whether he will run was not indicated in a survey early this week.

Terms of three trustees of the Board of Public Affairs will also expire. They are George W. Cheesman, Robert L. McIntire and Luther R. Fetter.

SIGNS WERE MONDAY that all three would file again, to "carry on the program of economy which was started in 1956".

Treasurer James Rhine is expected to file again. Petitions must carry the signatures of 25 qualified electors and be submitted with the filing fee to the Richland county board of elections before 4 p.m. Aug. 7.

Dairy president resigns because 'unfair to keep it'

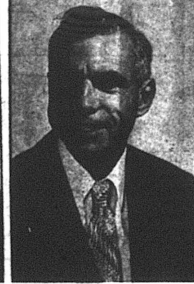
Head of a Willard dairy has resigned his post on the board of education there because he thinks it unfair to his stockholders to deny them access to a lucrative sales account.

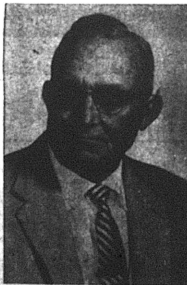

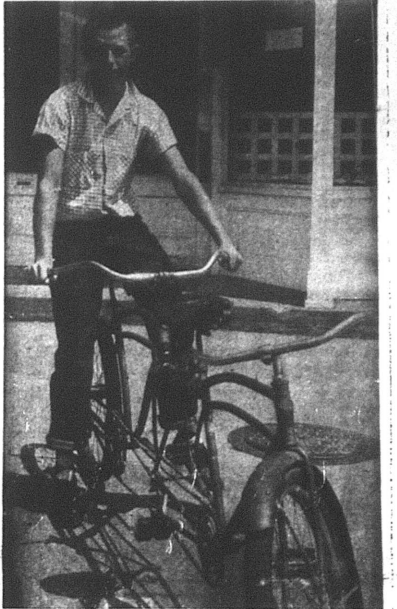

Told by his physician he had a suspicious lozenge on his tongue, the disbelieving Evans went to the celebrated Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn. He was frankly sceptical.

Admitted on July 2, after a day-and-a-half drive from Plymouth, Evans was told the diagnosis was positive. He submitted to the knife the following day.

The lozenge and glands in the right side of the neck were removed.

"You may get cancer again," doctors told him, "but if you do, you'll have caught it all over again. Because we got it all. You're one in a thousand, if you'd waited another two months, we couldn't have done a thing for you."

The background of the present school bond difficulties is an interesting study of what you get into when you go into something blind.

After transfer of Richland county school territory to Huron county was decided upon, the capable Richland county school boss, Dale Kinney, sought legal advice from the prosecutor, Ted Lutz, on how to go about it.

IT WAS DECIDED TO DO SO BY A SINGLE resolution. Lutz was a classmate of Bill Saxbe, the attorney-general, and naturally thought Saxbe would ring him by phone to let him know an opinion handed down in Lutz's bailiwick would be adverse.

But it wasn't done that way, and the attorney-general said in writing, by mail, that existing law doesn't authorize transfer of two districts in one resolution. Hence, it's illegal.

Now it doesn't have much effect upon the legality of the existence of Huron Valley and Iroquois school districts. They'll go on functioning, the attorney-general has said, and the contracts entered into with teachers and suppliers won't be in jeopardy.

BUT THE FACT IS THAT THOSE WHO invest money in the bond market got wind of the attorney-general's decision and are likely, concludes Squires, Sanders & Dempsey, the excellent

the less in confidence and value than if there were no adverse decision.

They advised doing it all over, or trying to get a Supreme Court decision. Both of these are risky businesses. Depending on the local situation, which is the more risky is a matter of opinion.

At the Huron Valley board saw it — and we think rightly — to do it all over again would consume at least 60 days in waiting time (two remonstrance periods are required by law) and there wouldn't be a chance of getting the bond issue on the November ballot.

THIS WOULD MEAN THAT THE 55 PER cent majority vote needed to pass the issue would go by the boards. In a special election, the figure has to be 60 per cent.

But, the board reasoned, none of the four districts which entered the consolidation had ever failed to give support to a school bond issue and there isn't much reason to believe this would occur now or in a special election.

That is why the board decided to go through the whole thing all over again. And it reasoned, also correctly, that a favorable decision of the Supreme Court is also risky business: who can tell what the court will say, or when?

NOT SO IN IROQUOIS DISTRICT. FOR one thing, the board there reasoned that the bond issue will encounter substantial opposition. It will need every vote. Why risk a 60 per cent decision if there is a chance at the 55 per cent approval? Also, dissident elements, notably in Ripley township and in Shiloh, had already filed remonstrance petitions. Why give them an opportunity to do it all over again?

The board reasoned it would not be in the best interests of harmony in the district or of good education for boys and girls to stir up a fight. So, on the advice of Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, it chose the action reported elsewhere in this newspaper today.

Because Iroquois local school district's board of education anticipates a close vote on the \$890,000 bond issue to build a consolidated high school and doesn't want to risk losing in a special election, where the majority would have to be 60 instead of 55 per cent, the board will not follow the procedure decided upon by the Huron Valley board.

Squire, Sanders & Dempsey advised going through the whole procedure again, not to undermine what has been done but to clear up any possible objection to the validity of the transfer that might affect the legality and security of the bonds in a tenuous market.

IT WAS THIS COURSE which the Huron Valley district elected to follow.

Because of dissidence of a vocal minority in Shiloh, the Iroquois board told the Cleveland attorneys it was reluctant to follow the procedure. It didn't want to reopen old wounds.

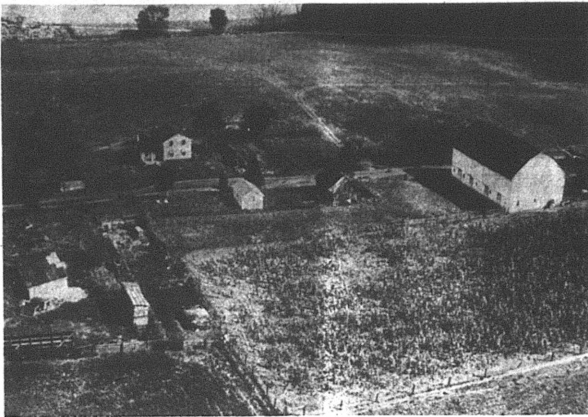
What Iroquois plans to do, it was learned Friday, is:

1. Persist in the legislation already approved by the board.
2. Have its clerk refuse to accept the bonds, on the legal grounds the transfer of districts was not legal, as stated by the attorney-general.
3. Initiate a suit for writ of mandamus to compel the clerk to accept the bonds. This would be heard by the common pleas court at Norwalk, whose ruling would determine whether the bonds would be successfully reinforced by the action so far taken as to be credible in the market. In the event of an adverse decision, an appeal could be taken.
4. These actions shall be taken before Nov. 7.

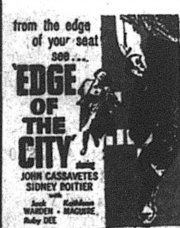

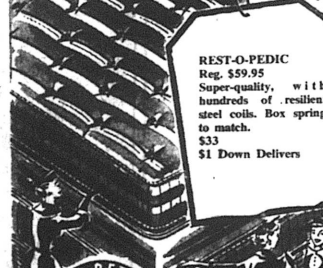
