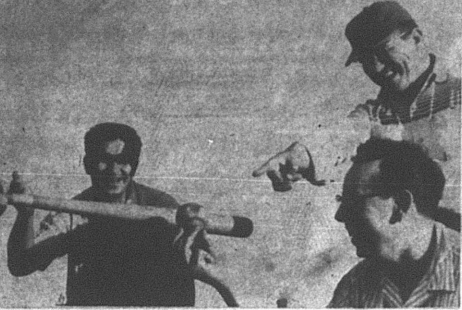

Henry says increase in telephone rates may not be so big

Northern Ohio Telephone Co. is not sanguine over the prospect of an increase in telephone rates at the level it requested of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.

William C. Henry, president of the firm, said in Norwalk Friday night he doesn't expect the PUCO to give the company all it has asked for.

HE SAID HE BASES THIS conclusion on the notion that some items inserted in the plant and equipment inventory by the company will be disallowed by the PUCO.

Mansfield Telephone Co. got only 74 per cent of its request. Henry told a meeting of Farm officials, and how much NOTCO will get is likely to be known after the middle of August.

Opposition to the proposed increase has, so far, Henry said, "not amounted to much." Norwalk was one of three cities which voted funds to finance a protest. Told by some Farm Bureau members that service of NOTCO leaves "something to be desired," Henry said the PUCO is forbidden by law to consider service complaints during rate hearings.

The board indicated no desire to allow the building to be sold.

At the meeting held at the home of Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., leaders and committee members heard Mrs. T. R. Conklin of Ashland tell of the organization of the Ashland council's day camp. She was accompanied by Mrs. Clifford Lowe who helped with the older girl's camp in Ashland.

During a short business meeting under the direction of Mrs. Samuel G. Schroeder, president of the council, Mrs. Roy Carter was chosen vice-president.

All junior high pupils to attend classes at New Haven school

All seventh and eighth grade pupils enrolled in Huron Valley Local school district will attend classes at the New Haven building beginning this September.

In a special meeting Thursday night, the Board of Education, adopted a program of assigning pupils among the available buildings. Anticipating the passage of a bond issue on the November ballot for the building of a new high school building, the board will retain some pupils in Willard High school until 1959.

PUPILS PRESENTLY ENROLLED in the New Haven and Plymouth High school buildings will attend classes at Plymouth. All ninth graders enrolled in the 1958-59 school year will attend classes at the Plymouth building.

In the interim period tuition will be paid by the board to the Willard school for ninth, 10th, 11th, and 12th graders of the

Richmond and Greenfield schools for the 1957-58 school year. The following year, tuition will only be paid for 10th, 11th, and 12th graders. No tuition will be paid during the 1959-1960 school year, when it is hoped the new building will be ready. All students will enter it unless they wish to continue at Willard by paying their own tuition.

In other action, the board assigned Lloyd B. Ray as principal of the Plymouth elementary school. He has served as principal at the Richmond school. That position was left unfilled for the time being. Robert F. Pleunik will be principal of the junior high school at New Haven. Clyde Wicker was assigned the principalship at the Greenfield building and Erskine T. Richmond was named principal of the New Haven elementary school.

Charles Marr, who has been retained as architect by the newly formed Board of Education, heard the board briefly outline his plans for the new building. Taking into account the steady year-by-year rise in school population, Mr. Marr suggested the building be planned to house 400 students, which will be the school population within a 10-year period. He planned to inspect the present buildings with Supt. M. J. Coon the following day and recommend repairs.

THE BOARD PASSED A RESOLUTION establishing the rate of pay for outside help for the schools. Superintendent Coon has been authorized to pay not above \$1.50 an hour for any labor.

The Marsh school building located in Bullhead road was sold at auction last week. A bid of \$2,190 by D. G. Dawson was high.

Paddock, Jr., editor and publisher of The Advertiser, as citizen members of the commission.

CHARLES VANASDALE will serve as representative of the council on the commission. His term will endure so long as he holds official position on the council.

The commission will meet in the village hall tomorrow to consider a draft ordinance, patterned after the Tipp City law, suggested by the Ohio Municipal League as a good example of zoning.

Vanasdale will be chairman of the commission and Mrs. Akers will serve as secretary.

WHETHER THE COMMISSION will propose an interim "freeze" ordinance, which would prohibit altering the status quo in building here — until it can come up with a full-dress ordinance was undecided last night.

A spontaneous gesture engineered by Plymouth Chamber of Commerce will replace, in part, the losses of the James P. Nowakowski in a fire June 22.

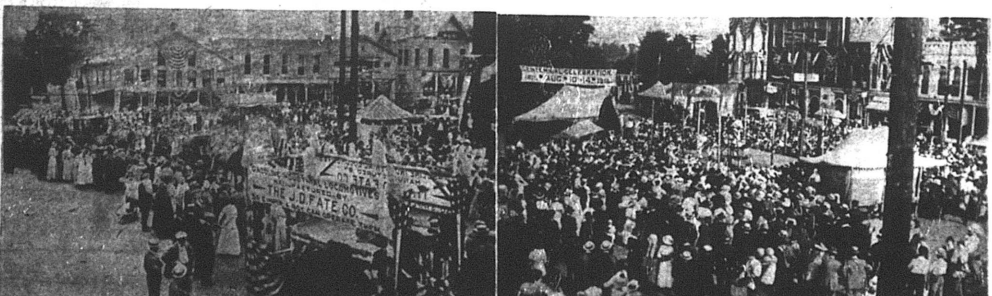

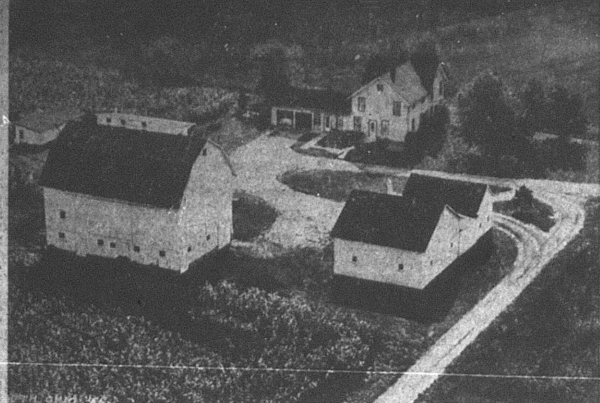

The Rev. Robert F. Hall joined Lutheran colleagues Sunday to lay plans for raising \$100,000 for the Good Shepherd Lutheran Home for the Aged Ashland.

Ministers from 40 Lutheran congregations met at the J. L. Clark mansion in Ashland recently given to the Good Shepherd trustees under the agreement by which the mansion and its surrounding grounds will become a home for the aged.

IN THEIR FIRST CAMPAIGN move, the Good Shepherd trustees announced the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Edward P. Scharf, Lucas, as chairman of the campaign to raise \$50,000 which will give the trustees possession of the home to make necessary alterations. Operation of the home is permitted when the remaining \$50,000 is raised.

The Rev. Dr. Scharf outlined the campaign program. The ministers were conducted on a tour of the mansion prior to the business meeting. The Rev. Dr. Scharf is a retired Lutheran pastor who participated in a number of campaigns supporting Lutheran causes.

During his active service in the ministry he was pastor at Urbana, Crestline, and the Stone Creek parishes in Ohio, and in Chicago and Freeport, Ill. He was pastor at St. Paul and Pleasant Valley, Lucas, at the time of his retirement. The Rev. Dr. Scharf participated in three financial campaigns for Wittenberg college,

Springfield, and was director of the Carthage college appeal in the Illinois synod. He has served as chairman of the stewardship committee of the Synod of Ohio, where he became acquainted with Mr. Clark, who was one of the founders of the now national Lutheran laymen's movement for stewardship. The Rev. Dr. Scharf has also served on the Board of directors of the Oesterlen home for children, Springfield, and the board of Wittenberg college.

These are times, it was once written, that try men's souls. 'Twas Tom Paine who penned those words, and while it was a bit dangerous once to espouse his writings and preachings (that was when the late, unlamented junior senator from Wisconsin had Washington, the 48 states and the rest of the world cowed), isn't that just what the Rev. Billy Graham is up to now?

Brother Graham certainly must have something, though we confess we've never seen the chap, not even on TV. But our neighbor, Mrs. George J. Searle, has had tea with the evangelist, and she says he is, pure and simple, a very dynamic man.

CERTAINLY DYNAMISM IS WHAT'S needed nowadays to awaken a materialistic world to the Word. The Rev. Mr. Graham seems to have equal effect upon rich and poor, sick and well, believing and non-believing alike.

Mrs. Searle reports she met him in the company of some friends of her daughter, Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, when other guests included a generous sprinkling of the names that make finance, business, investment and the 400, as well.

He was at ease, yet he drew these sophisticated, poised people like honey draws flies.

AN OLD-TIME MINISTER OF OUR AC-quaintance once said that a good minister knows the Word and knows how to say it. A sound observation, that.

For our part, having been brought up in a family that distrusted hellfire-and-brimstone preaching by reason of its New England upbringing, in part, we have always been a little bit leery of passionate preachers.

We've always thought religion, any brand of it, should be a matter of mind over emotion. This egghead approach is probably the reason we haven't found a permanent home in any sect.

AND WE DOUBT THAT BILLY GRAHAM would do us much good along that line. But we're convinced he's on the right pitch. What took place in Cleveland the other day, when the Christian Congregationalist church and the Evangelical and Reformed church, dissimilar ethnically and traditionally, united as the United Church

of Christ, merely supports the sage observation, that what's happening in religion is that a lot of sects are burying their personal and private hatchets in favor of the Word.

Which is, we think, as it should be.

"In my house are many mansions, saith the Lord." There's room for all of us. And with independence day coming up, when we think of the liberties that are ours because of what some iconoclasts did in 1776, it's good to ponder upon the freedom of religious choice.

Choosing God, as we see it (and this is Billy Graham's real message), is more important than choosing what brand of God's product you'll buy.

Walt Shockey, editor and publisher of the Liberty Center Press, has his belly full of presidential news hounds writing of every quirk and pain of President Eisenhower. He feels his own belly-aches are important and thus, news worthy. He writes in his column, Penpoints:

"BEING THE publisher and editor of this here weekly chronicle gives us certain rights and privileges. And by heck, the next time we get the bellyache we are going to make a major crisis out of it and blurb it all over the front page of our paper."

LOCAL EDITOR GETS BELLYACHE

Burps Three Times In One Day

"Walt Shockey, local editor, was stricken with the stomachache at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday while reclining on the sofa watching television.

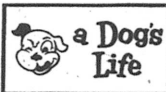

SKIN AILMENTS

by E. M. Gildow, D.V.M.

Skin ailments in dogs are as numerous as those in humans. They may be simple in origin as those caused by cuts in the skin, friction with inflammation or callouses, burns, chemical irritation as from lye, acid, or irritant antiseptics, or from too frequent bathing with or without the use of irritating soaps.

On the other hand, the cause may be more difficult to determine such as hormone dis-

turbances, allergic dermatitis from contact with certain allergic producing substances, from occasional internal or external medicinal treatments or from specific foods, from skin tumors, bacterial infections, fungi (ringworm), mange, lice and fleas.

This large group of causes of skin ailments may be confusing to the dog owner. However, one can treat the simple ailments and call the local veterinarian for help if the trouble is severe or persists.

Minor skin injuries can be cleaned with mild soap and water and treated with a healing powder.

One of the commonest causes of summer dermatitis is the common flea. This dermatitis consists of itching areas on the back above the tail, over the shoulders, or on other areas. It is associated with a moist exudate or discharge or a bald spot with thickening and sloughing of scabs or dandruff-like material.

Control of fleas and simple treatment of the area involved will usually control this skin ailment.

Feeding Tip: Dogs, like children, often prefer candy to vegetable, meat, and potatoes. Your dog will be better nourished with a complete dog food like Friskies.

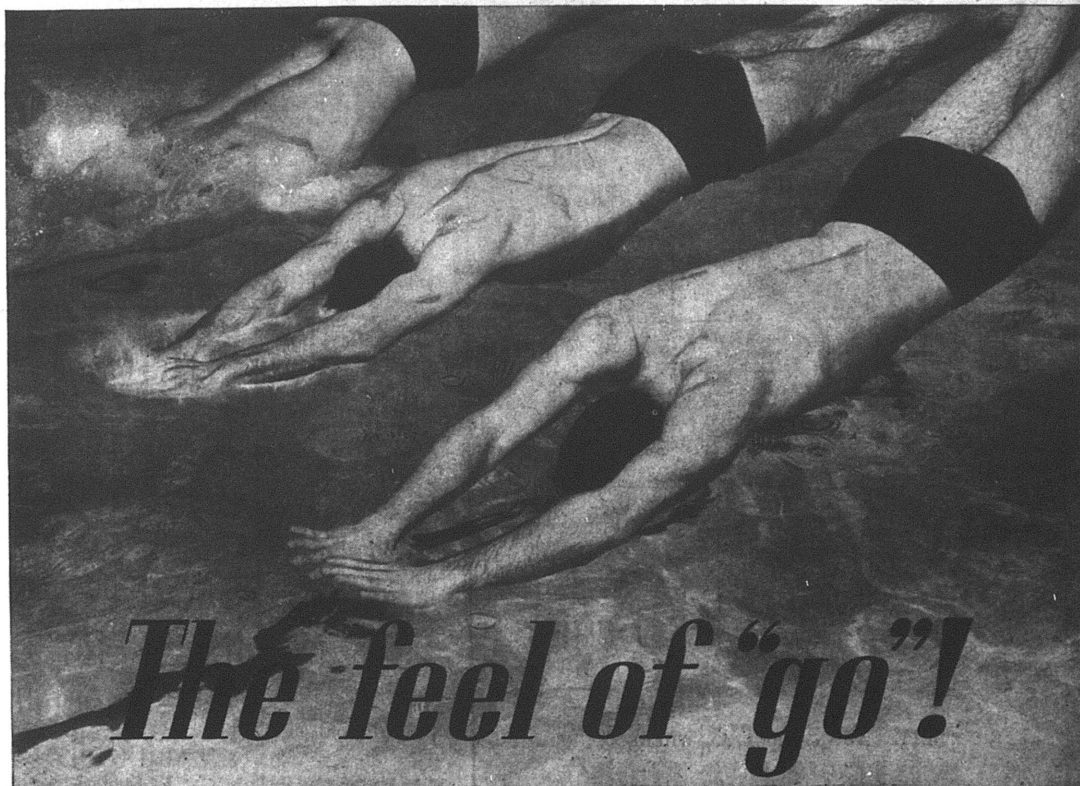

Judge says no to bid of Ripley

Because petitioners failed to file the required briefs, Huron County Common Pleas Judge Robert J. Vetter has refused to grant a permanent injunction to Ripley township petitioners who seek to upset the school consolidation of South-Central and Shiloh districts.

The consolidation is now a matter of record, Judge Vetter ruled. He allowed seven days for filing of petitioners' briefs, five days for response by Prosecutor of the Common Pleas Bernard W. Freeman, representing Huron county school board, and three days for a reply in rebuttal thereto.

NONE OF THESE BRIEFS was filed, Judge Vetter implied the suit was capricious and tendentious and obstructive in nature.

Petitioners were represented by Zeiber and Savord, Sandusky. Shiloh interests were represented by Allen M. Hartman, Shelby.

Petitioners argued the decision of the Huron county school board to consolidate the two districts was arbitrary and counter to law, in that a previous petition to organize a citizen's committee had not been acted upon.

The court in its ruling said its decision was reached on its own research and thinking.

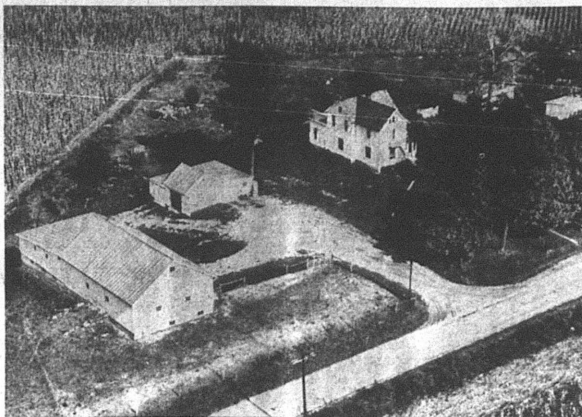

Federal funds used up: state

"All monies made available by the federal government for sewer construction in Ohio have been appropriated for this year," the water pollution control board said at Columbus Monday.

"If the village of Shiloh or any other village thinks it should have some of these funds, it will have to wait at least a year. So far, the

Congress hasn't indicated whether it will replenish these funds."

Shiloh intends to apply for federal funds to assist in the construction of a \$170,000 sewer disposal system.

John Cunniff, Mansfield, has been appointed to represent the village in its endeavor to obtain these funds.

Under the existing law, Shiloh would be eligible for up to 30 per cent of the estimated cost of the project. This would amount

to \$53,700 if the state were to approve maximum participation.

"We didn't authorize any town the maximum amount for which it was eligible," the water pollution control board told The Advertiser Monday. "But tell 'em to send in their application — we'll give it just as much consideration as the others get."
