

Education should be directed toward the grasping of all that can be taught, by every pupil, although allowance must certainly be made for those who learn faster and better than others.

(That allowance, incidentally, is that teachers should work harder to get through to those pupils. No other.)

The problems of housing pupils are important, ut it seems to us that boards of education are principally concerned with building new buildings or adding on to old ones and less with what is being taught, how much, and how well.
