"If the dog is comfortable on the way to the event," say the brothers Forquer, "he'll certainly do better when he gets there."

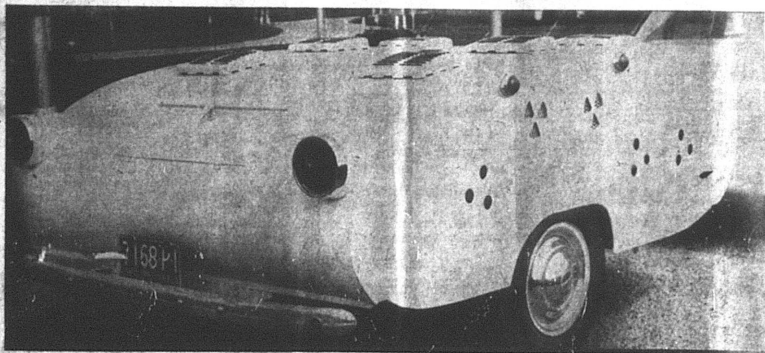

What other communities of Plymouth's size have done was revealed in part by the Chamber secretary, Miss Madeleine H. Smith, who reported that Archbold, in Fulton county, with a population of 1,464 and no local industry, raised \$17,000, of which \$15,000 in cash, in its community chest.

The text of the weekly messages is couched in non-denominational terms. They urge the godly — and we are constructed in His image — to attend church regularly, without shame or guilt, according to one's choice.

If our sincere hope our readers will find these messages inspiring and worth while. Remember that they are brought each week by business houses who seek a better community first.

A better community makes for better business, that's why.

For those candidates who seem to us to know what they're about curriculum-wise, who are most likely to see to it that our children, both of 'em, receive the best instruction in the best program of instruction that can be obtained, regardless of cost.

Now it's true that four candidates live in Plymouth. And the others live in other areas of the district, less populous than Plymouth and, if our little friend's theory is correct, with less access to popular vote.

We don't think this is true and while we have on some occasions cast aspersions that we felt are justified against the intelligence of the electorate. We doubt very much that voters in Huron Valley school district will choose members because they happen to live in Plymouth.

We don't choose senators that way, do we? For years Ohio's senators have hailed from either Cokes or Cincinnati. Anything to prevent the folks of, say, Delaware from putting their candidate forward and trying to elect him?

Not at all. The same is true here. It's the democratic procedure.

GOOD SCHOOLS ARE MADE BY GOOD teachers. Good teachers can be laid and kept by treating them right, by paying them well, by affording them respect and community prestige, and by evincing interest in what they do and what how they teach, suggesting constructively where that is indicated.

You can have a good school with a bad building, or with no building at all. Abe Lincoln had a good teacher and he learned by firelight. You can have a bad school with a good building.

THE ANSWER IS IN THE TEACHING. Good teachers teaching a well-planned curriculum, dedicated principally to the education of the mind and secondarily to the "group adjustment" psychology and only incidentally to muscular controls (eight of the 15 professionals on the high school staff dedicate the major part of their teaching time to this latter), will develop a good school.

A good school, good churches and free enterprise. He says make a good community. Let these thoughts, we suggest, be a guide to what action to take.

The little man around the corner hailed us the other day and bent our ear for a short spell upon a good point.

"It shouldn't be that our board of education," he said, "should be composed of four members from the biggest town in the district and one from outside. You ought to do something about it. At least at the beginning, we ought to have representation from each district."

We don't look at it that way. Not exactly, anyway.

THE FIRST DUTY OF A MEMBER OF A board of education, whether here or anywhere, is, we hold, the improvement of the curriculum so that it is second to none anywhere, for whatever price.

The only justification for a school is to educate. To educate toward a norm or median is both stupid and foolhardy, we think. Education should be directed toward the grasping of all that can be taught, by every pupil, although allowance must certainly be made for those who learn faster and better than others.

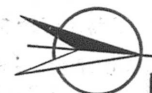
(That allowance, incidentally, is that teachers should work harder to get through to those pupils. No other.)

The problems of housing pupils are important, but it seems to us that boards of education are principally concerned with building new buildings or adding on to old ones and less with what is being taught, how much, and how well.

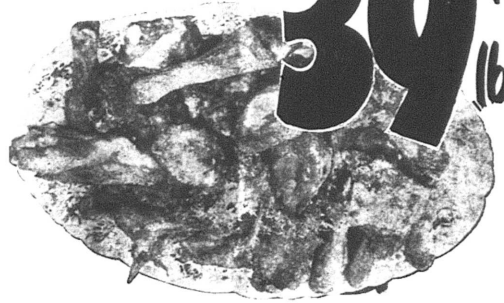

Taylor scores four TD's, Vees romp in NCC win over Milan

Mr. Inside went inside for 57 yards and Mr. Outside went outside for four scores here Friday night as Huron Valley High school turned in its first victory of the season over Milan, 32 to 0.

On balance, the defending champs showed defensive weaknesses. Undermanned and inexperienced, the Indians moved convincingly through the Vees' line during the second half. Indeed, they out-statisticked the Vees, first-down-wise, eight to five.

INDIVIDUALLY, EDDIE Taylor, Huron Valley's senior halfback, was the bright spot of the contest, played before some 375 delighted fans.

After his eleven had kicked off and held the Indians to a seven-yard gain, Ray Einsel fielded a punt and returned to the Indian 45.

Here the Vees' began to crunch toward the goal. Duane Utiss bore the brunt of the attack. A five-yard penalty against the visitors and Utiss' bull-like punches off guard brought the ball to the two.

Taylor's signal was called and he produced the score. Utiss' buck for the extra point was good.

NEXT TIME THE WINNERS gained possession, they sprung Utiss loose over right tackle for 57 yards. It was the first play of the series. Dick Fidler failed to convert on a buck over guard.

Early in the second period, after Jerry Colohan, easily the standout among the Indian representatives, had racked up an eight-yard advance, only to lose

possession on downs, Einsel started on the option play around right ed. He pitched out to Taylor, who shifted into high gear and romped down the north side line without a hand touching him. A crushing block by Utiss cleared the road. Ted Fox kicked the extra point.

FIVE PLAYS LATER, after Milan had quick-kicked to gain an advantage, Einsel sent Utiss off guard for five before calling the option again. Taylor produced this time for 56 yards.

The Indians were a different ball club in the second half. Admittedly, part of the time the Huron Valley second unit was in. But when they shifted into a single wing formation, the Indians gained through the first unit and showed weaknesses in the Vees' defense.

Late in the period, Taylor rounded his right end for his fourth touchdown. Dick Akar delivered a devastating block in the Indian secondary to remove the last man with a chance to touch the flying senior.

THEREAFTER THE INDIANS gained consistently and with a better passing attack might have done better. The single wing confused the Vees and Coach Lew Pettit substituted freely to develop strength at weak points.

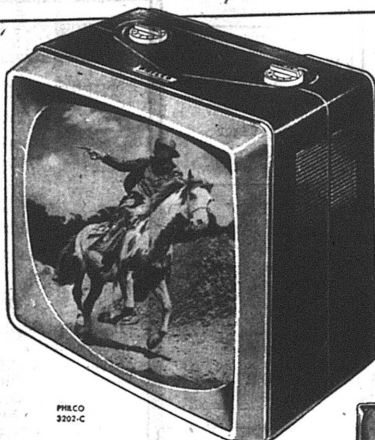
