

Schools open Sept. 3 for half day session

Huron Valley schools will open at 8:30 a.m. Sept. 3, for the 1957-58 school term. Supt. M. J. Coon announces. School will be in session only one half day and pupils will be home at noon.

Bus schedules for Richmond township will be the same as last year. Students are to be ready for the bus 15 minutes early on the first day of school. Pupils from Celeryville attending Willard High school are to board Bus No. 7. Students attending the Huron Valley High school at Plymouth are to board Bus No. 6.

BUS SCHEDULES FOR Greenfield township will be the same as last year. Students should be ready 15 minutes early the first day of school.

Funds not stopped for new school use

State board of education has refused to intervene in the question of whether the transfer of Shioh and Plymouth school districts to Huron county is legal.

Ronald R. Howard, clerk of the old Shioh board, asked the board Aug. 12 to step in to declare the transfer illegal on the basis of the June 16 decision of Attorney General William Saxbe. The board refused to do so, but neither did it comment upon the legality, favorably or otherwise.

THE BOARD SAID, IN ESSENCE, "we didn't make the transfer nor create the new district, it's not within our province to do so, and we're not venturing any opinion on the matter."

Huron Valley and Troquois local school districts have entered in the board's book of accounts as operating districts eligible to receive state funds.

NO ACTION TO DENY state support funds to the two districts has been taken, the board said. There was a report current in Shioh that this step had been taken.

Huron County Supt. Ralph W. Brown said Monday the "two districts are operating and will continue to do so until some change is directed."

Letters to the Editor

Huron County Prosecutor Bernard W. Freeman has not yet moved against Howard to compel him to surrender books and records of the old Shioh district.

Since an article in last week's Advertiser brought inquiries concerning professional requirements for teachers, it is hoped that the following explanation may be of help to all persons who do not have an exact knowledge for such requirements.

The following is quoted from LAWS and REGULATIONS Governing the Certification of Teachers, etc.: (Issued by R. M. Eymann, Supt. of Public Instruction.)

"Renewal of Temporary Certification. No temporary certificate issued for full-time teaching in elementary, high school or special fields will be renewed, except upon: (1) The request of the employing superintendent, certifying that he could not fill the position with a suitable teacher holding a standard certificate, and (2) evidence of the completion of six semester hours of additional training applicable to the requirements for standard certification in the applicant's field of teaching.

To be eligible for a provisional cadet elementary certificate a teacher must have completed a certain 62 semester hours of college work.

To be eligible for a provisional elementary certificate one must have completed two years of college work or as much as 124 semester hours.

To be eligible for a provisional high school certificate one must have four years of college work and between 20 and 45 appropriate credit hours for the subjects one desires to teach, depending upon the subject.

To convert the provisional elementary certificate to an eight-year professional one must have evidence of: (1) Twenty-four months of successful teaching experience under the provisional elementary certificate, and (2) A degree in elementary education.

Since I was allowed by the State Department of Education to hold a temporary certificate with 41 hours of credits I have in the last two summers added 16 more hours (a half-year of college work), one wonders what more that I could have done to show the board that teaching was my chosen profession. I was guided by the college in my choice of subjects and am short five credits (62 credits).

Ex-Plymouthite in earthquake

An ex-Plymouthite is alive and safe today after a harrowing experience in the earthquake which shook Mexico City several times last month.

An eyewitness report of the calamity is recorded by Mrs. Letha Burchard, who was vacationing at the Hotel Regis, in the center of the city, at the time.

"At 2:50 a.m. I got out of bed and was thrown against the wall. Then back on the bed. The chandelier was hitting the ceiling on either side like a bell ringing. I got my robe on, slippers, grabbed a short jacket, made my way out in the hall to the elevator.

"**THEY WERE LOCKED.** I found the back stairs, descended to the lobby. Front door to the street was jammed, just room for one person to pass at a time. By that time I had a string of frightened followers.

"I made my way across the Esplanade (an eight-lane street) which was solid from side to side with broken glass, and more still flying.

"When I reached the center of the street, the quake began to stop its violence. In five minutes people were streaming all around. "Hundreds crossed the intersection to a park and stayed there until eight o'clock in the morning.

They were in pajamas, nightgowns, and all kinds of unbecoming attire. Some were fully dressed and carrying their luggage.

"**AT 5 A.M. I WENT BACK** inside the hotel. They had opened the kitchen and had made coffee which the hotel staff and the few people they had persuaded to sit down inside were drinking. I did not stop.

"I went back to my room on the fourth floor, fully expecting the second tremor. Just as I got inside my room, it came, but very light. About 8:30 a.m. I went to bed and slept until 1 p.m.

"Got up and dressed, and at 2:15 another small quiver came, which many did not even notice. "The walls and ceiling of our hotel were cracked three and four inches in places. Plaster fell everywhere, and it rained plaster dust. Marble blocks were loosened and the huge chandeliers in the hotel lobby with hundreds of pounds of glass prisms were doubled up like some giant hand had twisted them.

"**THE 12-STORY NATIONAL Bank** building directly in front of the hotel leaned and rocked like a small tree top in a storm. Not a window was left in it without all or some part missing. The nearby Hotel El Prado rocked as

though it was going to meet the buildings on either side of it.

"The inside of the new Hotel Hilton collapsed and they had to evacuate all their guests. Statues crumbled in the street. Apartment buildings were flattened. Two thousand people were trying to get out the city even at 5 a.m.

"**I DID NOT MAKE ANY** effort because as I saw the earthquake was over. No need to run then. But, one week later at approximately the same time, they had another. Police were busy patrolling to keep order and prevent theft.

"All lights were out for a time, high tension wires, were down and power houses out. "Mexico City stands at such a high altitude and is very cold at night. I shivered and chilled in my light attire, almost froze. Some people panicked, some were praying, some cursing, and all were running.

"**AS SOON AS THE VIOLENCE** subsided, my fear was gone. I was one of the very, very few who went back to bed at all that night or the following day. "I thanked God for being alive and dismissed it, for it truly was a miracle that the hotel stood. "Mrs. Burchard is the former Letha Rugg of Plymouth.
